Lincoln City Directories, School Directories, or School Records or Histories--

When cleaning out the attic, the trunk or a box of books, please before you throw them out, consider whether they have history of a nature that we could use in our research at the library. Contact our librarian, Mildred Devanny (Mrs. Jack).

The Lincoln Public Library has available World Conference Records in Volumes 1 - 13, with No. 13 being the index to proceedings by author and text. These records are the lectures given at the 1980 World Conference on Records at Salt Lake City, Utah. The lectures could be an excellent source of program material for genealogical societies. These books are not for check out, but can be used at the Library.

History of Logan County to be printed

A general history book of Logan County, to be printed in 1982, will include historical sketches of the families in the County, histories of various organizations, businesses, schools, landmarks and churches. The general county history will be updated from the 1911 Stringer's History of Logan County.

Each family in the county will be asked to write an historical sketch. This project is to be organized by townships, with a chairman in each township. Every family will receive a notice of the details of the history project along with the name of their township chairman, whom they can call to answer questions that they may have.

Each family may submit one black and white picture to accompany the story which is limited to 500 words.

Suggestions and Items to Consider in Writing a Family History

1. When and why your family came to the County.
2. Your birth: when, where, parents
3. Your childhood: association with brothers and sisters, visitors, unusual happenings, trips, playmates, relatives you remember, religion in your home, financial condition of parents that influenced your lifestyle.
4. Your school days: schools attended, teachers, courses studied, special activities, achievements, humorous situations, who or what influenced you.
5. Your courtship and marriage: meeting your spouse, proposal, wedding, parties, honeymoon, meeting your in-laws.
6. Your activities: vacations, jobs, attendance at church, other church functions, scouting, 4-H, sports, tasks at home, fun and funny situations.
7. Settling down to married life: your new home, housekeeping, joys and sorrows, making ends meet.
8. Your vocations: training for your job, promotions, companies you worked for, salaries, associates, your own business.

9. Your children: names, dates and places of birth, health of mother before and after, how father fared, characteristics, habits, accomplishments, schooling, marriage, vocations, sicknesses, accidents, operations.
10. Your political and civic activities: positions held, services rendered, clubs, fraternities, and lodges you joined.
11. Your avocations: sports, home hobbies, dramatic and musical activities, reading habits, genealogy, travels, favorite songs, movies, books, writers, poems.
12. Your church activities: as a young person, churches attended, church positions, church certificates.
13. Special celebrations or holidays you remember: Easter, Christmas, national and local holiday vacations.
14. Plans and hopes for the future.

National Archives Microfilm Loan Program

To All Librarians;

Several months ago you were notified of the effects of budget and staff reductions on the interlibrary loan of National Archives microfilm from the Fort Worth Federal Archives and Records Center. Since then, through management initiatives, we increased the level of service, circulating 35,000 rolls of film a month. It is now clear, however, that in order to meet new budget goals, we will have to make additional personnel reductions. The equivalent of 181 full-time positions in the National Archives and Records Service must be eliminated by February 1982.

We regret that the interlibrary loan of National Archives microfilm from Fort Worth must be discontinued. New requests received as of December 10, 1981, or after will not be processed. All requests on hand as of this date will be returned.

We are exploring ways that this service might be resumed on a fee basis by a private sector firm. We have maintained records of all libraries that have borrowed film from Fort Worth and will announce future developments.

We appreciate your patience and cooperation as we have worked together to provide the public with this very popular service. More than 1 1/2 million rolls of film have been loaned since 1971, when the service began. We ask your further cooperation in the coming weeks in seeing that all microfilm is returned to Fort Worth. In the meantime, we urge all those who can do so to use the microfilm in reading rooms at the National Archives Building and in the 11 Federal Archives and Records Centers around the country, or to purchase the film at a price of \$15.00 per roll from the Publications Sales Branch (NEPS), NARS, Washington, D. C. 20408

Recipe For Paste That Bugs Don't Like!

1 cup flour 1/2 tsp. oil of cloves

1/2 tsp. powdered alum 1/2 tbsp. Formaldehyde

Mix flour and alum with cold water until smooth. Add enough warm water to make about 1 pint.

Cook until thick and starch-like. Just before removing from the stove, add 1/3 to 1/2 tsp. oil of cloves and the formaldehyde.

This makes a thick paste and must be thinned with water when used.

Eliphas T. Brown, born 1818 Jericho, Chittenden Co., Vermont; married first Metilda Jane McClane, born 1817 Kentucky; married second 11 January, 1860 Edwards Co., to Elizabeth Harris, born 1836 Tennessee; daughter of Richard and Martha Harris. Four children by first marriage and two by second marriage. Thomas McClane Brown, Orin Henry Brown, Louisa Jane Brown, George H. Brown, Marcus W. Brown and Charles Brown.

WILLIAM F. SEGELHORST

A well known blacksmith and wagon maker in the town of Venedy was born December 11, 1866 at (Okawville) Grand-Prairie, Ill. The youngest son of Conrad Segelhorst and wife Louise Huelskoetter. William went to live with his grandparents Huelskoetter at the age of 5 upon the death of his mother. He remained with them until after his confirmation at which time he went to work for Henry Grewe. At the age of 15 he went to Beaufort, Mo. to live with his sister Anna who was married to Henry Temme. William lived with them for 7 years

EDWIN L. RHEA

My immediate roots are in Washington County. I, Elva Peithman Rhea, was born in this county and lived here until my early twenties. I am a daughter of William and Alma (Haun) Peithman, their fourth child of six children. My paternal grandparents were Herman and Louise (Schnake) Peith-

DANIEL BOSECKER

Daniel A. Bosecker, was born January 14, 1946, in the German settlement near Cowling, Illinois, in Wabash County. He was the first child of five children born to Christian and Waneta (Riley) Bosecker. Dan's mother was formerly from Pike County, Indiana. Waneta's family were coal miners. Chris was born in the German settlement, his family were farmers.

JOHN PAUL

John Paul and family came to Illinois from Lincoln County, Tennessee. We have the following record from Session Minutes of the Reformed Presbyterian Church, Eden, Randolph County, Illinois, dated November 13, 1835 "The following

JAMES FARRELL MINOR

Overton and Elizabeth Harlow traveled from Wilson County, Tenn. in 1818. They brought the 4 children of their future family of 13. Mary "Polly" (Nov. 22, 1818 — 1890) was the first white girl born in Jefferson County. She married James Farrell Minor on Feb. 3, 1835.

Henry Newton Minor, born 1851, was the 10th of 13 children born to James and "Polly." He married Vesta Elmina Duncan in 1878 and had 10 children. Their 4th child, James

HENRY BOWMAN

In 1817, Henry Bowman with a Mr. Pitcher came from London, England to join Morris Birkbeck and George Flower in Albion, Illinois. Henry married Sally Simpkins, built a hotel, called the Bowman House, made of homemade brick in 1828. It housed many famous people, including Abraham Lincoln, and was described as the oldest tavern in Illinois at the time it was razed.

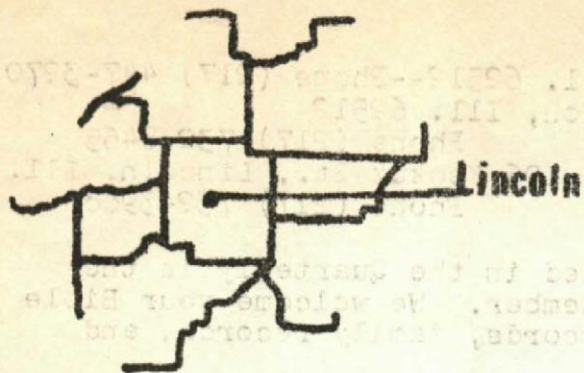

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I - NAME AND PURPOSE

- Section 1. The name of this organization shall be Logan County Genealogical Society.
- Section 2. The purpose of this organization shall be to encourage the science of genealogy, to assist others gather genealogical information, to preserve and publish material of historical and genealogical nature - all for educational and research purpose.

ARTICLE II - MEMBERSHIP

- Section 1. All persons interested in genealogy are eligible for membership. Names of persons applying for membership shall be submitted to the Second Vice-President for approval, then submitted for majority vote approval at any regular meeting.

ARTICLE III - OFFICERS AND THEIR ELECTION

- Section 1. The Officers shall be: President, First Vice-President, Second Vice-President, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer, Quarterly Editor, Special Publications Editor, Librarian, Genealogist, and one Member-at-large. They shall be elected at the annual meeting to serve for a term of one year.

- Section 2. The Executive Board shall consist of all elected and appointed officers, chairmen of standing committees, and the retiring President.

- a. The Executive Board shall meet once each month, or when necessary, to transact business of the Society in the interim between its regular meetings.
- b. A majority of the Board shall constitute a quorum.
- c. Regular Executive Board meetings shall be open to the Society membership.
- d. Special meetings of the Board may be called as needed by the President, or by a majority of the Board members, provided all Board members are notified.

ARTICLE IV - MEETINGS

- Section 1. A regular monthly meeting of this organization shall be held, except in the month of December, the date, time and place to be determined by the Executive Board.

Section 2. The annual meeting, which shall be the beginning of the New Year of operations shall be held in January at which time officers shall be elected and annual reports given.

Section 3. A quorum at any regular meeting of the Society shall be at least ten members including two officers.

Section 4. All voting shall be by a simple majority vote unless otherwise specified.

ARTICLE V - AMENDMENTS

Section 1. The constitution may be amended by three-fourths majority vote of all members present at a regular meeting.

Section 2. Any member may propose an amendment by submitting the same in writing to the Corresponding Secretary. The amendment shall then be submitted to the Executive Board for majority approval before being presented to the membership. The proposed amendment, after action by the Executive Board, shall be mailed to each member, and shall be voted upon at the next regular meeting falling at least one month after the date of mailing.

ARTICLE VI - DISSOLUTION

Section 1. Upon the dissolution of the society, the officers who serve as the Board, shall after paying or making provisions for the payment of all liabilities of the society, offer the assets of the society to the Illinois State Genealogical Society, or if the Illinois State Genealogical Society does not exist, the assets shall be offered to the Illinois State Historical Library, or to an organization or organizations founded and operated exclusively for education, charitable, religious, or scientific purposes which qualified as an exempt organization under Section 501 (C) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law), as the Board shall determine.

Section 2. Any of such assets not so disposed of shall be disposed of by the Logan County Court of Common Pleas, where the Society is located, exclusively for such organization or organizations, as said Court shall determine, which are organized and operated exclusively for such purposes under Section 501 (C) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future Internal Revenue Law).

ARTICLE VII - PARLIAMENTARY AUTHORITY

Section 1. The Society shall be conducted in accordance with the parliamentary procedure set forth in Robert's Rules of Order.

LOGAN COUNTY GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I - MEMBERSHIP AND DUES

Section 1. Membership is effective when dues are received and application for membership is approved at a regular meeting.

- a. Individual dues are \$5.00 per year
- b. Family dues are \$6.00 per year (Family, add \$1.00) for each additional member over two persons).
- c. Student dues are \$3.00 per year.
- d. Contributing membership, \$5.00.
- e. Life membership is \$100.00.

ARTICLE II - MEETINGS

Section 1. Regular meetings of the Society shall be held the third Monday evening of each month at 7:30 p.m.

ARTICLE III - DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. All officers shall be paid-up members and attend Board meetings regularly. An officer who misses three consecutive board meetings without reasonable cause shall be subject to action by the board as to his or her continuance in office.

The officers shall:

- a. Perform the duties outlined in these by-laws and those assigned in the future.
- b. Deliver to his or her successor all official material within ten days following the annual meeting.
- c. Present an annual report at the annual meeting.
- d. Report on the activities of his or her area of responsibility at each regular meeting and each board meeting.

Section 2. The President shall preside at all meetings of the Society and of the Executive Board, and shall be ex-officio member of all committees except the nominating committee. In the absence of the Treasurer, the President shall have authority to sign checks.

Section 3. The First Vice-President shall assist the President in organizational duties and perform the duties of the President in the absence or inability of that officer to serve. He or she shall be responsible for planning the program and shall serve as chairman of the Program Committee.

Section 4. The Second Vice-President shall have the responsibility of keeping a current and correct list of all members. He or she shall

nominate member applicants at each regular meeting. He or she shall send a list of new members to the Recording Secretary, the Corresponding Secretary, the Treasurer and the Quarterly Editor, (when the quarterly is instituted). He or she shall send membership invitations to prospective members and renewal notices to regular members. He or she shall preside in the absence of the President and First Vice-President. He or she shall serve as chairman of the membership committee.

Section 5. The Recording Secretary shall record and read the minutes of the previous regular meetings and previous Executive Board meetings at their respective meetings and preserve all minutes and reports.

Section 6. The Corresponding Secretary shall attend to the correspondence of the Society. He or she shall distribute the mail to the officers and be responsible for mailing the monthly newsletter.

Section 7. The Treasurer shall collect and record all dues and funds received by the Society and shall pay all budgeted bills of the Society. He or she shall give a financial report at each monthly meeting and an annual report at the annual meeting. He or she shall keep an accurate record of all receipts and expenditures.

a. The Treasurer's accounts shall be examined annually at the end of each treasurer's term by an auditing committee consisting of one member of the executive board and two members at large, appointed by the President. This committee shall audit the books and report their findings in a signed statement at the next general meeting. The Treasurer shall deliver to the auditors the following items:

1. Checkbook
2. Bank Statements
3. Ledger or Account Book
4. Itemized statements of bills paid
5. Vouchers, if the voucher system is used

b. He or she shall be bonded for an amount determined by the executive board. The bond shall be paid by the Society.

c. He or she shall serve as chairman of the Finance and Budget Committee.

d. Only the Treasurer and/or the President shall have the authority to sign checks.

Section 8. The Quarterly Editor shall be responsible for preparing and mailing the quarterlies based on policies established by the executive board. He or she shall serve as chairman of the Editorial Committee.

a. He or she shall appoint contributing editors.

Section 9. The Special Publications Editor shall be responsible for publishing all special publications based on policies established by the executive board.

- a. He or she shall serve on the Projects Committee.
- b. He or she shall keep records of costs of publishing.

Section 10. The Librarian shall:

- a. Catalogue all materials of the society's library.
- b. Keep the material in good repair.
- c. Maintain regular library hours.
- d. Serve as chairman of the Library and Book Committee.

Section 11. The Genealogist shall do limited research in answering specific inquiries.

ARTICLE IV - EXECUTIVE BOARD

Section 1. The President, with approval of the executive board, shall appoint an Historian, whose term shall run concurrently with the elected officers. He or she shall compile and keep a record of the activities, honors, and achievements of the society or its members.

Section 2. The Board shall recommend to the membership for approval purchases exceeding the allotted budget.

Section 3. The Board shall report at regular meetings of the Society on major policy changes and new projects.

ARTICLE V - STANDING COMMITTEES

Section 1. The following committees with chairmen as designated shall recommend policy to the executive board and upon approval shall implement it within their estimated budgets. Committee members shall be recommended by committee chairmen and shall be approved by the executive board.

- a. Finance and Budget Committee shall determine financial requirements and compile the annual budget, which shall be approved at a regular meeting of the Society. The Treasurer shall serve as chairman.
- b. Membership Committee shall promote membership by soliciting new members and encouraging renewals. The Second Vice-President shall serve as chairman.
- c. Program committee shall aid the First Vice-President, who shall be chairman of the committee, in planning programs for regular monthly meetings.

- d. Advertising Committee shall disseminate information about the society and its publications and prepare a yearly commercial advertising program. The chairman shall be appointed by the executive board.
- e. Library and Book committees shall select, acquire, and maintain genealogical material for the Library. The Librarian shall serve as chairman.
- f. Editorial Committee shall be responsible for publishing the quarterly and shall select material for use in the quarterlies. The Quarterly Editor shall be chairman.
- g. Project Committee shall plan and coordinate projects for the purpose of collecting and preserving genealogical and historical records. They shall determine priorities and recommend prices for special publications. Material to be published, when completed, shall be turned over to the Special Publications Editor for publishing. Chairman shall be appointed by the executive board.
- h. Publications Sales Committee shall answer all inquiries regarding sales of publications, fill orders for publications, collect and deposit funds weekly, furnish records of sales to the Treasurer, set up displays and sell publications at various meetings, conferences, etc. with the approval of the executive board, maintain the stock of publications, and prepare an annual inventory. The Chairman shall be appointed by the executive board.

ARTICLE VI - ELECTIONS

- Section 1. Nominations for officers shall be made by a nominating committee consisting of three members chosen at the October meeting. They shall be: an appointee of the President and two elected from the floor. The committee shall elect its own chairman.
- Section 2. The nominating committee shall be given a list of each officer's duties, together with names of members in good standing, and accordingly select one nominee for each office to be filled. The committee shall report the slate of officers in the letter announcing the January annual meeting.
- Section 3. Following the nominating committee's report at the January annual meeting, an opportunity shall be given for nominations from the floor.
- Section 4. Only those who have consented to serve if elected shall be eligible for nomination either by the Committee or from the floor.
- Section 5. Officers shall be elected by a simple majority vote of the members present at the annual meeting in January.
- Section 6. A vacancy occurring in any office shall be filled for the unexpired term by a member elected by a majority vote of the executive board.

ARTICLE VII - AMENDMENTS AND REVISIONS

Section 1. A five-member committee shall be appointed by the President every two years, from the time of the last revision, to review the by-laws. This committee shall report its findings to the executive board for consideration. A copy of the proposed changes shall be mailed to the membership and shall be voted upon at the next regular meeting falling at least one month after the date of mailing. Vote shall be by simple majority of all members present at a regular meeting.

ARTICLE VIII - PUBLICATIONS

Section 1. A quarterly publication, known as the shall be published by the society during spring, summer, fall and winter.

Section 2. The Quarterly publication shall be distributed to all members. Family memberships shall receive one quarterly per household.

Section 3. The subscription rate shall be \$5.00 per year or \$1.25, plus postage, per single copy of back issues.

Section 4. Exchange of quarterlies and special publications with other genealogical societies or historical organizations shall be arranged and coordinated by the Editors and Librarian.

ARTICLE IX - FISCAL YEAR

Section 1. The Society's fiscal year shall be from January 1 to last day of December.

ARTICLE X - CHARTER MEMBERS

Section 1. Persons who were members of the organization prior to December 31, 1978 are Charter Members.

ARTICLE IV - EXECUTIVE BOARD

The following proposed amendments and revisions as presented by a committee

(1980) consisting of Vernon Gehlbach, Chairman, and Bertha Dahmm, Jack Gordon, Lester Wickline, Lucille Henrichsmeyer, Emily McElhaney, and the 1982 Executive Board members.

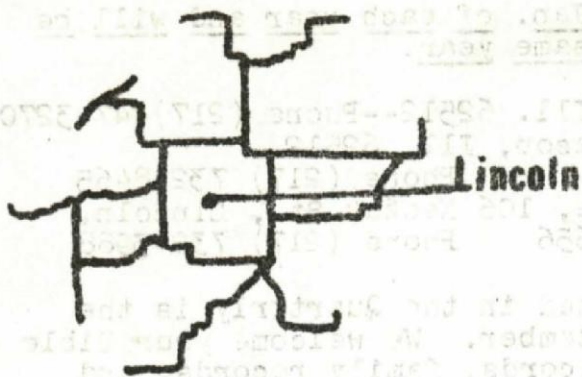

CALENDAR DATINGS

In 1582 Europe corrected the old Julian Calendar to make up for errors in "Solar" time by adding (advancing) eleven days. At this time they also changed the beginning of the new year to January 1st instead of March 25th. All countries accepted this method of dating except Great Britain and all their colonies which kept using the old Julian system with March 25th the new year.

In 1752 the British Parliament adopted our present Gregorian Calendar. For example, George Washington was born on February 11, 1731, according to England, but to the rest of the world, his birthday was February 22, 1732. In his family Bible, George Washington's birth date was "double-dated" as 1731/32.

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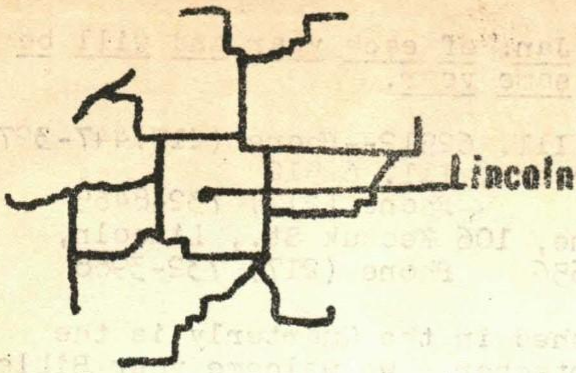

1982 Program Highlights

- January, 1982 - This meeting was cancelled due to severe weather conditions.
- February, 1982 - This was a workshop meeting from 10:00 a.m. until 12:00, and was held at the public library. The morning workshop was conducted by Mildred Devanny, society librarian, and was on advanced research sources and the evaluation of research sources. A sack lunch was enjoyed at noon. The business meeting was at 1:00 p.m. at which time the annual report from all committee chairmen were made. Following was the annual election of officers for 1982 and their installation. (This was to have been in Jan.) New officers are Emily Gordon, President; 1st Vice-President, open; 2nd Vice-President, Lester Wickline; Recording Secretary, Lucille Henrichs-meyer; Corresponding Secretary, Brenda Jones; Treasurer, Jane Whiteman. Installation was in charge of Helen Gordy. The new president, Emily Gordon, outlined plans and goals for the coming year.
- March, 1982 - Since the corresponding secretary could not attend the February meeting, she was formally installed at this meeting. Mildred Devanny provided the program for the evening, speaking on research necessary for membership in the various patriotic organizations.
- April, 1982 - A program given by Jack and Emily Gordon, local members, on the Andersonville prison in Georgia during the Civil War. They had recently visited there. They showed slide pictures which they had taken. An account of the horrible condition of the prisoners was of interest to all of those who had ancestors serving in the War between the States.
- May, 1982 - A program on 'How to Research and Write your Family History' was given by Helen Gordy, a member of the local society. She gave many good points to follow in writing an interesting history. Her background material came from the 1980 World Conference lectures. She is also in the process of writing her own family history and told of some of her own interesting experiences.
- June, 1982 - Society members brought samples of some of the work they have done and told of their disappointments and successes in their research.
- July, 1982 - Mrs. Myrna Parks, Normal, Illinois, gave the program on 'Family Antiques and Treasures' as related to genealogical research and information. She said that many times unlooked for information can be found in these articles. Many of her own collected antique items were displayed.
- August, 1982 - Martha Montgomery of Decatur, Illinois, spoke on 'Research in New Jersey and Pennsylvania.' She told of the settling of New Jersey and how it became the melting pot for many immigrants coming in from the Continent prior to the establishment of Pennsylvania as a state.
- September, 1982 - Program given by Virginia Johnson, local member, who spoke on Indian research. Gave background of Cherokee tribe as illustration of Indian life and culture. 1/32 Indian ancestry is as far back as records are kept. Slides were shown of the Cherokee Indian village in North Carolina. Indian research is very difficult.

Letter written by Hamilton Jefferson HUBBART while he was serving in the
Civil War, stationed at Glasgow, Barren County, Kentucky: April 4, 1863

Dear Father and Mother I take my pen in hand to inform you that I am getting along
as well as can be expected after being sick as long as I have my brest is about
like it has been it is not any better than common; if my brest was well I would
be all rite I think and I hope it will git better when the weather gets settled
and warm I have left the hospital and am now in camp and I feel better than I did
when there: I dont do any duty only answer at roll call and go on Dress parade.
But notwithstanding all this my prayerto god is when these lines come to hand they
may find you and Mother. (god bless her old grey hairs) injoying the best of health:

Samuel A. Gordon was born in Delaware County, New York, on the 8th of
September, 1843. He moved to Pennsylvania with his parents, Edward and Nancy
(Harding) Gordon, where his father was engaged in the lumber and sawmill business.
On May 20th, 1861, when but seventeen years of age, he enlisted in Co. K 11th Pa.
Reserves, under Captain E. R. Brady and Co. T. F. Gallagher. The regiment was
assigned to the Third Brigade, Second Division, Fifth Army Corps, Army of the
Potomac. Among the battles in which he participated were: Malvern Hill, Antietam,
South Mountain, Fredericksburg, Gettysburg, the Wilderness, North Anna and Cold
Harbor. He was wounded in the stomach at the battle of North Anna, Virginia, and
was honorably discharged at Pittsburgh, Pa., 14 June, 1864, having served for
three years and three months. He returned to Jefferson County, Pa., and was
married 21 Sept. 1865 to Matilda McAninch, daughter of George and May (Hetrick)
McAninch. In 1870 he migrated to Minnesota, where he resided for 44 years, most
of this time he lived in the Annandale, Wright County area, where he owned and
operated a resort near Cedar and Clearwater lakes. In the summer of 1913, he
traveled to Gettysburg, Pa., to join a number of his comrades, in reunion, who had
fought side by side with him for liberty and the saving of the Union.

Samuel A. Gordon died at his home in Annandale, Minn., on Sunday evening,
8 Feb., 1914, aged 70 years and five months. He was the Great Uncle of member
Jack O. Gordon.

Lewis Graebe (Louis Grabe) was born in Danneberg, Hesse-Cassel, Germany on March 12, 1838. In 1854 at the age of 16 he came to the United States and settled in Pittsburgh, Pa. He enlisted as a Private in Co. B, 5th Pennsylvania Volunteers and served from April 16, 1861 to July 24, 1861. Lewis served under Brigadier-general Irvin Mc. Dowell who became commander of the Army of the Potomac in 1861. While on duty as a guard on a bridge over the Potomac, President Lincoln addressed his company. He was killed by a train in Braddock, Pa., on Dec., 23, 1916. Lewis is the great grandfather of Louise Jeffries.

Another great grandfather of Louise Jeffries, Fredrick Stolte, was drafted and served as a private with Co. A, 62 Regiment Pennsylvania from July 10, 1863, to July 10, 1865. In 1864 he was transferred to the 91 Regiment, Co. I. Fredrick was born in Prussia on March 4, 1835 and died Jan. 7, 1895 in Pittsburgh, Pa. His Civil War records that I received from the archives did not say where he served.

Thomas Jefferson Talbot was born in Somerset, Ohio on June 28, 1843. His parents were John and Mary Jane Blake Talbot. John, who was born in Ireland and moved to Canada in 1818 with his parents and brothers and sisters, came to the United States sometime in the 1830's. We do not have the information as to which company he served from Illinois, but his death occurred near Atlanta, Ga., on Aug. 8, 1864. He is a distant cousin of William Jeffries.

Edward Richard Roden Talbot was born in London, Ontario on March 14, 1846. His parents were Freeman and Ann Eliza Clark Talbot. Freeman and John were brothers. Freeman was also born in Ireland and came to Canada in 1818 with the family. He and his family moved to Cleveland, Minn. in 1856. Edward was a First Lt. in Co. E, 68 United States Colored Infantry and was killed on April 5, 1865 during the siege of Blakely, Alabama. Edward is also a distant cousin of William Jeffries. Ralph Smith Talbot, a cousin of Edward's, wrote the following poem:

He sleeps beneath the quiet sod,
Where comrades brave have laid him;
The flag he loved is waving o'er
The grave, brave hand have made him.

No mother kind was here to soothe,
Nor father's voice to cheer him;
He met the reaper face to face,
and did not quail or fear him.

His country called on noble hearts,
and willing hands to save her;
And 'mongst the myriads that went forth
There was not found a braver.

Then he who sleeps that peaceful sleep

Job J. Whiteman was born in Green County, Ohio, on November 27, 1838, a son of Everett and Harriet Jennings Whiteman. The family moved to Indiana and then to Illinois. On July 25, 1861, in Lincoln, Illinois, he enlisted for a term of three years in Company H, 7th Ill., Infantry, and, on that same date, was mustered in at Mound City, Illinois. He was promoted to Corporal on September 1, 1861. His Military Service Records obtained from the National Archives show that he worked in the Commissary, was Company Cook, and, for the better part of his service, on detached service in the Ambulance Corps. On July 25, 1864, at Chattanooga, Tenn., he was honorably discharged for reason of expiration of term of service. He died on December 29, 1907, in Lincoln, Illinois, and is buried in Union Cemetery, Lincoln, Illinois. He was a member of Leo Meyers Post G.A.R. in Lincoln, Ill.

Henry N. Whiteman, a brother of Job J. Whiteman, was born in Ohio, and on July 25, 1861, enlisted for a term of three years in Company H, 7th Illinois Infantry. He was twenty-one years of age at the time of his enlistment. He was enrolled for duty at Ft. Holt, Ky., on November 3, 1861. His Military Service Records show that he was an ambulance driver. He was wounded in battle at Shiloh April 7, 1862. On November 3, 1864, at Rome, Ga., he was mustered out for reason of expiration of service. He died on October 30, 1913, in Lincoln, Illinois, and is buried in Union Cemetery at Lincoln. He was a member of Leo W. Myers Post G.A.R. in Lincoln, Illinois.

Robert S. Whiteman, a brother of Job J. Whiteman and Henry N. Whiteman, was born on January 1, 1847, in Wells County, Indiana. On January 8, 1863, at Corinth, Miss., he enlisted for a term of three years in Company H, 7th Illinois Infantry. His Military Service Records show that he was promoted to Corporal on April 1, 1865. He was mustered out at Louisville, Kentucky, on July 9, 1865. He died in Middletown, Illinois, on August 24, 1912, and is buried in Irish Grove Cemetery near Middletown, Illinois. He was a member of Leo W. Myers Post G.A.R. in Lincoln, Illinois.

Job J. Whiteman, Henry N. Whiteman, and Robert S. Whiteman were the brothers of Jacob H. Whiteman, grandfather of Jane Whiteman.

Alexander Havens was born in Monmouth, New Jersey, and on October 3, 1861, at Pekin, Illinois, enlisted for a term of three years in Company F, 11th Illinois Cavalry. He was mustered in at Peoria, Illinois, on December 20, 1861. He was discharged on October 5, 1862, on Surgeon's Certificate which showed a valvular disease of the heart said to have been produced when on duty in April, 1862. The Tazewell Register of Tuesday, February 14, 1862, contains a muster roll of Company F of the Eleventh Cavalry. Alexander Havens was First Sergeant. In furnishing the Roll for publication, Captain Olmstead added the following: "The above is a correct list of the 'Pekin Hell Drivers', so called in derision at first, but afterwards adopted by the boys as the official name of the Company. Every man in the Company is capable of filling a corporal's or sergeant's place, and their friends will never have cause to blush for them." Alexander Havens died on January 31, 1864, and is buried in Roberson Cemetery, Deer Creek Township, Tazewell County, Illinois. He was the great grandfather of Jane Whiteman.

- A-2. Church Records in the Midwest for German Background Peoples. Dr. David H. Koss, Jacksonville, Illinois. Information of depositories of the Lutheran Church - Missouri Synod; American Lutheran Church: L.C.A.; (former) Evangelical and Reformed Church; (former) Evangelical United Brethren Church Mennonite and Brethren; German Methodist; Presbyterian; Congregational and Baptist; and a bit on Roman Catholic.

- B-2. Problems in Spelling and Pronouncing German Names. Dr. Arta E. Johnson, Columbus, Ohio. How and why German names were garbled in the USA; how to restore original spellings and the need to do so. German sounds spelled differently in English, English spellings not found in German.
- C-1. Personal Records of Pennsylvania Germans. Pastor Fredrick S. Weiser. Pennsylvania Germans kept many records in their homes and in their own possession. The various kinds of records will be discussed; their genealogical value given and some hints on where to find them.
- D-2. Are Your German Immigrants on Microfilm? Arlene H. Eakle, Salt Lake City, Utah. Description of the thousands of rolls of film available to you through the genealogical Society of Utah - passenger lists, debt clearances, permits to travel or leave the country (protocols), manumissions and many other emigrant/immigrant documents.
- F-B. Pennsylvania Folkart. Pastor Fredrick S. Weiser. The "Pennsylvania Dutch" provided their own entertainment by making brightly colored objects which reflected the world as they saw it. The serious and the comic went hand in hand in their folk art reflecting their joyous view of life.
- F-2. 19th Century Immigration in the Midwest: A Case Study. Dr. David Koss. Will explore settlement of German families from urban areas to those branches that formed in the same country. Using case studies this lecture will show the diversification in marriage, religion and social status that occurred to many of our ancestors.

- G-1. The Origins of German Surnames. Dr. Arta Johnson. An interesting talk on patronymics, occupation - surnames, place - surnames and personal characteristic surnames (the fun ones). This will be preceded with a short historical introduction.
- G-2. Fitting It All Together: Pennsylvania German Family Trees. Arlene H. Eacle. Answers to: Which sources are best for my Pennsylvania German family tree? Tax lists? Deeds? Wills? Estate partitions? County Histories? Church Records? Do I have to search them all? How do I match the evidence I already have with what I find in the sources - especially if it doesn't agree?
