These records are the lectures given at the 1980 World Conference on Records at Salt Lake City, Utah. The lectures could be an excellent source of program material for genealogical socities. These books are not for check out, but can be used at the Library.

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## History of Logan County to be printed . Whole Control of the contr

A general history book of Logan County, to be printed in 1982, will include historical sketches of the families in the County, histories of various organizations, businesses, schools, landmarks and churches. The general county history will be updated from the 1911 Stringer's History of Logan County.

Each family in the county will be asked to write an historical sketch. This project is to be organized by townships, with a chairman in each township. Every family will receive a notice of the details of the history project along with the name of their township chairman, whom they can call to answer questions that they may have.

Each family may submit one black and white picture to accompany the story which is limited to 500 words.

Suggestions and Items to Consider in Writing a Family History

- 1. When and why your family came to the County.
- 2. Your birth: when, where, parents
- 3. Your childhood: association with brothers and sisters, visitors, unusual happenings, trips, playmates, relatives you remember, religion in your home, financial condition of parents that influenced your lifestyle.
- 4. Your school days: school attended, teachers, courses studied, special activities, achievements, humorous situations, who or what influenced you.
- 5. Your courtship and marriage: meeting your spouse, proposal, wedding, parties, honeymoon, meeting your in-laws.
- 6. Your activities: vacations, jobs, attendance at church, other church functions, scouting, 4-H, sports, tasks at home, fun and funny situations.
- 7. Settling down to married life: your new home, housekeeping, joys and sorrows, making ends meet.
- 8. Your vocation: training for your job, promotions, companies you worked for, salaries, associates, your own business.

## National Archives Microfilm Loan Program

To All Librarians:

Several months ago we notified you of the effects of budget and staff reductions on the interlibrary loan of National Archives microfilm from the Fort Worth Federal Archives and Records Center. Since then, through management initiatives, we increased the level of service, circulating 35,000 rolls of film a month. It is now clear, however, that in order to meet new budget goals, we will have to make additional personnel reductions. The equivalent of 181 full-time positions in the National Archives and Records Service must be eliminated by February 1982.

We regret that the interlibrary loan of National and a second archives microfilm from Fort Worth must be discontinued.

New requests received as of December 10, 1981, or ofter a constant will not be processed. All requests on hand as of this data will be returned.

We are exploring ways that this service might be resumed on a fee basis by a private sector firm. We have maintained are records of all libraries that have borrowed film from Fort of the warm worth and will announce future developments.

We appreciate your patience and cooperation as we have worked together to provide the public with this very popular service. More than 14 million rolls of film have been loaned since 1971, when the service began. We ask your further cooperation in the coming weeks in seeing that all microfilm is returned to Fort Worth. In the meantime, we urge all those who can do so to use the microfilm in reading rooms at the National Archives Building and in the 11 Federal Archives and Records Centers around the country, or to purchase the film at a price of \$15.00 per roll from the Publications Sales Brance (MEPS), NARS, Washington, D. C. 20408





In 1582 Europe corrected the old Julian Calendar to make up for errors in "Solar" time by adding (advancing) eleven days. At this time they also changed the beginning of the new year to January 1st instead of March 25th. All countries accepted this method of dating except Great Britain and all their colonies which kept using the old Julian system with March 25th the new year.

In 1752 the British Parliament adopted our present <u>Gregorian Calendar</u>. For example, George Washington was born on <u>February 11</u>, <u>1731</u>, according to England, but to the rest of the world, his birthday was <u>February 22</u>, <u>1732</u>. In his family Bible, George Washington's birth date was "double-dated" as <u>1731/32</u>.

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

# 1982 Program Highlights

- January, 1982 This meeting was cancelled due to severe weather donditions.
- Jebruary, 1982 This was a workshop meeting form 10:00 a.m. until 12:00, and was held at the public library. The morning workshop was conducted by Mildred Devanny, society librarian, and was on advanced research sources and the evaluation of research sources. A sack lunch was enjoyed at noon. The business meeting was at 1:00 p.m. at which time the annual report from all committee chairmen were made. Following was the annual election of officers for 1982 and their installation. (This was to have been in Jan.) New officers are Emily Gordon, President; 1st Vice-President, open; 2nd Vice-President, Lester Wickline; Recording Secretary, Lucille Henrichsmeyer; Corresponding Secretary, Brenda Jones; Treasurer, Jane Whiteman. Installation was in charge of Helen Gordy. The new president, Emily Gordon, outlined plans and goals for the coming year.
- March, 1982 Since the corresponding secretary could not attend the February meeting, she was formally installed at this meeting. Mildred Devanny provided the program for the evening, speaking on research necessary for membership in the various patriotic organizations.
- April, 1982 A program given by Jack and Emily Gordon, local members, on the Andersonville prison in Georgia during the Civil War. They had recently visited there. Letter written by Hamilton Jefferson HUBBART while he was serving in the Civil Var, stationed at Glasgow, Barren County, Kentucky: April 4, 1863

Lear Father and Nother I take my pen in hand to inform you that I am gitting along as well as can be expected after being sick as long as I have my brest is about like it has been it is not any better than common; if my brest was well I would be all rite I think and I hope it will git better when the weather gits settled and warm I have left the hospital and am now in camp and I feel better than I did when there: I dont do any duty only answer at roll call and go on Dress parade. But notwithstanding all this my orayerto god is when these lines come to hand they may find you and other. (god bless her old grey hairs) injoying the best of health: and Green & sis & Dick & Frank & Elizabeth and Phebe and sissy and Jane and her children all well and doing well (may the Lord bless you all and pour out his spirit abundantly upon you all is the prayer of your humble son) Pap we received your letter of the 22nd of March and was glad to hear that you was well the weather is verry plesant to day it was tolerble cooll here yesterday but is plesant to day it is here about like it is in Illinois in regard to the weather: the health is verry good in the Regiment at this time considering the number of men that is together there is verry little sickness in camp there is A good many in the Hospital but none of them verry Dangerous I guess. Jim is well and hearty he Just camein off of Ficket: Pap there is no news of importance to rite concerning the war only we are going to fight out we can whip the Rebbels in the south and then come home and whip them traitors there it is to bad to think of to think that we left our homes and families to come here to indure the hardships of camp life and to for the rites of any government and not only that but the rites of the verry men that is acting and doing all they can against us instead of helping us as they said they would I think more of the Rebbels in the south than I do of them copperheads in the North: we are fortifying here now and if the secesh will stay about A month and then come we will give them fits: they are going to stay till we git our fortifycatians done it is the Elgin Battery from Illinois: Pap J.D Bantwell belongs to it the man that used to keep A. lumber yard in Champaign Citty and seed store Just this side of the Railroad om the right hand side as you go in town There is sixty negroes at work on the Forifycations now there is three Hundred abd fifty to be here as soon as we can press them in (the way that is done is this) Colonel Kelly and Greyham has got the names of all the Loyal citizens in Glasgow and vicinity and they take the Negroes of the Disloyal citizens whither they want them to go or not and put them on the fortifications to work and make their Masters feed them while they are doing this work and there is an order ishued now that no Merchant is allowed to sell goods to any Rebble under any circumstances whatever the Rebbels are suffering in the south verry much from what we can hear for the want of food and raiment it is A pitty but they would all starve or come back in the union: I think the war will come to A close some time this summer but it is hard to tell when it will be over: Pap they have comenced giving Furloughs and if we live we will git to come home once more to see you all if you all live may god grant to spare all your lives and ourn too: to see each other Again is my preayer: uncle Tom and aunt Phidelia is both well aunt Phidelia is bording at the hotel in glasgow: Pap I want you to see that our families git along all rite we will come home as soon as we can but you need not look for us till you see us coming if we should never meet on earth again let us live so that we can meet in heaven: the talk is that we git our pay this week but that is uncertain: Pap I want you to Write as soon as this comes to hand & tell us all the news so No more at this time but still and forever will remain your ever Dutiful son till Death From H.J. Gordon was born in Delaware County, New York, on the 8th of September, 1843. He moved to Pennsylvania with his parents, Edward and Nancy (Harding) Gordon, where his father was engaed in the lumber and sawmill business. On May 20th, 1361, when but seventeen years of age, he enlisted in Co. K 11th Pa. Reserves, under Captain E. R. Brady and Co. T. F. Gallagher. The regiment was assigned to the Third Brigade, Second Division, Fifth Army Corps, Army of the Potomac. Among the battles in which he participated were: Malvern, Hill, Antietam, South Mountain, Fredericksburg, Gettysburg, the Wilderness, North Anna and Cold Harbor. He was wounded in the stomach at the battle of North Anna, Virginia, and was honorably discharged at Pittsburgh, Pa., 14 June, 1864, having served for three years and three months. He returned to Jefferson County, Pa., and was married 21 Sept. 1865 to Matilda McAninch, daughter of George and May (Hetrick) McAninch. In 1870 he migrated to Minnesota, where he resided for 44 years, most of this time he lived in the Annandale, right County area, where he owned and operated a resort near Cedar and Clearwater lakes. In the summer of 1913, he traveled to Gettysburg, Pa., to join a number of his courades, in reunion, who had fought side by side with him for liberty and the saving of the Union.

Samuel A. Gordon died at his home in Annandale, Minn., on Sunday evening, 8 Feb., 1914, aged 70 years and five months. He was the Great Uncle of member Jack O. Gordon.

Lewis Graebe (Louis Grabe) was born in Danneberg, Hesse-Cassel, Germany on March 12, 1838. In 1854 at the age of 16 he came to the United States and settled in Pittsburgh, Pa. He enlisted as a Brivate in Cc. B. 5th Pennsylvania Volunteers and served from April 16, 1861 to July 24, 1861. Lewis served under Brigadier-general Irvin Mc. Dowell who became commander of the Army of the Potomac in 1861. Thile on duty as a guard on a bridge over the Potomac, President Lincoln addressed his company. He was killed by a train in Eraddock, Pa., on Lec., 28, 1916. Lewis is the great grandfather of Louise Jeffries.

Another great grandfather of Louise Jeffries, Fredrick Stolte, was drafted and served as a private with Co. 1. 62 Regiment Pennsylvania from July 10, 1863, to July 10, 1865. In 1864 he was transferred to the 91 Regiment, Co. 1. Fredrick was born in Prussia on March 4, 1835 and sied Jan. 7, 1895 in Pittsburgh, Pa. His Civil for records that I received from the archives did not say where he served.

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Thomas Jefferson Talbot was born in Somerset, Ohio on June 28, 1843. His parents were John and Mary Jane Blake Talbot. John, who was both in Ireland and moved to Canada in 1818 with his parents and brothers and sisters, came to the United States sometime in the 1830's. We do not have the information as to which company he served from Illinois, but his death occured near Atlanta, Ga., on Aug. 8, 1864. He is a distant cousin of illiam Jeffries.

Edward Richard Roden Talbot was born in London, Ontario on March 14, 1846. His parents were Freeman and Ann Eliza Clark Talbot. Freeman and John were brothers. Freeman was also born in Ireland and came to Canada in 1818 with the family. He and his family moved to Cleveland, Minn. in 1856. Edward was a First It. in Co. 7, 68 United States Colored Infantry and was killed on Ipril 5, 1865 during the aeige of Blakels, Alabama. Edward is also a distant cousin of William Jeffries. Ralph Smith Talbot, a cousin of Edward's, wrote the following poem:

He sleeps beneath the quiet sod,
Where comrades brave have laid him;
The flag he loved is waving o'er
The grave, brave hand have made him.

No mother kind was here to soothe,

Job J. Whiteman was born in Green County, Chio, on November 27, 1838, a son of Twerett and Harriet Jennings Whiteman. The family moved to Indiana and then to Illinois. On July 25, 1861, in Lincoln, Illinois, he enlisted for a term of three years in Company H, 7th Ill., Infantry, and, ob that same date, was mustered in at Mound City, Illinois. He was promoted to Corporal on September 1, 1861. His Military Service Records obtained from the National Archives show that he worked in the Commissary, was Company Gook, and, for the better part of his service, on detached service in the Embulance Corps. On July 25, 1864, at Chattanooga, Tenn., he was honorably discharged for reason of expiration of term of service. He died on Lecember 29, 1907, in Lincoln, Illinois, and is buried in Union Cemetery, Lincoln, Illinois. He was a member of Leo Meyers Post C.A.R. in Lincoln, Ill.

Henry N. Whiteman, a brother of Job J. Whiteman, was born in Chio, and on July 25, 1361, enlisted for a term of three years in Company H, 7th Illinois Infantry. He was twenty-one years of age at the time of his enlistment. He was enrolled for duty at Ft. Holt, Ky., on November 3, 1861. His Lilitary Service Seconds show that he was an ambulance dirver. He was wounded in battle at hiloh April 7, 1862. On November 3, 1864, at Rome, Ga., he was mustered out for reason of of expiration of service. He died on October 30, 1913, in Lincoln, Illinois, and is buried in Union Cemetery at Lincoln. He was a member of Iwo W. Myers Post G. 1.1. in Lincoln, Illinois.

Cobert S. Whiteman, a brother of Job J. Whiteman and Henry N. Whiteman, was Born on January 1, 1847, in cells County, Inliana. On January 8, 1863, at Corinth, Hiss., he enlisted for a term of three years in Company H. 7th Illinois Infantry. Fis illitary Service records show that he was promoted to Corporal on April 1, 1865. He was mustered out at Foursville, Fentucky, on July 9, 1865. He died in Middletown, Illinois, on woust 24, 1912, and is buried in Irish Crove Cemetery near middletown, Illinois. He was a member of Teo Trypes Post G.A.T. in Lincoln, Illinois.

He was mustered in at Peoria, Illinois, on December 20, 1861. He was discharged on October 5, 1862, on Surgeon's Certificate which showed a valvular disease of the heart said to have been produced when on duty in April, 1862. The Tazewell Register of Tuesday, February 14, 1862, contains a muster roll of Company F of the Eleventh Cavalry. Alexander Havens was First Sergeant. In furnishing the Roll for publication, Captaim Olmstead added the following: "The above is a correct list of the 'Pekin Hell Drivers', so called in derision at first, but afterwards adopted by the boys as the official name of the Company. gvery man in the Company is capable of filling a corporal's or sergeant's place, and their friends will never have cause to blush for them." Alexander havens died on Janu ry 31, 1854, and is buried in Roberson Cemetery, Deer Creek Township, Tazewell County, Illinois. He was the great grandfather of Jane hiteman.

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- A-1. Pennsylvania German (hurch Records Possibilities and Limitations. Pastor Fredrick S. Weiser, New Oxford, Pennsylvania. What records were kept by Pennsylvania German (hurches, Clergymen? Which denominations are represented and where are these records? How to get maximum benefits from these records.
- A-2. Church Records in the Midwest for German Background Peoples. Dr. David H. Koss, Jacksonville, Pilinois. Information of depositories of the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod; American Lutheran Church: L.C.A.; (former) Evangelical and Reformed Church; (former) Evangelical United Brethren Church Mennonite and Brethren; German Methodist; Presbyterian; Congregational and Baptist; and a bit on Roman Catholic.
- B-1. Cartography as a Research Jool in Genealogical Research with Special Emphasis on German Research. Met Woifgang, Albany, New York. The boundaries of Germany and the German speaking countries changed often. It is necessary to know the evolution dates to pinpoint the exact geographic area to determine where your ancestor's records may be found.
- B-2. Problems in Spelling and Pronouncing German Names. Dr. Arta E. Johnson, Columbus, Ohio. How and why German names were garbled in the USA; how to restore original spellings and the need to do so. German sounds spelled differently in English, English spellings not found in German.
- (-1. Personal Records of Pennsylvania Germans. Pastor Inedrick S. Weiser. Pennsylvania Germans kept many records in their homes and in their own possession. The various kinds of records will be discussed; their genealogical value given and some hints on where to find them.
- D-2. Are Your German Immigrants on Microfilm? Arlene H. Eakle, Salt Lake (ity, Utah. Description of the thousands of nolls of film available to you through the genealogical Society of Utah passenger lists, debt clearances, permits to travel or leave the country (protocals), manumissions and many other emigrant/immigrant documents.
- J-B. Pennsylvania Folkart. Pastor Fredrick S. Weiser. The "Pennsylvania Dutch" provided their own entertainment by making brightly colored objects which reflected the world as they saw it. The serious and the comic went hand in hand in their folk art reflecting their joyous view of life.
- 3-2. 19th Century Immigration in the Midwest: A Case Study. Dr. David Koss. Will explore settlement of German families from unban areas to those branches that formed in the same country. Using case studies this lecture will show the diversification in marriage, religion and social status that occurred to many of our ancestors.

- 9-1. The Origins of German Surnames. Dr. Arta Johnson. An interesting talk on patronymics, occupation - surnames, place - surnames and personal characteristic surnames (the fun ones). This will be preceded with a short historical introduction.
- 9-2. Fitting It All Josether: Pennsylvania German Family Trees. Arlene H. Eacle. Answers to: Which sources are best for my Pennsylvania German family tree? Jax lists? Deeds? Wills? Estate partitions? (ounty Histories? (hurch Records? Do 9 have to search them all? How do 9 match the evidence 9 already have with what I find in the sources - especially if it doesn't agree?
