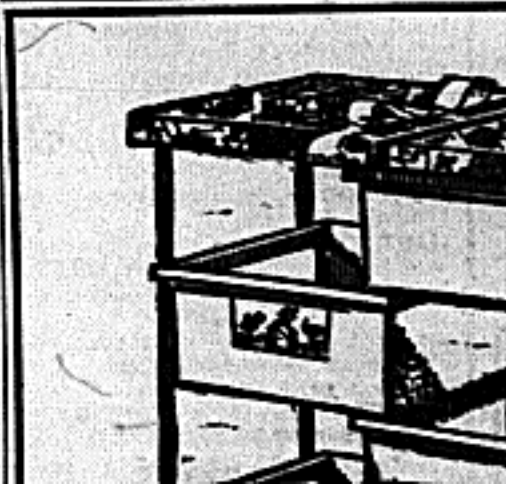

15 Year Old Lincoln Youth Killed When Struck By Train

A 15 year old Lincoln youth was fatally injured when he was struck by a train at an Illinois Central Gulf railroad crossing here at 12:17 p.m. Saturday.

Killed was Haldean Taylor, 61 Centennial court. The accident occurred 332 feet south of the Keokuk st. crossing.

Train engineer William E. White of Bloomington told police the train was moving southward at 45 miles per hour when he saw two boys walking toward the tracks from the west.

White said he sounded the horn, that the kids looked toward the train and stopped. Then he said the kid in front continued to push his bike and

walked in front of the train.

The impact threw the lad 72 feet to the west. He landed about four feet from the west side of the tracks. The train was stopped at Pekin st. with the lad's bike still hanging on the front of the train.

Witnesses included the dead lad's brother, Danny Taylor, John H. Nierhoff of Bloomington, brakeman; Samuel J. Gross, Bloomington, conductor; and J. L. Abbott, Normal, flagman.

Complete Expansion At PPG Industries

PPG Industries has completed a major expansion of its Lincoln glass fabrication plant, increasing capacity by nearly 50 per cent to help meet soaring demand for insulating window glass.

The expansion included construction of a plant addition and installation of two high-volume insulating glass fabrication lines, said Richard F. Becker, manager of PPG's Lincoln plant. The new construction adds 28,000 square feet of floor space and brings total fabrication lines at the plant to 11.

Sparked by the energy shortage, homeowner demand for insulating windows, both for new construction and remodeling, has nearly outpaced production capacity, even with the new addition, Becker said. The Lincoln plant produces Twindow Xi insulating units — two glass panels with a special dry gas sealed between — that are 20 per cent more efficient than conventional air-filled units in reducing interior heat loss.

"The new facilities incorporate advanced process technology for higher production speeds and greater efficiency," Becker said. The expansion has added about 85 employees, bringing total employment at the Lincoln plant to more than 425.

Now in full production operation, the two new fabricating lines are the latest in a series of expansions since the Lincoln plant began producing insulating glass units 22 years ago.

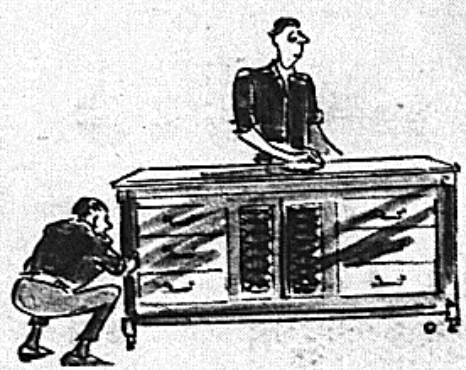

MT. PULASKI — Charles F. Wagner, 56, died at 4:45 p.m., Friday at his vacation home in Hallisper, Mo.

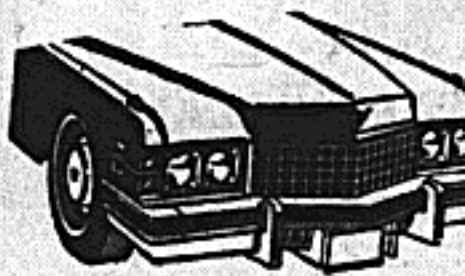
