

Complete Expansion At PPG Industries

PPG Industries has completed a major expansion of its Lincoin glass fabrication plant, in-creasing capacity by nearly 50 per cent to help meet soaring demand for insulating window

The expansion included con-struction of a plant addition and installation of two high-volume Insulating glass fabrication lines, said Richard F. Becker, manager of PPG's Lincoln

lines, said Richard F. Becker, manager of PPG's Lincoln plant. The new construction adds 28,000 square feet of floor space and brings total fabrication lines at the plant to 11. Sparked by the energy shortage, homeowner demand for insulating windows, both for new construction and remodeling, has nearly outpaced production capicity, even with the new addition, Becker said. The Lincoln plant produces Twindow Xi insulating units — two glass Xi insulating units — two glass panels with a special dry gas sealed between — that are 20 per cent more efficient than conventional air - filled units in reducing interior heat loss. "The new facilities incorpor-

ate advanced process technology for higher production speeds and greater efficiency," Becker said. The expansion has added

said. The expansion has added about 85 employes, bringing total employment at the Lincoln plant to more than 425.

Now in full production operation, the two new fabricating lines are the latest in a series of expansions since the Lincoln plant began producing insulating glass units 22 years ago.


