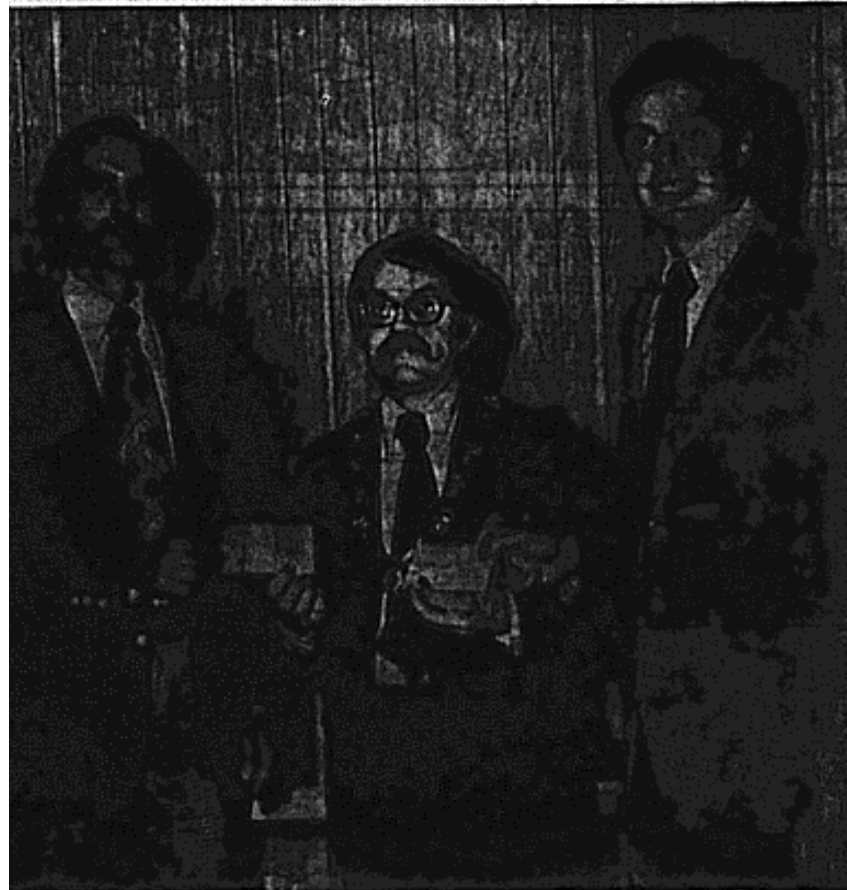

New Holland Farmer Dies From Gunshot

A 65 year old rural New Holland farmer was found dead at his home around noon Tuesday, apparently from a self-inflicted gunshot wound.

Deputy Coroner Ed Barry pronounced George Funderburg dead at the scene. The dead man was found in his living room with a shotgun beside him.
