Mt. Pulaski Man Killed in Wreck

MT. PULASKI — A 19-year-old Mt. Pulaski man was killed when his car ran out of control three miles south of Mt. Pulaski on the Illiopolis blacktop.

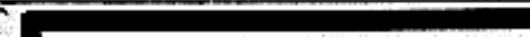
