L.C.C. President Appel Succumbs

Dr. Leon H. Appel, president of Lincoln Christian College and Seminary and former minister of Lincoln Christian Church, died en route to a Fargo, N.D. hospital Thursday.

Appel, 52, suffered a heart attack in Minnesota Saturday and was being transferred by ambulance from Park Rapids, Minn., to Fargo when death occurred.

His funeral will be at 2 p.m. Monday at Lincoln Christian College Chapel, with Ken Monson, pastor of Lincoln Christian church, and Dr. Earl C. Hargrove, Chancellor of Lincoln Christian College officiating. Burial will be in Union cemetery. The family suggests memorials may be made to Lincoln Christian College.

Friends may call at the Lincoln Christian College Chapel after 2 p.m. Sunday. Holland and Barry Funeral Home is in charge of arrangements.

He was named president of the Lincoln Christian College and Seminary by its board of trustees in June, 1972, succeeding Dr. Earl C. Hargrove, who had been president of the college since its inception in 1944.

Mr. Hargrove was named chancellor of the college upon the appointment of Mr. Appel, who had served as executive vice president of the college for two years.

A native of Volga, S.D., Mr. Appel became pastor of the Lincoln Christian church in November, 1950 and in 1951 was named chairman of the religious affairs committee of the Lincoln - Logan County Civil Defense.

He was graduated from Minnesota Bible College, Minneapolis, in June, 1943, and did further work at Butler School of Religion, Indianapolis, Ind.

In recognition of his service, Minnesota Bible College conferred the Doctor of Divinity degree upon him in 1960. Two years later, the Lincoln Church gave him an expense-free trip abroad. He toured seventeen countries in three continents, Europe, Africa, and Asia, including a visit to the Holy Land.

He served as minister at the Sheldon, Wis., Christian church from August 1942, to February, 1945. In that year he went to Toluca, where he served until moving to the Lincoln church.

He finished his nearly 20 years of service at the Lincoln church with a sermon, "The Brighter Tomorrow," on June 28, 1970.

He had served as chairman of the board of trustees of the Lincoln school, was on the board

of trustees of Minnesota Bible College. He also served on the publishing committee of Standard Publishing Co., and the board of Abraham Lincoln Memorial Hospital, and was director of the Christian Loan Fund, a past president of the Lincoln Kiwanis Club, a member of the survey committee that did the preparatory for Lincoln's \$2.5 million high school and of the park commission that took the initiative in establishing a park district for the City of Lincoln.

An outstanding public speaker, Dr. Appel was frequently requested to speak for many oc-

casions relating to the church as well as for farm, business, and professional groups.

Prior to becoming president of Lincoln Christian College, June 3, 1972, he served two years as executive vice president. Mr. Appel came to Lincoln in 1950 and served as senior minister of Lincoln Christian Church for almost twenty years. During his ministry, this congregation grew to over 2,000 members, and church property was erected valued at almost a million dollars. Missionary giving increased to \$80,000 annually. Other ministries were held in Sheldon, Wisconsin, and Toluca, Illinois.

In 1963 he was elected president of the North American Christian Convention and prior to that had served several terms on its continuation and executive committees, 1921.

He was born Nov. 1, 1921, at Volga, S.D. a son of Harve and Erva Levitt Appel. He married Veva Crooks and she survives.

Surviving are his mother, three daughters, Mrs. Gloria Fry, Canton, Ohio; Mrs. Glenda Allison, Champaign; Mrs. Gail Clark, Lincoln; three sons, Mike, Greg, and Gene, all of Lincoln; a brother, Lyle Appel, Denver, Colo.; a sister, Mrs. Evelyn York, Toledo, Ohio; and three grandchildren.

Unemployment Rate Shows Slight Rise

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The nation's unemployment rate rose slightly in July to 5.3 per cent of the labor force, the government reported today.

The rate in June was 5.2 per cent and such small increases as the 0.1 per cent rise in July are generally regarded as statistically insignificant. But some Democratic critics of the administration's economic policy said the jobless rate might go as high as 7 per cent by next year.

The number of unemployed persons in July was listed by the Labor Department at 4.9 million, little changed from June, while total employment was 86.3 million. An increase in the number of women holding jobs was offset by a decline in teen-age employment.

On Thursday, former Kennedy-Johnson administration economist Walter Heller said joblessness might reach 7 per cent in 1975 under current programs.

Treasury Secretary William E. Simon acknowledged today that unemployment likely would rise. Simon testified before the House-Senate Joint Economic Committee that "for a time, we will have to live with slightly more unemployment than we would like, but it will not have to be a large amount."

Simon urged passage by Congress of improved unemployment compensation benefits proposed by President Nixon. But he added that all Americans, rich and poor alike, were suffering from more pervasive
