On The Record

DECISION AFFIRMED

The fourth district appellate court has affirmed a July 15 Logan court decision made by Judge John T. McCullough.

The appellate court affirmed the judge's decision in the case of American Cyanamid Co. versus Donald L. and Emelia M. Rogers; and the People of the State of Illinois, plaintiff appellee, versus Donald Rogers, defendant appellant.

Attorneys for Rogers had appealed the court order which had found him to be in contempt of court for disobeying a prior court order to pay a judgment to the American Cyanamid Co.
