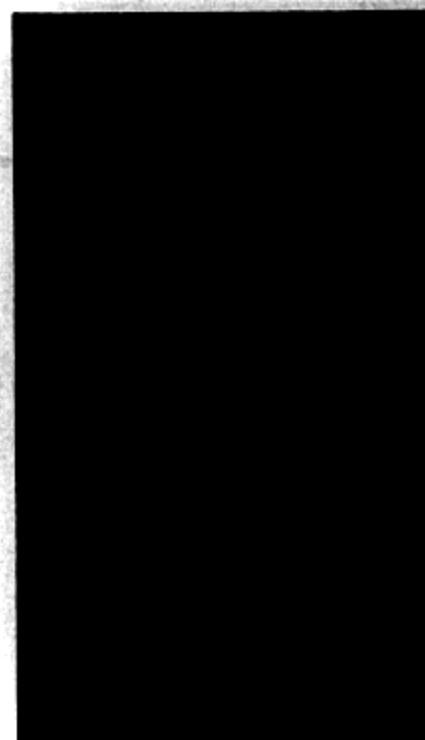

Approximately 2,900 IBEW members — operators, service, construction, supply, and service office workers of GenTel — walked off their jobs at midnight Oct. 26 after attempts to negotiate new contracts failed.

Bargaining committees from both sides met Nov. 4 with Baker. After eight hours, the talks broke off with GenTel representatives claiming the union's wage position was "totally unacceptable."

C. Sumpter Logan, GenTel's vice president of public affairs, said the company considered its "last wage and benefit offer to be a very fair one." Logan said the offer would have provided \$4,155,000 in additional wages and benefits to the striking employes on an annual basis.

The final offer, which IBEW negotiators refused to take to the membership for a vote, included a two-year contract. It called for a 13 per cent average wage increase the first year
