NEW YORK (UPI) — With uncertainty mounting over the outcome of a vote to end the nationwide coal strike, prices plunged today in slow trading on the New York Stock Exchange.

The Dow Jones industrial average was off 10.01 to 608.65 shortly before noon EST. Declines led advances, 799 to 236, among the 1,441 issues crossing the tape.

The two-hour turnover amounted to about 4,300,000 shares, compared with 3,410,000 traded during the same period Friday, the second slowest trading day of the year.

Eastman Kodak lost 2 3/4. There is concern on Wall Street demand for photo products will continue to be sluggish through late 1975, according to the Wall Street Journal. Polaroid dropped 1/2.

Procter & Gamble lost 1 1/4. It lost Friday also after a Federal Drug Administration panel raised questions, which Procter & Gamble denied, about an antiperspirant.

Coal, steels, chemicals, oils and glamors were losers in the early trading.

Sielaff issued the fact sheet after the Cook County grand jury Friday recommended furloughs be ended for "convicts who are serving prison sentences for major crimes such as murder, rape, armed robbery and aggravated battery."

Sielaff countered by noting in the fact sheet he is required by a 1969 state law to maintain a furlough program, even for "persons convicted of violent crimes." He said it is especially important for these offenders to re-enter society gradually because they've been away longer than most prisoners.

Specifically, the fact sheet said, "violent crime" offenders are eligible for furlough only if they are within six months of parole, have "exhibited excellent institutional behavior and have developed plans that indicate motivation to make a successful community adjustment."

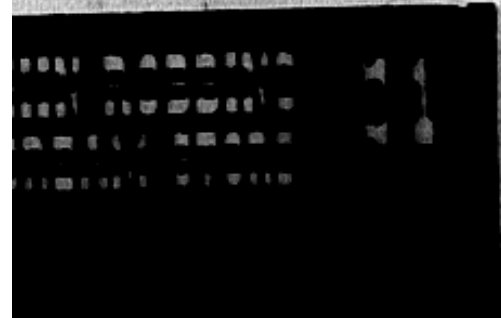
