

Les Sheridan, Lincoln history devotee, dies

Lester Odell Sheridan, well-known in Lincoln for his persistent promotion of the city's Lincoln heritage, died at 4 a.m. today (Friday) April 1, at Lincoln Rustic Gift Shop, which he owned.

Sheridan, age 48, resided at Rural Route 2, Lincoln. Funeral arrangements are pending at Holland and Barry Funeral Home.

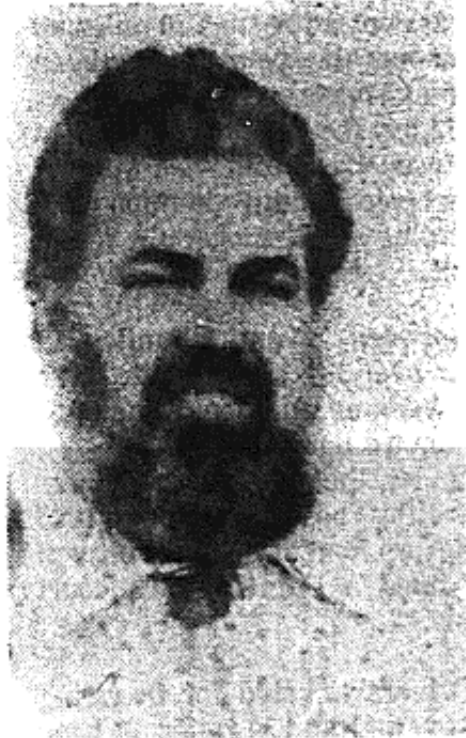
He was born March 6, 1929, in Lincoln, a son of O.L. and Edna Bertrice Broughton Sheridan. He married Jacqueline Cowgur June 5, 1948, in Lincoln. She survives.

Also surviving are one daughter, Mrs. Ann Holshouser, Elkhart; his mother, Lincoln; and one brother, Edwin Sheridan, Champaign.

He was employed at Lehn and Fink Products Corporation as a production planner of raw materials, and served as a past officer and member of the bargaining committee of International Chemical Workers Union Local 316.

A lifelong Lincoln resident, Sheridan obtained his elementary education at Hunting and Musick rural schools and was a 1946 graduate of Lincoln High School.

A reading of Judge Lawrence B. Stringer's history of Logan County sparked his fervent interest in local heritage. His adult years were spent in service to the community and efforts to promote and enhance the city's historical ties with Abraham

Lincoln.

He was a member and former trustee of First United Methodist Church, at one time serving as associate lay leader. He was a former central Illinois conference director of Methodist Men and on the list of certified lay speakers for seven years.

Sheridan was also a member of Lincoln Lodge 210, AF&AM; Springfield Consistory; Ansar Temple; Logan County Shrine Club; White Shrine of Jerusalem; Lincoln Chapter 47, Royal Arch Masons; Logan County Railsplitting Association; the board of Lincoln Heritage Trail Association; the advisory board of Mr. Lincoln's Country of the

Illinois Tourism Office; Abraham Lincoln Logan County Historical Foundation; and Logan County Park and Trails Foundation.

He was a member and past worthy patron of Lincoln Order of Eastern Star 351, and a member and charter president of Lincoln Lions Club.

He received the Grand Cross of Color for his service on the advisory board of Order of Rainbow for Girls. He served as a zone chairman and a deputy district governor in Lions International.

Enamored with the idea of Lincoln's historical significance, Sheridan suggested that Lions Club members present the city with a replica of a watermelon slice to remind citizens and visitors of Abe Lincoln's part in "starting" the town. The replica was erected at the depot.

Sheridan was among promoters of the watermelon festival, part of the annual Labor Day homecoming sponsored by the Lions.

Recently, he and Joe Kafka planned dedication ceremonies for a new rail fence and two white oak trees established at the depot, which are to commemorate President Gerald Ford's visit here. The dedication was conducted Saturday, March 26.

Because of his unceasing efforts to promote Lincoln's heritage, The Courier named Lester Sheridan "Man of the Month" in November, 1965.

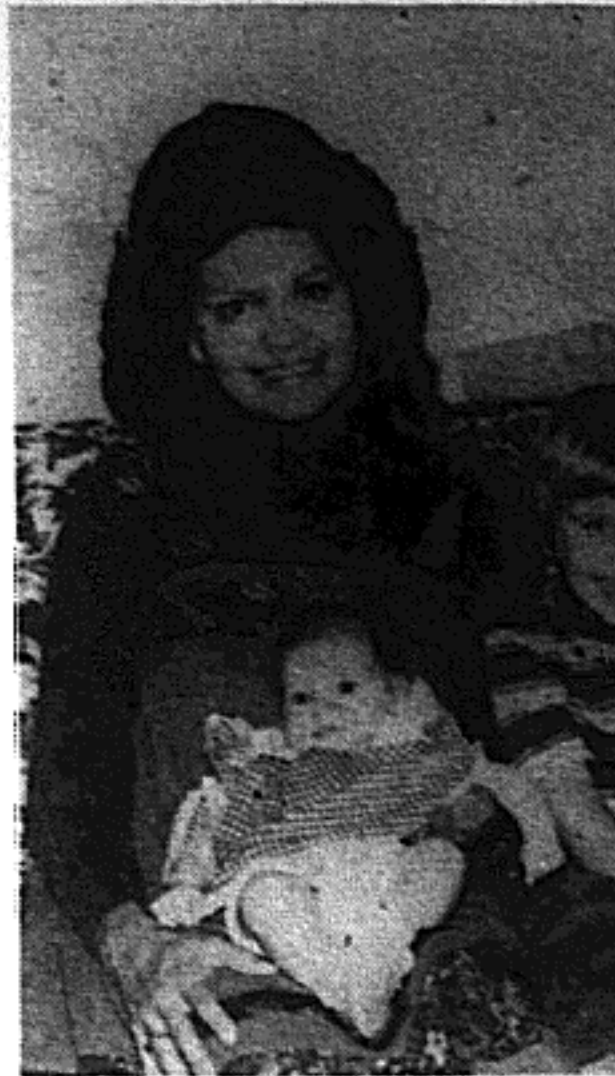

Require use of call sign

WASHINGTON (AP)— Almost all CBers have "numbers," but refusal to use their Federal Communications Commission call signs accounts for the greatest abuse of Citizen Band radio regulations.

In fact Uncle Charlie, as the FCC is known, ranks failure to identify CB stations by their call signs at the top of the commission's "trigger violations," or enforcement priorities.

The use of call signs is required by international treaty, says Deputy Chief James C. McKinney of the Field Operations Bureau, the FCC's enforcement arm.

"It's main purpose is to control interference," McKinney explains. "When interference does occur, other stations can easily identify the offender and the responsible government agency then can take appropriate action," he says.

Use of call signs also aids enforcement of other rules, McKinney adds.

"We're seeing much greater use of call signs," he says.

There was a time when we had only 5 per cent compliance, but we're now running 35 to 40 per cent. That's still too low, but it's a great improvement."

One reason for the increased use of numbers, perhaps, is the recent FCC action permitting CBers to go on the air almost immediately after getting a new radio.

A CBer now can begin "modulating" legally just by sending the FCC the license application usually packed with his new rig and using a temporary call sign until the permanent license arrives.

The temporary number is composed of the letter "K," the CBer's first and last initial and his postal zip code.

Until this change, CBers were required to wait until their permanent license arrived.
