Long, 50, who once boasted, "I am the law," went on trial Monday in Circuit Court on the first of 18 counts on which he was indicted.

Long is charged with battery for allegedly beating John M. Wilmoth Jr., 25, who is now serving a 20-to 60-year sentence at the Menard Correctional Center on his conviction for raping a 70-year-old woman confined to a wheelchair in Lincoln in 1975.

Long's attorney asked Judge Robert J. Steigmann for a change of venue, but Long reportedly told friends he prefers to be tried in Clinton because he believes a hometown jury will be more sympathetic to him than to Wilmoth. Steigmann took the change-of-venue motion under advisement Monday as jury selection began.

The charges on which Long is being tried related to incidents stemming from Wilmoth's arrest nearly a year before the rape incident. Wilmoth was charged

with disorderly conduct and obscene language in across the street from County Jail.

Four officers, 6 deputies and two citizens allegedly witnessed of Wilmoth. Special Basil G. Greenias of included the four of list of witnesses to prosecution.

Wilmoth was found the disorderly conduct and was fined \$35.

Jettisoned rocket cause of problem

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — Scientists believe the Voyager 2 space craft's erratic behavior after its launch last weekend may have been caused by a jettisoned rocket that bumped into it.

The 350-pound expended rocket, which should have fallen clear, may be tagging along with the unmanned space probe bound for Jupiter, Saturn and beyond, scientists at Jet Propulsion Laboratory here said Tuesday.

For that reason, a maneuver planned for later this week to correct Voyager's course may be delayed while light-sensing instruments aboard the probe search for signs of the jettisoned rocket, called a propulsion module.
