Allyne V. Nugent dies

Mrs. Allyne V. Nugent, former publisher and owner of the Lincoln Courier, died Friday at 7:30 p.m. at the Christian Nursing Home. Funeral arrangements are pending at Holland & Barry Funeral Home.

Mrs. Nugent was born in Ellettsville, Indiana, the daughter of Jacob and Mary Michael Scheerer. March 1, 1912. She was married to Willard E. Carpenter and he died in 1925. While on a trip in Europe, she met and married John L. Nugent in London in 1928. Mr. Nugent died Jan. 19, 1972.

Mrs. Nugent was associated with the Carpenter & Company National Advertising firm and represented newspapers throughout the Midwest with offices in Chicago and New York. She was also active in a women's advertising club of Chicago and New York.

In 1918 the Lincoln Courier Herald was purchased and the advertising agency maintained. Mrs. Nugent became publisher of the Courier after the death of her husband (Carpenter) in 1925. She wrote articles on travel under the "My Column" heading. The advertising agencies were merged with her brother Hugo, to become the Scheerer and Company firm. After his death, she devoted full time to building the Courier into a fine small town daily newspaper. In 1938, Mrs. Nugent purchased the Lincoln Star and the two newspapers merged.

The Courier Herald used rented quarters on N. Kickapoo Street and moved to the IOOF building in 1923. The office was moved to the present building in 1939 and she was her own architect, planning the entire building. The present building was built from a number of smaller business buildings which were purchased by Mr. and Mrs. Nugent.

After her marriage to Mr.

Nugent, he became associated with the Courier until it was sold in 1968. For three years, the Courier was placed in the hands of a manager while the Nugents resided in Chicago.

Mrs. Nugent was a member of the Illinois Board of Pardons and Paroles. She was active in helping to establish the First National Bank in Lincoln and was also active in the dedication and ground work for the City Gateway, built by labor of this community who donated their efforts. Governor and Mrs. Green were among many state dignitaries to attend the dedication ceremonies and the program received national publicity

from Bangor, Maine to San Diego, Calif.

A memorial for the war dead as a part of the park district became part of her dreams in 1945. She spent many hours trying to develop the memorial but it was defeated in a referendum.

In 1946 the Courier received the Rockefeller Center award from the Museum of Science and Industry for the best small town newspaper in the United States.

Mrs. Nugent had always been interested in the betterment of the community and the Courier promoted many things, including the Logan County fair queen, the Junior

Good Citizens, Miss of the Month and Year programs and helped organize the Logan County Mother of Twins club.

In a statement published in the Courier Aug. 28, 1962, the evening of the Lincoln centennial, Mr. and Mrs. Nugent set forth guidelines for their publishing philosophy. The statement follows:

"We take pride in being a part in seeing that people are kept informed. We will continue to challenge the community in its welfare drives, in relation to the exercise of the ballot and in relation to its needs. While appreciating what we have we must not forget what we should have.

"It is our mission to bring the world to your doorstep for either a hurried glance, a leisurely perusal, or a concentrated study. We shall chronicle who was born, who died, and who was married. We will predict the weather, provide results of sports contests, and in various other ways offer a varied reading menu for your information and entertainment.

Now will we relent in assisting the development of Logan County in civic, economic, educational, religious, social and cultural progress in the days before us. In this way we shall do our part to promote better life and better living for the people of this great community."

Mr. and Mrs. Nugent retired from a long and active life in the newspaper field when they sold the Lincoln Evening Courier to William V. Joy, owner of the Centralia Sentinel. Since the Courier publisher has been James L. Felgatter, who is also business manager of the Centralia daily. When the paper changed hands, the name was changed to Lincoln Courier.

Surviving is a sister, Mrs. Beatrice Hamilton of Lee's Summit, Missouri; three nephews and one niece.
