Montgomery was born in Austin Township, a son of W.N. and Grace Albert Montgomery. He was an art history professor at Yale University, was an

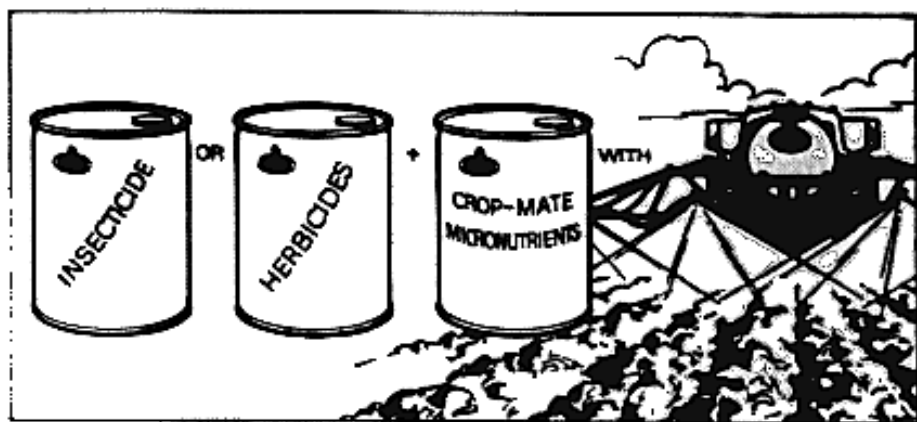
authority on American decorative art and was curator of the Mabel Brady Garven collection and related collections of American art at Yale.
