NEW YORK (AP) — The possibility of stability in Iran settled the stock market today after three days of heavy losses.

The Dow Jones industrial average, down about 20 points so far this week, was off .06 to 839.14 at noon.

Gainers trailed losers 2-1 on the New York Stock Exchange

Analysts said investors seemed to be taking a wait-and-see attitude on the return to Iran of opposition religious leader Ayatullah Ruhollah Khomeini.

McGraw-Hill topped the active list, rising 1 to 28%. On Wednesday, the firm turned down a \$40 per share offer from American Express Co. That decision knocked the price of McGraw-Hill's stock down 3% in a late trade on the Pacific Stock Exchange Wednesday.
