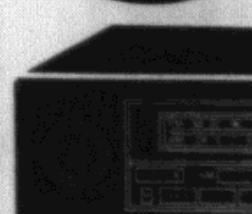

A total of 19 people were treated at St. John's Hospital and two at Memorial Medical Complex. Among those treated and released at St. John's were Estrella Bernardes, 32, and Emily Bernardes, 6, both of Lincoln.

Sangamon County Coroner Norman Richter said an autopsy was being conducted Monday morning. He said Mott had obvious chest injuries and a broken arm at the accident scene. An inquest will be scheduled later.

Richter said it was believed the Mott automobile was the third car in the 16-car chain. He said preliminary reports indicated the Mott vehicle struck the car in front of it, turned sideways following the crash, in the passing lane, where it was struck by another car and pushed down into the median.

Bystanders at the scene credited an unknown truck driver with preventing further collisions. They said the trucker saw what was happening and pulled his rig so that it blocked both lanes, halting traffic.

Authorities said three ambulances, four Springfield and one Sherman fire trucks, eight wreckers and seven state police cars were at the scene. Traffic was blocked for more than an hour at the accident scene, backing it up for more than two miles, police said.
