

Woman dead in wreck

Scuffle follows fatality

A 24 year old Lincoln woman was fatally injured Friday evening in a one car accident in the 1800 block of Broadway Street, west of Route 121.

Mary Trail, of 127 Frorer Ave., was pronounced dead at 8:40 p.m. at ALM Hospital, according to Logan County Coroner Edward Barry.

Lincoln police said Ms. Trail's car was westbound on Broadway Street at approximately 8:06 p.m. when, by an unknown means, her vehicle went out of control, and crossed the center line of the roadway. The car crossed the curb on the south side of the street and traveled approximately 50 feet before striking a tree in a yard at 1801 Broadway Street, according to police.

Lincoln Police were still conducting an investigation into the accident Saturday morning. Ms. Trails was alone in the car at the time of the accident, according to officers.

Police said approximately 30 minutes after they arrived at the scene, a scuffle with Terry (Stubby) Heath, 22, of 1028 S. State St. resulted in a head injury to Lincoln Officer Mike Harberts. Heath was reportedly a friend of Ms. Trail.

Sergeant Darrell Sisk, who is handling the accident investigation, said officers were attempting to remove Heath from the scene after he had become disorderly.

According to authorities, the officer struck his head on a sign

near the accident scene after a scuffle occurred during the removal of Heath. The scuffle involved Heath and his brother Larry Heath, 22, of rural Middletown, and several other bystanders, police said.

Both Heath brothers were

arrested on charges of aggravated battery. Other charges are pending upon the completion of the investigation, according to Sisk.

Police believe the Heath brothers may have witnessed the accident. Further information is

expected to be available following an investigation into the incident.

Officer Harberts was listed in satisfactory condition at ALM Hospital Saturday morning.

Funeral arrangements are still pending.



Fire in rural Emden home claims lives of two residents

EMDEN — Wednesday was warm with bright sunshine but the more than two dozen people standing around the home owned by Bill and Linda Parrott of Tulon didn't notice.

The bystanders were firemen, rescue personnel and law enforcement officials as well as Merle Donath's neighbors. The scene was one of somber quiet as they viewed the smoky remains of the more than 100 year old

home which had burned to the ground.

The blaze killed Donath's 43-year-old wife, Rosemary and house guest Diana L. Trowbridge, 21. The couple and two sons, escaped the wood frame house when the mid-morning fire began, but the three went back into the inferno to help Miss Trowbridge. Mrs. Donath never came back. The women's bodies were recovered from the still-smoldering rubble around 1:30 p.m.

The Donath's closest neighbors, Mr. and Mrs. Allen Barry, said he spotted the house engulfed in flames around 10 a.m. as he was bringing horses to the barnlot. He asked his wife to call the fire department and went to help his neighbors.

The Emden Fire Department

responded to the call as did the Delavan Rescue Squad. Before the fire was contained, both Hartsburg and San Jose Fire Departments and Rescue Squad trucks were assisting. Lincoln-Logan paramedics also responded to the call and stayed at the scene.

Mrs. Barry said she and her husband grabbed two wooden ladders and took them to the scene. However, the blaze was widespread and hot, the ladders burned before they could be used. The rural Emden farmwife said Miss Trowbridge was in an upstairs room in the two-story house and they tried to throw things to break the window to help her.

Coroner Ed Barry who was at the scene for more than three hours, said the fire apparently

centered near a 20-year-old family room addition. According to the Logan County Coroner and the State Fire Marshal the fire apparently was started by a wood burning stove, which had recently been installed.

Donath, a Caterpillar worker, and his sons ran barefoot from the house and wore borrowed shoes from the Barrys. Other Donath family members, including two high school students and a married daughter, stayed at the scene until after the bodies were recovered.

As the firemen continued to hose down the smoldering ashes, area residents were beginning to organize aid for the family. While Mrs. Barry was trying to help at the scene, she was also receiving phone calls on clothing and other needs of the family.

Bystanders at the scene said Miss Trowbridge and Arthur Donath were to be married this weekend.

The fire scene is in Prairie Creek township five miles southwest of Emden and about the same distance northwest of Hartsburg.

Firemen said when they arrived at the scene the entire structure was on fire. Shortly after their arrival, the roof collapsed. When they were told at least one person was still inside the home, they attempted to enter from each side of the building.

However, the firefighters were driven back by the heat and heavy black smoke. "There was just nothing we could do," said one Emden fireman his voice trailing off. "You feel so helpless,

frustrated. So we just fought the fire and kept those tanks cool." He was referring to an LP tank on one side of the house and a gas or fuel oil tank on the other.

Friends of the Donath family are beginning a drive for clothing and cash contributions in the Emden area.

Canned goods and clothing may be left at the Emden firehouse, the Emden Community House or the St. Peter's Lutheran Church. Cash contributions should be sent to the Farmers State Bank of Emden.

The daughter wears size 3 slacks, a small blouse and size 7½-8 shoes. The father and three sons all wear 15-15½ shirts. The trousers are 29-30, 31-32, 32-30 and 34-30. Shoe sizes are 9½, 10½-11, 10½D and 9½B.

A memorial service for Diana L. Trowbridge will be conducted at 10:30 a.m. Saturday at Fricke Funeral Home, Lincoln, with the

Rev. Don Galehr officiating. Visitation will be one hour prior to the service.
