# Red Sovine dies

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Country music entertainer Red Sovine, best known for his truck driving songs and hearttugging recitations, is dead from injuries received in a traffic accident. He was 61

A van driven by Sovine ran a red light and collided with a car Friday in a residential section of Nashville. said patrolman William Bay of the Metro Police Department.

He died shortly before noon at the St. Thomas Hospital emergency room. The driver of the car was slightly injured.

St. Thomas spokesman Lamar Jackson said a preliminary autopsy showed Sovine died of internal injuries — abdominal bleeding related to a cut spleen and liver along with broken ribs and breastbone.

A former partner, singer Webb Pierce, said of Sovine, "He was quiet when he wanted to be and funny when he wanted to be. He was great to work with, probably the best front man I ever had."

Although his cureer spanned more than 40 years, he was best known for his 1976 millionseller hit, "Teddy Bear"

"It was a sentimental recitation about a crippled boy who complained of loneliness while talking to truck drivers on a Citizens Band radio at his home. The boy, whose "handle" was "Teddy Bear," subsequently was visited by truckers who gave him rides.

During the song, one of the first about CB radios, Sovine's voice cracked.

"I'm very sentimental," he said in an interview when the song was popular. "To do a recitation well, you have to get all wrapped up in it. I still cry sometimes when I do it, especially if the place is quiet."


