## Law suit going to jury today

A law suit trial will go to the jury today (Friday) in Sangamon County Circuit Court in a case against the Illinois Central Gulf Railroad in the death of Robert Wilson, of rural Argenta. Wilson was killed in a train accident in Atlanta in February of 1972.

Two passengers in Wilson's car, Robert L. Edmiston, and his wife Ella, also died of injuries suffered in the accident. Edmiston died the day of the accident, Feb. 19 at St. John's Hospital in Springfield, and Mrs. Edmiston died in a Galesburg Hospital April 4, 1972. Wilson died March 14, 1972 in Macon County.

Details of the law suit could not be obtained at press time Friday.

The accident occurred Feb. 19, 1972 when the car driven by Wilson was struck by a northbound train. According to state police, at the time of the accident, Wilson's car was eastbound on Elm Street and was struck by the northbound Gulf, Mobile, and Ohio (Amtrack) passenger train (now the Illinois Central Gulf Railroad) at approximately 11:15 a.m.
