Mrs. Harris, a 1917 graduate of Northwestern University, was a member of Kappa Alpha Beta sorority at the university and was a honorary member of Beta Sigma Phi of Lincoln.

She was a member of the Friday and Monday book clubs and was former president of the Lincoln and Chester woman's club.

She was a member of the Abraham Lincoln Memorial Hospital Auxiliary and the United Nations Association.

She was well-known downtown for her book reviews and programs on foreign affairs.

She was a member of First United Methodist Church and its Naomi-Martin Circle.
