DeMuth dies in accident

MOUNT PULASKI — James Allen DeMuth, 60, a teacher at Beason Grade School and member of the board of Lincoln Community Theatre, was killed about 6:30 a.m. Wednesday near his home.

According to Logan County Coroner Ed Barry, DeMuth was attempting to start his car, which was parked in a garage at 204 S. Vine St., next door to the family residence. Barry and acting Mount Pulaski Police Chief Norman Griffin said the teacher was apparently pushing the car out of the garage, when he was pinned by the car door against the frame of the two-car garage.

Two men, Robert Faith and Wesley DePaister, were passing the scene on their way to work, and found the accident. They notified the City Police Department. Griffin said personnel from his department notified the coroner as well as other emergency personnel, including Mount Pulaski ambulance service. The victim was pronounced dead at the scene.

Latham Rescue Squad was called to the scene, as were personnel of the Logan County Sheriff's Department.
