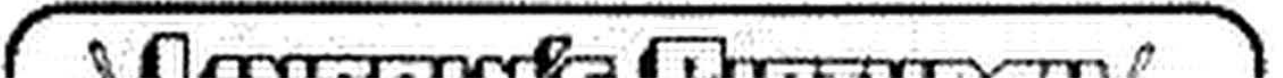

Vets warned

CHICAGO — Veterans are reminded by the Veterans Administration that private cemeteries offering free burial spaces to them are not connected with the agency in any way. Official-looking documents are often sent to veterans describing a program providing a free burial space to a veteran.

The VA urges veterans to read the documents carefully. In most cases the free space is actually provided, but the salesman who calls to "process" the certificate may proceed to endeavor to sell additional spaces for the veteran's spouse and children.

In addition, some such free lots have other requirements concerning the burial, such as the purchase of headstones or markers, extensive requirements for vaults, etc., and in some cases a rather expensive fee for grave opening costs.

An honorably discharged veteran may be buried free of charge in a national cemetery, however the VA does not pay transportation costs to the cemetery in cases where the death was not service-connected. Surviving spouses of a veteran are eligible for burial in a national cemetery as well as two surviving children.

Survivors of veterans who are not buried in national cemeteries receive up to \$450 for burial and plot allowances. A burial flag is provided for all veterans, and a headstone or marker is also provided to all veterans free of charge.



Dead at the scene were Donald Wayne Harms, 54, Leland Mammen, 61, and Marion Rushing, 54, all of Emden; Rudolph Lolling, 83, Lawrence Leesman, 56, and Ed Seaman Jr., 38, all of Hartsburg; Howard Payne, 50, rural Hartsburg; and Chris Rawlings, 26, of Lincoln. The ninth victim, a passenger in a pickup truck, was James M. Koch, 44, of Tremont.

Hospitalized at St. Francis Hospital Medical Center in Peoria is another passenger in the pickup truck, Virgil Harsock, also of Tremont. Treated and released at the same hospital were Norman Welsh of Tremont, pickup truck driver, and Sally A. Gleason of Peoria Heights, driver of another van involved in the collisions.

According to the preliminary report filed at state police headquarters in Metamora, the visibility was estimated to be, at best, 30 feet. The accident is still under investigation by state troopers, aided by crime scene technicians. At one point Thursday, airborne investigators were taking photographs of the stretch of highway and wreckage. Route 121 was closed throughout the day Thursday as emergency vehicles attempted to clear the roadway.

According to the preliminary report, the 7:10 a.m. accident began when Sally A. Gleason was driving a van southbound on Route 121 and attempted to make a left turn onto Allentown Road. A semi-trailer truck, in the same southbound lane, struck the van in the rear and then veered into the northbound lane.

The semi struck the commuter van, carrying the Logan County residents, head-on, and the van burst into flames. The van was then struck by another northbound vehicle, a compact car driven by Joseph H. Litherland of

Hopedale. Neither Litherland nor the semi's driver, Berry Orange of St. Louis, was injured.

The semi truck then struck the pickup truck, driven by Welsh and carrying Harsock and Koch. The series of collisions ended when a southbound car, driven by Marcia Willis of Congerville struck the Gleason van.

As of Friday morning, no tickets have been issued. Other accidents were reported following the initial chain-reaction collision. One of the emergency personnel at the scene said the wreckage reminded him of aircraft crashes he had witnessed in battle during the Vietnam conflict.

Witnesses at the scene said the original accident happened at the height of the morning rush-hour traffic on the highway, which is a main artery for workers at the Caterpillar plant in Morton. They also reported the flames leaped 25 to 30 feet in the air at the scene.
