Holland introduced the use of limestone, phosphate and hybrid corn on his farm in 1913 and became the "laughing stock" of his neighbors, who dubbed him a "book farmer."

His farming activities also included breeding saddle horses, and the farm eventually was named for Helogia, the most famous of his mares. Helogia's colts made the Holland farms well-known among lovers of horseflesh.

Holland was the son of a pioneer, Oliver W. Holland, who founded the village of New Holland in 1875. D. Logan was born May 30, 1888, in New Holland, to Oliver and his wife, Amanda Huffman.

He was educated in the New Holland schools and the high school at Lincoln. On June 16,
