The fly was found Saturday 30 miles southwest of the zone where officials thought they had contained the pest, which deposits its eggs under the skin of many fruit and vegetables.

Crews were set to begin a fourth round of aerial spraying today over a 267-square-mile area, which was to be expanded later this week 179 square miles deeper into Santa Clara County.

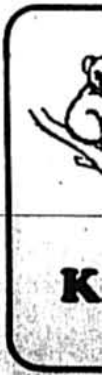

Five fruit flies found in suburb

LOS GATOS, Calif. (AP) — Five fruit flies found in a Los Angeles suburb raised the possibility of a vast expansion of the pest's infestation, while the United States reached an agreement with Japan that may require that fruit imported from California be fumigated.
