MASON CITY — Three men were arrested Tuesday morning after Mason County sheriff's police received a report of someone picking marijuana northeast of Mason City.

Deputy Dave Coulter was on routine patrol about 8:20 a.m., when he was stopped by a Mason City man who told him he had seen two guys picking marijuana by a pond located south of the Harry Jackson farm. The witness said the men left the area travelling southbound in a white van with Illinois truck plates.

At 8:40 a.m., Coulter saw a van matching the description traveling eastbound on Illinois 10. After following the van for a time, Coulter stopped the vehicle on Illinois 29 a mile south of Mason City.

The driver of the van, Joseph Gregson, 23, of Waterloo, reportedly had wet marijuana leaves stuck to his shirt.

State Trooper Jim Bergman arrived at the scene to assist Coulter, and the van was taken to Brooks Motor Company, Mason City. The owner of the vehicle, David Harbison, 23, of Hecker, who was a passenger with Gregson, gave written permission for officials to search the van.

Officers found a compartment in the van which contained what appeared to be freshly-cut cannabis.

Gregson, Harbison, and another passenger, Maurice Bixby Jr., 23, of Waterloo, were arrested for possession of over 500 grams of cannabis. They were lodged in Mason County Jail and held for court appearance.

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Couple sues for number change

LIBERTYVILLE, Ill. (AP) — Harassed Norman and Marilyn White are fed up with being the target of "Dirty Deeds Done Dirt Cheap," and they've gone to court to get some peace and quiet.

It seems that the suburban Chicago couple's home telephone number filters through a recent hit song by a punk rock group. As a result, the Whites say, they've received hundreds of obscene phone calls from punk rockers.

So now the song "Dirty Deeds Done Dirt Cheap," the title track of the latest album by the group "AC/DC," faces the music. The Whites have sued to have the lyrics changed.

The Whites' Cook County Circuit Court suit wants a revised recording of the song published and asks for damages of at least \$250,000.

Hundreds of lewd, suggestive and threatening phone calls relating to the dirty deeds suggested in the song have constituted an unreasonable and prohibited invasion of

privacy and an unwarranted intrusion into our private lives," the Whites charged in the lawsuit, filed Thursday.

In a telephone interview, White said most calls were from young teens.

"After a while," he said, "we would get some calls from parents of the kids trying to find out why our number was appearing on their long distance bills." He said he was glad to tell them.

Dennis P. Ryan, an attorney who filed the suit, said it would be inconvenient for the couple to change their phone number because it appears on business cards held by clients of White, a real-estate broker.

The suit contends that Atlantic Recording Corp., WEA Records Ltd. and J. Albert and Son Ltd., who recorded and released the album, never secured the Whites' permission before recording a six-digit number followed by a slurred word that sounded like the number eight. That made a 12-digit number identical to the Whites', the suit said.

Church day care centers untouched

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. (AP) — The Moral Majority is looking to round two in the Illinois House, after the state Senate voted for a second time this year to get state government out of the business of regulating church-run day care centers.

Senators voted 38-15 to override Gov. James R. Thompson's veto of a bill excluding religious-affiliated child care programs from all state regulations except fire and building safety codes.

In overriding the governor, senators heeded arguments that state licensing violates the constitutional separation of church and state.

The bill now goes to the House, where its sponsor, Sen. W.

Timothy Simms, R-Rockford, predicts a "close vote."

"The threshold question of the whole matter is whether church ministries are subject to the licensure regulations of the state," Simms argued during Senate floor debate. "I don't think they are."

The legislation would exclude from licensing any day care center operated "as an integral part of a local church ministry or a religious non-profit elementary school."

The measure had pitted the Moral Majority and the Illinois Association of Christian Schools against the Illinois Conference of Churches and the state government.

Correctional guard reinstated by CSC

A female guard accused of having sexual intercourse with a Logan Correctional Center inmate was vindicated Thursday by the Illinois Civil Service Commission.

Vicki Moore was notified of her dismissal July 15 by the state's personnel department after prison officials had investigated the case.

The female guard denied the charge and appealed her firing to the Illinois Civil Service Commission.

During an August hearing on the appeal, both the inmate who was named as the guard's sexual

partner, and Miss Moore denied the accusation.

The charge, according to Commission records, was based on another inmate's report. However, other witnesses at the appeal hearing said the inmate who made the report, was not at the scene of the allegation and could, have no knowledge of such an incident taking place.

The commission, therefore, reinstated Miss Moore to her position.

The panel, however, upheld the dismissal of Robert McGee, another LCC guard, who was fired in July on charges of excessive absenteeism.

Argentina to remain Russian grain partner

WASHINGTON (AP) — Argentina, which became a prime supplier of grain to the Soviet Union during the U.S. embargo, is expected to remain a major trading partner with the Russians in 1982, an Agriculture Department analysis says.

The partial embargo, ordered by then-President Carter on Jan. 4, 1980, in response to the Soviet move into Afghanistan, was lifted by President Reagan last April.

Effectively, it blocked sales of about 17 million metric tons of grain that the Soviets had expected to get in 1979-80 and put a lid on sales for much of the 1980-

81 season. The Soviets were limited to 8 million metric tons annually of U.S. wheat and corn.

The new analysis by the Agriculture Department's Foreign Agricultural Service says that because of the embargo, the Soviets became the most important export market for Argentine grain in 1981.

"The Soviets will probably be the top customer for Argentine grain again in 1982," says the analysis by James V. Parker, U.S. agriculture counselor in Buenos Aires, in the current issue of "Foreign Agriculture."

The report notes, however, that "lifting of the U.S. embargo — which was supported by Canada, Australia and the European Community — may bring a reduction in the Soviet Union's share of the Argentine grain trade."

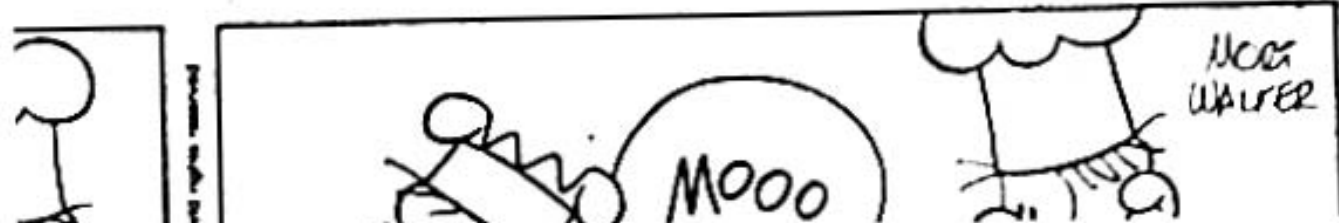
