Grain bin fire started by light bulb

BURTONVIEW — Firefighters from New Holland and Lincoln fought a grain bin fire Saturday evening at the farm of Richard Martin, about 1/2 mile north and 1/4 mile west of Burtonview.

New Holland Fire Chief Kenneth Lowe said Monday that corn stored in the bin was ignited by the heat from a light bulb inside the bin. The 12,000-bushel bin itself was not damaged by the fire, and the burned corn was augered out onto the ground, Lowe said.

The extent of the damage has not yet been determined, according to Lowe, who said he did not know how many bushels of the corn were burned.

The fire chief said it was unknown exactly when the grain may have started burning. The report of the fire was received about 5:15 p.m., and firefighters remained on the scene until about 9 p.m.

Mutual aid was given by Lincoln fire stations 1 and 2, which sent three trucks and four men to the scene.

Record set in October

October was a below average month for precipitation according to official weatherman Vernon Gehlbach. The rainfall for the month was measured at 1.98 inches, below the October average of 2.61 inches.

Despite the low monthly rainfall total, the yearly total is far above the yearly average to date. With 1.98 inches, the total rainfall for the year is 44.44 inches. The average rainfall for the year is only 32.88 inches.

One new record was set for the month of October as the temperature dipped to 21 degrees on Oct. 24. That broke the 1960 record of 23 degrees for that date.

The 21 degrees was also the lowest temperature recorded for the month, while the high was 85 on Oct. 1.

Saturday the high was 70 with an overnight low of 56. Sunday the high reading was 69 and the low 57. Precipitation Sunday was measured at .57 of an inch.

All-saver certificates save Savings & Loans

CHICAGO (AP) — Officials say that for the first time since February, savings deposits in the nation's savings and loan associations were pulled out of the red last month because of the new all-savers certificates.

Preliminary data released Friday by the Chicago-based U.S. League of Savings Associations revealed that in October, deposits exceeded withdrawals for a net asset inflow of \$2.1 billion.

Americans deposited \$18.7 billion in all-savers certificates at S&Ls in October, the first month the new tax-exempt instruments were available, said Rollin D. Barnhard, league president.

Twenty-five percent of the all-saver funds represented new money from other financial institutions, with the balance being internal transfers from other

accounts.
"There is no doubt that the all-savers certificate is the most successful new savings product we've ever seen," said Barnhard.
