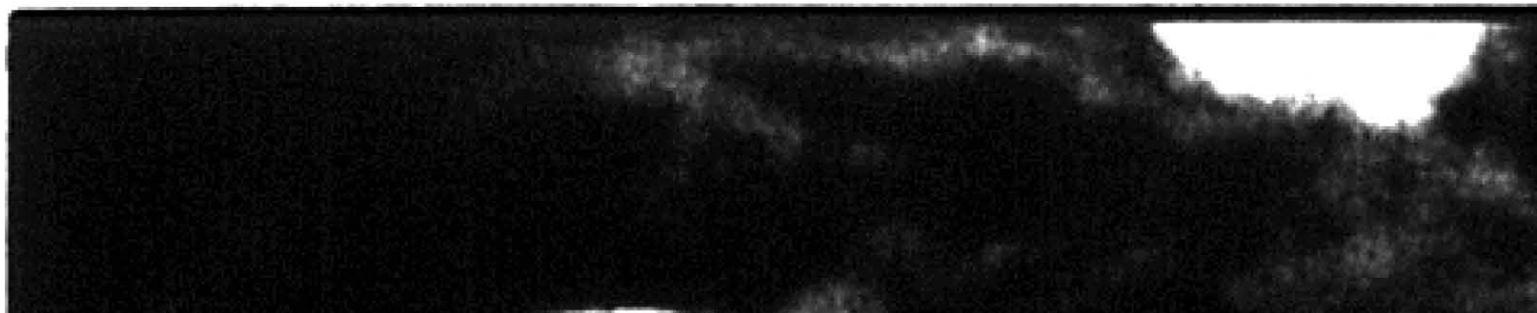

The Illinois hit a crest of 25.5 feet Thursday. Flood stage is 18 feet and damage begins at 22 feet, according to river watchers.

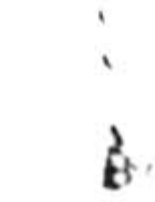
