Burris made the statements in his monthly report on state finances.

The General Fund makes up about \$8 billion of the state's \$14 billion-plus budget and is used to finance a wide variety of state government agencies and programs.

Burris, a Democrat seeking reelection, said the General Fund's month-end balances fell below the \$200 million "warning zone" level for 11 months last year.

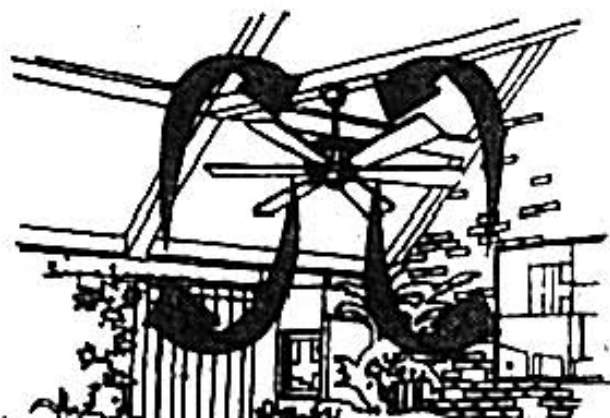
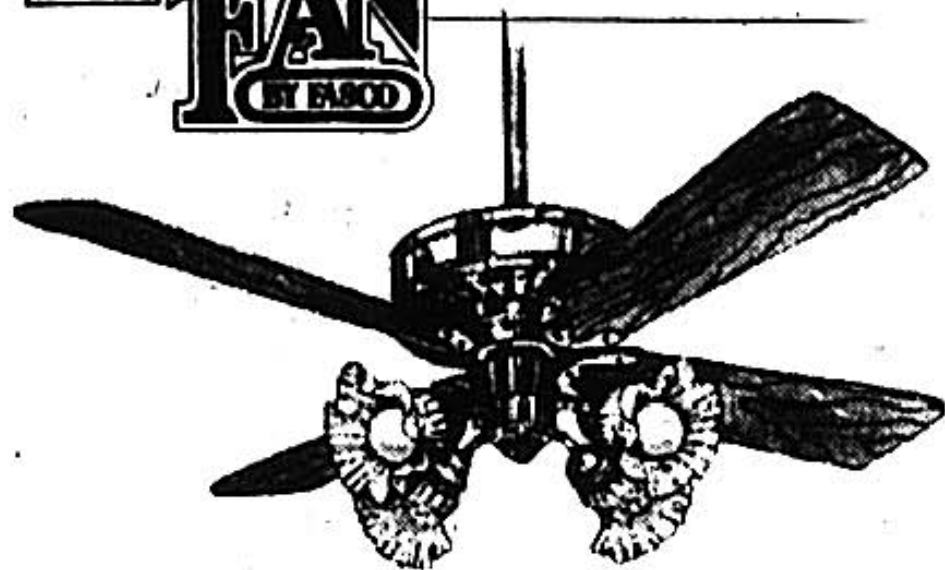
