Board of Trade

CHICAGO (AP) — Corn and soybean futures prices rose modestly in early trading today on the Chicago Board of Trade on perceptions of declining production prospects. Oil futures also rose; wheat futures edged lower.

A private analytical firm, Farmers Commodities Corp. of Des Moines, Iowa, has pegged the year's U.S. corn production at 6.49 billion bushels, down sharply from the Agriculture Department's October estimate of 6.96 billion.

The Des Moines firm estimated the soybean crop at 1.87 billion bushels compared to the latest USDA estimate of 1.89 billion. The USDA will revise its estimates on Nov. 9.

Wheat futures were fractionally lower on profit-taking after a strong rally across the board on Friday.

Another USDA report showed rapid harvest progress last week, although the corn harvest remained behind the normal pace. The agency said 50 percent of the U.S. corn crop was in the bin as of Sunday compared with the five-year average for that date of 75 percent. The soybean crop was 80 percent harvested, slightly below the norm of 83 percent. In early trading, wheat for December delivery was up 1 1/2 cents at \$3.34 a bushel; December corn was 1 1/2 cents higher at \$2.62 1/4 a bushel; December oats were up 1 1/4 cents at \$1.32 1/4 a bushel; November

soybeans were up 8 cents at \$6.26 1/4 a bushel. Corn futures rose on Monday but other grain and soybean futures ended mostly lower. Accused dad-son robbers tell why they shot at police

LAFAYETTE, Ind. — The defense team for the father-son duo accused of being interstate bank robbers said this morning that the pair fired at police officers last spring because they feared being trapped, not because they intended to kill them.

John T. Hunter Sr., 55, of Rolling Meadows, Ill., and his 27-year-old son, John T. Hunter Jr. of Schaumburg, Ill., each is charged with four counts of attempted murder and 11 other counts.

While the trial concerns the chase and battle with local police, FBI officials have said the two men are suspected of robbing up to 35 banks of about \$500,000 since 1985 in Indiana, Iowa, Michigan, Ohio, Minnesota, Illinois and Wisconsin.

Both sides made their opening arguments this morning and began hearing witnesses.

Defense Attorney Edwin Belz said the prosecution will not be able to prove attempted murder because it cannot prove intent.

Tippecanoe Prosecutor Jerry Bean devoted his time to describing the events that led to the duo's arrest, and reminded the jury several times that the "police never fired a shot."

The Hunters, however, shot at police numerous times, said Sgt. Rick Walker, who testified that his car took a hit in the grill and tire during the chase.

A jury of nine women and three men, plus two alternates,

was seated Monday night despite a delay in selection brought on by the strip search of the two defendants for weapons in a Tippecanoe Superior Court conference room. The searches produced no weapons.

Authorities received a tip that one of the suspects planned to smuggle a weapon into the courtroom. Sheriff Dave Heath said a razor blade and part of a towel rack were found hidden in the elder Hunter's jail cell.

Family members and friends of the Hunters were searched with a hand-held metal detector each time they re-entered the courtroom.

The men were arrested last April and have been held on \$1 million in the Tippecanoe County Jail.

Police said the Hunters were taking a license plate from a car at a Lafayette apartment complex April 22 when a sheriff's deputy spotted them and approached them. The men fled and during the chase that followed, they allegedly fired at pursuing officers.

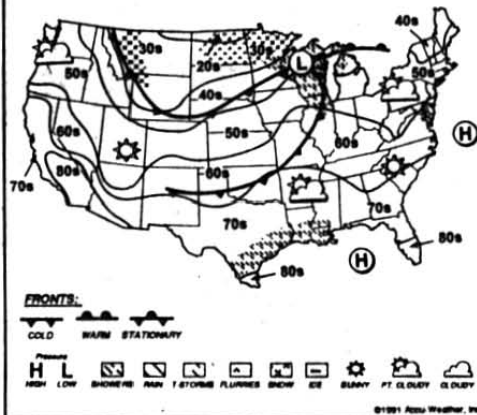

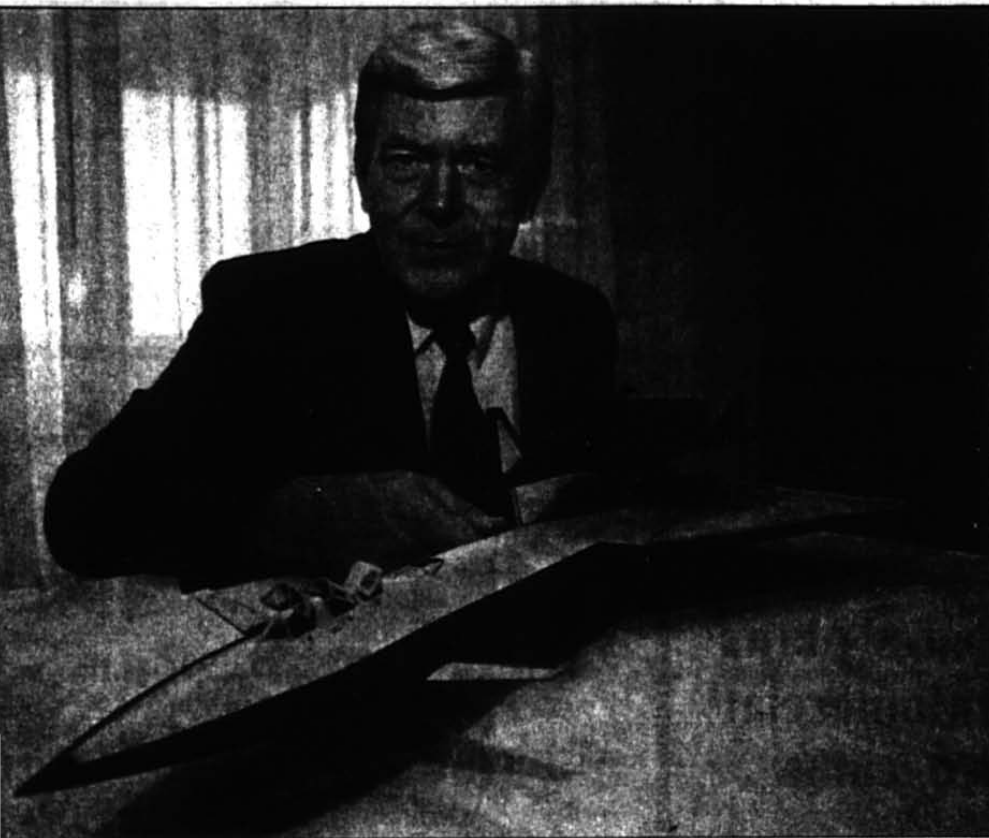

Model maker may have a secret

ROSEMONT — So the guy from the model airplane company calls and says he's got a model of a new spy plane that can do Mach 7. The Air Force denies the plane exists. The guy is nuts, right?

Maybe. Maybe not. The last time the company did this, their model was of the ten-secret Stealth fighter, and it was quite accurate.

"We think we're very, very close with the XR-7," said John Andrews, who designed the model for Testor Corp., based in

Model and Hobby Show running Thursday through Sunday.

The 1:72 scale model, 18 months in design, represents a 2-person, 80-foot plane with a 43-foot wingspan capable of traveling about 5,200 mph.

The current record-holder, the SR-71 Blackbird, can travel 2,193 mph.

Jane's Defence Weekly, a British military affairs journal, suggested the existence of the plane last December. It said Chris Gibson, a trained aircraft spotter, had seen the plane from a North Sea oil rig more than three years earlier.

"We're not doing anything at all with an XR-7 or anything like it," said Capt. Renee Strickland, spokeswoman for the NRO, which only admitted its own existence in September 1992.

The Air Force also denies the plane exists.

"There's no such plane and no such program. We have no aircraft that does Mach 7 or Mach 8, and we have no such aircraft in development," said Air Force spokeswoman Maj. Monica Aloisio.

Illinois' jobless rate falls

CHICAGO — Illinois' unemployment rate dropped to 7.8 percent in October, down 0.7 percentage points from a month earlier, the government said Friday.

The Illinois rate compares to a national unemployment rate of 6.8 percent in October, up from 6.7 percent in both September and August.

Illinois' rate of 7.8 percent was third highest among the nation's 11 major industrial states, following California, with 8.9 percent, and New York, with 7.9 percent, the government said.

Last month, Illinois unemployment officials questioned the 8.5 percent rate reported by the government for September, suggesting that the unemployment survey itself may need revamping.

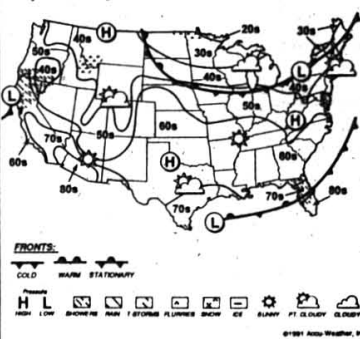

Board of Trade

CHICAGO (AP) — Grain and soybean futures prices were mostly higher in cautious early trading today on the Chicago Board of Trade ahead of a government crop report. Wheat futures led the early gains on signs of strengthening export demand. The Agriculture Department said it inspected 27.9 million bushels of wheat for export last week, which was more than traders expected. Corn and soybean futures were mixed to slightly higher in a weak recovery from Monday's losses. Analysts predicted little movement in those markets today ahead of a USDA crop report due out after the close that was to contain new estimates of this year's U.S. corn and soybean production.

Traders expected downward revisions in the USDA's October estimates of 6.96 billion bushels of corn and 1.89 billion bushels of soybeans.

In early trading, wheat for December delivery was 5 cents higher at \$3.38 a bushel; December corn was up 1 cent at \$2.81 1/4 a bushel; December oats were unchanged at \$1.34 1/4 a bushel; November soybeans were up 1 1/4 cents at \$6.32 1/2 a bushel. Cattle futures were mostly higher and pork futures were mixed in early trading on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. Cattle for December delivery were 20 cent higher at 73.32 cents a pound; November feeder cattle were unchanged at 84.95 cents a pound; December live hogs were 50 cent lower at 47.15 cents a pound; February frozen pork bellies were 50 cent higher at 55.95 cents a pound. Cattle futures ended mixed on Monday; pork futures rose.

Ex-Springfield priest faces sex abuse lawsuit

SPRINGFIELD — Five former students of St. Agnes School say in a Sangamon County lawsuit they were sexually abused by a parish priest in the late 1970s and early 1980s.

The suit, filed Monday, says the Rev. Joseph Havey instructed the five boys to beat him as part of a masochistic ritual.

Havey also allegedly showed the boys pornography and supplied them with cigarettes, alcoholic beverages and marijuana.

The plaintiffs are identified only by fictitious names: John and James Doe, John Smith, John Brown and John Jones.

Their attorney, Douglas Forsyth of Clayton, Mo., said the alleged incidents began in 1978, when the boys, all friends, were 11 and 12 years old, and continued through about 1981.

The young men, now 26 and 27, are Sangamon County residents, with the exception of the person identified as John Doe. The brother of James Doe, he lives in Texas, Forsyth said.

In addition to Havey, the suit names as defendants Bishop Daniel Ryan, on behalf of the Springfield Diocese, and the Rev. Patrick Wright, as pastor of St. Agnes.

"We can't comment on the specifics of pending litigation," said Kathie Sass, diocese spokeswoman.

"The diocese is very concerned about cases like this," Sass added. "We will do everything in our power to do everything healing and pastoral for those people and everyone involved."

Havey reportedly left the St. Agnes Parish in the early 1980s, Forsyth said.

"It is my understanding he is no longer functioning as a priest," Sass said.

Havey is said to live in St. Augustine, Fla., according to Forsyth. Directory assistance there had no listing for a Joseph Havey.

Wright is named in the suit because he allegedly knew or should have known about Havey's conduct and failed to

Their attorney said the alleged incidents began in 1978, when the boys, all friends, were 11 and 12 years old.

According to the suit, Havey, a priest in St. Agnes Parish, began counseling the Doe brothers about 1978. He almost daily visited their home, where he often celebrated Mass. Havey allegedly initiated vacations and out-of-town travel with some of the boys.

During his visits to the Doe home, Havey began supplying the brothers with hard-core pornography and then encouraged them to masturbate together, the suit says.

The sessions eventually took place in other locations and also involved the other boys, according to the complaint.

After supplying the boys with cigarettes, alcoholic beverages and marijuana, Havey allegedly "introduced masochistic ritual abuse."

According to the suit, the boys were compelled by Havey to bind him, suspend him from a tree while naked and beat him on the lower back, buttocks and thighs with sticks, baseball bats and paddles, all with protruding nails.

The force of the blows propelled Havey's body into other nails inserted in the tree, the suit says.

Havey allegedly also instructed the boys to throw "sharp-pointed gaming darts at his genitals."

The priest repeatedly told the boys the acts were to "cleanse me of my sins."

"Plaintiffs' perception of (Havey's) greater size, strength and power, both physically and spiritually, had the effect of intimidating (the boys) into absolute silence," the suit says.

The abuse ended, Forsyth said, after its level became "so insane so ferocious the boys

Board of Trade

CHICAGO (AP) — Corn and soybean futures prices soared their permitted daily limits in panicked early trading today on the Chicago Board of Trade after the government lowered its production estimates for those crops.
 Wheat and oat futures followed the corn and soybean markets higher.
 "I think the users of corn and beans have been awakened," said grain analyst Dan Cekander of Rodman & Renshaw Inc. in Chicago. "A lot of people who have not covered their needs now need to get something bought."
 The Agriculture Department said in a report after the close of trading Tuesday that farmers will harvest 6.5 billion bushels of corn this year, 31 percent less than a year ago and

the smallest crop since the 1988 drought.
 The USDA said soybean production will drop 16 percent to 1.83 billion bushels.
 In early trading, wheat for December delivery was 11 1/4 cents higher at \$3.47 1/2 a bushel. December corn was up 12 cents, the permitted daily limit, at \$2.73 1/2 a bushel. December oats were 7 1/2 cents higher at \$1.39 1/4 a bushel. November soybeans were up 41 cents at \$6.71 1/2 a bushel.
 The November soybean contract has no daily limit due to the nearness of its expiration. Most other soybean contracts were up the 30-cent limit.
 Cattle futures were mixed and pork futures were higher in early trading on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

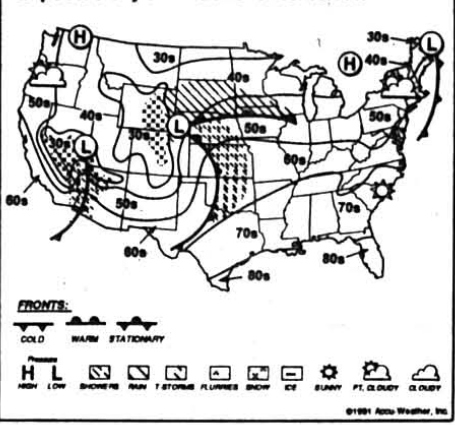

The Agriculture Department lowered its estimates for U.S. corn and soybean production in a report on Tuesday. The small crops are expected to result in the tightest supplies relative to demand since the mid-1970s for both crops.

Soybeans for November delivery fell moderately this morning after leaping by 48 1/2 cents a bushel Wednesday. The contracts for delivery in January and beyond continued to advance after soaring the permitted daily limit of 30 cents on Wednesday.

The limit on November soybeans has been lifted pending the contract's expiration next Thursday.

In early trading, wheat for December delivery were 3 cents lower at \$3.42 1/4 a bushel; December corn was up 6 cents at \$2.79 1/2 a bushel; December oats were 3 1/4 cents lower at \$1.36 1/2 a bushel; November soybeans were down 6 1/2 cents at \$6.72 1/2 a bushel; January soybeans were 11 cents higher at \$6.80 a bushel.

Livestock and meat futures were mostly higher in early trading on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

Live cattle for December delivery were .03 cent higher at 73.85 cents a pound; November feeder cattle were .33 cent higher at

84.25 cents a pound; December live hogs were .28 cent higher at 46.45 cents a pound; February frozen pork bellies were .48 cent higher at 55.60 cents a pound. Feeder cattle futures fell sharply on Wednesday; other livestock and meat futures advanced.

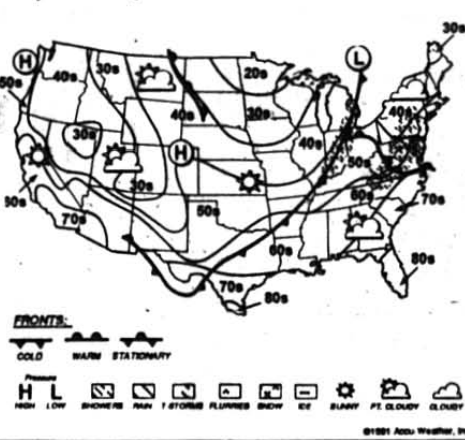

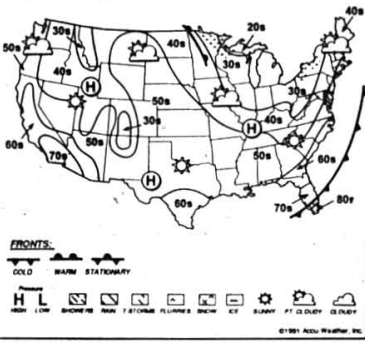

Cardinal returns to Chicago

Embattled Bernardin appreciative of supporters

CHICAGO — Roman Catholic Cardinal Joseph Bernardin says he is heartened by those who support him against sexual misconduct allegations.

"I had a wonderful expression of support from my fellow bishops," Bernardin said Thursday, returning from a conference of U.S. bishops in Washington, D.C.

Arriving at O'Hare International Airport, he told about 30 well-wishers, which include some priests, that he appreciated their backing.

All priests in the Chicago archdiocese have been invited to a special prayer service for Bernardin this afternoon at the main chapel of Niles College in suburban Niles.

Bernardin, looking tired but sounding upbeat, said he was still stunned by a lawsuit filed last week in Cincinnati, alleging he had sex with a teen-ager more than 15 years ago.

"But things are going quite well," he added.

"I just want to get on with the work of the archdiocese."

A Chicago television station reported Thursday night that Steven Cook, the man who claims he only recently recovered lost memories of sexual abuse by Cardinal Joseph Bernardin, indicated in a written report in 1985 that he had been abused by priests.

Cook, 34, of Philadelphia, filed a lawsuit last Friday claiming he had repressed memories of sexual abuse by Bernardin

and another priest that happened when he was in his mid-teens. But WLS-TV reported it obtained a mental health questionnaire Cook filled out in April 1985 in which he wrote of being abused by two unidentified priests while a teen-ager.

Cook only mentioned priests in the questionnaire and did not say anything about an archbishop, according to WLS. Bernardin was archbishop in Cincinnati in the 1970's, when Cook was a teen-ager and pre-seminary student.

Cook refused to comment to the station, which reported that Cook's lawyers were not aware of the mental health questionnaire.

Kevin Nealy, who lives with Cook, said this morning that Cook would not comment on the matter. He referred questions to Cook's lawyers, who did not immediately return messages.

Nealy said the questionnaire finance committee of the State Board of Education.

was not news to Cook, and that it did not necessarily represent a discrepancy in his account of remembering the alleged abuse. He said the news media were "taking a little piece of something" and distorting it.

Earlier Thursday at the airport, Bernardin commented on a Chicago Tribune report that he had been named in a series of lawsuits alleging that while he was head of the Cincinnati archdiocese, he allowed a priest accused of sexual misconduct to hold a series of posts that continued to bring him into contact with children.

"I do remember allegations against this priest, and they were dealt with in accordance with policies in place at the time," he told reporters.

The priest, the Rev. George Cooley, pleaded guilty in 1991 to abuse charges resulting from incidents with four boys in 1983 and 1984 in Cincinnati.

Bernardin said the archdiocese's sex abuse policies in Cincinnati at the time were not as strict as ones implemented by him in Chicago.

Some of the cardinal's backers Thursday carried signs reading, "We Support His Eminence."

"He has been vilely slandered," said Madeleine Ziener, a parishioner of Our Lady of Perpetual Help Church in suburban Glenview. "There is no defense when things are tried in the news. He has been a holy man for 48 years."

Board of Trade

CHICAGO (AP) — Grain and soybean futures prices were lower at the Chicago Board of Trade this morning, reflecting a deflationary tone to outside markets.

The biggest loser was wheat, which also was struggling with the report that the Agriculture Department has rejected bids for U.S. wheat from Egypt and the Philippines.

All the farm markets were undermined by plunging crude oil and precious metals prices. In early dealings, wheat for delivery in December was 4 cents lower at \$3.53 1/4 a bushel; December corn was 1/4 cent lower at \$2.82 a bushel; December oats were 1 cent lower at \$1.29 1/4 a bushel; and January soybeans were 3/4 cents lower at \$8.82 1/2 a bushel.

Livestock and meat futures were mostly lower at the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

Live cattle for delivery in December were .07 cent lower at 72.50 cents a pound; January feeder cattle were .05 cent lower at 82.20 cents a pound; December hogs were .15 cent lower at 45.52 cents a pound; and February pork bellies were the daily limit 2 cents lower at 52.10 cents a pound.

On Friday, livestock and meat futures were mostly lower.

Wall Street at noon

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market was higher at midday, buoyed by a strong bond market and tumbling oil prices.

At noon on Wall Street, the Dow Jones industrial average was up 10.62 points at 3,694.57.

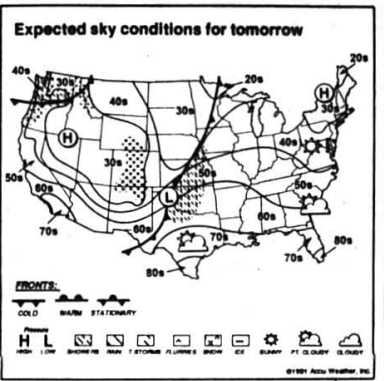

EIU professor denies charges he sexually harassed students

CHARLESTON — A professor accused of sexual harassment because he criticized Christianity and discussed phallic symbols and Freudian analyses during his music lectures says he's done nothing wrong.

"It's a matter of intellectual freedom," said Eastern Illinois University Professor Douglas DiBianco, 51.

"I don't think I'm doing one thing remotely related to sexual harassment," he added.

The complaints by four female students stem from a provision in the Illinois Human Rights Act. A section of the act dealing with higher education prohibits creating an "intimidating, hostile or offensive educational environment."

Kristin Adams, a 21-year-old student in DiBianco's non-Western music class last summer, was among those who complained to the university's Office of Affirmative Action. She said the complaints concern DiBianco's teaching, not his be-

lieve there and tell him I'm Catholic; it's none of his business."

Kent Sezer, general counsel for the Illinois Human Rights Commission, noted someone can be accused of sexual harassment in the workplace for using sexually charged words against someone in an argument or having pinups and "girly pictures" posted.

"But the commission has handled no cases concerning course content in higher education, Sezer said.

Adams also criticized DiBianco's references to phallic symbols in art and his examples of art by iconoclastic artists, such as photographer Robert Mapplethorpe.

"We're paying \$200 to listen to his propaganda," Adams said, adding the class catalog did not indicate the course would include such items.

Adams, a family services major, said DiBianco referred to Pinocchio's nose as a phallic
