Huff & Puff program registration under way

Father, son accountants sent to prison

SPRINGFIELD — Father and son accountants who allegedly cheated clients out of \$1.5 million were sentenced Monday in Springfield's federal court to 18 months imprisonment.

Howard E. Bozovich, 63, of Ewing, and John H. Bozovich, 44, formerly of Alton, will serve their federal sentences at the same time they serve prison terms imposed earlier in state court.

John Bozovich also was ordered by U.S. District Judge Richard Mills to pay restitution of \$25,000 — a figure authorities believe he realistically could repay after his release from prison.

Because of his greater age, Howard Bozovich was ordered to repay a smaller amount: \$15,000.

Although the Bozovichs purportedly cheated clients out of more than \$1 million, they now say they have no assets. Both were represented by court-appointed lawyers.

Assistant U.S. attorney Patrick Chesley said the Bozovichs knew, because of their accounting and investment business, that clients Roy Danny Sidener and Garnetta Sidener of Alton owned annuities with Franklin Life Insurance Co.

After the Sideners declined to invest with the Bozovichs, the Bozovichs forged the Sideners' signatures on withdrawal papers and obtained more than \$120,000, Chesley said.

They pleaded guilty to one

count of mail fraud in connection with that case.

Chesley said the Bozovichs were convicted in circuit court in Madison County of other similar crimes against clients. Among the victims were an 86-year-old Grafton widow, her niece and the niece's husband.

Howard Bozovich is serving a 12-year prison sentence for the state court convictions. John Bozovich is serving an eight-year term.

Both men apologized in court Monday for their actions.

Howard Bozovich was represented in federal court by attorneys Bruce Locher and Michael Ochoa. Jon Gray Noll represented John Bozovich.

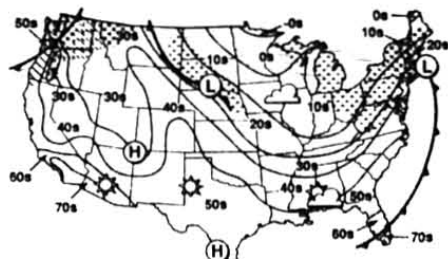

Board of Trade

CHICAGO (AP) — Corn futures prices slipped from 5 1/2-year highs in early trading today on the Chicago Board of Trade as signs of slowing corn exports prompted traders to take profits.

Wheat and soybean futures also fell, oat futures were narrowly mixed.

A weekly Agriculture Department report late Thursday showed lower export sales of corn last week than traders expected. Selling in response to the report was limited by expectations the USDA will lower its corn and soybean crop estimates in a report next Wednesday, said analyst Steve Freed of ADM Investor Services Inc. in Chicago.

The futures markets also were pressured by forecasts for beneficial rain this weekend in South American soybean areas, and by the USDA's rejection of a Chinese bid for 285,000 metric tons of U.S. wheat at subsidized prices.

In early trading, wheat for March delivery was down 2 cents at \$3.88 1/4 a bushel; March

corn was 1 1/4 cents lower at \$3.07 1/4 a bushel; March oats were unchanged at \$1.34 1/4 a bushel; January soybeans were 2 1/4 cents lower at \$6.94 1/4 a bushel. Cattle futures were mostly higher and pork futures were lower in early trading on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

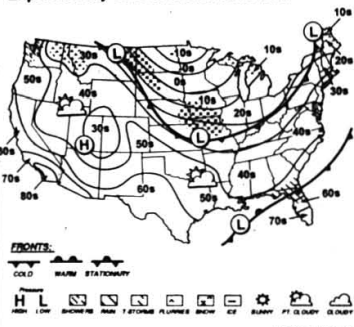

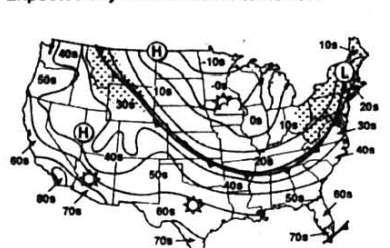

Civil rights rally to counter KKK

SPRINGFIELD — Local civil rights and labor leaders are drawing a careful line between themselves and radical activists who plan to confront the Ku Klux Klan Sunday.

One of those Chicago-based organizations Friday lost a legal battle over conditions the state is imposing on its anti-Klan counter-rally.

The Partisan Defense Committee and one other anti-Klan group have permits for counter-rallies to be held at the same time as a Klan demonstration scheduled Sunday, the day after Dr. Martin Luther King's birthday. Those and other groups coming to Springfield have hinted at the possibility of violence, something local leaders say will only help the KKK win more publicity.

A group of local labor representatives and others Friday conducted a joint press conference to repudiate both the Klan and the PDC and other groups that, they said, have been falsely claiming to have their support.

"We in the labor community are greatly distressed by groups falsely purporting to represent the views of organized labor," said Mike Hade, president of the Springfield & Central Illinois

Trades and Labor Council.

The PDC "is an organization whose motives are questionable and self-serving," said Larry Golden of the Coalition to Promote Human Dignity and Diversity. "These groups are coming into Springfield to vent their own frustration and their own anger."

"We're asking people not even to come out to the (rallies)," said the Rev. Richard Maye of the Ministerial Alliance of Springfield. "We're asking the media not to give them any more attention than necessary."

A PDC spokeswoman Friday maintained that all support the group has claimed is "fully documented."

Hade and others who spoke Friday said some of the PDC's political beliefs may hurt the reputation of all anti-Klan organizations.

Part of the confusion, Hade said, stemmed from "red-baiting" on a radio talk show Thursday, during which the host and callers made an issue of the communist beliefs of some anti-Klan groups.

The radio show, on WMAY-AM, is conducted by Jackson, who calls himself "One Eyed Jack" on the air.

Jackson responded Friday that he wasn't denigrating all anti-

Klan activists, only those who are "socialist or communist" in their politics, as some members of the Chicago groups say they are.

"The KKK is despicable. I find it embarrassing in this day and age that we still have groups like that in this country," Jackson said in a telephone interview. He maintained, however, that the question of communist ideology on the part of some anti-Klan groups is a legitimate part of the debate.

"If I had to pick from the two (Klansmen and Communists), I'd stand shoulder-to-shoulder with the Ku Klux Klan," Jackson said.

Meanwhile Friday, a federal judge in Springfield ruled that the PDC's rights won't be violated by restrictions on where it can place a speakers' platform.

The Illinois secretary of state's office, which oversees the Capitol, told the group it can't erect a 6-by-6-foot platform in a parking lot near the east side of the Statehouse, where the Klan rally will be held. The PDC's permit is for the north side of the Capitol, and the state has said any speakers' platform must stay on the north steps.

Gun rights advocates slam Edgar's assault weapon ban

SPRINGFIELD — Opponents of Gov. Jim Edgar's proposed assault weapon ban said Friday that the administration is a victim of anti-gun hype.

"Illinois politicians are acting out of a nationwide hysteria," said Gary Larson, spokesman for the Second Amendment Defense League, a Decatur-based gun rights organization.

During his Jan. 12 State of the State address, Edgar joined other politicians who have recently

ally prohibiting the sale of all firearms.

"Statements that the bans will not affect hunting arms are also false," said Larson.

Edgar has repeatedly said he will not take away the rights of hunters and sportsmen to own guns.

Edgar spokesman Mike Lawrence slammed the criticism.

"The bottom line is there is no good reason to allow assault weapons because they are used by criminals to kill people," he said. "That is the only use for

Flooding washes away rendezvous

Annual Fort Chartres celebration will be skipped

PRAIRIE DU ROCHER — Last summer's floods have washed away another tradition: the annual Rendezvous at Fort Chartres, a re-enactment of the settlement of the Illinois territory in the mid-1700s.

Although the fort's historic stone structures withstood the 1993 flood, modern conveniences such as toilets floated away. A cleanup has been completed, but the Illinois Historic Preservation Agency will not begin repairs until levees protecting the site are repaired.

"If the holes in the levee aren't fixed, then when the spring floods come, we'll be having the same problems all over again," said Bob Coomer, the agency's superintendent of historic sites.

The 25th anniversary of the event has been rescheduled for June 3 and 4, 1995.

During the two-day event, the settlement of the Illinois territory in the mid-1700s is re-

enacted by participants from 24 states acting as soldiers, trappers, traders and Native Americans.

"It's 38,000 people in two days," said Jan Kennedy, owner of La Maison du Rocher, a country inn and restaurant. "You're talking 1,900 participants on the fort grounds. This is the best there is in the entire Midwest. That's why we get such a tremendous draw."

Business owners who rely on tourism lost profits last summer to the flood and stand to lose again.

Kennedy said many were buoyed by business from truck drivers, workers and contractors repairing flood damage. But that business is drying up.

"The Rendezvous and the activities of the fort are a major event," she said. "The fort is the major draw of the entire area."

Some events, such as Children's Weekend on the first weekend in May, still are

planned. "It's devastating for us over here, but we're not going to give up," Kennedy said. "If we can have the Children's Weekend and some other things, we can survive."

While most of Prairie du Rocher was spared, damage to Fort de Chartres was excessive. An access road northwest of the fort was obliterated by waters that cut a swath 65 feet wide and 20 feet deep through the site.

Flood waters carried away smaller wooden structures, such as a maintenance building, picnic shelter, six toilets, bridges, steps and a handicapped ramp.

"I think both the community and participants are disappointed about the cancellation," Coomer said. "But I think for the most part they're understanding of the conditions and that we're going to do everything we can to make the event bigger and better next year."

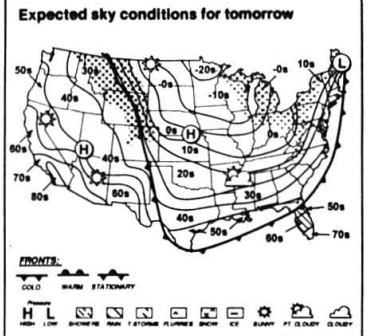

Recycling of chemical cans to be extended

CHAMPAIGN — Recycling is slowly becoming a trend in Illinois agriculture as farmers and chemical dealers discover traditional methods of disposing plastic containers will not work much longer.

State officials report 21 tons of plastic were collected and shredded last year at 44 sites across Illinois.

There are plans to expand the effort to 75 locations in 1994. The ultimate goal is at least six permanent recycling stations, Warren Goetsch of the Illinois Agriculture Department said.

"Most people today are either taking them to a landfill or they're being burned," Goetsch said of the containers.

But Illinois dealers will be barred from burning them at their business, beginning in 1995, and landfill operators are concerned about chemical residue in the container, he said.

Anticipating a wave of new regulations, the farm-chemical industry two years ago set up the Agricultural Container Research Council, which supports state collections and explores new uses for recycled plastic.

So far, the plastic has been turned into new pesticide jugs and used to fuel cement kilns.

"The plastic almost has as much heat value as natural gas," said Bill Wehrle, president of the research council and packaging manager at BASF Corp. in Research Triangle Park, N.C. "Other things that we are researching are fence posts, plastic pallets and drain pipes," he said.

Indeed, a pipe made from recycled plastic was installed at a Cass County farm last month. Goetsch plans to monitor the water and soil for any trace of pesticide residue.

The Illinois collections occurred in June, July and August, weeks after farm chemicals are usually applied. A site in Effingham County produced 3,300 pounds of plastic, best in the state.

Despite the large haul statewide, Goetsch noted that less than 300 people, mostly chemical dealers, participated last year. He wants farmers to shed their reluctance.

"Like any recycling activity, you have to make it easy and convenient," Goetsch said. "That's why we're expanding the sites this year to 75."

Chicago Teachers Union chief Vaughn loses cancer battle

CHICAGO — Chicago Teachers Union President Jacqueline Vaughn, who struggled secretly against cancer while fighting the public battle over the Chicago Public School crisis, is dead at the age of 58.

Vaughn died Saturday at Michael Reese Hospital, only two days after she relinquished her duties as union president after nearly 10 years in the post.

"My health has not prevented me from carrying out my duties, and I'm not interested in discussing it," she told a magazine interviewer last fall at the height of the battle over funding for the schools.

That fight involved not just the 31,000-member union and the school board, but also Mayor Richard M. Daley, Gov. Jim Edgar and the Illinois General Assembly.

Union negotiators were caught between teacher demands for better pay and working conditions, and dwindling state support for education and the school board's insistence that a balanced budget required contract concessions.

After months of resistance, Vaughn finally gave in on key issues.

"She always made us understand that teachers are to be

cherished by a society that must value the education of its young," Daley said after he was informed of Vaughn's death.

"She was a dynamite lady," said union spokeswoman Jackie Gallagher, who had worked with Vaughn for three years. "She was one of those people who really can't be replaced."

Vaughn was personally chosen for the union's top job in 1984 by her predecessor, Robert Healy, when he resigned to become president of the Chicago Federation of Labor. She was the first woman and the first African-American to hold the post.

D. Sharon Grant, president of the Board of Education, said she was a friend of Vaughn's as well as her adversary at contract time.

"One of the reasons I'm in public education is because of women like Jackie," Grant said. "Jackie was a role model, but more than that, she was a real person."

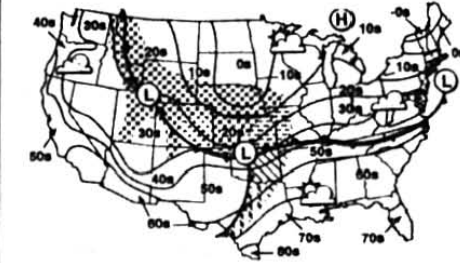



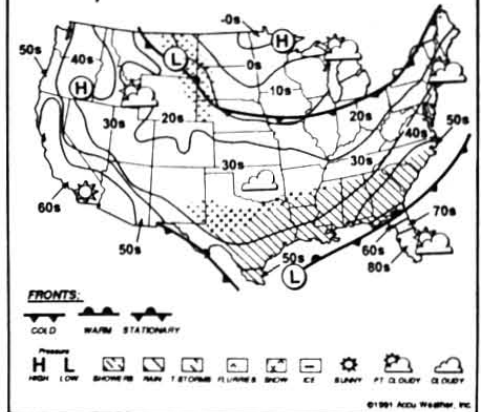
