Illinois crime victims given state aid

SPRINGFIELD — More than 1,200 crime victims received \$5.6 million to help pay for medical bills, counseling, lost wages and funeral expenses, the Illinois attorney general says.

Roland Burris issued a report Monday to the General Assembly on the services and programs Illinois offered victims of crimes in 1993.

Illinois has two major programs for violent crime victims.

The Crime Victims Compensation Act provides direct financial help to victims for expenses attributable to the crime. The money comes from fines assessed against a criminal.

The Violent Crime Victims Assistance Act offers grants to local organizations to help provide better services to victims in their area. In 1993, the state provided \$4.3 million to 219 service organizations for counseling, shelter and other support services.

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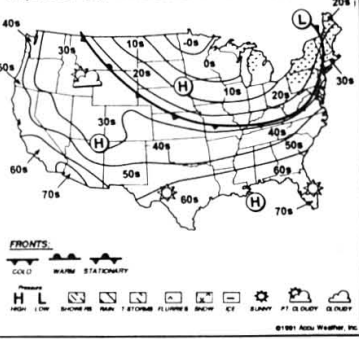



 Cat futures edged lower.
 In a report released after the close of trading Thursday, the USDA reduced its projected Aug 31 U.S. corn stockpile to 777 million bushels from 802 million. The revision, which surprised most analysts, was due to an increase of 25 million bushels in anticipated consumption of corn for food, industrial and seed uses.
 The agency lowered its May 31 wheat

stocks estimate to 588 million bushels from 598 million.
 The USDA raised its Aug 31 soybean stocks estimate slightly, to 155 million bushels from 150 million.
 In early trading, wheat for March delivery was 1 1/4 cents higher at \$3.74 1/4 a bushel; March corn was up 1 cent at \$2.96 a bushel; March oats were 1/2 cent lower at \$1.30 1/4 a bushel. March soybeans were 1/4 cent higher at \$6.79 1/4 a bushel.
 Livestock and meat futures were mostly lower in early trading on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.
 Live cattle were unchanged at 0.12 cents a pound. March feeder cattle were 0.27 cent lower at \$0.65 cents a pound. February live hogs were down 0.25 cent at 48.67 cents a pound. February frozen pork bellies were 0.47 cent lower at 55.30 cents a pound.
 Cattle futures ended mixed on Thursday. Most pork futures fell.

The two board members who heard the plea repeatedly stressed the horror of the crime.

"There is no use kidding yourself," one board member said. "What happened was terrible."

A year ago, at Gambrell's latest unsuccessful parole attempt, the board said his release would "deprecate the serious nature of the offense and would, indeed, promote disrespect for the law."

It was 30 years ago that Everett Gambrell, his wife Mary Eilene, and their daughter Anna Belle, 12, were killed.

knocking on Ford's door and almost immediately heard a gunshot inside the room.

"Obviously, he knew the police were after him," said Cimarossa.

The officers got a key to the room from motel management, but they were unable to get inside immediately because Ford had bolted the door. Eventually, the door was knocked in, and police found Ford's body.

Ford was wanted on three warrants from two states: Texas for felony theft and running a confidence game; and West Virginia for fraud, Cimarossa said.

"Based on what evidence was in the room and the history of warrants, I'm assuming he was attempting to set up shop here. There were some items (in the room) that raised a few eyebrows," said Cimarossa.

He would not identify what those items were.

(she felt) government will do a better job of spending that money for people than the private sector," Hastert said.

Durbin said he'd heard enough horror stories of medical bills driving people into bankruptcy to convince him there is a crisis.

"How many of us can say that will never happen to me?" Durbin asked.

Congress will start debate on the health plans soon, and the goal is to pass a reform package this year, he said. The final plan will undoubtedly be a compromise, Durbin added.

"When all is said and done, some of the most conservative and most liberal members are

not going to be satisfied," he said, "It really depends on those of us toward the middle of the spectrum — moderates in both wings of the parties — to work out a solution."

Health-care reform is one of the top six priority issues of the American Farm Bureau this year, said AFBF deputy chief economist Ross Korves.

"Our people in Washington say there's a high probability some kind of health reform will be passed," this year, Korves said, but only a 50 percent chance it will be the Clinton proposal.

"It's very much open season yet," to help shape the plan, Korves told farmers at the conference.

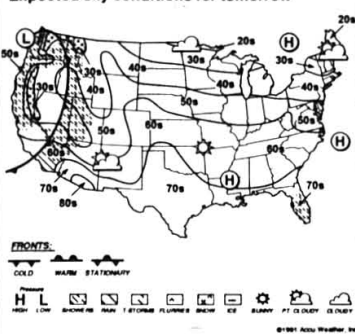

Vietnamese-Americans offer mixed reaction to lifting of trade embargo

CHICAGO — Diem Do left Vietnam in 1975 as a 12-year-old refugee, his mind seared with the fresh memory of a buddy who died at the hands of the Communists.

Now a financial analyst in Southern California, Do says lifting the U.S. trade embargo against Vietnam will benefit most of the government that tore his young life apart.

"How can you forget when one of your closet friends got killed by Communist mortar? How can you forget that?" Do said. "Lifting the trade embargo is a setback."

That's the view many Vietnamese-Americans share — at least publicly. Those who support lifting the ban are more cautious, fearing the wrath of fellow refugees who think any contact with Vietnam is an act of betrayal.

President Clinton's removal of the trade embargo earlier this month has stirred a debate among the nation's estimated 850,000 Vietnamese-Americans — a debate that has festered since the Communists' victory nearly 20 years ago.

"People who officially say out loud that they're in favor of lifting the embargo get a huge attack from most of the Vietnamese newspapers," said a Washington, D.C.-area attorney who asked that his name not be used.

"You get called a Communist sympathizer," and some people have received harassing phone calls and threats of violence, he said.

In many cases the debate is along generational lines, with younger refugees supporting

Clinton's actions and older Vietnamese-Americans opposed, said Nguyen Ngoc Bich, executive director of the National Congress of Vietnamese in America, an umbrella group for Vietnamese associations around the United States.

"The younger generation tends to think of themselves as being Americans first," Bich said. "Older ones tend to say that the younger ones do not have enough experience with the Communist regime."

Long before the embargo was lifted, "Any contact with Vietnam, any revisiting of Vietnam was being protested" by many refugees, said Janie Dam Nguyen, a Chicago attorney who supports Clinton's actions.

"These people still have really emotional memories of what Vietnam was like back in 1975," she said. "They feel very frustrated, and when they heard the United States was on the way to lifting the embargo, they lashed out at people like myself who have gone back to Vietnam."

Dam Nguyen, 28, was criticized for traveling to Vietnam last summer to seek business contacts.

"People were making indirect threats to me, that I should remember what happened to Lang Tom," a Chicagoan whose home was firebombed five years ago when he made a documentary film in Vietnam, Dam Nguyen said in an interview Wednesday.

Fear of retribution led Dam Nguyen to resign as president of the local Vietnamese Chamber of Commerce and as a director of the Vietnamese Association of Illinois, a non-political group that aids refugees.

Dam Nguyen says lifting the embargo will help residents of her homeland gain reforms that would not otherwise have been possible.

Opponents "have a very antiquated image" of life in Vietnam, Dam Nguyen argued. While human rights violations still exist, conditions have improved since 1975, she said.

Do, the financial analyst, countered that removing the embargo has eliminated pressure against the Communists to change.

"With the infusions of cash flow and foreign investment they can get resources to maintain their government. Without those resources the current government is teetering on the brink of collapse," Do said.

Houston businessman Kien Pham, 36, says he supports lifting the embargo "because that's what the Vietnamese people inside Vietnam wanted."

But Pham, head of the Vietnam Forum Foundation, a non-profit educational group, said his liberal views have gotten him into trouble.

Last year he tried to organize a conference on the reconstruction of Vietnam, but when word got out that he planned to invite a Communist government representative, "the editors of the Vietnamese newspapers around the country went ballistic," he said.

"They immediately assumed that I was a tool of Hanoi," he said.

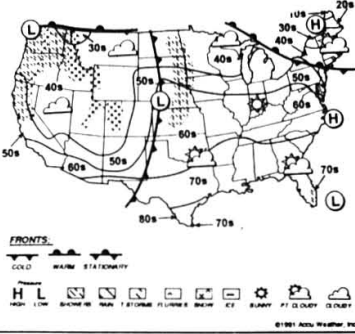

Livestock and meat futures were mixed in early trading on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange ahead of a monthly Agriculture Department cattle-on-feed report scheduled for release after the close. The report was expected to show a slight increase in the number of animals on feed lots.

The contracts for February delivery of live cattle, live hogs and pork bellies were due to expire at noon Central time. All agricultural futures at the Merc were scheduled to close at noon as a prelude to the three-day Presidents' Day holiday weekend. All U.S. commodity markets will be closed Monday.

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Computer will link up Illinois school districts

URBANA — Springfield school Superintendent Bob Hill likes to talk to colleagues in other districts. What he dislikes is the wait.

"We fax something around the state and it usually takes a couple weeks to get the information," he said. "In fact, there's a man here I've been trying to reach for three days."

The frustration could end soon.

Forty-nine school districts that serve nearly half of all Illinois students will be connected by computer, allowing superintendents to exchange information on a range of issues.

the university's College of Education got the project off the ground. James Ward said the school districts will communicate with each other and campus professors.

The university wants access to schools so professors can conduct research and spot trends in education, he said.

Membership on the network should cost the districts about \$200 each, Ward said.

Champaign Superintendent Timothy Hyland said the districts, which hold approximately 860,000 students, "have some of the most talented people in the state."

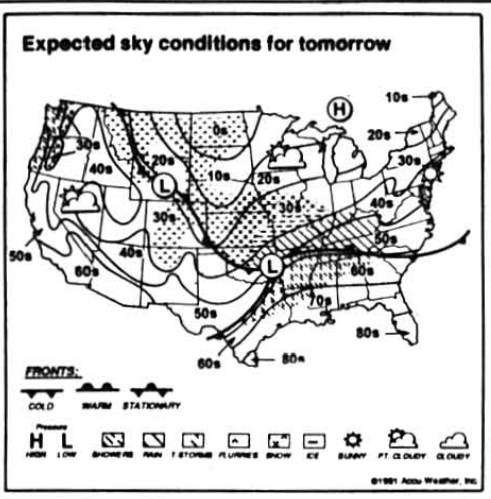

USDA tallies up flood relief funds

WASHINGTON — The Agriculture Department says it has provided \$2.109 billion in direct disaster aid to the nine Midwest states affected by rain and floods from last April through September.

The aid includes crop disaster payments, crop insurance indemnity payments, emergency food stamps and commodities for group feeding, loans and Emergency Watershed Protection projects, said Agriculture Secretary Mike Espy.

"These payments from

USDA, along with other federal and state assistance, will continue to help producers in many areas of the Midwest recover from the effects of one of the worst weather disasters this nation has ever seen," Espy said.

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
