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AIDS becomes No. 1 killer in state prisons

SPRINGFIELD — AIDS was the No. 1 cause of death among prison inmates in 1993, killing nearly one-fourth of those who died while incarcerated, according to the Illinois Department of Corrections.

The number of prisoners diagnosed with the disease also soared during the last decade from one case in 1984 to 177 by the end of 1993, corrections spokesman Nic Howell said.

AIDS caused the deaths of 23 of the 96 people who died in state prisons last year, compared to 14 prisoners who died from cancer, 11 from heart attacks, and four from suicide. Eleven inmates died from AIDS in 1991.

The department is not required to test all inmates for AIDS so officials cannot determine exactly how many of the 35,000 Illinois prisoners have the disease, Howell said. Prison workers usually do not become aware an inmate has human immunodeficiency virus (HIV), which causes AIDS, until he or she shows visible symp-

toms.

But despite one lawmaker's belief that inmates contract the disease while in prison, Howell said he believes most inmates carry the HIV virus before they are incarcerated.

Rep. Cal Skinner, R-Crystal Lake, has introduced legislation that would force the department to test all prisoners for HIV and then to house those who are infected separately from other inmates.

Skinner based the idea for his legislation on a 1988 study by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention in which prison inmates were tested for AIDS when they arrived in prison and again a year later.

About 4 percent of the nearly 2,400 inmates tested were HIV-positive in the first year. In the second year, seven of the prisoners who initially were HIV-negative were found to have the virus.

Prisoners do not deserve a "death sentence" once they get to prison where intravenous drug use and sex is common among inmates, Skinner said.

But the Department of Corrections opposes the legislation — which was over-

whelmingly rejected in the Illinois House — because it would be too costly to implement and it is unconstitutional to segregate prisoners with AIDS, Howell said.

"The overriding factor is, it's just not how we treat people in the general society with AIDS," he said. "It's ludicrous to suggest we should treat people who are in prison differently."

The department already spends about \$500,000 a year on medication for prisoners who are HIV infected or have AIDS. To test inmates for AIDS could cost as much as \$63 per prisoner.

Corrections officials are not "naive enough" to believe prison inmates are not having sex, Howell said, but he disagrees with Skinner's assertion that AIDS is forced upon them.

"We suggest that they know what they are doing," Howell said. "People don't get raped in prison."

Suspected serial killer will face five trials in kids' murders

BELLEVILLE — A man accused in the serial killings of five children will have a separate trial in each death.

St. Clair Circuit Judge James K. Donovan on Monday denied

a request by defendant Lorenzo Fayne's attorney, Assistant Public Defender John O'Gara, to combine the five cases into one trial.

O'Gara argued it would protect the rights of the families of

the children Fayne is charged with killing.

"Who knows how long five trials could take?" O'Gara said. "This could needlessly go on for years."

St. Clair County State's At-

torney Robert Haida contended that trying the cases separately would not violate the rights of Fayne or the victims' families.

"I have the best interests of the victims in my mind," Haida said.

Rockford rejects assault weapons ban inside city



Residents of flooded town begin returning

MEYER — Residents are trickling back to this flood-stricken village almost a year after the Mississippi River nearly wiped it off the map.

Among the first to move back was 69-year-old Bessie Lovell, who returned late last month.

"It felt like home," she said. "Instead of automobiles, you hear the doves and the birds and enjoy the peace and quiet."

Mrs. Lovell had been living in a mobile home in the Ursa area since the flood swept through her three-bedroom house.

Although water rose to four feet within her walls, her home withstood the flood better than most. Government officials estimated damages at 27 percent.

"It kind of sits up higher," she said. "It didn't receive near the damage as the others did."

The sturdy house was Mrs. Lovell's retirement home. She moved there in April 1993 — just three months before the Lima Lake Drainage District levee gave way, sending a torrent of floodwater into the historic fishing village of about 50 homes.

The flood ripped apart houses, knocked down trees, killed plants and flowers and left behind piles of mud and sand.

It also infused a rebuilding spirit in the town's residents, many of whom started renovating as soon as the water receded.

Jean Reiter and her husband, Bill, moved in last week.

"It's home. It's quiet. It's cheap living," Jean Reiter said. "There's nothing like it."

After the levee broke, neighbors talked among themselves to see who would stay and who would go.

"I said, 'I'm going back,'" Mrs. Reiter, a 45-year resident of the town, said. "That was the next day."

She, her husband and their two grown sons poured all their spare time into getting the house back in order. Little more than a



In a report this morning, the USDA predicted U.S. farmers will harvest 1.66 billion bushels of winter wheat this year, about 6 percent less than in 1993. The number was near trade expectations.

The USDA also predicted a 3.8 billion rise in U.S. corn production to 87 billion bushels, and a 16 percent rise in U.S. soybean production to 2.1 billion bushels.
 In early trading, wheat for May delivery was 1/4 cent higher at \$3.20 a bushel. May corn was 1/4 cents higher at \$2.58 a bushel; May oats were 1/4 cents higher at \$1.09 1/4 a bushel; May soybeans were up 2 cents at \$6.65 1/4 a bushel.

Lear said the working group's recommendations will include eliminating some indicators, compressing others and including more recognition value "for doing some good things" not presently credited in the program.

Lear said the group's recommendations will go to the Office of Federal Management and Budget and then published in the Federal Register for public comment.

"I felt very honored to be asked" to be part of the working group, Lear said. "It's been a most interesting and rewarding time. It's very exciting to know they're listening to us, willing to let us use our experience."

boat gambling to its international racecourse, did not show for the hearing.

Rep. Louis Lang, D-Skokie, the sponsor of riverboat legislation in the House, has scheduled hearings for the next three weeks, but, so far, his bill appears to be caught in a partisan gridlock.

GOP leaders in the Republican-controlled Senate have said any riverboat proposal must include their pro-business reforms. Democrats, on the other hand, say they will support riverboats in Chicago and anywhere else in the state, but want no part of the business legislation.

If lawmakers do approve ad-

ditional riverboat gambling licenses this legislative session, Rosemont, along with Waukegan, North Chicago, the Fox Lake area, Springfield, Danville and Rockford are among the cities that may want to be included in the deal.

Rosemont already has a thriving economy in the 4,000 population city where the main source of revenue is from hosting conventions, said Joe Mudd, a lobbyist for the city.

"We already have a lot of amenities," Mudd said. "What we need is the enhancement of gaming to give these convention people something to do when they're visiting our city."

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



Island near Starved Rock for sale

UTICA — A historic island in the shadow of scenic Starved Rock could be yours.

It's up for sale after a businessman gave up on plans to open a restaurant and bar there.

Plum Island is located in the middle of the Illinois River, in the historic area where famous French explorers such as Jacques Marquette, Louis Joliet and Robert Cavalier Sieur de La Salle met Indians in the late 1600s.

Years later, archaeologists found Indian burial sites on the 50-acre island, and sightseers rode cable cars or boats there to dance, picnic or just look at the spectacular sandstone cliffs across the river.

Small airplanes took off and landed many times a day from a grass-covered island strip to give customers an aerial view of Starved Rock State Park.

Bill Vajdik, owner of American Waste Inc. in Maywood and a self-described speculator, bought the island in 1988.

He tried to start a small restaurant and bar there, where boat traffic is heavy and the Starved Rock Lodge had just expanded. The park has more than 1.6 mil-

lion visitors annually.

But the venture fell victim to government restrictions, such as a requirement to hire a Coast Guard-licensed captain to ferry people across the river from the Starved Rock landing.

"It was fun for the years we owned it," Vajdik said. "But the financial remuneration didn't justify the expense."

Vajdik remodeled two small cabins on the island, converted the abandoned cable car into an observation deck and installed a temporary dock.

"It was a labor of love," said Vajdik, 50. "We had a lot of fun doing it."

But life on Plum Island isn't always a bowl of cherries.

"It's a nightmare to get stuff out there."

Food must be taken and garbage brought back. Flooding can be a problem.

The temporary dock washed away, but Vajdik thinks permanent docks could be designed to rise and fall with the water, and he thinks Chicago's efforts to control water runoff, including retention ponds and the Deep Tunnel Project, eventually will alleviate potential flooding.

The hardships were balanced, he said, by awakening to hear the river and see Starved Rock out his bedroom window.

"The view was perfect. We spent lots of nice summers there."



Jury clears teenager of father's murder, convicts him for concealing his death



PEORIA — Shane Hillard says he will not return to Alexis after serving his sentence for concealing his father's killing. "I don't think they'd let me go back home," the teen-ager said Thursday after being found innocent of his father's murder but guilty of hiding the death. Several residents testified against Hillard during his trial. Hillard, 17, argued that he killed his father, Charles "Lonnie" Hillard, in self-defense after his father struck him in the head with a crowbar and chased him with a pitchfork the night of the killing. He also said his father had

physically and sexually abused him for years. In closing arguments Wednesday, defense attorney Walter Braud said: "Sixteen years of abuse is enough — he was crying out year after year in his own weak way, 'Get me away from Dad.' Enough is enough." Prosecutors argued that Hillard ambushed his father last July and fabricated his story of abuse to win jurors' sympathy. "Shane Hillard was a 16-year-old with an attitude who didn't like being told what to do," prosecutor Michael Herr said in closing arguments. "He is lying, trying to escape the consequences for shooting and killing

his father in cold blood." Hillard bit his lip and smiled tightly as the verdict was read. In tears, he hugged his attorney. His mother and relatives of his father also wept. "I'm just very happy that they've seen what's happened to me over my life," Hillard said. He could be sent to a juvenile detention center until his 19th birthday. Had he been convicted of murder, he could have received 20 to 60 years in prison.

The trial was moved to Peoria County because of pretrial publicity in Mercer County.

Mother accused of killing baby

IRVINE, Calif. — A 44-year-old woman has been arrested at the request of Illinois authorities who reopened an investigation into the murder of her baby 18 years ago, police said Friday.

Victoria L. Neal of being held on \$100,000 bond pending extradition to Tazewell County in Illinois, the police department said in a statement. She was arrested Thursday after a Tazewell County grand jury issued an indictment and arrest warrant, the release said.

Coroner's authorities originally believed her 1-year-old adopted daughter, Danielle, died accidentally in a fall in Morton, Ill., on or about Aug. 30, 1976, said Lt. Sam Allevato. But Neal apparently told a social worker in October she had killed the child, said Kirk Schoenbein, assistant state's attorney in Tazewell County.

A review of the child's autopsy showed death likely was caused by violent shaking.

"There was no inquest. (The investigation) just laid dormant all these years," Schoenbein said.

Authorities also are investigating circumstances that led to Neal's second adopted daughter suffering brain damage in 1979, Schoenbein said. The girl was taken from Neal after the incident, he said.



Study: Chicago's poor becoming isolated

CHICAGO — A new study has found that poor people are becoming increasingly isolated from prosperous people in Chicago and its suburbs, mirroring a worrisome a national trend.

From 1970 to 1990, the segregation of poor in the area increased 20 percent, according to the study, by Alan J. Abramson and Mitchell S. Tobin of the Washington-based Urban Institute.

Nationally, a rise of 13 percent was recorded.

One contributor to the problem has been the movement of middle-class and affluent people from central cities to sprawling suburbs.

"The flight of manufacturing to the suburbs or its disappearance

altogether has left behind a set of people who previously worked in the factories. They're trapped in these neighborhoods," Abramson said in an interview published Sunday in the Chicago Tribune.

Other experts said the study's findings are a worrisome indication of a growing chasm between the needy and the well-to-do in the United States.

"We seem to be becoming a really stratified society. It's an ominous trend," said Douglas S. Massey, a University of Chicago sociologist.

Separation of the poor and the prosperous makes it harder for the poor to rise economically. It also has an effect on local economies, where concentrated poverty tends to be accompanied by

lack of political clout, substandard schools and minimal city services.

In such areas, social problems such as crime, drugs and welfare dependency reinforce each other. And the costs spread to the rest of society in the form of an unproductive labor force, crime that spills outside ghettos and taxes for public aid, police and prisons.

The Abramson-Tobin study was commissioned by the Federal National Mortgage Association.

Board of Trade

CHICAGO (AP) — Soybean futures prices rocketed to a 10-month high in early trading today on the Chicago Board of Trade as drought fears mounted. Other grain futures also rose sharply.

Some meteorologists have predicted the unusually dry weather pattern that has predominated in the Midwest this spring will continue through June, said Jason Roose, a broker with U.S. Commodities Inc. in West Des Moines, Iowa.

The clear weather has helped farmers get their crops planted rapidly but the corn and soybeans now need rain.

"The areas that are getting rain, it's just enough to dampen the soil," Roose said.

Scattered rain fell over the weekend in northern and western Iowa, but the rest of the Corn

Belt was dry.

Any threat to the crops is being taken seriously because U.S. corn and soybean stockpiles are at critically low levels. Flooding in the Midwest last summer reduced last year's production.

In early trading, wheat for July delivery was 6 1/4 cents higher at \$3.33 1/2 a bushel; July corn was 6 1/4 cents higher at \$2.75 1/2 a bushel; July oats were 2 1/2 cents higher at \$1.25 1/4 a bushel; July soybeans were 20 cents higher at \$7.22 1/2 a bushel.

Livestock and meat futures were mixed in early trading on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

Live cattle for June delivery were 0.15 cent higher at 64.02 cents a pound; May feeder cattle were 0.30 cent lower at 73.95 cents a pound; June live hogs were 0.22 cent lower at 48.85 cents a pound; July frozen pork bellies were 0.07 cent lower at 45.25 cents a pound.

Grain and soybean futures rose last week; livestock and meat futures retreated.

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Deere tallies record quarterly earnings

MOLINE — Deere & Co. today reported second-quarter earnings of \$189.3 million, or \$2.20 per share, its most profitable quarter ever.

That compares to \$21 million, or 27 cents a share, earned last year. The second quarter 1993 was affected by an \$80 million one-time restructuring charge to cut European operations by 2,000 employees.

The performance eclipses the record \$144 million earnings reported in the second quarter of 1990.

Second-quarter sales for the Moline-based world leader in farm equipment manufacturing also set a record at \$2.46 billion, up from \$2.1 billion in sales for the same 1994 period.

It keeps Deere on pace for a record year, coming on the heels

of its best first-quarter ever. For the first six months of 1994, earnings stand at \$276.3 million and sales were \$4.18 billion.

The company's best year ever was 1990 when it earned \$411.1 million on \$7.75 billion in sales.

Deere spokesman Robert Combs said production now is forecast at 16 percent higher than last year, the biggest jump coming in the division that makes construction machinery.

The demand has allowed Deere to raise higher prices and eliminate many sales incentives. The company expects employment to remain at about 32,500.

Restructuring of its European operations, where Deere has six factories building tractors and engines, has helped that division earn a small profit. But Europe remains a weak market, said Deere chairman Hans Becherer.



Sierra Club files suit over utility's permit application

SPRINGFIELD — An environmental group is trying to stop a state agency from issuing a chemical discharge permit to Illinois Power Co. because the group says the utility is polluting Illinois' only designated scenic river.

The Sierra Club is seeking an injunction from the Fourth District Appellate Court in Springfield to prohibit the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency from issuing the permit. The permit would allow IP to continue discharging chemicals and other waste matter into the Middle Fork of the Vermilion River near Danville.

The Middle Fork is the only federally designated natural scenic river in the state.

Illinois Power's coal-fired power plant discharges boron, sulfur and total dissolved solids in excess of state water quality standards, said Sierra Club

spokeswoman Anne Ray. "They (Illinois Power) would end up discharging even more than they are now" if they get the modified permit, Ray said.

Not so, responds Illinois Power.

"The Sierra Club has been saying that for ad infinitum," said IP spokesman Craig Nesbit. "It's just plain, not true. We have to make sure (discharges) are below federal clean water standards."

The materials are byproducts of the utility's 38-year-old power plant near Oakwood. Nesbit said IP uses ash settling ponds that clean and process discharge from the plant before it's released into the river.

Under the modified permit, Illinois Power would build a retention area where some discharge would be held in times of low river flow, said IEPA spokeswoman Joan Muraro.

classes were running normal Friday, at least, as normal as the final day before summer vacation ever goes.

"Some of the kids were really upset about the break in. We talked about it and how wrong it was," Mahler said. "And we offered a thank you prayer for the volunteers who helped us clean up and a prayer to help the police find the culprits."

As yet, police have not found any suspects in the vandalism spree after interviewing several Carroll students and graduates, according to John Bunner, city investigator.

Bunner said that a minimum of two vandals entered the building sometime after the night janitor completed his tasks, but there were no signs of forced entry. A gymnasium door was found ajar the next morning, but he said it is more likely this was where the vandals exited, rather than entered the building.

The wreckage was first noticed Thursday morning when janitor Greg Bree entered the locked school building to find water pouring from the ceiling

and pounding the concrete hallways, littered with fractured glass, gym equipment and assorted food items that had been pilfered from freezers in the cafeteria.

The vandals had plugged the second-floor bathroom sinks with paper towels and left the faucet running. Two locked classrooms were entered by breaking a small door window. Teaching materials were strewn across both rooms and derogatory messages were left on the chalkboards. But expensive equipment, such as a computer and television/VCR system,

were left untouched. Nothing has been reported missing.

By noon a dozen teachers and volunteers had cleaned up the rubble.

The vandalism spree, which Bunner claimed to be the worst Lincoln has ever seen, comes on the heels of severe vandalism acts in the past two months at Eureka High School, Normal Community High School and Springfield's Graham Elementary School. Bunner said there is

no indication the Carroll incident is gang related.

Mahler — who said she felt the vandals attacked the school, mimicking these other break ins — said she wants stories of the destruction to die down so children in other communities don't get any ideas.

"I think this was a copycat from the Bloomington vandalism and I'd feel really badly if this happened to another school," she said.

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
