

WASHINGTON — Illinois' unemployment rate was 5.8 percent in May, up from 5.5 percent in April, the government said today


Illinois' jobless rate was still lower than the national average, which declined from 6.4 percent in April to 6 percent last month.

Illinois had the eighth highest rate among the nation's 11 maior industrial states. California was the worst with 8.3 percent, and North Carolina was the best at 4 percent.

"The basic message underneath is that this economy is growing more slowly than before," said Robert G. Dederick, chief economist with the Northern Trust Co. in Chicago.

Edgar wins support for Medicaid plan

SPRINGFIELD - Gov. Jim Edgar today plans to unveil a revised proposal to revamp the state's Medicaid system, a measure he said is being supported by state health-care providers.

More than 20 Cook County hospitals have agreed to participate in the governor's proposal to launch a health maintenance organization style "managedcare" system for the state's 1.1 million Medicaid patients, Edgar said during a Statehouse news conference.

He said he has been negotiating with downstate health care providers and hopes to enlist their support for the managed care system, which is a major component of his plan to bail out the troubled Medicaid sys-

he said. "I expect we will have support downstate" by the target date to start the program April 1, 1995 Flanked by representatives

from state medical organizations and Cook County hospitals, Edgar said he will present the revised proposal to leaders of the General Assembly at a meeting later today.

The meeting marks the second time the legislative leaders have conducted negotiations on Medicaid, a key issue included in the governor's \$31.5 billion budget proposal that must be approved before the legislature can adiourn

"It is crucial that the legislature act in the next few weeks to

system," Edgar said.

Although the proposal revises his earlier plan to control costs by providing HMOs for Medicaid recipients, it does not touch the more controversial element of the proposal.

Edgar left intact his plan to restructure the state's long-term debt to pay off a \$1.4 billion backlog in Medicaid bills. Democrats have said that part of the proposal simply delays payment of the bills. The legislation calls for the state to negotiate agreements with managed care providers throughout Illinois to participate in the system. Those health care providers

would be required to deliver services to Medicaid clients at set costs they negotiate with the state. The proposal provides for

help us overhaul the Medicaid a separate managed care program to deliver mental health services to Medicaid recipients - an element backed by mental

> health experts. The plan also allows hospitals that specialize in treating children with chronic and acute physical problems to continue to operate independently of the managed care system for the first year of the program.

Edgar promised to provide more timely Medicaid payments to health-care providers, which in past years have waited months to receive their reimbursements from the state.

Edgar plans to pay off the state's \$1.4 billion in unpaid Medicaid bills by restructuring the state's long-term debt and capturing federal matching funds

Report gives dim outlook for Illinois coal industry

SPRINGFIELD - Illinois has not had much success in promot-ing the use of clean-coal scrubbers, and the future for the state's coal industry is bleak, acthe

cording to a new report. "It's ugly," said Kim Under-wood, director of the Illinois Office of Coal Development and Marketing, which compiled the report, "Outlook for the Illinois

report, "Outlook for the influors Coal Industry." Last year's production drop was blamed on a nationwide coal strike and severe flooding, but Underwood expects Illinois

coal production to continue to slip in the next few years to far below pre-strike levels. "We could lose 60 or 70 per-

cent of the market by the turn of the century," Underwood said. The state produced 61.7 mil-

lion tons of coal, and the indus-try employed 8,800 miners as recently as 1990. Last year, only 42.1 million tons of coal were produced by 7,300 miners.

The report projects that utili-ties will be buying only about 29 million tons of coal from Il-linois mines by the year 2000 — down from 55 million tons in

Lawyers challenge term limit referendum

SPRINGFIELD — State Treasurer Patrick Quinn blames "entrenched interests" opposed to changing Illinois government for challenging a fall vote on term limits for legislators.

"It's no secret that the members of the General Assembly and their lobbyist friends don't want term limits," Quinn said Monday at a Statehouse news conference. "We will never the state Supreme Court to stop a vote that could limit lawmakers to eight years in office.

Gordon Nash, who is helping mount the legal challenge, said the courts eventually will consider the legality of holding a referendum. The issue might as well be decided now, he said before the state goes through the expense of holding the referendum.

"If we're right on this issue

constitution permits that only for amendments to change the structure or procedures of the Legislature.
