Board of Trade

CHICAGO (AP) — Most grain and soybean futures prices weakened in early trading today on the Chicago Board of Trade, reflecting chances for beneficial rain in the Midwest.

The early losses erased only a small fraction of the gains posted Tuesday, when most corn and soybean contracts soared their permitted daily limits amid concerns about dry weather in the Midwest, the main growing region for those crops.

A storm system moving through Nebraska, southern Iowa, northern Missouri and central and southern Illinois appeared to be carrying more moisture than most forecasters had expected, analysts said.

Wheat for July delivery was 3 1/4 cents lower at \$3.24 1/4 a bushel. July corn was 1/2 cent lower at \$2.78 1/4 a bushel. July oats were 3/4 cent lower at \$1.24 1/4 a bushel. July soybeans were 2 1/2 cents lower at \$6.96 1/4 a bushel.

Livestock and meat futures were mostly lower in early trading on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

Live cattle for June delivery were 0.97 cent lower at 65.30 cents a pound. August feeder cattle were 0.65 cent lower at 73.30 cents a pound. June live hogs were 0.10 cent lower at

47.50 cents a pound. July frozen pork bellies were 0.20 cent lower 41.30 cents a pound. Livestock and meat futures ended mixed on Tuesday.

Wall Street at noon

NEW YORK (AP) — Stocks remained depressed today but above their worst levels after registering some of the ground lost in response to an economic reading that contained hints of higher inflation.

The Dow Jones industrial average was down 12.00 to 3,746.37 by noon on Wall Street. The blue chip indicator was knocked down more than 25 points earlier when the stock market mirrored a selloff in bonds.

Broader indicators also had difficulties. The New York Stock Exchange composite index fell 0.45 to 251.79 and Standard & Poor's 500 stock index slid 0.96 to 455.55.

Declining issues maintained a lead over advances on the NYSE with 848 up, 1,015 down and 788 unchanged. Volume on the Big Board's floor came to 116.62 million shares at midday, compared to 92.65 million at the same point Tuesday.

Smaller stocks also were weighed down. The Nasdaq Stock Market composite index dipped 3.94 to 731.25 and the American Stock Exchange market value index fell 1.15 to 439.30.

Stocks slid in sympathy with the bond market where the National Association of Purchasing Management's monthly report on business indicated selling. The 30-year bond tumbled more than 3/4 point before recovering slightly. At noon, the key bond was off 9-18 point, which pushed up its yield to 7.48 percent from 7.43 percent late Tuesday.

Man who damaged cop car sent to prison

Jeffrey T. Jones was sentenced to two years in prison for kicking out the back window of an Atlanta Police Department squad car in March.

Jones, who originally pleaded innocent to the criminal damage to property charge, changed his plea to guilty to accept an agreement that dismissed two other charges against him.

Jones caused approximately \$800 in damages to the squad car after he was arrested and placed in the back seat of the vehicle. He kicked out the window and dented the window frame.

Other action in court included a \$55,000 bond reduction for Keith L. Yeazel, 31, of Lincoln who was arrested on charges of two counts of aggravated criminal sexual assault.

Bond, originally set at \$75,000, was dropped to \$20,000. Yeazel, who was ordered to stay away from all minors, has yet to post bond.

Yeazel, who has faced similar charges in the past, entered a plea of not guilty to assaulting two minor boys. A jury trial date was set for July 18.

Illinois' jobless rate was still lower than the national average, which declined from 6.4 percent in April to 6 percent last month.

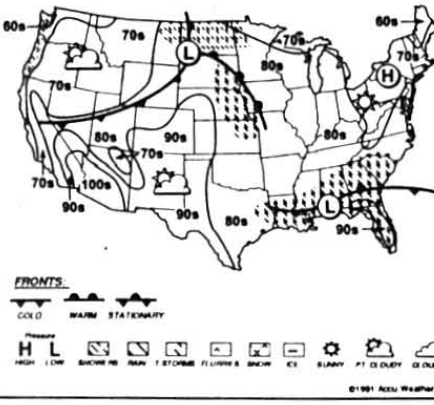
Illinois had the eighth highest rate among the nation's 11 major industrial states. California was the worst with 8.3 percent, and North Carolina was the best at 4 percent.

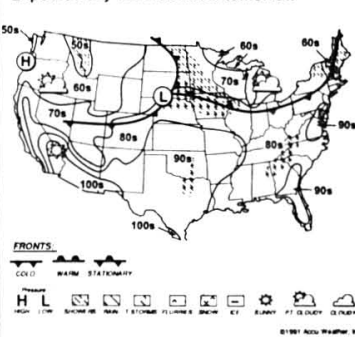

Edgar wins support for Medicaid plan

SPRINGFIELD — Gov. Jim Edgar today plans to unveil a revised proposal to revamp the state's Medicaid system, a measure he said is being supported by state health-care providers.

More than 20 Cook County hospitals have agreed to participate in the governor's proposal to launch a health maintenance organization style "managed-care" system for the state's 1.1 million Medicaid patients, Edgar said during a Statehouse news conference.

He said he has been negotiating with downstate health care providers and hopes to enlist their support for the managed care system, which is a major component of his plan to bail out the troubled Medicaid sys-

tem.

"We have conversations underway with HMOs downstate," he said. "I expect we will have support downstate" by the target date to start the program April 1, 1995.

Flanked by representatives from state medical organizations and Cook County hospitals, Edgar said he will present the revised proposal to leaders of the General Assembly at a meeting later today.

The meeting marks the second time the legislative leaders have conducted negotiations on Medicaid, a key issue included in the governor's \$31.5 billion budget proposal that must be approved before the legislature can adjourn.

"It is crucial that the legislature act in the next few weeks to

help us overhaul the Medicaid system," Edgar said.

Although the proposal revises his earlier plan to control costs by providing HMOs for Medicaid recipients, it does not touch the more controversial element of the proposal.

Edgar left intact his plan to restructure the state's long-term debt to pay off a \$1.4 billion backlog in Medicaid bills. Democrats have said that part of the proposal simply delays payment of the bills. The legislation calls for the state to negotiate agreements with managed care providers throughout Illinois to participate in the system.

Those health care providers would be required to deliver services to Medicaid clients at set costs they negotiate with the state. The proposal provides for

a separate managed care program to deliver mental health services to Medicaid recipients — an element backed by mental health experts.

The plan also allows hospitals that specialize in treating children with chronic and acute physical problems to continue to operate independently of the managed care system for the first year of the program.

Edgar promised to provide more timely Medicaid payments to health-care providers, which in past years have waited months to receive their reimbursements from the state.

Edgar plans to pay off the state's \$1.4 billion in unpaid Medicaid bills by restructuring the state's long-term debt and capturing federal matching funds.

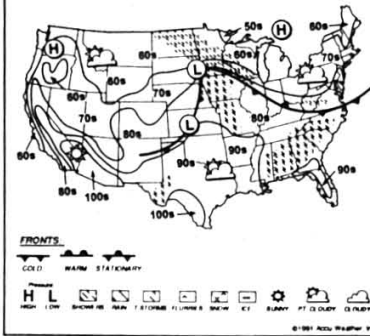

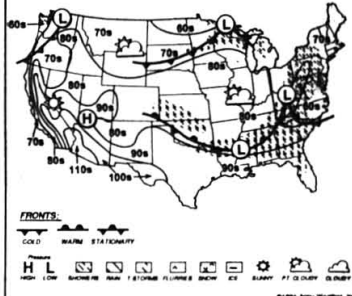

Pontiac guards union boss under fire

PONTIAC — The leader of the guards union at Pontiac Correctional Center is "irresponsible" for claiming the prison is controlled by gangs instead of the warden, state officials said.

Sgt. Danny Jarrett said gang leaders get preferential treatment from Warden Richard Gramley because he's afraid they will riot and get him fired.

"He's intimidated and he's weak," Jarrett said Thursday. "The warden would rather deal with gangs than his own employees. Their numbers are greater than ours, so he does what he has to and gets by."

Jarrett is president of the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees Local 494. He has been a guard at Pontiac since 1984.

Department of Corrections spokesman Nic Howell denied the claims, saying Gramley is

"at the head of the class" among Illinois wardens. Gramley is the state's senior warden, with service dating to 1981.

"These are the annual beatings of Mr. Jarrett," Howell said. "Mr. Jarrett is an embarrassment to the people he represents and to himself."

Howell said the Pontiac prison has run smoothly since Gramley arrived about three years ago.

Not so, said Jarrett, noting at least nine serious attacks on guards since March, including incidents Saturday, Sunday and Monday in which guards were injured by inmates.

On Wednesday, guards had to fire warning shots, for the first time in several years, to break up fighting by inmates.

"We're running a maximum-security prison with inmates double-celled in buildings, some of which are more than 100 years old," Gramley said. "The vast majority of our inmates

have gang affiliations and 80 percent of our inmates are in for murder or class X felonies.

"This is not a nice bunch of people. It's small miracle (the prison is) able to run without terrible problems."

Gramley said guards have to expect some problems.

"Sgt. Jarrett wants me to overreact to the situation and lock everybody up," Gramley said. "He thinks that is good management."

Jarrett is demanding immediate lockdown of all 2,100 inmates to allow guards to perform a cell-by-cell search for weapons and contraband. He said guards should be able to search inmates at random. And he wants aggressive inmates assigned to cell houses with armed guards.

Gramley said Jarrett's tactics could lead to riots in a volatile prison.

Atlanta Library launching summer program

and will be a "Fairy Tale Festival" from 10:30 to 11 a.m. Friday.

Participants are to come in costumes as their favorite story book character.

To be eligible to attend a special program, the reader must present a completed party pass, earned by reading for the required number of hours the previous week.

The required number of reading hours for younger non-readers (to be read to) is 1 1/2

hours each week, for readers up through second grade two hours per week, and for third graders and up it's three hours per week.

U of I President Ikenberry makes plans to leave in 1995

CHICAGO — Saying the University of Illinois is ready for an infusion of new ideas, fresh perspectives and enthusiasm, Stanley Ikenberry announced his resignation as president.

"The health of the university is excellent, our prospects are bright, and we are well positioned to proceed with an orderly transition of leadership," Ikenberry said during a meeting Thursday of the university's board of trustees.

Ikenberry said he will remain on the job until a successor is named, which he hopes will happen by fall 1995.

One of the highlights of his tenure was the 1982 merger of the university's medical center and Chicago Circle campus into the University of Illinois at Chicago, he said.

"But many people may remember me for helping pour concrete and cutting ribbons," Ikenberry said in reference to the nearly 50 buildings built or remodeled during his 15 years as president. Only two presidents have served longer.

Ikenberry said two of the challenges his successor will face are revitalizing education for un-

dergraduates at a school that emphasizes research and expanding the university's public service role.

Another major challenge, he said, is improving the quality of the university with less money.

"Hard as we try to get more money from the state, we have to face the same competitive challenges as businesses," Ikenberry said. "We have to increase our efficiency and productivity."

Ikenberry oversees all operations at the university's two campuses, a \$1.66 billion budget, 61,600 students and 4,800 faculty.

Kenneth Boyle, president of the board of trustees, said the national search for Ikenberry's successor "will be the most important job of the trustees next year."

"We will choose his successor, but we will never find a replacement," said Boyle. "He had a unique ability to work in Springfield, Chicago, Campaign and Washington D.C. to persuade people to do the right thing for the university."

In Springfield, Gov. Jim Edgar said Ikenberry leaves a record "second to none."

Board of Trade

CHICAGO (AP) — Corn, soybean and oat prices opened higher today on the Chicago Board of Trade as forecasters predicted continued warm, dry weather for the eastern Midwest.
Wheat prices were higher as scattered thunderstorms caused harvesting delays in Texas and Oklahoma.

"It's a weather market as of right now," said Jason Roose, a broker for U.S. Commodities Inc. in West Des Moines, Iowa.
Extended forecasts show a "hot-air dome" moving into the eastern corn belt, where soils are already too dry. Temperatures are predicted next week to move into the 90s, which would quickly dry out soil.

Analysts say yields have not yet been affected by the weather, but that could change if the forecasts hold true.

"That's the fear if we don't get coverage of rain, there may be damage or yield loss," Roose said.

But while dry weather continues in the eastern Midwest, farmers harvesting winter wheat in Texas and Oklahoma might be delayed by scattered thunderstorms.

Corn and wheat futures were modestly higher, reversing Thursday's declines. Soybeans and oats extended Thursday's gains.
In early trading, wheat for July delivery was 1 1/4 cent higher at \$3.37 1/4 a bushel. July corn was 1 1/4 cent higher at \$2.73 a bushel. July oats were 1 1/2 cent higher at \$1.19 1/2 a bushel; and soybeans were up 3 1/4 cents at \$6.76 a bushel.

Report gives dim outlook for Illinois coal industry

SPRINGFIELD — Illinois has not had much success in promoting the use of clean-coal scrubbers, and the future for the state's coal industry is bleak, according to a new report.

"It's ugly," said Kim Underwood, director of the Illinois Office of Coal Development and Marketing, which compiled the report, "Outlook for the Illinois Coal Industry."

Last year's production drop was blamed on a nationwide coal strike and severe flooding, but Underwood expects Illinois

coal production to continue to slip in the next few years to far below pre-strike levels.

"We could lose 60 or 70 percent of the market by the turn of the century," Underwood said.

The state produced 61.7 million tons of coal, and the industry employed 8,800 miners as recently as 1990. Last year, only 42.1 million tons of coal were produced by 7,300 miners.

The report projects that utilities will be buying only about 29 million tons of coal from Illinois mines by the year 2000 — down from 55 million tons in

1992. Even that estimate may be too optimistic.

"It's rosier than what the reality will be," Underwood said. "A lot of those contracts have escape clauses."

Some major mining concerns, such as the Peabody Coal Co., already have cut back on mines operating in the state. At the beginning of 1993, Peabody had three operating coal mines in the state. It now operates only one, in Marissa. Peabody closed its nearby Baldwin Mine for good last year, leaving about 300 min-

ers out of work.

Underwood said the problem is that utility companies that burn coal are quickly switching to low-sulfur coal produced in western states, and Illinois mines are losing their contracts.

Provisions of the federal Clean Air Act that mandate reduced sulfur dioxide pollution from coal-fired electrical power plants are now being implemented. And Underwood said most utilities prefer to buy the western coal, rather than to pay for the scrubbers that would enable them to burn Illinois coal.

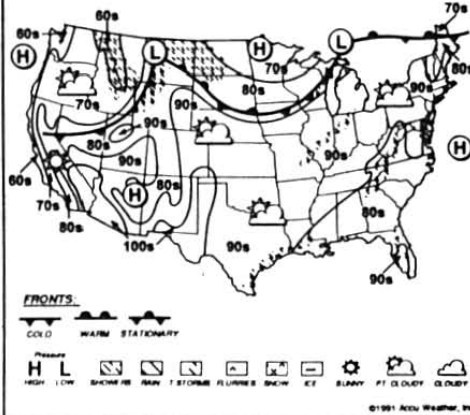

Chicago mail carrier who stashed letters pleads guilty to theft

CHICAGO — Prosecutors plan to seek a prison sentence of 21 to 27 months for a former postal carrier who pleaded guilty to theft for stashing more than a ton of undelivered mail in his home.

Robert Beverly's sentencing hearing is set for Aug. 24. Authorities discovered 3,400 pieces of first class mail and

more than 22,000 pieces of bulk mail last month when firefighters responded to a fire at Beverly's Palatine Township home.

Beverly apologized during a hearing in U.S. District Court on Thursday.

"It wasn't my intention to profit by my actions," said Beverly, a 30-year-old U.S. Postal Service employee since 1987.

"In delaying the mail, I made a grave error in judgment and compounded it by repeating it over a period of time," he said.

"I thought I was buying myself time to deliver the mail at a later time," he said.

Beverly has resigned his \$32,000 a year job with the Postal Service, said his lawyer, Lawrence Schueler.

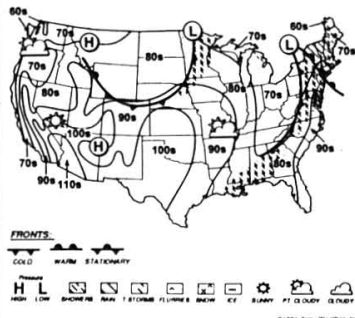

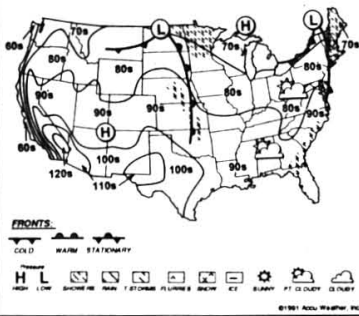

CHICAGO (AP) — Corn and soybean futures gave up a large part of Tuesday's gains this morning on revised weather forecasts showing more moderate conditions in the Midwest next week.

Private forecasts on Tuesday projected the huge dome of blistering heat over the Southwest moving into the corn belt next week.

"But today the weather maps don't look as oppressive and there's more rain in the picture for next week," said Joel Karlin, research analyst in Chicago for Kemper Securities Inc.

In early dealings, wheat for delivery in July was 3 1/2 cents lower at \$3.16 a bushel; July corn was 7 cents lower at \$2.51 a bushel; July oats were 4 cents lower at \$1.20 1/2 a bushel; and July soybeans were 1 1/2 cents lower at \$6.70 1/4 a bushel.

Feeder cattle moved higher but most other livestock and meat futures contracts declined on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

Live cattle for delivery in August were 25 cent lower at \$3.22 cents a pound; August feeder cattle were 20 cent higher at \$3.57 cents a pound; July hogs were 35 cent lower at 46.45 cents a bushel; and August pork bellies were 80 cent lower at 37.30 cents a pound.

On Tuesday, cattle were higher, feeder cattle and hogs were mixed, and pork bellies were lower.

Wall Street at noon

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market was higher at midday, even though the dollar fell to its fourth record low in six sessions against the Japanese yen.

At noon on Wall Street, the Dow Jones industrial average was up 24.93 points at 3,694.57.

Volume on the floor of the New York Stock Exchange was 121,050 million shares, compared with 119,350 million at the same time in the previous session.

Advancing shares outnumbered declining ones about 7 to 4 on the NYSE, with 1,216 up, 699 down and 721 unchanged.

The NYSE composite index was up 1.80 at 247.50. On the American Stock Exchange, the market value index was up 0.79 at 423.46, while the Nasdaq composite index was up 4.57 at 706.62.

For the past week the stock market's performance has been widely tied to the dollar's fate, but there were signs today that focus might be weakening. Investors, analysts said, were beginning to attribute the dollar's slide against the yen more to problems with the Japanese economy than anything else.
