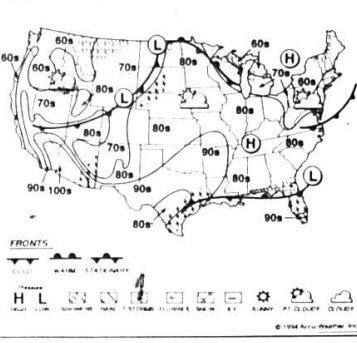

**Edgar signs bill guaranteeing homeless children an education**

SPRINGFIELD — An Aurora woman's plight to find a school for her children while the family was living in a homeless shelter ended Friday with a state law to guarantee all homeless children a public education.

Gov. Jim Edgar signed a bill that will allow homeless children to choose which school they want to attend without engaging in a court battle over residency requirements.

The school district where the child lives and the district where the student goes to school also will split any transportation costs, under the bill.

Rep. Tom Cross, R-Oswego, drafted the legislation to help Yeast Boatwright of Aurora

because state law did not clarify where homeless children could go to school.

Under the law, which takes effect immediately, a district superintendent will work with homeless children to place them either in their old school district, or the district where they find shelter, Cross said.

If the district has to find transportation to take the student back to an old district, the state will be reimbursed by the federal government for its share of the cost.

For Boatwright, "it was a temporary situation. I think there are a lot of people on the edge out there," Cross said.

five months after the primary, she wasn't, and that got her into a deep hole.

"Clearly, the tollway ads helped her. I think it's going to take more than that to get her into contention, but at least they're running on the attack," he adds.

When tollway irregularities surfaced, Edgar acted to deflect the heat. He installed a new executive director and essentially ordered an end to the supplemental pension system.

All the same, Netsch's ads may have undermined Edgar's seeming immunity from criticism, observers say.

"The tollway commercial has helped to some degree, because Edgar is perceived by many as being made of Teflon. Mr. Clean," says John Gianulis, Rock Island County Democratic chairman. But he adds: "If I were to tell you we are in good shape in the governor's race, I'd be less than honest."

"The precinct committeemen are telling me that, in their blue-

collar precincts, Netsch stands for an increase in their income tax and that frightens them," Gianulis says. "These are UAW voters ... and for her to carry this county she has got to get to them."

Unrest over the school financing plan within the traditional Democratic base grew with Edgar ads attacking Netsch as soft on crime. While representing a state Senate district on Chicago's north lake front, she opposed such measures as automatic prison terms for gun crimes and life sentences for those convicted of three serious felonies.

Netsch has tried to blunt that attack by calling for more prisons and "truth-in-sentencing" legislation designed to ensure that "violent, repeat offenders" serve at least 85 percent of their sentences. It seems likely that the campaign will focus on crime in at least one of the ads it will air this month.

Shorr concedes that "we just didn't have the resources when he hit us early and we had to take the punch."

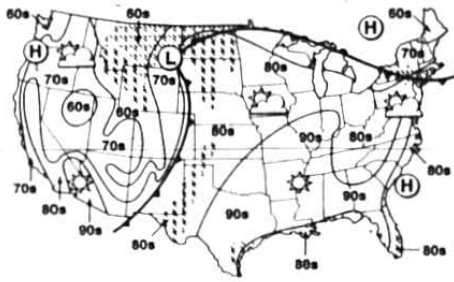

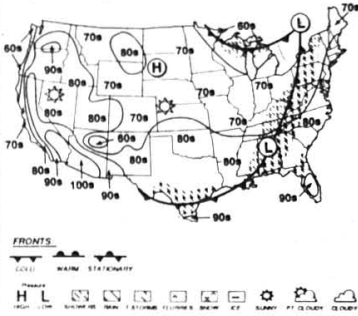

**Wall Street at noon**

NEW YORK (AP) — Stock prices retreated this morning from Thursday's surge after the government reported factories were operating closer to capacity as the economy grows.  
The figures suggested the economy is improving quicker than some have anticipated, giving inflation-wary investors another reason to sell and reaffirming suspicions the Federal Reserve might raise interest rates again.

The news also came as the stock market is under the influence of today's quarterly expirations of stock futures and options. The deadlines can cause wide price changes such as Thursday's sharp rise or a steep drop.

The Dow Jones industrial average was down 34 3/4 points at 3,919.56 by midmorning. Declining issues outnumbered advancers on the New York Stock Exchange by more than 3 to 1, with 1,532 down, 481 up and 732 unchanged.

The market is reversing some of the silliness at 4 p.m. yesterday. Lawrence Rice, chief market strategist at Josephthal Lyon & Ross, said of Thursday's late gains.

Trading was heavy with Big Board volume reaching 255.87 million shares at noon on Wall Street, up from 114.59 million the day before. The heavy volume was attributed to urgent trading before the options deadline.

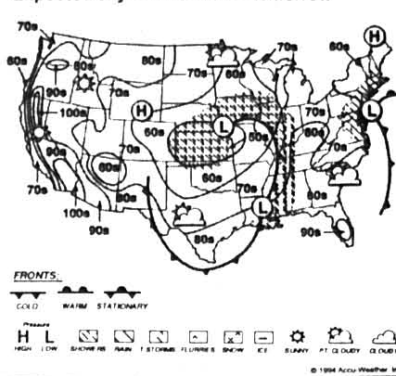

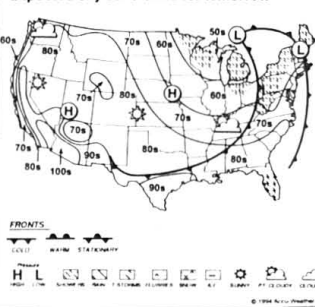

**Board of Trade**  
CHICAGO (AP) — Wheat futures prices slipped in early trading on the Chicago Board of Trade after the Agriculture Department rejected several export bids.  
Corn and oat futures also edged lower; soybeans were steady to higher.  
The Agriculture Department turned down bids from Egypt, the Philippines, Algeria and Yemen for U.S. wheat at subsidized prices.  
Wheat has risen for six straight weeks on strong export demand. December deliveries faltered Monday just short of \$4 a bushel, a 2 1/2-year high.  
In the corn and soybean pits, buying interest prompted by forecasts for rain in the Midwest next week was tempered by the negative price impact of the advancing corn and soybean harvest. Early yields have been higher than expected for both crops, analysts said.  
In early trading, wheat for December delivery was 2 1/4 cents lower at \$3.94 a bushel. December corn was 1/4 cent lower at \$2.16 a bushel. December oats were 1/2 cent lower at \$1.25 1/4 a bushel. November soybeans were unchanged at \$5.54 1/4 a bushel.  
Livestock and meat futures retreated in early trading on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. Live cattle for October delivery were down 0.35 cent at 69.65 cents a pound; September feeder cattle were down 0.15 cent at 73.15 cents a pound; October live hogs were 0.13 cent lower at 37.52 cents a pound.

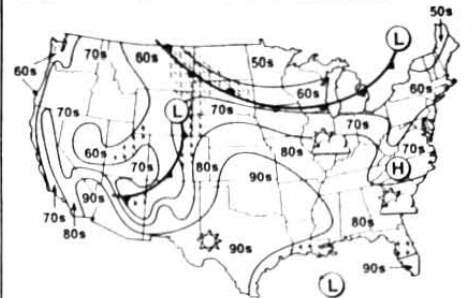

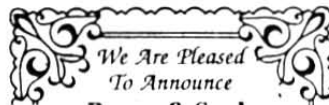

## Congress responds to pleas related to friendly fire deaths

**RED BUD** — The persistence of two Southern Illinois women may yet win Purple Hearts for the 14 American military personnel killed when their helicopters were accidentally shot down over Iraq last April.

The Black Hawk helicopters were mistakenly shot down by a pair of American F-15 fighters. The Army and Air Force denied the medals because the deaths were not

caused directly by the enemy. But Congress on Thursday passed a defense budget including a paragraph saying Congress "believes that the 14 members of the Armed Forces should be awarded posthumously the Purple Heart or other medal of distinction for their distinguished service to their country."

That does not guarantee the

## Business owner D. Brewster Parker dies

THE COURIER

D. Brewster Parker, a prominent business and civic leader with clout in local Democratic politics, died Thursday afternoon.

He had been ill in recent years with amyotrophic lateral sclerosis, commonly known as Lou Gehrig's disease.

Parker, 57, of Lincoln died at 4:50 p.m. Thursday at Abraham Lincoln Memorial Hospital.

He was president of the family-owned Logan County Title Company in Lincoln, a business he assumed in 1969 from his grandfather, Lynn R. Parker. The Parkers have owned the

firm more than 80 years.

Brewster Parker also was a member and former president of the Illinois Land Title Association.

He has been a major sponsor of the Lincoln Art and Balloon Festival since the event's inception. He was a member of the Lincoln/Logan County Chamber of Commerce and of several service clubs.

"Brewster has just been a staunch supporter" of the chamber and the festival, said Beth Harding, the chamber's executive director. "He always went above and beyond" in helping with sponsorships and other con-

tributions over the years.

"I can't say enough about the supporter he was of the chamber."

Added Valecia Crisafulli, a longtime friend of the Parker family, "Brewster loved this town and you could always count on him to support community efforts," such as Main Street, local school referenda and events that included the art festival.

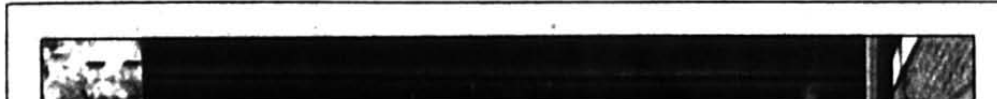

maraderic, excitement, financial gain and protection.

The most effective tool parents have of keeping their children out of gangs is offering a strong family environment.

Gomora said parents need to spend regular time with their children — eating together, talking with them, identifying posi-

tive role models and enforcing discipline.

"A lot of people think, 'I'll let my kids run. He's not going to get into trouble,' and society becomes the babysitter," he said.

Warning signs of possible gang activity include:

- Buying an excessive amount of one color for their wardrobe, wearing sagging pants on the

hips or waist and excessive amounts of gold jewelry.

- Withdrawal from family members.

- Staying out later than usual.
- Desiring too much privacy.
- Spending more money than usual.

- Using hand signs or gang verbiage, and
- Sudden changes in friends.

served as chairman from 1989 to 1993 and, prior to that, as vice chairman.

"We were all saddened by his passing," said John Pembroke, vice chancellor for the Illinois Board of Regents. "Certainly the staff and all his board colleagues are going to miss his enthusiasm, his good will and his sense of humor."

"Above all, Brewster was an outstanding steward of the public trust. He was fully committed to the welfare and well being of regent universities students, faculty and staff."

The Board of Regents administers Northern Illinois, Illinois State and Sangamon State universities and is the second largest university system in the state with more than 50,000 students.

Parker was a former member of the Board of Higher Education who, at the time of his death, was the alternate representative to the Board of Higher Education for the Board of Regents and was a member of the board's Executive Committee.

Long active in Logan County Democratic politics, he was a delegate to the 1972 Democratic National Convention and was a former Logan County Democratic party precinct committeeman.

Parker was a charter member and director of the Logan County Park and Trails Foundation.

He was a member of Trinity Episcopal Church and a former Lincoln College trustee.

An avid jazz fan, he started the Kickapoo Valley Jazz Club. He enjoyed sailing and track officiating at the high school and college levels.

Parker was educated at the Kent School in Kent, Conn., and attended Amherst College. He received a Bachelor of Arts degree in English from Illinois Wesleyan University and his law degree from the University of Miami.

He was born Nov. 4, 1936, in Lincoln, the son of John Randolph and Dorothy Moore Parker. He married Joan Agrella in River Forest on Dec. 3, 1966. She survives.

Other survivors include two sons, Jonathan and Christopher, both of Washington, D.C.; and an aunt, LaVera Moore, of Lincoln.

He was preceded in death by his parents.

Funeral services will be at 10:30 a.m. Tuesday at Trinity Episcopal Church, with the Rev. William Turner officiating. Burial will be in Union Cemetery.

Visitation will be from 4 to 8 p.m. Monday at Holland & Barry Funeral Home.

# Lawmakers push pork for Illinois

WASHINGTON — If lawmakers get their way, federal dollars will help pay for a host of Illinois projects — from a water tower in Crainville to library programs at DePaul University.

The projects are covered in appropriations measures that lawmakers have worked their way through this week with the budget year starting Saturday. The measures are subject to the president's approval.

Much of the federal money Illinois would get comes from funding formulas — for crop programs, roads and mass transit, for example. But the spending bills also contain money earmarked for specific Illinois communities or projects.

The city of Paris, Ill., near the Indiana border in Edgar County, would get \$1 million to clean up the reservoirs of the Twin Lakes. They serve as the municipal water supply and also provide access to boating, fishing and swimming.

Crainville, in Southern Illinois, would use \$200,000 to build a new water tower, while DePaul University in Chicago

would benefit from \$2 million for library programs.

In agriculture, Illinois would receive money to continue research on aflatoxin, a carcinogenic mold that grows on corn, and canola oil, which is low in saturated fat.

A new project, the Illinois-Missouri Alliance for Agricultural Biotechnology, would be given a start-up boost with \$1.4 million in federal money. The alliance would bring together farmers, universities, research institutions and agribusinesses to improve the nutritional and health value of food crops.

Engineering and design studies on an ethanol pilot plant would get \$400,000. The plant, intended to examine more efficient and competitive ways of producing ethanol from corn, would be at University Park, a research and development site adjacent to Southern Illinois University at Edwardsville.

Communities across Illinois would gain from transportation projects.

Lawmakers approved \$1 million for redesigning Veterans Parkway in Springfield and the same amount to study the possibility of a Peoria-Chicago highway.

Three areas — Danville, Mattoon-Charleston and Mount Vernon — would each receive \$386,666 under the Essential Air Service program, which helps keep scheduled commercial air service in small communities.

Larger projects include \$25 million for Chicago's downtown trolley plan, \$12.1 million for the Illinois-St. Louis Metro Link light rail project, which eventually will connect the St. Louis airport with Scott Air Force Base; and \$2.5 million for Wisconsin Central Commuter Line, which will link northern Lake County and the northwest suburbs with Chicago and O'Hare International Airport.

The U.S. Army, meanwhile, has awarded Caterpillar Inc. a \$33 million contract for earth compactors. And the Transportation Department has released \$8.6 million for the Greater Rockford Airport Authority to improve taxiways, improve drainage and acquire land for noise reduction. The spending is related to plans by the United Parcel Service to set up a distribution center.

medals will be awarded, but the action pleased Judith Orrill of Godfrey, the mother of one of the victims, Sgt. Michael S. Robinson, 23.

"I think this is great," she said. "It's not a sure thing, but I think our boys will finally get what they deserve. They died for their country and they deserve the Purple Heart."

Orrill and Lynette Ellner of Red Bud, mother of Pfc. Mark A. "Tony" Ellner, asked the Army and Air Force to award the Purple Heart to their sons and the 12 other American military personnel killed in the shoot-down. The request was denied, but the two women did not give up.

They protested the denials in letters to Sen. Paul Simon, D-Ill., who wrote Sept. 19 to Sen.

Sam Nunn, D-Ga., chairman of the Senate Armed Services Committee, asking him to look into the matter.

"This is not like someone serving on a military base in the U.S. and getting into a car accident," Simon wrote. "It does seem to me like they deserve the Purple Heart."

Nunn contacted Sen. Daniel Inouye, D-Hawaii, head of the Defense Appropriations Committee, a few days ago, a Nunn spokesman said, and the paragraph was inserted in the defense spending bill.

The Purple Heart is America's oldest military award. It was created by George Washington in 1782. It can be given to members of the armed forces wounded or killed in action by or against an enemy.

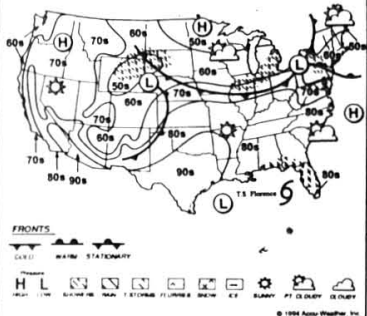

**Sara Lee plans deep slices to its payroll**

CHICAGO — Sara Lee Corp. says in its annual report that it plans to trim about 9,900 jobs under its restructuring program — 1,400 more jobs than it had previously estimated.

The personal products company also said it plans to close 94 plants and other facilities. Sara Lee has announced 21 U.S. plant closings since June.

Sara Lee Chairman John H. Bryan said 6.8 percent of the company's 146,000-person global work force will be cut by 1996. Sara Lee previously had estimated it would cut 6 percent, or about 8,500 jobs.

The job cuts also include early retirement incentives, transfers and attrition, said spokeswoman Kate Gace.

"The layoffs will occur over a period of time" Gace said Thursday, noting that many of the cuts already have been made.

The company has said it expects to save \$250 million annually by 1998 under the restructuring. The company hopes to fight unexpectedly strong competition — particularly in Europe — by cutting costs internally, including consolidating many of its hosiery and knit products plants.

Bryan also said he has given an ultimatum to top managers of the struggling personal products division: produce or get out. The personal products division makes and markets underwear, pantyhose and fleece products under brand names including Hanes, Champion, L'eggs, Liz Claiborne, DKNY and Playtex.

Sara Lee's report to shareholders blames "failed market strategies, management issues and deep retail discounting in Europe" for much of the division's shortfall.

It said competition has been intense at a time when "expensive new product initiatives" and the "high cost of manufacturing in Europe" slashed results.

"The layoffs will occur over a period of time" Gace said Thursday, noting that many of the cuts already have been made.

The company has said it expects to save \$250 million annually by 1998 under the restructuring. The company hopes to fight unexpectedly strong competition — particularly in Europe — by cutting costs internally, including consolidating many of its hosiery and knit products plants.

Bryan also said he has given an ultimatum to top managers of the struggling personal products division: produce or get out. The personal products division makes and markets underwear, pantyhose and fleece products under brand names including Hanes, Champion, L'eggs, Liz Claiborne, DKNY and Playtex.

Sara Lee's report to shareholders blames "failed market strategies, management issues and deep retail discounting in Europe" for much of the division's shortfall.

It said competition has been intense at a time when "expensive new product initiatives" and the "high cost of manufacturing in Europe" slashed results.
