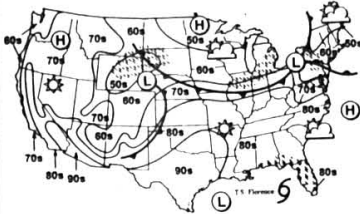

An active member of the Illinois Brotherhood of Electrical Workers Local 51 of Springfield, Mr. Behrends served as an executive board member from 1965 to 1979 and as president from 1979 to 1980.

In the Lincoln unit of Local 51, he was vice chairman from 1962 until 1968 and had been chairman since 1971.

Mr. Behrends was a 32-year member of Lincoln Masonic Lodge No. 210. He belonged to the Scottish Rite and Ansar

Shrine Temple, both in Springfield, and the Logan County Shrine Club.

He also belonged to the Fraternal Order of Eagles Aerie No. 2708, Moose Lodge No. 1441, Elk Lodge No. 914, the Tri-Police Association of Logan County, the National Rifle Association, Ducks Unlimited, Quail Unlimited, the Tri-County Duck and Goose Hunters Inc., Beason Sportman Club and the Hartsburg-Emden Duck Club.

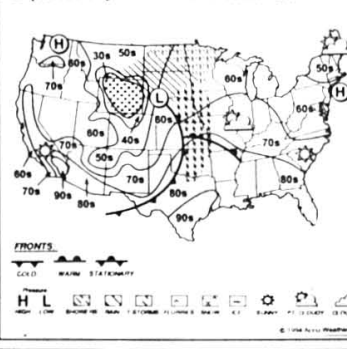

Senate chief under fire

Critics: Comment on DCFS workers was racist

ARLINGTON HEIGHTS — Illinois Senate President James "Pate" Philip's suggestion that some minority state employees have a lesser work ethic than whites and cover up for "fellow minorities" triggered rebukes from Democrats today. Gov. Jim Edgar moved to distance himself as well.

"It's probably a terrible thing to say, but I'll say it: Some of them do not have the work ethics that we have," said Philip, who is white, during an interview Wednesday with the editorial board of the Daily Herald in Arlington Heights.

Edgar, a Republican, quickly moved to distance himself through an aide from Philip's remarks as Democrats heaped criticism on the Senate president. "I can tell you that the governor strongly disagrees with Sen. Philip's comments," said Edgar spokesman Gary Mack. He said Edgar "thinks Sen. Philip was wrong in the racial context."

Democrat Dawn Clark Netsch, campaigning for governor, was quick to condemn Philip's comments. "I think it is outrageous, it is racist, it is deplorable, it is not accurate, it is very offensive, it is extremely offensive," Netsch told a mid-morning news conference. She said Edgar should "disavow" Philip's comments and "express similar outrage, and I would hope that Pate

would pull back also."

Netsch recalled that one of Philip's Senate aides once described her in speaking with reporters as a "broad." She said this demonstrated insensitivity toward women. In addition, the Democratic candidate said she was disturbed by an Edgar television ad in which two blacks describe how they got off of welfare and Edgar takes credit for putting "these people" back to work. Netsch said the phrase "these people" was insensitive in the context.

State Rep. Monique Davis, D-Chicago, was critical of Philip, saying, "A person with that mentality should resign as president of the Illinois state Senate. He's a racist."

Philip, R-Wood Dale, mentioned the widely publicized discovery Feb. 1 of 19 children living in a filthy, roach-infested apartment on Chicago's West Side. He noted that a caseworker from the Department of Children and Family Services had been to the home twice in the preceding five months but had done nothing after being refused entry.

"Of course, she was a minority. Her boss was a minority. ... They don't tend to squeal on their fellow minorities," Philip said.

The caseworker was fired in March. Asked whether he would say

the same thing if it had been a white family in the apartment, Philip said: "If the caseworker never got in the apartment or the building and the caseworker didn't do the job and there wasn't anything in the files, you're damn right I would. Absolutely."

Philip acknowledged that his comments could be interpreted as racist.

"But I'm not politically correct. I don't try to be. If you want to be politically correct, you'll never tell the truth," Philip said.

Wedded bliss emphasized in sex study

CHICAGO — It seems people promising "to have and to hold" at the altar really mean it when it comes to sex.

A sweeping new survey of young and middle-aged adults finds that married people and couples who live together but are not married have better sex, and have it more often, than single people.

Forty-one percent of married couples surveyed reported having sex at least twice a week, while 56 percent of unmarried couples who live together reported having sex twice a week or more. Only 23 percent of single people reported being that active.

Among married women, 75 percent reported they always or usually had an orgasm during sex, compared with 62 percent of single women and about 95 percent of all men.

Even so, lead researcher Robert Michael said today, what is most surprising in the landmark study is that most American sexual habits fall within a relatively narrow range of behavior.

"The most striking finding is how conventional American sex lives are," said Michael, dean of the Harris School of Public Policy Studies at the University of Chicago. "Unlike what we're led to believe by watching movies and reading novels, most people have few partners and have rather infrequent sex."

Results of the nationwide survey are to be published Monday in two books: "Sex in America: A Definitive Study," which is intended for general readership, and "The Social Organization of Sexuality: Sexual Practices in the United States," which includes statistical analysis geared for an academic audience.

Researchers at the University of Chicago and the State University of New York, Stony Brook, also reported that 75 percent of married men and 85 percent of married women remain faithful to their spouses.

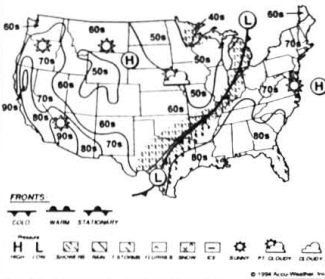

Man who died trying to save buildings saluted

CHICAGO — Photographer Richard Nickel died as he lived: trying to save the work of architect Louis Sullivan from the wrecking ball.

"He was a determined, somewhat angry person who begrudged the fact that these buildings were coming down," said John Vinci, a Chicago architect who fought alongside Nickel to save Sullivan's buildings from destruction.

At the request of Richard Cahan, the author of a new book on Nickel's life, the photographer's friends and family gathered Monday to honor a man whose life was filled with sadness over the destruction of what he considered art.

Nickel's 14-year career as a preservation activist and architectural photographer ended in 1972 when the old Stock Exchange building in Chicago's Loop came crashing down around him, burying him alive in a pile of sand, mud and plaster.

Nickel's 14-year career as a preservation activist ended in 1972 when the old Stock Exchange building came crashing down around him.

"The Stock Exchange was going to be his last building," his brother, Don Nickel, said Monday. "He was going to get married and give up the whole preservation business."

Cahan, the photo editor of the Chicago Sun-Times, said he first became intrigued with Nickel after seeing one of his pictures of the Stock Exchange and hearing the story of Nickel's death.

"I wanted to find out who this guy was ... that risked his life to save buildings," Cahan said.

What drove Nickel was his love for Adler & Sullivan buildings, especially Sullivan's ornaments. The delicate ornaments, often of molded terra cotta or cast-iron, highlighted the bold masonry buildings for which he is known.

"This was one of the very few architects who had developed an entirely unique style of ornament," said David Norris, an architect and fellow preservationist.

Sullivan had been one of the bright, young architects attracted to the blank canvas the city became following the "Great Chicago Fire" of 1871.

Among his buildings still standing are the Auditorium theater and the Carson Pirie Scott store.

After decades of furious work, Sullivan etched his mark indelibly on Chicago's facade — until Mayor Richard J. Daley came along.

In the 1950s, Daley, less interested in the aesthetics of art than the economics of growth, took

the wrecking ball to many of Chicago's historic buildings. Daley's action fueled the city's growth, but artists were appalled.

"In 100 years the only thing people will remember about Mayor Daley ... is that he allowed those buildings to be torn down," Norris said.

Nickel first became interested in Sullivan's work as a photography student at the Illinois Institute of Technology, where he dedicated his thesis to photographing Sullivan's work.

When he found out Sullivan's Reuben Rubel residence was about to be razed in 1958, he broke in and took as many of Sullivan's ornaments as he could, Norris said.

Nickel, Norris, Vinci and other preservationists felt justified in the thefts.

"We were taking it in trust, until the rest of the world woke up," Norris said, surrounded by rescued Sullivan ornaments in the Graham Foundation's sculpture garden.

"What happened to Mr. Madigan was that the heart muscle couldn't pump the blood where it had to go" because of the fluid buildup, said Woodruff.

Doctors drained 1,300 cubic centimeters (about 1 1/2 quarts) of fluid from within the membrane and left a small hole in the lining to allow fluid to drain in the future. That apparently solved the heart problem, doctors said.

Evaluation of the fluid and video thoracoscopy led to discovery and examination of the cancerous lump "the size of a small plum," Madigan surgeon Dr. Harry Wellons said Monday.

"The good thing is, the tumor

concerns they may be having with city government.

Melton, who revived the lost art of public forums in city government, said he hosted the original meeting after walking his ward was stretching him too thin.

"I usually walked the ward to get people's opinion and I just got to the point I couldn't make it to all the houses," he said. "I felt that if someone saw me stop at their neighbor's house and I didn't (stop at) their's, they'd feel slighted."

The forums also allow residents to set the evening's agenda, he said.

"I think this is a chance for everyone to get together to air out their complaints and opinions — to give the people a voice. A lot of time after the election the people never see their representative again," Melton said.

Prather said he and Melton

have been trying to organize the forum for some time.

"We just wanted to have it in case anyone had anything they want to discuss," Prather said.

Neither Prather nor Melton sees their party differences as a roadblock to effective joint communications with the ward.

"We get along good," Prather said. "We don't think about that (difference), we just seek to represent people the best we can."

Melton said he even sees their different party views benefiting the forum.

"I think it's good so there isn't one party dominating the event," he said. "We can sit down and try to do our best for the ward."

The hot topic the aldermen are expecting to hear about? Privatization of sewer maintenance, Melton said.

"Among the big, hot items people have, there are a lot of little things, the sidewalk breaking up in front of someone's house, clogged ditches. They might not seem important to everyone, but to that person it is. There's no problem too small," he said.

Judge rejects Rostenkowski claim against prosecution

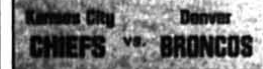

Farm chemicals taint Illinois water supplies

Millions of Americans swallow unhealthy doses of five widely used farm pesticides in their drinking water, says a study today by an environmental group that wants stricter regulations.

The Environmental Working Group says more than 3.5 million people in 121 Midwestern towns and cities face an elevated risk of cancer as a result. In all, 14.1 million Americans routinely consume the weedkillers atrazine, cyanazine, alachlor, metolachlor and simazine, the study said.

White Hall, Ill., 47 miles southwest of Springfield, had the most contaminated water of any of the cities and towns stud-

ied. Among 98 towns of under 25,000 people, Sorento, Ill., 55 miles south of Springfield, had the best water, but it was still worse than the group said should be allowed.

Springfield, Ill., had the most contaminated water of the 23 cities of more than 25,000 people studied.

Springfield water contained so much atrazine earlier this year that it almost forced the city to stop construction of new water mains, said City Water, Light and Power water manager Tom Skelly. Another high quarterly reading still could force that move, he said.

Atrazine, a comparatively low-cost herbicide that controls broadleaf weeds, is suspected of

causing cancer if people are exposed to enough of it for prolonged periods.

George Rolofson, spokesman for Ciba-Geigy Co., the makers of atrazine, said he hadn't seen the report but questioned the group's use of the narrowest risk standard.

"I think they're misusing it here," he said. "We think this misrepresents the whole process" of setting safe levels.

The Environmental Working Group, a private, Washington-based organization concerned with environmentally sound farming practices, focused its study on the Corn Belt states because the pesticides they looked at are commonly used on corn and soybeans.

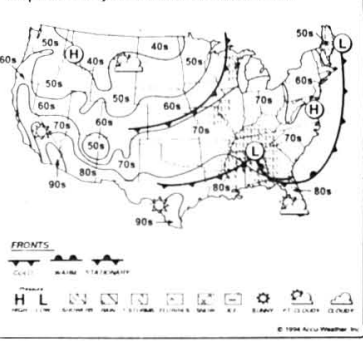

Proceeds from the harvest go to the International Disaster Emergency Services agency from Kempton, Ind., which distributes the funds to relief needs throughout the world.

In the first 10 years, more than \$321,207 has been raised.

No funds are retained by the local church.

Richard Sprague of IDES will be present at the Sunday morning services of Lincoln Christian Church to receive a check representing the "bounty" of the '94 Harvest.

Snyder anticipates some of this year's proceeds will be used specifically for relief of needs in Africa.

She said a common perception is that the now-annual "harvest" is basically a craft sale, "but that's only one aspect of it," she said.

The "harvest" the last several years also included proceeds from the sale of potatoes delivered from South Dakota, home state for the church's head ministry couple, Tom and Karen

Gerds.

This year, too, the harvest again will include proceeds from sales of a cookbook, "A Harvest of Recipes."

Cat posts record revenues

PEORIA — Caterpillar Inc. said today its third-quarter earnings fell 44 percent from the same period a year ago, when profits were inflated by a tax adjustment.

Excluding that special item, Caterpillar's earnings more than doubled, reflecting strong sales. Peoria-based Caterpillar, the world's largest maker of earth-moving equipment, reported net income of \$244 million, or \$1.20 per share, for the three months ending Sept. 30, compared with \$432 million, or \$2.13 per share, for the same 1993 quarter.

Revenues jumped 23 percent to \$3.5 billion from \$2.8 billion, a third-quarter record, despite a four-month strike by the United Auto Workers.

Excluding the non-recurring positive tax adjustment of \$336 million, earnings for the 1993 third quarter would have been

\$96 million, or 48 cents per share.

The strike by the UAW had "virtually no impact" on results, said Caterpillar Chairman Donald V. Fites.

"We encourage employees to exercise their right to return to work," Fites said. "However, the company's performance worldwide proves we can operate successfully during a prolonged strike — and we can continue to do so indefinitely, if necessary."

The most recent strike by UAW members, who had been working under terms of a company-imposed contract, started in late June. It expanded to include Caterpillar plants in Illinois, York, Pa. and Denver affecting 13,300 workers. The company has operated since then with management, salaried workers, new hires and picket-line crossers.

Caterpillar says about 4,000

UAW members have crossed the picket line and 1,200 new employees have been hired. In addition, about 5,000 white-collar workers are working in the factories.

Money saved by not paying strikers' salaries and benefits has largely been eaten up by added overtime and hiring some workers on contract, Caterpillar's chief financial officer, James Owens, said in a news conference.

"1994 should be a record sales and profit year for Cat," he added.

For the first nine months of the year, earnings were \$676 million, or \$3.32 a share, on revenue of \$10.4 billion, compared with earnings of \$533 million, or \$2.64 a share, on revenue of \$8.4 billion for the first nine months of 1993.

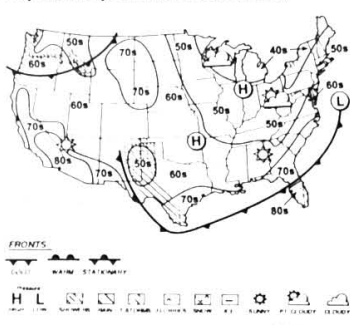

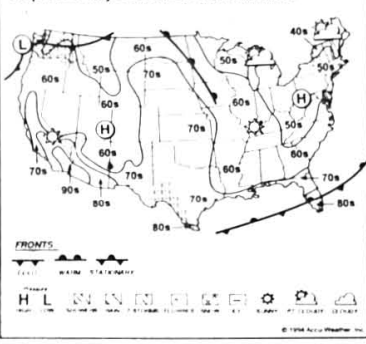

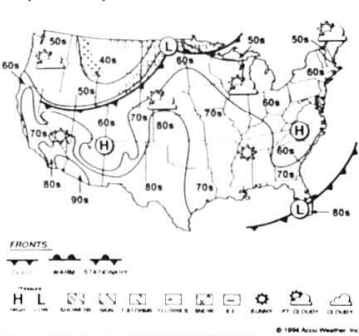

Man who kicked pregnant woman sentenced

A Lincoln man who pleaded guilty to kicking a pregnant woman in the head has received a 3½-year prison sentence for the aggravated battery charge.

Denton Wilson, 32, was sentenced Tuesday for the Class III felony, which could have carried a maximum sentence of five years in the Illinois Department of Corrections.

Wilson originally said the incident was an accident and he

had just been "goofing off" by showing the Lincoln woman some Taekwondo kicks.

The two were outside their residence at 918 Woodlawn Road, formerly the Lincoln Motel, cleaning out a car when the woman had turned toward Wilson, stepping into his kick, he testified.

But Tuesday in court Wilson accepted the plea agreement offered by the state's attorney's office charging him with one count of aggravated battery and

dismissing a domestic battery charge that stemmed from the Aug. 15 incident.

The victim, who testified to a similar story during the September hearing, told a police officer the day of the battery that the defendant had pushed her to the ground and then kicked her in the face.

Wilson, who has been held in the Logan County jail since his arrest, is credited with 209 days already served.

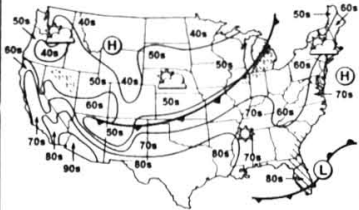
