Board of Trade

CHICAGO (AP) — Grain and soybean futures prices were steady to higher in early trading today on the Chicago Board of Trade, reflecting strong export demand for U.S. corn and harvest delays in the Midwest.
The slight early gains erased a fraction of Monday's steep losses in the wheat and soybean pits. Wheat futures hit a six-week low Monday as speculators bailed out of the sinking market.
Corn futures were supported by a weekly government report on export inspections that inferred consistent overseas demand for U.S. corn.
Heavy rain moving eastward through the Midwest hampered harvest activity Monday in Illinois and Indiana.
The Agriculture Department reported after the close of trading Monday that corn harvesting was 70 percent complete and soybean harvesting 83 percent complete as of Sunday.
The USDA also reported slight improvement in the U.S. winter wheat crop.
In early trading, wheat for December delivery was up 1 1/4 cents at \$3.05 1/4 a bushel. December corn was unchanged at \$2.15 1/4 a bushel; December oats were up 1/4 cent at

\$1.26 a bushel; November soybeans were 1/4 cent higher at \$5.43 a bushel.

Livestock and meat futures were moderately lower in early trading on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.
December live cattle were 0.05 cent lower at 89.95 cents a pound; November feeder cattle were 0.40 cent lower at 78.40 cents a pound; December live hogs were down 0.40 cent at 34.87 cents a pound; February frozen pork bellies were 0.42 cent lower at 42.45 cents a pound.
Cattle and pork belly futures rose Monday; hog futures fell.

Wall Street at noon

NEW YORK — Stocks were lumbering with bonds at midday following the release of data showing strength in the economy.
At noon on Wall Street, the Dow Jones Industrial average was down 31.63 points at 3,878.49.
Volume on the floor of the New York Stock Exchange was 146.87 million shares, compared with 146.89 million at the same time in the previous session.
Declining shares outnumbered advances about 3 to 1 on the NYSE, with 521 up, 1,477 down and 719 unchanged.
The NYSE composite index was down 1.81 at 258.88. On the American Stock Exchange, the market value index was down 2.75 at 455.82, while the Nasdaq composite index was down 5.02 to 772.47.
The National Association of Purchasing Management released better-than-expected data on business conditions nationwide.
Its October index was 59.7 percent, higher than the 58.1 percent private economists had expected and above September's 58.2 percent. A reading below 50 percent indicates the manufacturing economy is expanding.
Further worrying investors, the price component of the report showed a significant rise.



Police in Carbondale want photos of party

CARBONDALE — Several media organizations are being asked to give police copies of all photos and videotape of an annual Halloween street party that got rowdy when two cars were turned over.

The subpoenas come as authorities try to determine who is to blame for a melee that began at 11 p.m. on Oct. 29, when hundreds rampaged and forced police to use Mace and night sticks. The subpoenas ask for all materials from the evenings of Oct. 28 and Oct. 29 and early Oct. 30.

Subpoenas were delivered to The Southern Illinoisan and Daily Egyptian newspapers and WSIL-TV, WPSD-TV, WSIU-TV and KFVS-TV. The deadline to comply was 1 p.m. today.

The Southern Illinoisan turned over color photos. KFVS-TV and WPSD-TV turned in copies of aired footage. WSIL-TV gave copies of both aired and raw tape.

Police Sgt. Paul Echols said it was his understanding Southern Illinois University, which owns the Daily Egyptian and WSIU-TV, would ask for a week's extension before deciding whether to comply. Echols said police had no objection. A telephone call to Lee Ellen Starkweather, SIUC legal counsel, was not returned today.

"Our position on it is that everything we turned over was a matter of public record and any viewer could've seen it off our air," said Mike Beecher, news director of Cape Girardeau, Mo.-based KFVS-TV.

"To be honest with you, part of the reason we chose to go ahead and give them what they had asked for was that we didn't have any video of the incident," WSIL-TV news director Don Brown said. "So, it didn't make any difference to us."

Carbondale's Halloween party began in the 1970s as a primarily family affair. The event turned into a violent drunkfest in the late 1980s, and city officials have been trying to tame or eliminate it.

"Editorially, we supported the efforts of the city to keep the peace that weekend," Richard Johnston, publisher of The Southern Illinoisan, said. "We felt it was only consistent we be cooperative in their investigative work."

Walter Jaehnic, SIUC journalism school director and the Daily Egyptian's fiscal officer, said he wanted the paper to fight the subpoena.

"The Daily Egyptian is a teaching newspaper, and I think that the lessons we're teaching the students there are important. I think one of them should be that a newspaper covers news, it doesn't participate in the law enforcement or prosecution process," Jaehnic said.

Handing over film also could endanger reporters and photographers on future assignments because "there will be a sense on the street that the materials being accumulated will be passed on to the police," he said.

Lee O'Brien, SIUC broadcasting service director, said he had mixed emotions about the subpoena.

"From the point of view of being a university service, I can recognize how the university certainly wants to cooperate in every way possible because the entire event is giving the university a black eye," O'Brien said.

"On the other hand, I can also recognize the journalistic issues involved There are some First Amendment issues that are of legitimate concern to journalists."

Don Craven, an attorney representing the Illinois Press Association, called the subpoena "outrageous."

"They're saying let us look, and we'll tell you what we want," Craven said. "It's just an absolute invasion of the news-gathering process."

Telephone messages for Jackson County State's Attorney Mike Wepsiec and Assistant State's Attorney Mark Hamrock were not returned Tuesday.

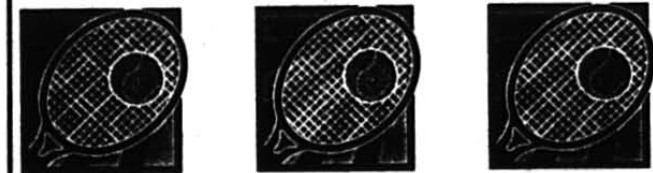

Walgreen recalling pesticides

DEERFIELD — Walgreen Co. announced a nationwide recall of its Walgreens-brand Ant and Roach Killer in 15-ounce black aerosol cans Saturday because of a potentially dangerous problem with the can.

An employee at a Walgreens store in Chicago suffered a cut on the forehead that required stitches when the top of the can blew off, company spokesman Michael Polzin said.

Customers who bought Walgreens-brand Ant & Roach Killer in a 15-ounce black can between May 15 and Nov. 12 should call 800-455-4002 to arrange to have the product picked up.

"We don't want customers handling the product in any manner," Polzin said. "There is a potential for danger."

The product was made last April by Hysan Corp. of Blue Island, Ill., and has been in distribution in Walgreens stores nationwide since May. The problem was not discovered until Nov. 2, when a can burst inside a Chicago store.

Then, when an employee was injured on Nov. 8, the Deerfield-based company decided on the recall, Polzin said.

"We believe the problem is that there's too much moisture inside the can," which causes it to secede slowly, he said.

Board of Trade

Chicago Board of Trade as investors began to worry recent gains were overdone. Grains futures were mostly lower.

Soybeans futures have moved sharply higher amid strong overseas demand for vegetable oil. Investors said an uncertain tone this morning in the soybean oil pits despite continued strong demand was having mixed effects in neighboring pits.

Corn futures rose in nearby contracts on strong export prospects but were lower elsewhere because of this year's record harvest.

Wheat futures extended Tuesday's losses amid technical selling and disappointment over the stack export lineup.

Wheat for December delivery fell 3 3/4 cents to \$3.74 1/2 a bushel; December corn rose 1/4 cent to \$2.17 a bushel; December oats fell 1/2 cent to \$1.24 1/4 a bushel; November soybeans rose 1/4 cent to \$5.60 1/2 a bushel.

Beef futures prices were mixed and pork futures prices were lower in early trading on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

December cattle fell .02 cent to 70.25 cents a pound; November feeder cattle was unchanged at 74.50 cents a pound; December live hogs were .55 cent lower at 32.92 cents a pound; February frozen pork bellies fell .95 cent to 39.85 cents a pound.

Wall Street at noon

NEW YORK (AP) — Stocks were narrowly mixed at midday, even as bond prices remained weaker.

At noon on Wall Street, the Dow Jones industrial average was up 8.08 at 3,834.44, after dipping briefly into negative territory.

Declining issues overtook advancers about 10 to 9 on the New York Stock Exchange, where volume totaled 140.44 million shares, down from 150.88 million on Tuesday.

Broad-market indexes were mixed. The NYSE composite index was up 0.01 at 254.53. But the American Stock Exchange's market value index was down 0.40 at 448.21, and the Nasdaq composite was down 0.38 at 768.64.

Bonds were slightly firmer earlier in the morning but then weakened. The 30-year bond was down about 3/4 point, yielding 8.06 percent.

The market was settling down after swinging wildly on Tuesday, following an increase in interest rates by the Federal Reserve.

But investors were still responding to the negative effects of higher interest rates, which can lure investors away from stocks and into the fixed-income market, and raise corporate costs and cut into earnings.

Dudley Eppel, a stock trader at Donaldson, Lufkin & Jenrette Securities, said he wasn't sure the reaction to the Fed's tightening was over, especially since the 0.75-percentage-point increase was more than investors expected.

"I can't tell you whether the disappointment's over, because I haven't seen any major institutional reaction yet. I haven't seen a lot of selling," Eppel said.

Added James Schroeder, market analyst at MMS International in Chicago, "The markets are uncertain as to what exactly is the next step. You've got generally what could have been considered an aggressive inflation-fighting move (by the Fed) yesterday, a decent consumer-price index report this morning, and yet we've seen the bond market continue to tumble."

Bonds initially rose after the Labor Department reported that consumer prices rose a tiny 0.1 percent in October, and that the so-called "core" rate of consumer inflation, minus volatile food and energy costs, rose 0.2 percent.

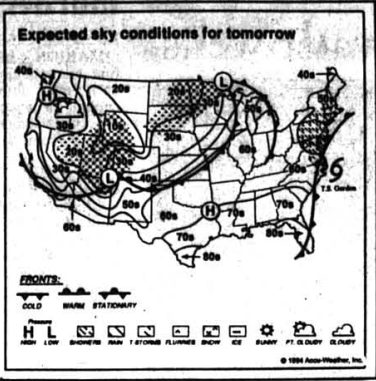

 Soybeans rose in line with stronger soybean oil and Malaysian palm oil prices. Soybean oil competes on the world market with palm oil, which is in short supply.
 Stronger export demand lifted corn futures. Wheat advanced on ideas the market's recent losses were overdue. Near-term wheat deliveries had fallen 8 1/2 cents a bushel Monday through Wednesday.
 In early trading, December wheat rose 1 1/4

cents to \$3.75 1/4 a bushel; December corn rose 1/2 cent to \$2.17 1/4 a bushel; December oats were unchanged at \$1.23 1/4 a bushel. November soybeans were 1/4 cent higher at \$8.59 1/4 a bushel.

Livestock and meat futures were mixed in early trading on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange as the markets recovered from Wednesday's broad decline, which included sharp losses in hog futures.

Live cattle for December delivery was down 0.02 cent at 68.85 cents a pound; November feeder cattle were 0.15 cent higher at 74.60 cents a pound; December live hogs were up 0.23 cent at 32.25 cents a pound; February frozen pork bellies were 0.20 cent lower at 38.60 cents a pound.

Rostenkowski may be pinched to pay lawyers

WASHINGTON — The challenge for Jim Healey comes after Jan. 3, when the new members of Congress take the oath of office and Dan Rostenkowski leaves the House.

Healey is the former Rostenkowski aide and Washington lobbyist who's raising money for the Chicago Democrat's legal expenses as he battles political corruption charges.

"One thing is for sure: he's going to have large legal bills and they're not going to go away," Healey said.

But will donors dry up now that a political newcomer, Republican Michael Patrick Flanagan, unseated Rostenkowski?

"Obviously, let's not kid ourselves. We did have ... a significant amount of PAC (political action committee) contributions," Healey said.

"I would think with PAC funds limited and with a whole new batch of congressmen, those PAC committees and boards are

going to have to make some serious decisions as to where they go. It's one thing contributing to a standing member of Congress. It's another thing contributing to someone who's no longer in."

Rostenkowski was still chairman of the tax-writing Ways and Means Committee when the fund was established in the summer of 1993, amid a federal probe of his office and campaign finances.

He stepped aside temporarily as chairman after his May indictment on political corruption charges but remained influential on Capitol Hill.

Days after the indictment, the fund made its first and, so far,

only public disclosure: it took in more than \$750,000 in 1993 from lobbyists, corporate power brokers and political allies.

Rostenkowski already has spent about \$1.2 million in campaign funds since the federal investigation began more than two years ago. He has used the money for legal bills for him and his associates, staff members and political committees.

The campaign account had \$387,574 through Oct. 19.

Rostenkowski is not required to report spending by the separate legal defense fund. But the money is going only for legal expenses for Rostenkowski and his family, Healey said. Donors

can give up to \$5,000 per year to the fund.

House rules will no longer govern the fund once Rostenkowski leaves office. He must file a final report within 30 days after that showing personal financial information and contributions to the fund of \$250 or more.

Individuals and organizations would not have the \$5,000 limit on contributions; there is tax liability on gifts of more than \$10,000, and "I frankly don't think we're going to get many of those," Healey said.

He estimated the fund had raised close to \$1.4 million, as of about a month ago.

"I think we're trying to stay one step ahead of the bills," Healey said. "We're not trying to raise zillions of dollars. We're trying to raise enough money to pay the legal bills when they're due."

The fund received some un solicited contributions after Rostenkowski's election defeat Nov. 8.

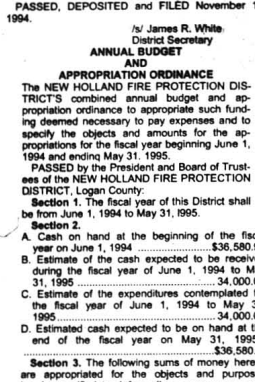

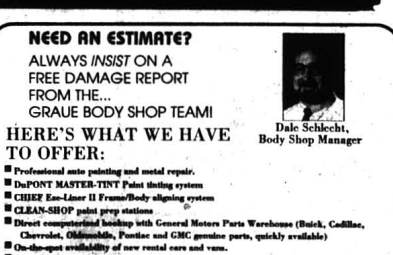
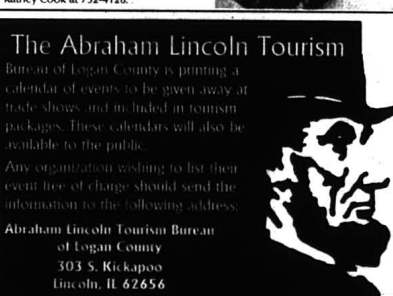

CHICAGO (AP) — Wheat, corn and oil futures prices were slightly lower in early trading today on the Chicago Board of Trade, extending the previous day's decline amid a lack of fresh export demand news.
Soybean futures steadied after Monday's steep drop, reflecting signs that world demand for soybean oil remains strong.
The Census Bureau reported a record-high monthly U.S. soybean crush of 118.6 million bushels in October. Soybeans are crushed to obtain oil and soybean meal, which is used mainly as livestock feed.
Soybean oil futures reached a five-month high last week due to stronger Chinese de-

mand and relatively tight supplies of Malaysian palm oil, which competes with soybean oil on the world market.
In early trading, wheat for December delivery was 1/4 cent lower at \$3.72 1/4 a bushel; December corn was 1/4 cent lower at \$2.16 a bushel; December oats were 1 cent lower at \$1.17 1/4 a bushel; January soybeans were 1/4 cent lower at \$5.63 1/4 a bushel.
Livestock and meat futures fell in early trading on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange, led by a sharp drop in hog futures as cash hog prices hit fresh 20-year lows. Hog futures are trading near 14-year lows.

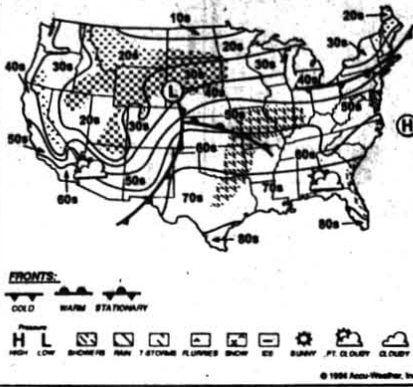

Soybean oil prices surged in the opening minutes of trading on gains in palm oil and other competing vegetable oils. Wheat and corn futures prices gained on news of unexpected export sales. Wheat for December delivery rose 1 1/2 cents to \$3.65 1/4 a bushel; December rose 1 1/4 cent to \$2.13 a bushel; December oats rose 1 cent to \$1.13 a bushel. January soybeans rose 3 1/2 cents a bushel to \$5.68 1/4 a bushel.

Beef futures prices were mixed, hog prices were mostly lower and frozen pork bellies were higher in early trading on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

December cattle was unchanged at 68.25 cents a pound; January fell .15 cent to 73.15 cents a pound; December hogs rose 27 cent to 31.92 cents a pound; February rose .50 cent to 36.15 cents a pound.

Wall Street at noon

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market continued higher at midday as investors took a pause from the heavy selling that dominated the week. At noon on Wall Street, the Dow Jones industrial average was up 36.33 to 3,710.96. Volume on the floor of the New York Stock Exchange at noon was 82.19 million shares.

Advancing issues outnumbered decliners by a ratio of 13 to 5, with 1,396 issues up, 537 down and 713 unchanged.

The NYSE composite index was up 1.54 at 247.72. On the American Stock Exchange, the market value index was up 1.42 at 433.82, while the Nasdaq composite index was up 4.27 at 740.97.

Trading activity was subdued following the Thanksgiving Day break. Analysts said prices were up on follow-through buying from Wednesday's close. But they said that the trend was exaggerated because there were so few buyers in the market and no news to influence trading.

Today's session will close at 1 p.m. EST. On Tuesday, computer-guided program

selling led stocks lower as fears swept the market about higher interest rates and their potential impact on the economy, corporate earnings and the desirability of stocks.

The Dow average plunged 91.52 points to 3,677.99, its biggest one-day loss since Feb. 4, the day the Federal Reserve enacted the first of six interest-rate tightenings this year. Prices steadied on Wednesday.

Analysts said stock prices will continue to come under selling pressure because investors are still worried about the impact of interest rates on corporate earnings.

"Today is a natural knee-jerk reaction to what happened earlier in the week," said Alfred E. Goldman, vice president at A.G. Edwards & Sons Inc. in St. Louis.

Stocks ended mostly lower abroad. In Tokyo, the Nikkei index slumped 0.2 percent. In

London, the Financial Times-Stock Exchange 100-share index closed 0.2 percent lower, while Frankfurt's DAX index ended 0.1 percent lower. Stocks in Paris rose 0.6 percent.

Among actively traded NYSE stocks, Pfizer was up 1 to 73 1/2. The company agreed to acquire SmithKline Beecham's animal health business for \$1.45 billion. The company is reportedly having problems with its Pentium computer chip. Bankers Trust was up 1/4 to 57 1/2. The firm said settled a lawsuit with Gibson Greeting over derivatives sales.

Meanwhile, TRW was up 1 1/4 to 64 1/2, Wells Fargo rose 1 1/2 to 149 and Genetech was up 1 1/4 to 45.

On the Nasdaq, Intel fell 1 to 64 1/4. The company is reportedly having problems with its key Pentium computer chip. AK Steel Holding Co. rose 1/4 to 27.

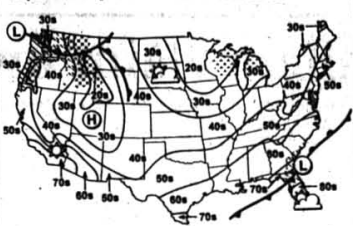

Board of Trade

CHICAGO (AP) — Soybean futures prices retreated in early trading today on the Chicago Board of Trade as the recent rally put farmers in a selling mood. Most wheat, corn and oat futures advanced.

Beneficial rain in soybean-growing areas of Brazil also weighed on prices this morning, analysts said.

Soybean futures reached a 2 1/2-month high Monday as strong world demand for soybean oil prompted processors to boost their bids for beans. The higher prices prompted fresh selling from farmers who had been reluctant to part with their crops.

In early trading wheat for December delivery was up 3/4 cent at \$3.68 1/2 a bushel; December corn was 1/4 cent higher at \$2.12 1/2 a bushel; December oats were 1/4 cent higher at \$1.12 a bushel; January soybeans were down 1 cent at \$5.72 1/2 a bushel.

Cattle futures were mixed in early trading on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. Hog futures slipped to life-of-contract lows as abundant supplies of slaughter-ready animals continued to burden the market.

Live cattle for December delivery were 0.05 cent lower at 67.77 cents a pound; January feeder cattle were 0.05 cent higher at 73.02 cents a pound; December live hogs were 0.12 cent lower at 31.25 cents a pound; February frozen pork bellies were down 0.05 cent at 35.65 cents a pound.

Cattle futures rose Monday; pork futures fell.

Wall Street all Noon

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market was lower at midday as bond prices tumbled following some better-than-expected news on the economy.

At noon on Wall Street, the Dow Jones

industrial average was down 12.11 points at 3,727.45.

Volume on the floor of the New York Stock Exchange was 133.40 million shares, compared with 116.84 million at the same time in the previous session.

Declining shares outnumbered advances 9 to 7 on the NYSE, with 880 up, 1,129 down and 773 unchanged.

The NYSE composite index was down 0.35 at 248.11. On the American Stock Exchange, the market value index was down 1.15 at 432.44, while the Nasdaq composite index was up 1.78 at 747.49.

The Conference Board, said consumer confidence in the economy rose sharply in November to reach a four-year high, with more households optimistic about jobs and income. The business-research group said its Consumer Confidence Index climbed last month to 101.3, up from a revised 89.1 reading in October.

Bond prices tumbled, with the yield on the Treasury's benchmark 30-year bond moving above the key 8 percent level again.

Bond investors don't like word of strong growth because that implies inflation down the road. Inflation erodes the value of fixed-income securities such as Treasuries.

And higher interest rates worry stock investors because they make shares less attractive relative to interest-bearing investments and increase the cost of money to companies.

Stocks tumbled last week, with the Dow losing 137 points as fears swept the market about higher interest rates and their potential impact on the economy, corporate earnings and the desirability of stocks. The Federal Reserve has nudged rates higher six times since February, hoping to slow the economy and forestall inflation.


But consecutive gains on Friday and Monday have added 65 points to the Dow average.

Hours of operation are 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.

The Logan County State's Attorney's office hours are being extended to include the lunch hour to make the department more accessible to the public.

State's Attorney Tim Huyett said the new hours will take effect Monday.

"My intent is to have at least one staff person present from noon to 1 p.m. to answer routine questions and assist with scheduling problems," Huyett said in announcing the move.

Inmate implicated in drug death makes appearance in court here

A former Logan Correctional Center inmate, charged with supplying a fellow inmate with the illegal drugs that killed her, appeared in court Tuesday to face charges.

Glennetta A. Bell, 26, has been charged with two counts of possessing narcotics while in a penal institution.

The drugs were traced to Bell after an autopsy report conducted on inmate Patricia Hill found heroin in her blood stream and traces of cocaine in her nostrils, according to the autopsy conducted by Dr. Joan Barenfanger of Memorial Medical Center in Springfield.

Hill was found dead in her cell bunk Sept. 10, after her brain and nervous system shut down from either inhaling or eating some form of opiate, of which heroin is a form.

Hill, an admitted drug addict, allegedly received an unknown amount of heroin and cocaine Sept. 9 from Bell, according to Dave Brubaker, investigator for the Illinois Department of Corrections.

According to several inmates, Bell allegedly received the illegal drugs Sept. 9 from a visi-

tor, he said.

State's Attorney Tim Huyett said the visitor who supplied Bell has not been identified and Bell is the only one charged with the incident for now.

The preliminary hearing for Bell was set for Dec. 13.

No bail was set for Bell because she has a year remaining in her prison term for aggravated arson. Bell was transferred to Dwight Correctional Center in Dwight after Hill's death.
