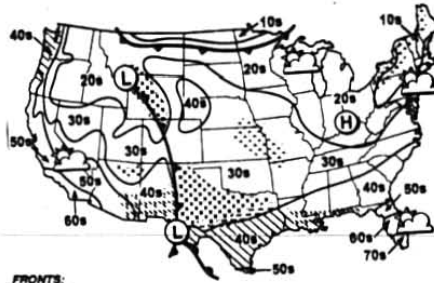

# Firestone canning many striking workers

On picket lines from Decatur to Des Moines to Oklahoma City, Bridgestone-Firestone strikers were more defiant than angry at word that more than half of them will be replaced. "Our people are not mad. They're not sad. They're not even confused," said Tony Carr, vice president at United Rubber Workers Local 998 in Oklahoma City.

"We know this for what it is: the last cry of a failed strategy. The battle is not over," said Carr.

With the work stoppage in its sixth month, tire maker Bridgestone-Firestone announced Wednesday it will replace strikers in Oklahoma, Indiana, Il-

linois and Iowa.

Of the 4,000 workers on strike, more than 2,000 will be replaced. The exact numbers fired at each plant should be known Thursday, said Trevor Hoskins, spokesman for the Japanese-owned company.

"... It is important we return to full production and that we begin our seven-day continuous operation schedule in order to meet the needs of our customers," Hoskins said.

The strike has cost Bridgestone-Firestone \$10 million a month, said Yoichiro Kaizaki, the Tokyo-based president of parent Bridgestone Corp.

Tire plants affected by the strike are in Des Moines, Decatur, Ill., and Oklahoma City. An

air springs plant in Noblesville, Ind., also was struck.

On a frigid Des Moines, Iowa, picket line, striking URW workers warmed themselves around a fire and assured a reporter they couldn't be replaced.

"I don't think they can operate. It's going to take a long time before they can get people in there who are qualified to do that work," said Arlo Richardson, a machinist at the Des Moines plant for 28 years.

Steve Maxwell of Marshalltown, Iowa, who's been a tire layer at Bridgestone for seven years, said the new hires should think before they cross a picket line.

"If they're going to treat us like this, think about how they'll

treat you," he said. "They offered us a package and that's it. It hasn't been a negotiation. It's been a dictation on their part."

Hoskins said negotiations broke down on when Bridgestone-Firestone refused to accept the "pattern" contract reached by URW and Goodyear.

"We have repeatedly told the union that such a contract does not address the needs of Bridgestone-Firestone," he said.

Curt Brown, a spokesman at URW's Akron headquarters, said the company's timing couldn't have been worse.

"We heard about this while our bargaining committee was upstairs trying to figure a way to get things back on track," he said.

# Report shows Illinois' infant mortality rate drops to all-time low

SPRINGFIELD — The state's infant mortality rate dropped to an all-time low of 9.6 deaths for every 1,000 live births in 1993 but rose in Chicago, a report released today showed.

"We are encouraged by the continued improvement in Illinois' infant mortality rate, but

it is not enough," said Dr. John Lumpkin, director of the Illinois Department of Public Health.

"Too many babies are dying before their first birthdays — many because their mothers don't receive the proper prenatal care," he said.

In 1992, the statewide infant mortality rate was 10 for every

1,000 live births, and 1993's 9.6 rate continued a decline over the past several years.

In Chicago, the infant mortality rate rose from the city's record low of 13.3 in 1992 to 13.7 in 1993.

The statewide total of infant deaths in 1993 was 1,838, down from 1,911 in 1992.

The 1993 figures showed 806 deaths in Chicago and 1,032 in the rest of the state. In 1992, Chicago recorded 790 infant deaths, and there were 1,911 infant deaths elsewhere.

Lumpkin attributed the overall state drop to state programs like Healthy Moms-Healthy Kids, an initiative of Gov. Jim Edgar.

dentist and downtown property owner, said he always has tried to keep his buildings' looking attractive, but the grant, he said, will make it possible to make them historically accurate.

"Our buildings are pretty much cosmetically appealing, but this will help get them back to their historical look," he said. "I don't think I would have spent money (for this project) without the grant since the buildings already are functional and look good."

Although willing to get ideas from the project architect, Crisafulli said he is hoping to use the grant money to do window renovations on buildings he owns on Chicago Street. The new windows would replace the current fixtures with longer glass panes, similar to windows that originally graced the buildings.

Approximately 24 building owners, with property holdings of 46 downtown street addresses, have committed to participating in the renovation effort, Hartman said.

All names on the current list will pay 20 percent of the architect's fee even if the building owners decide against going ahead with the suggested renovations, he said.

Guzzardo said the widespread participation will give the downtown business district a cohesive look that he feels will help boost activity in the area.

"I honestly believe that this will help the downtown revival effort by giving a facelift to the building fronts, bringing them back to the looks of the early 19th century," Guzzardo said.

**Caterpillar, union load guns before two sides meet again**

PEORIA — Even before their first meeting, Caterpillar Inc. and the United Auto Workers sound like they are deadlocked. "We will not discuss any 'NLRB complaints,'" said Caterpillar Vice President Wayne Zimmerman.

"We have not and will not relinquish our right to bring to the table any issue that separates us," shot back UAW Secretary-Treasurer Bill Castevens.

The two sides agreed Monday to meet in hopes of beginning negotiations for the first time since June 20, 1994, when the union launched a company-wide strike.

The time and place for the meeting between Zimmerman and Castevens have not been set.

The union has suggested meetings in the past, but only if its complaints to the National Labor Relations Board were the first order of business. Last week, the union changed its stance and offered to discuss "any issue."

"Now that the UAW has re-

moved the obstacle which has prevented any meaningful bargaining since at least June, I will be glad to meet," Zimmerman wrote to the Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service.

"We will not discuss any 'NLRB complaints,'" Zimmerman said. "We will meet and discuss contract issues."

But Castevens, in his letter agreeing to a meeting, warned that he won't let the company tell him what issues can be raised.

The last time the two sides met, their discussion ended quickly as the union tried to discuss labor practices and the company stuck to economic differences.

The strike involves plants employing 13,400 workers in three different states. Caterpillar, the world's top maker of earth-moving equipment, says about 30 percent of those employees have crossed the picket line and gone back to work.

The company also has hired new employees and moved white-collar workers into manufacturing jobs, allowing to keep producing equipment and large profits.

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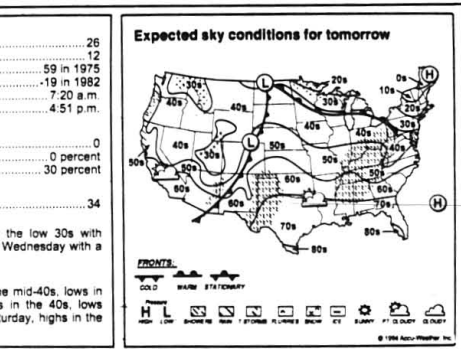

**Board of Trade**  
CHICAGO (AP) — Wheat futures prices rebounded slightly from a three-week low in early trading today on the Chicago Board of Trade. Most other grain and soybean futures edged lower.  
Analysts attributed wheat's bounce to per-

ceptions the market fell too far, too fast in Monday's 11-cent decline. The sell-off Monday was linked to the March contract's inability to reach the psychologically important level of \$4 a bushel.

Forecasters for rain in drought-stricken South Africa weighed on corn futures. Soybean futures were similarly pressured by forecasts for beneficial rain in Brazil and Argentina, the two largest producers after the United States.

In soybean trading, wheat for March delivery was up 1/4 cent at \$3.84 1/4 a bushel. March corn was 1/4 cent lower at \$2.32 1/4 a bushel. March oats were down 1/4 cent at \$1.21 1/4 a bushel. January soybeans slipped 1/4 cent to \$5.48 a bushel.

Cattle futures were narrowly mixed in early trading on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange, reflecting ideas cash cattle prices have peaked after reaching 73 cents a pound Monday.

Hog and pork belly futures rose modestly in line with higher cash hog prices.

Live cattle for February delivery were down 0.02 cent at 73.35 cents a pound, January feeder cattle were 0.02 cent lower at 75.75 cents a pound; February live hogs were 0.25 cent higher at 37.95 cents a pound, February frozen pork bellies were up 0.52 cent at 41.27 cents a pound.

**Air controllers want to toss binoculars**

**CAHOKIA** — Air traffic controllers at a metro-east airport that handles military and corporate jets want their congressman to fulfill a decade-old request: They want radar so planes won't be tracked with binoculars anymore.

"I wouldn't go as far as to say there's a safety hazard right now," air traffic controller Marvin Meng said Monday. "But with this equipment, the margin of safety would be tremendously increased."

Meng also coordinates the St. Louis Downtown-Parks Airport's unit of the National Air

Traffic Controller's Association. Air traffic controllers there keep track of the planes with binoculars and radio instructions to pilots.

The airport, built in the 1920s, has never had a fatal accident. Air traffic controllers have been asking for a radar system and a taller tower for more than a 10 years, Meng said.

U.S. Rep. Jerry Costello, D-Belleville, toured the airport last Monday. Costello, a member of the House public works and transportation committee, promised to try to meet with Federal Aviation Administration of-

ficials as soon as possible.

"My argument is that it's an airport that averages about 500 flights a day and from a safety standpoint, it should not be deferred any longer," Costello said. "I believe they have valid points for both a radar system and a new tower."

On a busy day, about 1,000 aircraft will land at the airport, including Air Force C-9s, which are the equivalent of commercial DC-9 jets. Commercial jets do not use the airport, although private corporate ones do, Meng said.

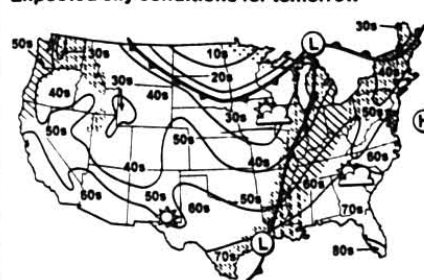

### Beef of Trade

CHICAGO (AP) — Wheat and corn futures prices rose strongly in early trading today on the Chicago Board of Trade after the Agriculture Department reported lower supplies of those grains than traders expected. Soybean futures fell slightly.

In a report released before the markets opened, the USDA pegged Dec. 1 U.S. wheat stocks at 1.5 billion bushels and corn stocks at 8.1 billion. Both numbers were below trade expectations.

The agency's estimate of winter wheat seedings — 49.6 million acres — also fell short of trade expectations, as did its forecast for May 31 U.S. wheat stocks of 466 million bushels.

"Wheat seedings below 50 (million acres) was just shocking," said David Armstrong, grain analyst at Chicago Corp.

The USDA's final tally of 1994 U.S. corn production was a record-high 10.1 billion bushels, 60 percent larger than the flood-damaged 1993 crop but still slightly below trade expectations.

Last year's soybean production totaled a record 2.56 billion bushels, which was slightly above trade expectations and 37 percent higher than 1993 production.

The USDA estimated Dec. 1 U.S. soybean stocks at 2.1 billion bushels, which was slightly lower than expected.

In early trading, wheat for March delivery was 4 cents higher at \$3.89 1/4 a bushel. March corn was up 3 1/4 cents at \$2.36 a bushel. March oats were 1/2 cent higher at \$1.23 1/4 a bushel. January soybeans were 1 1/4 cents lower at \$5.49 1/4 a bushel.

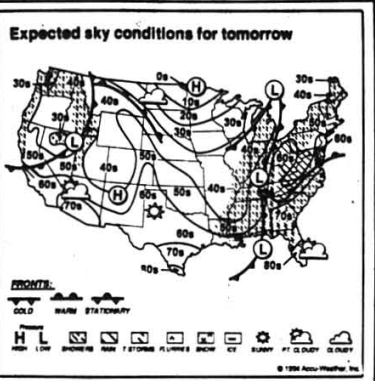

fort," he said. "There are ways of working it out."

Minimal administrative funding also would be generated by establishing a licensing fee for all trucks that haul waste material. But this annual fee, which has been limited to a maximum of \$50 a year per vehicle, would only generate a minimum of the funding needed, he said.

Other options May suggested to the finance committee included having municipalities impose a tax levy, establishing bond agreements — which would allow municipalities to enter contract agreements for having minimal waste facilities operating near the community — and tapping into the county's already stretched general fund.

The county board will vote Tuesday whether to adopt the proposed waste management plan that was devised in the second phase of the five-county consortium's work.

A decision on whether to join the consortium itself is not necessarily needed Tuesday night, according to Walter Willis, senior planner for Patrick Engineering Inc. of Springfield.

But if the board decides to join the five-county effort, Logan County would be responsible for a third of the \$81,000 annual operating costs — estimated at \$25,000 if all five counties decide to participate.

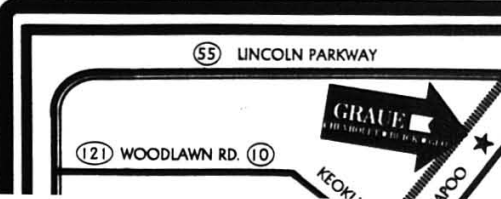

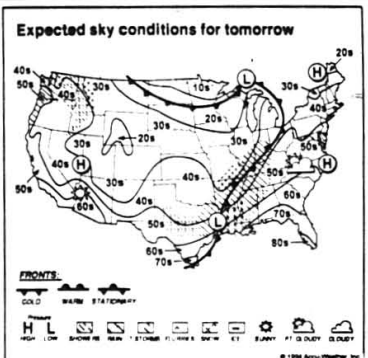

**Kmart removes chairman in shuffle**

TROY, Mich. — Joseph Antonini was removed today as chairman of Kmart Corp. but will remain as president and chief executive officer of the troubled retailer.

The company said its board had named Donald Perkins chairman. He is a former chairman and CEO of Jewel Cos. and has been on Kmart's board since 1986.

Jewel Companies Inc. was acquired in 1984 by American Stores Co. of Salt Lake City. Perkins was no longer with the company at that time.

The Jewel Food Stores division of American Stores remains headquartered in Melrose Park, Ill.

Kmart spokeswoman Teri Kula declined to comment on the reasons for the move, but insisted it was not a reflection on Antonini's performance.

"This is a reinforcement of the board's confidence in Joseph Antonini and his ability to move this company ahead and improve shareholder value," she said.

However, it has been widely speculated for some time that the Kmart board would be forced to replace Antonini. He

Kmart spokeswoman Teri Kula declined to comment on the reasons for the move, but insisted it was not a reflection on Antonini's performance.

has been sharply criticized by stockholders in recent years because of Kmart's slow response to competition from Wal-Mart, Target and other retailers.

Wall Street appeared unimpressed by the move. Kmart's stock was up 50 cents to \$13.75 a share on the New York Stock Exchange after the announcement.

Since 1990 the company has been undergoing a major restructuring to reduce costs and make its core discount operations more competitive.

Antonini and Perkins

scheduled a 2 p.m. EST news conference at the company's Troy headquarters.

Kmart is the nation's second-largest retailer, behind Arkansas-based Wal-Mart Stores Inc.

In September the company announced plans to close 11,000 stores and eliminate 6,000 jobs in response to its continued poor performance. Two months later, the company said additional store closures were planned.

To raise cash to modernize its aging stores and retire some of its debt, Kmart last year sold its share in Australian retailer Coles-Myer Ltd. and sold majority stakes in its Sports Authority and OfficeMax divisions. A public offering of its bookstore chain, Borders-Waldenbooks, is planned for the spring.

For the nine months ended Oct. 6, Kmart earned \$151 million, or 32 cents a share, compared with \$219 million, or 47 cents a share, for the same period of 1993. Sales were \$25.43 billion, up from \$23.89 billion in the year-ago period.

Fourth-quarter earnings are expected to be announced next month.

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# Walter Wilmert, key figure in local lodges, dies

Lincoln resident Walter G. Wilmert, a dedicated worker for several fraternal organizations, died at 12:01 a.m. today, Friday, Jan. 20, 1995, at Abraham Lincoln Memorial Hospital.

Wilmert, 82, was a retired automobile body repairman and painter. He was an aviation promoter who also was long active in the local Eagles, Moose and Odd Fellows organizations and St. John United Church of Christ.

He was state Eagles president in 1973-74 and regional Eagles president in 1974-75.

Mr. Wilmert was a member of Fraternal Order of Eagles Lodge No. 2708 since 1948 and twice served as lodge president. He was secretary of the lodge more than 30 years and once was a district director. He was Eagles District Six secretary five years.

He also was regional director of the Golden Eagle Fund two years, deputy to the Grand Worthy President of the Eagles for 10 years, and since 1984 was secretary-treasurer of the Illinois

Eagles Education Fund.

He was the Lincoln Courier Citizen of the Month in October 1977.

From 1952 until his retirement in 1979, Mr. Wilmert operated "Walt's Body Shop" on Clinton Street.

Prior to that, he specialized in auto body repairing, painting and wheel and frame alignment for 18 years at Sheer's Repair Shop, Mel Wiggers' Pontiac and at McMullen Motors.

Mr. Wilmert helped organize the "Flying Five" Club at the Bock air strip west of Lincoln and was one of the first to receive his private pilot license at the airfield in April 1946, after which he flew a Lincoln car dealer to Detroit to pick up some new cars after World War II.

He was baptized and confirmed a member at St. John United Church of Christ, where he was a member of the Church Council and past president of the Church Brotherhood.

Mr. Wilmert was a life mem-

ber of local Moose Lodge No. 1441, was a past Noble Grand and secretary of Odd Fellows Lodge 204, and a member of the American Association of Retired Persons.

He also had been a member of the Logan County Farm Bureau since 1954.

Mr. Wilmert was born March 23, 1912, in Lincoln, a son of Henry and Martha Gimbel Wilmert. He married Rosemary Leith on May 23, 1966, in Lincoln. She died June 24, 1990.

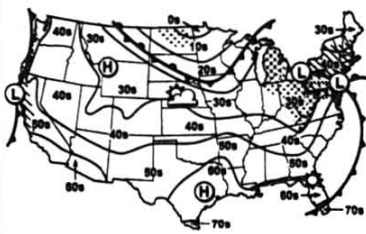

**Injured violinist files law suit against commuter rail system**

CHICAGO — A 20-year-old award-winning concert violinist sued the city's commuter rail system Friday, contending it is responsible for her losing a leg when a train door closed on her instrument case and dragged her under the wheels.

Rachel Barton was dragged 200 feet Monday morning in the accident on a Metra train pulling out of the station in north suburban Winnetka, where she taught violin.

"We have reason to believe the conductor allowed this train to depart before it was safe to do so," said attorney Robert A. Clifford.

Metra spokesman Chris Knapton would not comment on the lawsuit, but had said earlier that a preliminary investigation indicated that Barton made a dash to get out of the door as it was closing, causing the accident.

Clifford sued in Circuit Court and also asked Judge Michael

Hogan to impound the rail car to preserve evidence of the door's operation.

Barton's left leg was amputated at the knee and her right leg suffered severe tissue, bone and muscle damage, doctors said.

She was in serious condition at Evanston Hospital.

Barton is a concertmaster of the Civic Orchestra of Chicago, and had played with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra and the Lyric Opera orchestra. She was the first American winner of Germany's J.S. Bach violin competition.

**State brings out big guns for birds**

SPRINGFIELD — State officials have decided that intermittent cannon fire around the Capitol is preferable to the pigeons and starlings that have been flocking there for years.

Six propane cannons, which can be as loud as a jet engine, use blasts of sound to scare away the birds. They are being fired at varying intervals during the afternoons and evenings.

The state finally appears to be winning its war on the birds.

"We've seen about a 30 percent reduction in bird waste," said Mike Murphy, a spokesman for the secretary of state's office.

Bird droppings not only stain the 107-year-old building's limestone but also pose a health risk.

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# Baby Richard's father delivers new appeal

SPRINGFIELD — Baby Richard's biological father asked the Illinois Supreme Court today for the second time to grant him custody of his 3½-year-old son, taking him from the adoptive couple who have raised him nearly since birth.

The Supreme Court invalidated the adoption by the suburban Chicago couple last summer in a ruling that caused a public uproar. Gov. Jim Edgar characterized the justices as smug and arrogant, and the Legislature passed a law to allow the courts to consider a child's best interests when an adoption fails.

Today, the attorney for Otakar Kirchner, the biological father, argued that the adoptive parents have no standing in the case and the new law shouldn't apply.

"A whole purpose of what we are here for is, we are trying to put to rest a very, very troubled

case," said Loren Heinemann, Kirchner's attorney.

Justice John L. Nickels asked Heinemann whether the court should discount the time the youngster has spent with his adoptive parents, identified only as John and Jane Doe.

"The cold, hard facts on the other side of the coin, this is not by any fault of Mr. Kirchner," Heinemann said.

Gerald S. Solovy, the attorney for the Does, argued that custody is not automatic just because Kirchner is the biological father — it needs to be determined at a full hearing to consider how it will affect the boy. He said the Supreme Court would have to act as a "biblical Solomon" and the test must be what is in the best interest of the child.

Kirchner sat at his lawyer's desk during the arguments; the Does sat in the audience, hold-

ing hands.

Patrick Murphy, an attorney who represented Baby Richard, argued that his adoptive parents do have standing in determining where he should live.

"Who was he bonding to? Who took him to see Santa Claus?" Murphy said.

But he was interrupted by Chief Michael A. Bilandic, who said "The biological father ... came into the adoption process very early. If the child was returned to him then and there we would have never heard of this case."

Heinemann said that Kirchner prefers a gradual transition from the Does, not a sudden removal from the home as in the celebrated Baby Jessica case in Michigan.

Kirchner has never held, never seen, never talked to, never even seen a picture of his son.

Richard was put up for adop-


tion by his mother, Daniela Janikova, who believed Kirchner had abandoned her.

Kirchner was in his native Czechoslovakia at the time of Richard's birth and when he returned to this country was led to believe the boy had died. The couple have since married.

In last summer's decision, written by Justice James D. Heiple, the court said Kirchner, who never signed off on the adoption, was denied his rights because he believed the child was dead.

Heiple said Richard, who has lived with his adoptive parents since he was 4 days old, must be given to Kirchner.

The judge said the boy will get over any feeling of loss for the adults he has known as mom and dad.

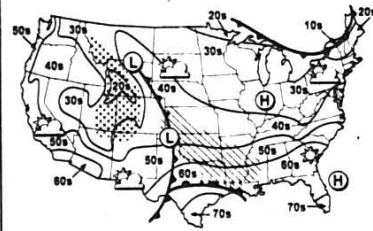

LOS ANGELES — There were a lot of surprises in the opening statement by O.J. Simpson's attorney. Just ask the prosecution.

Deputy District Attorney William Hodgman was outraged Wednesday when Johnnie Cochran Jr., while claiming that prosecutors ignored evidence in their rush to incriminate Simpson, mentioned witnesses and evidence to the jury without giving proper warning to prosecutors.

Hodgman repeatedly objected during Cochran's opening statement. Then he accused defense attorneys of suddenly unloading the information — some of which was gathered in June — in a last-minute ambush. Both sides are required to share information in a timely manner.

A few hours later, Hodgman complained of chest pains and was taken to California Medical Center. He was in good condi-

tion and resting comfortably today.

District Attorney Gil Garcetti said because of Hodgman's hospitalization and the defense's late release of information, prosecutors probably will seek a delay in presenting testimony. He said they would not try to have the completion of the defense opening statement postponed today.

Defense attorney Robert Shapiro, as he arrived at court today, said he would not oppose a delay in the trial. "We've waited before and we'll wait again," Shapiro said. "My feeling is this is a man's health. It takes priority."

Doctors would not say if Hodgman's condition was related to stress, but Superior Court Judge Lance Ito noted that he appeared extremely disturbed in court.

"I've known him as a colleague and a trial lawyer," said

Ito, who was a prosecutor for 10 years, "and I've never seen the expression on his face that I've seen today."

He set aside this morning's session to deal with prosecutors' complaints and their demands for time to study the new witness reports. He could end up delaying the trial or prohibiting the defense from calling some of the new witnesses.

Defense attorneys have repeatedly complained that prosecutors withheld the names of their witnesses, and Ito has placed restrictions on some prosecution witnesses.

Defense attorney Carl Douglas took responsibility for the late documents, saying they were lost in a mass of 22,000 other documents. He agreed that some punishment was in order.

"It is my blame and my blame alone," he said.

### Board of Trade

CHICAGO (AP) — Soybean futures prices rose modestly in early trading today on the Chicago Board of Trade after a government report implied strong demand for soybean products.

Wheat, corn and oat futures also rose after opening narrowly mixed.

The Census Bureau said U.S. soybean processors crushed 127.9 million bushels of soybeans for meal and oil in December, a record-high December crush.

Soybean oil stocks were unchanged from November and meal stocks declined slightly, which implied strong domestic usage of both commodities.

Grain futures strengthened on forecasts for dry weather in corn-growing areas of South Africa and perceptions that recent losses in the wheat market were overdone.

In early trading, wheat for March delivery was 1 1/4 cents higher at \$3.73 1/4 a bushel; March corn was 1/2 cent higher at \$2.33 1/4 a bushel; March oats were up 1 cent at \$1.21 1/4

a bushel; March soybeans were 2 1/4 cents higher at \$5.55 1/4 a bushel.

Cattle futures were narrowly mixed on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange in cautious trading ahead of a quarterly government report on feedlot cattle numbers.

Hog and pork belly futures rose moderately, extending the recent trend, as meatpacker demand for animals remained strong.

Live cattle for February delivery were unchanged at 74.35 cents a pound; March feeder cattle were 0.25 cent higher at 73.95 cents a pound.

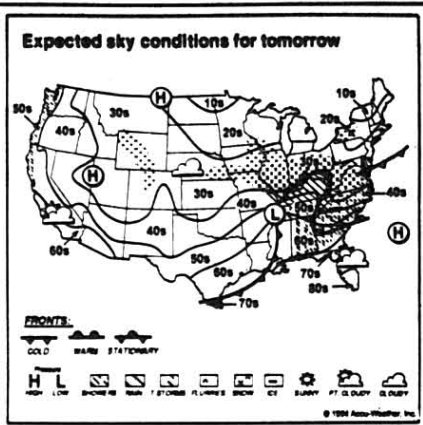
