

Firestone canning many striking workers

On picket lines from Decatur Des Moines to Oklahoma City, Bridgestone-Firestone strikers were more defiant than angry at word that more than half of them will be replaced.

"Our people are not mad. They're not sad. They're not even confused," said Tony Carr, vice president at United Rubber Workers Local 998 in Oklahoma

City.
"We know this for what it is: the last cry of a failed strategy.
The battle is not over," said

Carr.
With the work stoppage in its sixth month, tire maker Bridgestone-Firestone announced Wednesday it will replace strikers in Oklahoma. Indiana, Il-

linois and Iowa.

Of the 4,000 workers on strike, more than 2,000 will be replaced. The exact numbers fired at each plant should be known Thursday, said Trevor Hoskins, spokesman for the Jap-anese-owned company.

to full production and that we begin our seven-day continuous operation schedule in order to meet the needs of our custom-ers," Hoskins said.

The strike has cost Bridges-tone-Firestone \$10 million a month, said Yoichiro Kaizaki, the Tokyo-based president of parent Bridgestone Corp.

Tire plants affected by the strike are in Des Moines, Decatur, Ill., and Oklahoma City. An

air springs plant in Noblesville, Ind., also was struck.

On a frigid Des Moines, Iowa, picket line, striking URW work-ers warmed themselves around a fire and assured a reporter they couldn't be replaced.

"I don't think they can oper-ate. It's going to take a long time before they can get people in there who are qualified to do that work," said Arlo Richardson, a machinist at the Des Moines plant for 28 years.

Steve Maxwell of Marshalltown, Iowa, who's been a tire layer at Bridgestone for seven years, said the new hires should think before they cross a picket line.

"If they're going to treat us like this, think about how they'll

treat you," he said. "They of-fered us a package and that's it. It hasn't been a negotiation. It's been a dictation on their part."

Hoskins said negotiations broke down on when Bridges-tone-Firestone refused to accept the "pattern" contract reached by URW and Goodyear.

Report shows Illinois' infant mortality rate drops to all-time low

CAHOKIA - Air traffic controllers at a metro-east airport that handles military and corporate jets want their congressman to fulfill a decade-old request: They want radar so planes won't be tracked with binoculars any-

more.
"I wouldn't go as far as to say there's a safety hazard right now," air traffic controller Marvin Meng said Monday. "But with this equipment, the margin of safety would be tremendously increased."

Meng also coordinates the St. Louis Downtown-Parks Air-port's unit of the National Air also coordinates the St.

Traffic Controller's Association. Air traffic controllers there keep track of the planes with binocu-lars and radio instructions to pi-

The airport, built in the 1920s, has never had a fatal accident. Air traffic controllers have been asking for a radar system and a tower for more than a 10 years, Meng said.

U.S. Rep. Jerry Costello, D-Belleville, toured the airport Monday. Costello, a member of the House public works and transportation committee, promised to try to meet with Federal Aviation Administration of

'My argument is that it's an

my argument is that it's an airport that averages about 500 flights a day and from a safety standpoint, it should not be deferred any longer," Costellosaid. "I believe they have valid points for both a radar system and a new tower."

On a busy day, about 1,000 aircraft will land at the airport, including Air Force C-9s, which are the equivalent of commercial DC-9 jets. Commercial jets do not use the airport, although private corporate ones do, Meng said.

CHICAGO (AP) - Wheat and corn futures prices rose strongly in early trading today on the Chicago Board of Trade after the Agriculture Department reported lower supplies of those grains than traders expected Soybean futures fell slightly.

In a report released before the markets opened, the USDA pegged Dec. 1 U.S. wheat stocks at 1.5 billion bushels and corn stocks at 8.1 billion. Both numbers were below trade

expectations

The agency's estimate of winter wheat seedings - 496 million acres - also fell short of trade expectations, as did its forecast for May 31 U.S. wheat stocks of 466 million bushels

Wheat seedings below 50 (million acres) was just shocking," said David Armstrong, grain analyst at Chicago Corp

The USDA's final tally of 1994 U.S. com production was a record-high 10.1 billion bushels, 60 percent larger than the flooddamaged 1993 crop but still slightly below trade expectations

Last year's soybean production totaled a record 2 56 billion bushels, which was slightly above trade expectations and 37 percent higher than 1993 production.

The USDA estimated Dec. 1 U.S. soybean stocks at 2.1 billion bushels, which was slightly lower than expected

In early trading, wheat for March delivery was 4 cents higher at \$3.89% a bushel. March corn was up 31/2 cents at \$2.36 a bushel; March oats were 1/2 cent higher at \$1.231/4 a bushel, January soybeans were

Injured violinist files law suit against commuter rail system

CHICAGO - A 20-year-old award-winning concert violinist sued the city's commuter rail system Friday, contending it is responsible for her losing a leg when a train door closed on her instrument case and dragged her under the wheels.

Rachel Barton was dragged 200 feet Monday morning in the accident on a Metra train pulling out of the station in north suburban Winnetka, where she taught

"We have reason to believe the conductor allowed this train to depart before it was safe to do said attorney Robert A. Clifford.

Metra spokesman Chris Knapton would not comment on the lawsuit, but had said earlier that a preliminary investigation indicated that Barton made a dash to get out of the door as it was closing, causing the accident.

Clifford sued in Circuit Court and also asked Judge Michael

Barton's left leg was amputated at the knee and her right leg suffered severe tissue, bone muscle damage, doctors

She was in serious condition at Evanston Hospital.

Barton is a concertmaster of the Civic Orchestra of Chicago, and had played with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra and the Lyric Opera orchestra. She was the first American winner of Germany's J.S. Bach violin competition.

SPRINGFIFI D State officials have decided that intermittent cannon fire around the Capitol is preferable to the pi-geons and starlings that have been flocking there for years.


Six propane cannons, which can be as loud as a jet engine, use blasts of sound to scare away the birds. They are being fired at varying intervals during the afternoons and evenings.

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Baby Richard's father delivers new appeal

SPRINGFIELD - Baby Richard's biological father asked the Illinois Supreme Court today for the second time to grant him custody of his 31/2-year-old son. taking him from the adoptive couple who have raised him nearly since birth.

The Supreme Court invalidated the adoption by the suburban Chicago couple last summer in a ruling that caused a public uproar. Gov. Jim Edgar characterized the justices as smug and arrogant, and the Legislature passed a law to allow the courts to consider a child's best interests when an adoption fails.

Today, the attorney for Otakar Kirchner, the biological father, argued that the adoptive parents have no standing in the case and the new law shouldn't apply.





Simpson prosecutor hospitalized

Delay in trial possible after defense surprises

LOS ANGELES - There were a lot of surprises in the opening statement by O.J. Simpson's attorney. Just ask the prosecution

Deputy District Attorney William Hodgman was outraged Wednesday when Johnnie Cochran Jr., while claiming that prosecutors ignored evidence in their rush to incriminate Simpson. mentioned witnesses and evidence to the jury without giving proper warning to prosecutors.

Hodgman repeatedly objected during Cochran's opening statement. Then he accused defense attorneys of suddenly unloading the information some of which was gathered in June in a last-minute ambush. Both sides are required to share information in a timely manner.

A few hours later, Hodgman complained of chest pains and was taken to California Medical Center. He was in good condi-

District Attorney Gil Garcetti said because of Hodgman's hospitalization and the defense's late release of information, prosecutors probably will seek a delay in presenting testimony. He said they would not try to have the completion of the defense opening statement postponed to-

Defense attorney Robert Shapiro, as he arrived at court today, said he would not oppose a delay in the trial. "We've waited before and we'll wait again," Shapiro said. "My feeling is this is a man's health. It takes priority.

Doctors would not say if Hodgman's condition was related to stress, but Superior Court Judge Lance Ito noted that he appeared extremely disturbed in court.

"I've known him as a col-league and a trial lawyer," said blame alone," he said.
