Legislature begins action on changing SSU

COPLEY NEWS SERVICE

SPRINGFIELD — Legislation that would transform Sangamon State University into the University of Illinois at Springfield — and reorganize public higher education statewide — took its first official step toward reality Wednesday.

A bill that would make SSU a part of the U of I system, abolish the state Board of Governors and Board of Regents and give seven campuses their own governing boards sailed through the House Higher Education committee.

"I was not expecting this to go as quickly as it has gone in the committee meeting." SSU Naomi Lynn said afterward. She said she had not even had time to review the entire 429-page

bill before the committee hear-

ing.

However, Lynn said she had learned enough of the details of the bill to be happy that the legislation would put SSU on an equal footing with the two existing U of I campuses at Chicago and Urbana-Champaign.

"For us, it was an important issue that we would be a separate branch," Lynn said. "It was important that we would have the same opportunities as the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign and at Chicago. The only way to do that is to be one of three (equal) branches."

The arrangement would give SSU the same level of autonomy and independence under the U of I board of trustees that it currently has under the Board of Regents. Lynn had earlier expressed concerns that a merger with the U of I system might result in SSU being a satellite campus, with inferior status.

Lt. Gov. Bob Kustra, who has spearheaded the effort to reorganize Illinois' public higher education, said the change of governance for SSU would enhance the university's ability to recruit top faculty and students from across the nation.

"There are great things to come to this city and its educational institutions when we move this (change) forward," Kustra said.

Not everyone was happy with the language of the bill, which must still go through several stages before becoming law. Ron Ettinger, a spokesman for the University Professionals of Illinois, the labor union representing the SSU faculty, said the bill "is a union-buster for sure."

Currently, while the SSU faculty is unionized, faculties at the two U of I campuses are not. Ettinger said the SSU faculty is in the middle of a four-year contract.

If the bill passes as it is written, faculty on all three U of I campuses would be treated as a single bargaining unit. That would mean that once the current contract runs out at SSU, faculty at all three campuses would have to be organized into one union or SSU faculty would lose their union representation.

Selling laughing gas is no laughing matter in Carbondale

CARBONDALE — City officials have banned the sale of nitrous oxide for non-medical purposes after parents complained that their children were able to buy the "laughing gas" to get high.

"It really was brought to my attention by the complaints of mothers," City Manager Jeff Doherty said Wednesday.

The ban means anyone caught selling, using or providing nitrous oxide except for manufacturing, wholesale or medical

night. Nitrous oxide is commonly used as an anesthetic by dentists.

Doherty said police have detected an increase in the gas being used at college parties. A downtown business that has since closed sold nitrous oxide in containers to teen-agers, he said.

The most popular form of inhaling nitrous oxide is from balloops.

Attention also has been focused on the gas after investigators said a Herrin teen-

Husband recalls blood trail during murder trial

SPRINGFIELD — David Clarke Jr. recalls walking into a Farmington laundry in search of his wife on the night after Christmas in 1988 and instead finding something that shocked him.

"I saw a trail of blood that looked like something had been dragged through it," Clarke testified Tuesday at the start of testimony in William Reinbold's second murder trial.

The trail led to the rear of the laundry where Clarke found something that worried him even more. "There must have been a 3- or 4-foot puddle of blood outside the back door," he said.

Reinbold, 42, of London
Mills, is charged with murdering
21-year-old Mary Clarke by
bludgeoning her, causing a bone
splinter to pierce her brain. Her
husband found her missing
around 7 p.m., and a police dog
came upon her lifeless, partially
clad body at 2 a.m. the next day
on a rural road.

Clarke, 28, who now lives in Dubuque, Iowa, was the leadoff witness in the trial of Reinbold, who was convicted of the murder in 1991 and sentenced to life in prison. An appeals court ordered a new trial.

SSU moves step closer to becoming part of U of I

SPRINGFIELD — Despite complaints the move is antiunion, the Illinois Senate Thursday voted to make Sangamon State University part of the University of Illinois.

The merger was part of a bill that also eliminates the state Board of Regents and Board of Governors, which between them have oversight over eight public universities. Under the proposed reorganization, the seven other universities will each have its own governing board.

The Senate also narrowly approved legislation making the University of Illinois board of trustees an appointed rather than elected board.

Senators voted 33-23 to combine SSU with the U of I and abolish the BOR and BOG, which currently govern SSU, Illinois State, Northern Illinois, Eastern Illinois Western Illinois, Northeastern Illinois, Governors State and Chicago State universities.

"This is a real big day for my town." said Sen. Karen Hasara, R-Springfield. "We see this as the best opportunity in years and years for economic development and education."

SSU President Naomi Lynn said she would have no comment on the reorganization plan until after the House votes on its version of the legislation, which is expected to occur today.

The SSU merger was not without controversy. The Illinois Federation of Teachers blasted the legislation as "a serious attempt at union-busting" because

of the effect it would have on the SSU faculty union.

The SSU faculty are unionized, while the faculty at the U of I campuses in Urbana and Chicago are not. Under the merger plan, once existing contracts have expired in about two years, the faculty on all three campuses will be considered as one bargaining unit. That means the only way SSU faculty can continue to be represented by the union is if they can persuade the faculty on the other two campuses to join—an outcome considered virtually impossible.

In a statement, federation spokesman Ed Geppert Jr. said the attack on the SSU union was "a blatant display of intolerance for the working people of Illinois," and "an act that cannot and will not be tolerated."

"We are going to bust a union that has been operating on the campus for some years," said state Sen. Alice Palmer, D-Chicago.

"I don't know any other institution of government where we define the bargaining unit," said Sen. Vince Demuzio, D-Carlinville. Demuzio said the bill should be defeated unless the provision on union representation is removed.

However, Sen. Kirk Dillard, R-Hinsdale, said SSU employees will benefit from the merger, unionized or not.

He said the bill is actually pro-union if it leads to faculty at Champaign and Chicago joining the union. Jane Lauer

Abuse suspected in death of toddler in foster care

CHICAGO - The biological mother of a 2-year-old who died while in foster care during an apparent attempt at potty training says she warned the Department of Children and Family Services that, the child was abused.

His foster mother, Lillie Eas-ter, 40, was charged with first-degree murder. Police Cmdr. Charles Smith said Easter held Corese Goldman under a water faucet while trying to potty train him.

"The child was held under the The child was held under the faucet in the bathtub with water running on the child's face for several minutes, said Smith, apparently as "a form of discinline."

The child was pronounced dead Saturday at Michael Reese Hospital and Medical Center. Sharon Robinson said DCFS

had ignored her repeated reports that Corese was being abused by her foster mother. Robinson also said she complained to police after she last visited the children around Thanksgiving, but they did not act on her complaints.

DCFS spokeswoman Martha Allen said she was unaware of any allegations of abuse against

Easter on the agency's hotline.
"We won't find out if she
made any complaints to a caseworker until Monday," Allen
said Sunday. Smith said police had no record of complaints from Robinson.

Scott Air Base survives round of bases targeted for closure

WASHINGTON - The Pentagon today recommended closing or realigning two Army installations in Illinois, costing more than 600 jobs, but passed over the larger Scott Air Force Base and Rock Island Arsenal.

The Charles Melvin Price Support Center in Granite City and the Savanna Army Depot Activity were the only Illinois facilities slated for cuts on the Defense Department list to an independent base closing commission.

But Scott, in Southern Illinois, and the arsenal, in northwestern Illinois, weren't threatened in the first round of the 1995 base closing process.

The Price Center would lose 25 military and 200 civilian jobs over the next five years, but a small reserve part and a storage area would remain open. The center provides administrative, logistical and soldier support services for all federal agencies in the St. Louis area.

"It presents an opportunity for us to make the case ... that we have plenty of area and a good base to provide a home to other functions that ... may be relocating from other areas of the counsaid Rep. Jerry Costello, D-Belleville

Granite City Mayor Ron Selph said there are mixed emotions about the mixed recommenda-

'It's not a huge base of employment, but even losing a few jobs has an impact on any community," Selph said. "So, we're still not giving up hope."

The Pentagon recommended closing the Savanna base, at a cost of four military and 393 civilian jobs, and 53 students. The facility manages ammunition and has an ammunition

Rep. Lane Evans, D-Rock Island, plans to fight the recommendation. He said Savanna is an effective ammunition storage facility that is vital to U.S. military readiness.

Scott and its estimated \$1 billion annual economic boost escaped the list, which now goes to the special commission headed by former Illinois Sen. Alan Dixon.
