Prosecutors reveal their evidence in Brach case

CHICAGO — An unidentified witness says Richard Bailey offered him \$5,000 to kill candy heiress Helen Vorhees Brach but he turned down the offer, federal prosecutors have disclosed.

Days later, though, Bailey and an unidentified co-conspirator were told the "Candy Lady was now dead and would not be bothering them," the government said in citing evidence that led to its charges against Bailey, 65.

Those disclosures were included in a 95-page document prosecutors released Tuesday showcasing much of their evidence against Bailey.

The documents also reveal that another witness has told authorities that shortly before Mrs. Brach's disappearance in 1977, she furiously announced that she had been swindled in a horse deal and was going to the district attorney.

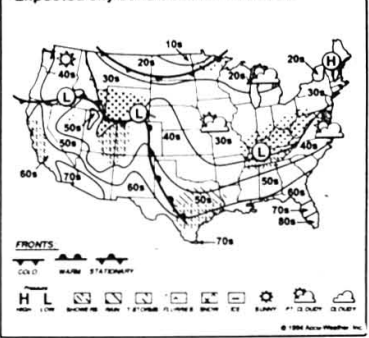

Board of Trade

CHICAGO (AP) — Most grain and soybean futures prices edged lower in early trading today on the Chicago Board of Trade, reflecting slack export demand and the advancing Brazilian soybean harvest.

Wheat futures gave up a bit of Wednesday's gains on ideas fresh snow cover in parts of Oklahoma and Kansas will protect dormant winter wheat from cold temperatures.

Corn and soybeans were fractionally lower in a continuation of the dull trading that has characterized those markets this week.

In early trading, wheat for March delivery was 1/2 cent lower at \$3.53 a bushel; March corn was 1/4 cent lower at \$2.35 a bushel; May oats were down 1/4 cent at \$1.28 1/2 a bushel; March soybeans were 1 1/4 cents lower at \$5.52 1/2 a bushel.

Cattle futures weakened in early trading on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange, extending Wednesday's losses, on expectations for weaker meat-packer demand for animals.

Hog futures were narrowly mixed.

Live cattle for April delivery were down 0.15 cent at 73.92 cents a pound; March feeder cattle were 0.35 cent lower at 70.40 cents a pound; April live hogs were 0.05 cent lower at 39.77 cents a pound; March frozen pork bellies were 0.05 cent higher at 43.20 cents a pound.

Wall Street noon

NEW YORK (AP) — Stocks were trading at lower levels at midday, as bonds extended their losses after surprisingly robust economic data stirred fears of inflation.

At noon on Wall Street, the Dow Jones industrial average was down 23.87 at 3,970.93.

Declining issues led advances by about 7 to 5 on the New York Stock Exchange, where trading volume reached 148.71 million shares, down from 168.42 million on Wednesday.

Broad market indexes turned negative. The NYSE composite index was down 0.94 at 262.82. The Standard & Poor's 500 composite was down 1.68 at 483.97. The American Stock Exchange's market value index was down 0.06 at 450.68. The Nasdaq composite was down 0.52 at 791.35.

Bonds headed lower at the open, after the Commerce Department reported that Americans' personal income rose 0.9 percent in January, the biggest gain in three months. Spending increased 0.4 percent in January after edging up 0.1 percent in December.

Analysts said in advance of the report that solid income gains could point to increased buying later this year, which could create a quickening in economic growth and possibly inflation.

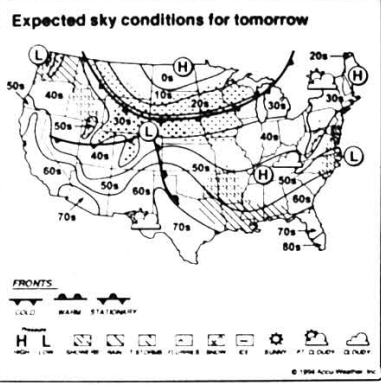

Judge zaps probation, sends man to prison

Aaron L. Poe, 21, of 436 Eighth St. was sentenced in Logan County Circuit Court Thursday to a maximum three years in state prison for violating his probation conditions.

Poe, who testified he was an alcoholic, was on probation after pleading guilty in April 1993 to unlawful restraint, a class 4 felony. The state's attorney's office filed a petition to revoke probation after Poe was arrested May 22 for illegal consumption and for failure to pay his probation fees.

Defense attorney Tom Funk argued that Poe was intoxicated during all his brushes with the law, indicating he needed treatment for his addiction rather than prison time.

But State's Attorney Tim Huyett said this was the second time a petition to revoke probation had been filed against Poe since his 1993 conviction and leniency no longer served justice.

Logan County Circuit Court Judge Gerald Dehner agreed that Poe's noncompliance with the court's sentences in the past —

which also included treatment for his addiction — made him ineligible for an extended probation.

In addition to the prison term, the court recommended Poe receive alcohol treatment while incarcerated. Poe was credited for 129 days credit for time already served.

Poe's sentencing hearing began Wednesday, but the sentence was delayed a day when Poe's father had a seizure after testifying as a character witness for his son.

Toward Education) of Illinois, which represents 11,000 motorcyclists statewide.

Jerry Conaway of Lincoln, president of the 200-member, Logan County-based Salt Creek ABATE, said, "I'm definitely against it. It's a freedom of choice, whether a rider wants to wear a helmet or not. That stuff they're laying about safety is a bunch of bull. It's freedom of choice, just like a woman and her own body."

The bill was available to a Senate Transportation Committee meeting Thursday but not called. Senate staffer Ed Orlet said, however, "It will be acted on, I guarantee you that. It's just a matter of when. It's one of the more attention-getting bills in the transportation committee."

Tammi Pratt of Lincoln, a member of the Illinois River ABATE and the McHenry County Independent Riders Harley Owners Group, said of the legislation, "I feel like anybody else from ABATE — if you want to wear a helmet, that's up to the individual. Our logos say, 'Let those who ride decide.'"

Pratt said there are no guarantees helmets would be safer for motorcycle riders.

"There have been several times I've heard or in accidents I've read about, the brain of the accident victim had swelled. To get the helmet off did more damage than the accident itself," Pratt said. "Plus, face guards have cracked in accidents and some pieces have become lodged in the throats of the accident victims."

Conaway conceded helmets might enhance riders' safety in town, but wouldn't help on cross country rides.

"Freedom will survive in '95," said Todd Vandermyde, ABATE's legislative coordinator.

"This is government getting as close and as personal as you can ever imagine. It doesn't get

The group sponsors free rider education courses for licensed drivers and graduates nearly 7,000 students a year, he said.

"You stop injuries by stopping accidents, helmets treat the symptom but not the cause," Vandermyde said.

Vandermyde showed that between 1985 and 1990, Illinois experienced a 46 percent decrease in motorcycle accidents and a 47 percent decrease in injuries to motorcyclists.

Vandermyde, like Pratt, said helmets can do more harm than good.

Riders can break their collarbone if, when thrown from a bike, their head bounces back and forth, exceeding the normal range of motion for the head and neck, he said.

Cullerton contends there are several costs borne by the state because no helmet law exists.

"About two-thirds of those who are severely injured as a result of motorcycle crashes end up on Public Aid" because they are disabled, he said.

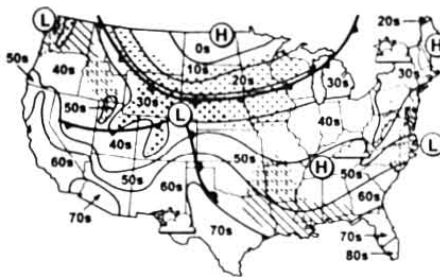

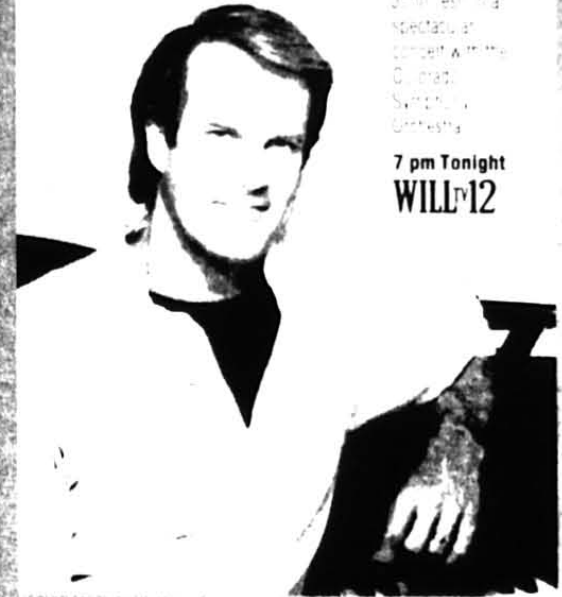

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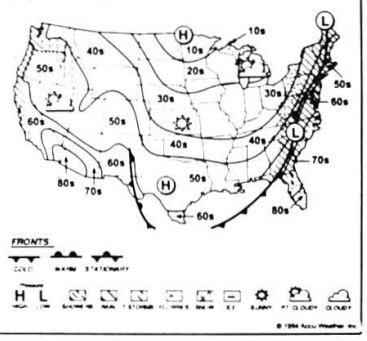

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Budget battles to hit rural areas

SPRINGFIELD — Budget battles in Washington will quickly ripple down to rural areas, two federal policy analysts predicted Tuesday.

Robert Lovan, director of the National Rural Development Partnership in Washington, told rural officials and planners meeting in Springfield that, based on a recent Cabinet official's estimate, perhaps 25 percent of current rural development programs may be converted to block grants.

While some local officials endorse the approach — believing local planners can save money and exercise more control — Lovan cautioned that initially, at least, block grants may be more complex and confusing to administer than the current maze of rural assistance programs.

"There's an awful lot of sorting out that's going to have to take place," Lovan told the Rural Community Economic Development Conference at the Holiday Inn East. The conference, sponsored by the Illinois Institute for Rural Affairs at Western Illinois University, Rural Partners and the Governor's Rural Affairs Council, drew about 330 rural policy special-

ists Tuesday.

In Illinois, the public-private Rural Partners group has not taken an official position on the idea of block grants, according to Louis DiFonzo, executive director of the Governor's Rural Affairs Council and co-chair of Rural Partners.

"One of the positions we're discussing is, if there are block grants, there has to be sufficient flexibility in them to make sure rural businesses other than agriculture have access to resources," DiFonzo said. "There's some pressure, specifically within the National Association of State Agriculture Directors, as one might guess, to keep the block grant language a little more limited to agriculture production agriculture and agribusiness."

Joseph "Jay" Kayne, director of Economic Development and Commerce Policy Studies with the National Governor's Association, said block grants will almost certainly mean less money overall than current programs, but also a chance to seek some different solutions.

As an example, Kayne said, a community might want to approach a 24-hour Wal-Mart with the idea of opening a public communications center, con-

nected to the Internet, instead of the local library that may be cutting hours.

"The kind of thing I don't think will be effective is the folks who've been the traditional deliverers, the traditional advisory panels (saying), 'This is our chance, we've been doing this for 40 years,'" Kayne said. "I think you'll find people will look at you and say, if you've been doing it for 40 years, why is there still a problem?"

The rural councils that are becoming ineffective, he said, are seeking more money for current programs. By contrast, "the councils that have been successful have been the ones that have gone to the governors and Congress and said, 'We hear what you're saying (about budget pressures), let us help you find the solution to that.'"

In Illinois, DiFonzo said, groups like Rural Partners probably won't be advocating the status quo, or acting as a traditional interest group.

"We sense very strongly the last thing the leadership in the state needs right now is one other group telling them what's wrong and how they can fix it," he said.

Study: Second-hand smoke doubles risk of SIDS

CHICAGO — Infants in households where people smoke are more than twice as likely to die of sudden infant death syndrome as those in smoke-free environments, a new study said.

The study is confirmation of earlier research suggesting that infants who breathe secondhand smoke face an increased risk of SIDS, even if their mothers quit smoking during pregnancy.

The greater the number of smokers or the greater the number of cigarettes an infant is exposed to, the higher the SIDS risk, said the study's lead author, Hillary S. Klonoff-Cohen, an assistant professor of family and preventive medicine at the University of California, San Diego.

The study was published in today's issue of The Journal of the American Medical Association.

"It's not enough for a woman to stop smoking while she's pregnant. It's important that she doesn't start up again after the birth of her child," said Dr. Kenneth C. Schoendorf, a SIDS researcher with the National Center for Health Statistics in Hyattsville, Md.

"It's also important that other people not smoke around the infant," said Schoendorf, who wasn't involved in the study.

SIDS is the sudden, unexpected death of an apparently healthy infant that remains unexplained after an autopsy and thorough investigation. It is the most common cause of death in the Western world of infants between 1 month and 1 year old, killing about 6,000 U.S. babies a year.

The researchers interviewed parents of 200 infants who died of SIDS in Southern California between January 1989 and December 1992, and parents of 200 similar healthy infants.

The infant was 3.46 times more likely to die if only the father smoked; 2.28 times more likely if only the mother smoked; and 2.18 times more likely if a live-in adult other than a parent was the only smoker, the researchers said.

If more than one adult smoked, the risk of the infant dying was 3.5 times higher than for infants in smoke-free households, the researchers said.

Smoking in the same room as

an infant pushed the risk even higher, the researchers said.

Klonoff-Cohen said she didn't know why the rate was highest when only the father smoked.

Board of Trade

CHICAGO (AP) — Grain and soybean futures prices fell modestly in early trading today on the Chicago Board of Trade as players look profits after a strong two-day rally.
Wheat and soybean futures rallied this week on ideas the weaker U.S. dollar would result in fresh export demand for U.S. commodities. A weak dollar makes U.S. goods cheaper overseas.

Those expectations were supported this morning by news the Agriculture Department approved a sale of 30,000 metric tons of U.S. wheat to China at subsidized prices.

The dollar stabilized this morning after Federal Reserve Chairman Alan Greenspan told Congress its decline on global currency markets was "unwelcome and troublesome."

In early trading, wheat for March delivery was down 2 1/4 cents at \$3.65 a bushel; March

corn was 1/2 cent lower at \$2.37 1/4 a bushel; March oats were unchanged at \$1.23 1/4 a bushel; March soybeans were down 4 1/2 cent at \$5.83 1/4 a bushel.

Cattle futures fell on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange, erasing Tuesday's gains, on ideas cash cattle prices have peaked for this week at 74 cents a pound. Pork futures were mixed after rising strongly Tuesday.

Live cattle for April delivery were down 0.60 cent at 72.82 cents a pound; March feeder cattle were 0.07 cent lower at 70.10 cents a pound. April live hogs were unchanged at 39.85 cents a pound; March frozen pork bellies were up 0.28 cent at 42.80 cents a pound.

Wall Street at noon

NEW YORK (AP) — Stocks were recovering at midday, as the dollar and bonds improved.

At noon on Wall Street, the Dow Jones industrial average was up 12.11 at 3,974.74. The dollar, which set new all-time lows against the Deutsche mark and the Japanese yen on Tuesday, firmed a bit in early trading, providing an early boost to stocks and bonds.

The dollar was recently trading at 91.15 yen and 1.39 marks, up fractionally on the day. The 30-year bond was up nearly 1/2 point.

But stock analysts were cautious. "You don't go from free fall to a roaring turnaround overnight," said Larry Wachtel, market analyst at Prudential Securities. "The dollar has stabilized for four hours; we want it to stabilize for four days."

The 30 Dow index components were led higher by Alcoa, up 1/4 at 37 1/4. That was followed by General Electric, up 1/4 at 53 1/4; and Texaco, up 1/2 at 64 1/4.

IBM was lagging the Dow 30, down 1/2 at 79 1/4.

Burglars kill rookie cop, wound another

CHICAGO — Burglary suspects opened fire on the rookie police officers who surprised them, killing one and wounding another, police said.

Officer Daniel Doffyn, 40, was shot in the head and shoulder Wednesday; he died about five hours later during surgery. Officer Milan Bubalo, 30, suffered a broken hip when he was shot in the thigh and was in fair

condition at Cook County Hospital.

Doffyn had been a police officer for eight months, Bubalo for 10.

The officers had just finished their shifts when they heard a radio report of a burglary at a West Side apartment complex across the street from the police station, said Police Supt. Matt Rodriguez.

They and two other officers ran across the street and heard

glass breaking inside an apartment, Rodriguez said. Doffyn, followed by Bubalo, ran around the building and Doffyn saw one suspect coming out of an apartment window, Rodriguez said.

Doffyn grabbed the 16-year-old boy, but another suspect emerged with an automatic weapon and opened fire, Rodriguez said. His shots injured the first suspect, killed Doffyn and injured Bubalo, and Bubalo then shot and injured the second

suspect, Rodriguez said.

The suspects were in critical condition today at Mount Sinai Hospital Medical Center, said administrative supervisor Bernadette Pollard.

The third suspect, who was not hurt, was arrested inside the apartment by other officers.

No charges had been filed by late Wednesday against any of the suspects.

Study: Medicaid reform probably won't be much of a money-saver

CHICAGO — A program to reform the state's Medicaid system probably won't result in substantial savings, according to a new study.

The state wants to institute a managed-care system, similar to a health maintenance organization, in hopes of driving down spiraling Medicaid costs, which are budgeted at \$5.7 billion this fiscal year.

"Our view is that while a carefully planned and a carefully implemented managed care plan for Medicare is a good idea, the state should not expect significant cost savings," said Lawrence B. Joseph, with the Center for Urban Research and Policy Studies at the University of Chicago. He coauthored the study released Wednesday.

Joseph said the primary target of managed care is welfare families, who represent about 70 percent of Medicaid enrollment but only 30 percent of expenditures.


"It's hugely unlikely you're going to save hundreds of millions of dollars with a Medicaid plan that focuses on the managed care population," he said.

Medicaid costs for welfare families for fiscal 1993 were \$1,300 per person, compared with \$7,900 for each elderly person and \$9,000 for each disabled person.

"The disabled have been, over time, a growing proportion of both enrollment and spending. So in 1983, they were 10 percent of enrollment; in 1994, they were 18 percent," he said.

The study examined Medicaid spending from 1983 to 1994.

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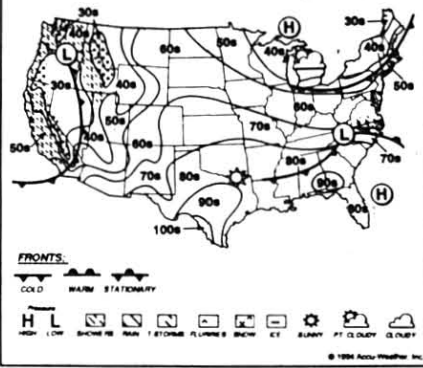

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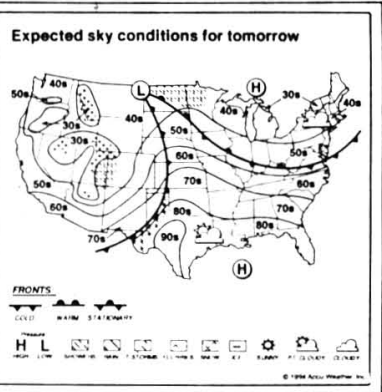

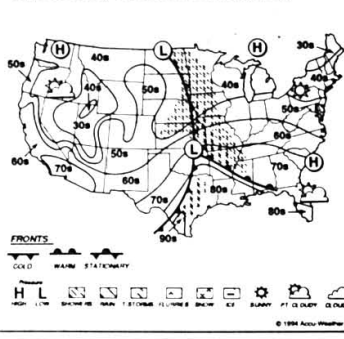

Academic coach caught cheating resigns from his teaching job

CHICAGO — The former coach of the Steinmetz High School academic decathlon team has resigned from his teaching post after admitting he cheated in last year's event.

But Chicago Board of Education officials said at a news conference Wednesday that they have uncovered no evidence that English teacher Jerry Plecki or students from the school cheated at this year's decathlon.

Steinmetz won the state championship March 11 by racking up the nation's highest score but was stripped of the title last week when the team refused to take two "validation" tests.

The Illinois Academic Decathlon Association said the team's scores had "statistical variances beyond normal parameters."

Earlier this week, Steinmetz Principal Constantine Kiamos said Plecki admitted slipping his students some answers during a regional decathlon competition

in 1994. But Plecki and the current team members insist they did not cheat this year.

Superintendent Argie Johnson had said Monday that she would try to fire Plecki from his \$40,000-a-year job. Plecki, 43, had taught at Steinmetz since September 1991.

The Board of Education's investigation included interviews with each team member and a review of their study materials, said board attorney Mike Hernandez. The board has sent the materials to the decathlon association for comparison with the actual test, said another board attorney, Jerry Marconi.

"(When I was) a state's attorney, I dealt with a lot of liars," Marconi said. "I interviewed nine or 10 kids (on the team) separately, and I never got a hint that any of them was lying."

"From where I sit, it appears they studied hard and got good results. If they cheated, they didn't know about it."

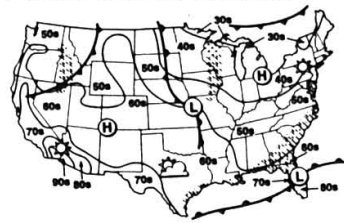

Police had received a tip that Arreola might be in Washington. He was arrested after leaving a supermarket near a house in which he was staying in Everett, Wash.

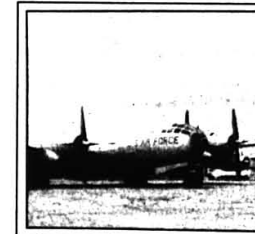
