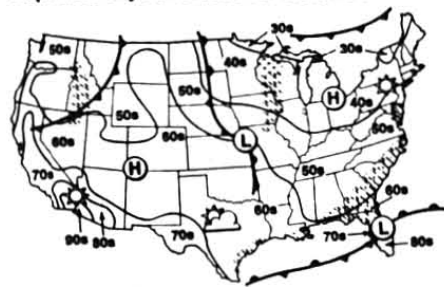

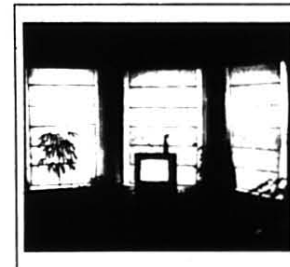
James Tiemann, 35, of Libertyville has not been seen nor heard of since taking off about 5:45 p.m. Friday to meet his wife. Searches by air Saturday and Sunday found no trace of him or his plane.

"At this point, we are not sure what happened," Lt. Col. Joe

King of the Civil Air Patrol said Sunday.

The trip to Valparaiso in Tiemann's four-seat, single-engine Beechcraft should have taken 60 to 90 minutes, depending on his route, King said. The plane had full gas tanks and could have flown for four to five hours, he said.

"He was a newer private pilot, but he was experienced enough that he had made the trip before," King said. "He knew what he was doing."

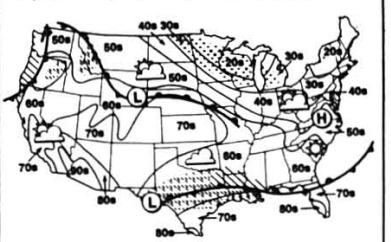

Board of Trade
CHICAGO (AP) — Wheat futures prices weakened in early trading today on the Chicago Board of Trade after the Agriculture Department reported most winter wheat in good condition. Most other grain and soybean futures also fell.
The USDA said in a report late Monday that 70 percent of the U.S. winter wheat crop was in good to excellent condition as of Sunday. The crop was 25 percent fair, 4 percent poor and 1 percent very poor, with the worst conditions in Washington, Oregon and Texas.
Losses were limited by news of U.S. wheat sales to Sri Lanka, Hong Kong and the Rhin.

At the American Stock Exchange, meanwhile, the market value index was up 0.51 to 466.50.
Stocks managed to hold on to the gains achieved during a strong opening today as the dollar stabilized.
The dollar was steadier after recovering from an intraday low against the Japanese yen in Tokyo trading. Japan's central bank encouraged the dollar to rebound by intervening in the currency markets, buying an estimated \$200 million during the morning.
The dollar's slump Monday proved to be only a minor distraction for the financial markets and stocks held up well despite an erratic day of trading. The Dow industrials rose 10.72 points to 4,168.41, just shy of Thursday's record close of 4,172.56.
Market analysts were pleased that stocks didn't follow the bond market, which deteriorated by late morning. The 30-year Treasury clung to a dwindling increase of 1/4 point around midday, which produced a yield of 7.38 percent, down from 7.39 percent late Monday. Bonds had sported better gains earlier.
"Today it looks like we're seeing the dollar being stocks," said Greg Nie, a technical

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Sex offender withdraws plea agreement

A guilty plea given by Robert Burger, 21, of Lincoln for violating his probation was withdrawn Tuesday after he learned he was ineligible to serve his 6-year prison term in the impact incarceration program.

The military boot-camp style program shortens prison terms for inmates who successfully complete the program. Burger was ineligible for the program because he has a sexual assault conviction.

Burger's guilty plea for violating the terms of his probation was declared invalid because he made it on the public defender's advice that he would be eligible to serve his sentence through the impact incarceration program.

With the guilty plea withdrawn, the charge of violating his probation was placed on the May jury calendar. The probation violation dates to Feb. 2 when Burger gave a police officer an alias while he was on probation.

A hearing was set for May 9 to resentencing Burger on the original offense of aggravated criminal sexual abuse, a class 2 felony.

The Lincoln man was returned from Graham Correctional Center to the Logan County jail to await the court proceedings. His

bond was reset at \$50,000 for the probation violation.

In other court action:
■ John W. Steen, 22, of 1027 N. Jefferson St. was sentenced to serve 4 years in state prison for violating his probation by arriving intoxicated at the county jail to serve a work-release sentence.

The offense occurred five days after the court gave him a suspended sentence when he pleaded guilty to violating the conditions of an earlier conviction by driving on a revoked license, entering a business that serves alcohol and failing to keep an appointment for alcohol treatment.

The suspended sentence could have kept Steen from serving additional jail time or a prison sentence if he abided by all the court requirements until July 31, when he was scheduled to complete the work-release jail time required under the original conviction. The requirements included not drinking alcohol and reporting to the jail drug and alcohol free.

When Steen arrived at the jail March 27 he had a blood-alcohol content of .19 percent.

"I had a bad day," Steen told the court, "and it turned into a worse one. That's what happens

when you're an alcoholic. It's my fault. I did it."

Steen was credited for 82 days already served and has applied for the impact incarceration program.

■ James E. Williams, 39, of Chatham was sentenced to pay \$3,200 in restitution and \$1,500 in court fees and fines after pleading guilty to writing a bad check to J&S Auto Center.

Williams pleaded guilty to a charge of deceptive practice, which was reduced to a class A misdemeanor. His sentence also requires him to serve 18 months conditional discharge and attend a financial counseling course.

The charges were filed after a \$4,000 check written by Williams to pay for a vehicle bounced twice.

■ Jennie M. Brown, 28, of Springfield was sentenced to 5 years in state prison for violating her probation by repeatedly committing retail thefts after she was convicted in Logan County of the same offense in 1992.

Brown, who was credited for 144 days already served, also must pay \$1,607 in restitution.

■ Barry W. Simons, 33, pled guilty to burglarizing a car in the 100 block of North McLean Street Aug. 17.

The plea agreement calls for Simons to serve a maximum

sentence of six years in state prison.

Simons was found crouched in the passenger seat of a parked car by a police officer who investigated the vehicle after noticing its break lights flash on. The glove box had been rifled and part of the stereo system had been removed.

A sentencing hearing is scheduled for May 16.

■ A bond reduction was denied Gary W. Heckrodt, 27, of Decatur who is charged with two counts of burglary in Logan County.

Heckrodt's charges relate to two Feb. 4 incidents that occurred at Casey's in Atlanta and Wal-Mart in Lincoln. Heckrodt is charged snatching a woman's purse at Wal-Mart.

Logan County Circuit Judge Gerald Dehner denied the motion based on Heckrodt's criminal history. The bond remains at \$10,000.

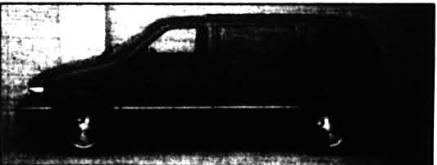
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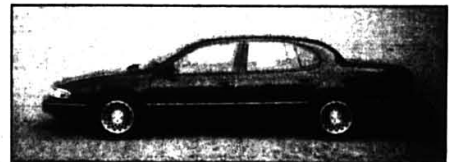

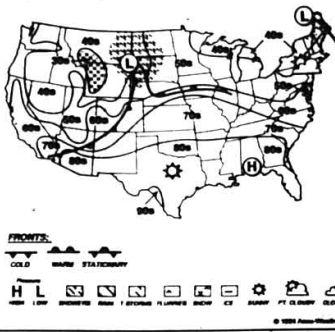

Gov. Edgar voices optimism about Mideast trade outlook

CAIRO, Egypt — As Illinois Gov. Jim Edgar neared the conclusion of his Middle East visit, he says good economic prospects exist in each of the countries his delegation visited.

"We in Illinois feel very strongly that our economic future is tied to the global market," Edgar said Wednesday, the day before he was scheduled to leave the Middle East.

Edgar led a trade delegation on a 10-day visit of the Middle East, including stops in Israel and Jordan. The group of nearly two-dozen businessmen also had talks in Jerusalem with Palestinian businessmen.

The group targeted the region "because of peace prospects," Edgar said. "We thought it created opportunities that hadn't existed here before."

Aides said it was Edgar's first foreign trade mission. The Republican is at the start of his second four-year term.

The delegation's talks in Cairo included meetings with Egyptian President Hosni Mubarak and Cairo Governor Omar Abdel-Akher.

Egypt imported about \$2.3 billion in U.S. goods and services last year, including \$66 million from Illinois.

Edgar said Illinois was looking to increase foreign sales to encourage economic growth and create jobs.

"In all of these countries, we do see economic growth occurring," he said.

Edgar said Illinois was emphasizing technical assistance to small- and medium-sized companies because "that is where all

the experts say the jobs are going to be."

He said he thought there was "much less tension" in Israel because of the peace process with its Arab neighbors. Jordan and Egypt, he said, were "much farther along in development than I thought and very open to investment."

But Edgar had a mixed reaction to Cairo. With a population of 14 million, it has more people than the 11.5 million in all of Illinois.

"I was very pleased with what I saw," Edgar said. "But it's got a pretty tough rush hour."

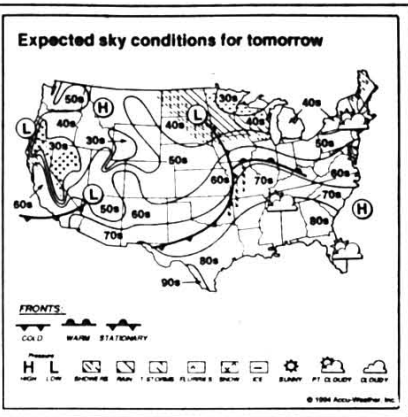

Rosty's prosecutors gain new witness

WASHINGTON — Dan Rostenkowski has left Congress, but the government is not relenting in its political corruption case against the Chicago Democrat.

Prosecutors on Thursday gained a witness against Rostenkowski when the son of a former Illinois state lawmaker pleaded guilty to obstruction of justice for lying to a federal grand jury.

Prosecutors, in a plea agreement with James Nedza, said they would seek to dismiss a second felony count for perjury when he is sentenced for lying about a "no-show" job in Rostenkowski's office.

In return, Nedza, 38, agreed to cooperate with the government's case against Rostenkowski, former chairman of the tax-writing House Ways and Means

Committee. Nedza entered the plea against the advice of his attorney, Robert Tucker. Tucker would not discuss the case; Nedza was taken away for processing.

Nedza entered the plea before U.S. District Judge Norma Holloway Johnson, who set a status hearing for June 13 but set no sentencing date. Nedza faces a maximum penalty of five years in prison, three years' supervised release and a \$250,000 fine.

One defense lawyer, Tom Buchanan, said Nedza's plea would not affect plans to go to trial.

"We do not believe that anything that he has to say is going to injure our defense and make it more difficult," Buchanan said.

Rostenkowski was indicted last May on charges that he used

official funds to pay employees who did mostly personal work for him; converted stationary, postal and home office allowances to his personal use; and obstructed justice.

Rostenkowski has pleaded innocent, and his lawyers are trying to have the charges in the 17-count indictment dismissed. He lost re-election Nov. 8 to Republican newcomer Michael Flanagan, a Chicago lawyer.

Rostenkowski's indictment detailed salaries, totaling more than \$500,000, for 14 alleged ghost employees in his offices from 1971 to 1992.

The employees were identified by only by number. No. 5 was an Illinois state senator's son on the congressional payroll between May 1983 and July 1986, who got about \$48,000 while performing no official work.

Struggling pet shop owner sentenced for robbing banks

CHICAGO — A sobbing Kathryn Bethann Lord was sentenced to 13 years and four months in prison Thursday for robbing banks in Waukegan and elsewhere to support her struggling Naperville pet shop.

"You're a 27-year-old woman who will be close to 40 by the time you get out," U.S. District Court Judge Marvin Aspen told Lord, who will be placed on five years probation upon her release.

Lord pleaded guilty in December in the midst of a trial on the

charges. Lord was arrested at her Naperville apartment in August 30, 1993, after police recovered some of the stolen bank money in her car and home. It had been stained from dye packs that a teller had placed in with the \$174,207 Lord stole from the American National Bank in Waukegan.

Thursday's sentencing marked the end of a dream turned into a nightmare for the single mother whose young daughter likely will be an adult by the time she is released.

Father, son sent to prison for bank heists

CHICAGO — A father and son were sentenced Friday to more than 300 years each in prison for a 10-month bank robbery spree in seven Midwestern states.

U.S. District Judge Marvin Aspen sentenced John T. Hunter to 377 years and John T. Hunter Jr. to 317 years.

The younger Hunter, 29, maintained his innocence in a statement before he was sentenced. "I never committed any of those crimes," he said. "I was never involved in any way, shape or form."

After their arrests, FBI agents found clothing worn during the robberies in the son's suburban Schaumburg apartment.

Investigators said the team robbed 16 banks and that the father robbed three banks on his own. They said the younger Hunter wore a mask resembling 1988 Democratic presidential nominee Michael Dukakis. His 56-year-old father used a mask of a smiling old man.

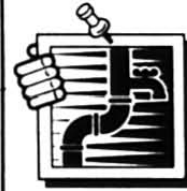

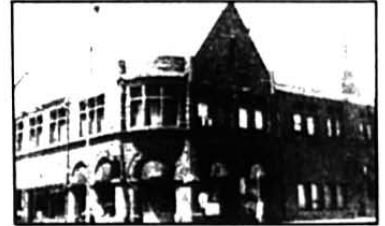

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House GOP going ahead with Chicago airport bills

Despite Daley's deal with Gary, Ind.

SPRINGFIELD — If Chicago Mayor Richard M. Daley thinks his deal with Gary on the creation of a regional airport authority will have an influence on the House Republican agenda, Speaker Lee A. Daniels warned Tuesday Daley may have another think coming.

Daniels, responding to questions as the legislature returned to work, said House Republicans have their agenda planned for the next nine days "and we will be running our agenda."

Legislation pending in the House would formulate a regional airport authority that would oversee O'Hare Airport, Midway Airport, Meigs and the proposed third airport for Peotone. Republicans have the legislation pending at the passage stage in the House.

"This (Chicago-Gary compact) does not change our approach to our agenda and the airport legislation will be a part and acted upon when we get to it," said Daniels, an Elmhurst Republican.

Daniels said he did feel that

the House Republicans were not necessarily in a rush to get to the airport legislation and "I am more concerned about the pay raises."

The Speaker was referring to pay raises approved Saturday by the Chicago City Council for Daley and aldermen.

Daniels chided Daley for forming the Chicago-Gary and then accepting the pay raise after the city election.

"Why would he (Daley) snub Illinois and go to Indiana," Daniels said, "and send money from Illinois to Indiana."

"Why would the mayor create regional warfare?" Daniels asked.

Under the Chicago-Gary plan, which is similar to one forged between New York and Newark, N.J., it would provide some \$1.5 million from Chicago at the beginning and this would level to \$1.4 million a year from passenger-tax revenues.

Sen. Thomas A. Dunn, D-Joliet, said he felt the GOP-sponsored airport authority legislation was a move to take over the operations of the proposed Peotone airport.

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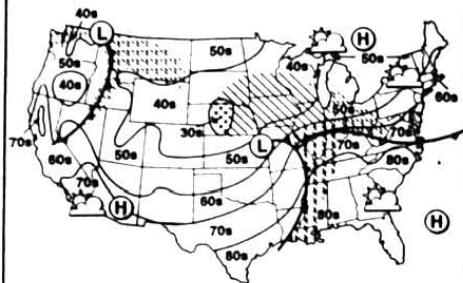

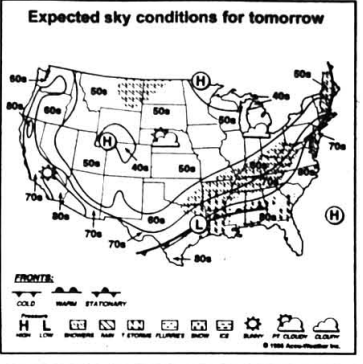

James Brady blasts concealed-gun bill

SPRINGFIELD — Carrying a gun does not guarantee safety, says James Brady, who was severely wounded during a 1981 assassination attempt on President Ronald Reagan.

"If guns made us safer, America would be the safest place on earth," said Brady, speaking from a wheelchair, his left leg in a brace and a long, curved scar visible on his forehead.

Brady, Reagan's former press secretary, entered the fray over Illinois' concealed weapons bill Thursday, saying a concealed weapons would provoke more violent crime, not less.

"My former boss, President Ronald Reagan, and I were shot when we were surrounded by the most highly trained law enforcement professionals in the world. It really scares me to think of thousands and thousands of citizens walking around armed to

the teeth — looking to shoot at any perceived danger," said Brady, a Centralia native.

Brady's appearance at the Illinois Capitol illustrated the concern gun opponents have about the bill sponsored by Sen. Kirk Dillard, R-Hinsdale. Dillard said he may call for a vote next week and has the support to pass.

The measure would allow registered handgun owners to carry concealed firearms if they have lived in Illinois five years, have never been convicted of a violent felony or misdemeanor, are fingerprinted and receive training on when to use deadly force.

"I have tremendous respect for Jim Brady. However, I think in his and (his wife) Sarah's zeal to remove guns from the street, that sometimes they don't analyze legislation as deeply as they should," Dillard said.

Dillard said that his bill would give citizens the right to protect themselves from violent

attack.

The concealed weapons battle is fought with a barrage of statistics. Supporters say states allowing concealed weapons have lower crime rates; opponents provide their own figures that show increases in crime.

Dillard said handgun homicide rates in Florida, which has a concealed carry law, dropped 29 percent between 1987 and 1993, while the overall homicide rate went down 22 percent. However, Dan Kolowski of the Illinois Council Against Handgun Violence said Florida has the highest rate of violent crime in the United States.

After the shooting, the Bradys became perhaps the nation's most widely known gun control advocates. The federal Brady Bill, which went into effect last year, requires five-day waiting periods and background checks before handgun purchases.

Chicago casino debate sinking in spring session

SPRINGFIELD — A key source in Chicago Mayor Richard Daley's office says expanding riverboat gambling won't be addressed in the spring legislative session.

"Boats are dead," the source said Thursday. "I think boats are not going to happen."

The assessment came a day after House Speaker Lee A. Daniels, R-Elmhurst, said efforts to expand riverboat gambling into Chicago and other cities are "on life support."

House Republicans pointed to the Democratic Chicago mayor's surprise move to create a re-

gional airport authority with Gary, Ind., as a key reason. The deal was an attempt by Daley to circumvent Republican lawmakers' plans to set up an airport authority that would oversee Chicago's three airports and Edgar's proposed Will County airport near Peotone.

Members of both parties have been dancing around the possibility of expanding gambling into Chicago and elsewhere in the state. Republican Gov. Jim Edgar has signaled support for putting boats in Chicago and along the Lake Michigan shoreline in Lake County.

Daley has sought gambling for

years, in hopes of a cash infusion.

And Daniels earlier this month said he would not rule out putting land-based casinos in Illinois.

But officials could never put together a coalition, even before Daley's move and various Republican efforts to retaliate.

The source in Chicago City Hall, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said lawmakers "can't do boats without Chicago. They can't do it without Democrats."

It is unlikely that Republicans could muster enough votes to pass a riverboat package.

Police crack curbside cocaine sales operation

CHICAGO — A Chicago street gang sold crack cocaine and heroin to people from throughout the Chicago area from a curbside location near a major expressway.

Sales from the Eisenhower Expressway operation ranged up to \$30,000 a day and could have totalled \$40 million over the past three years, U.S. Attorney James Burns said Thursday in announcing the arrest of 29 people.

Burns announced a 74-count indictment against 21 individuals. It had been sealed since April 19. Eight others were charged with separate state offenses related to the gang's criminal activities.

Gang members also gave undercover agents, portraying themselves as corrupt officers, saved-off shotguns and other weapons as bribes for police protection, Burns said.

Rural summit geared for Monday meeting

WASHINGTON — In Bob Rogers' school district in rural Bluffs, Ill., students use computers and satellites to take Japanese, creative writing and college-level calculus.

With health and supply problems looming, Delbert Mundt in Dieterich helped organize a water cooperative to serve parts of south-central Illinois.

These are some of the ways rural communities are trying to keep pace today, and their experiences will be examined Monday in Edwardsville at the Illinois portion of a national rural summit.

Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman and Rep. Dick Durbin, D-Springfield, are leading the Illinois conference — one of a series in the Midwest before Tuesday's meeting in Ames, Iowa, which President Clinton is scheduled to attend.

The featured topics Monday are education, health care, economic development, telecommunications and infrastructure.

The four Illinoisans giving presentations hope rural communities can learn from their experiences.

For example, Chuck Scholz, mayor of Quincy, has helped oversee an economic revival that has helped reverse several decades of population decline in Adams County.

Quincy moved to diversify its economic base and has attracted several electronics firms. The farm crisis in the 1980s and the international oil glut had hurt

the city, home to manufacturers of drills and pumps, and wheels for heavy agricultural equipment.

Recently, Quincy beat out other cities across the country for a new prototype Home Depot facility, bringing 200 jobs. Key reasons were good schools, the low crime rate and excellent parks.

"It's not that we have anything unique here. I just think that we were able to bring the right forces together. Ultimately, what we're trying to market when we go out and sell Quincy

is the kind of quality of life that you see throughout Southern Illinois," he said.

Rogers, the school superintendent, said educators need to think globally; competition for jobs comes from Japan and Germany today, not just nearby Jacksonville. That means giving the 320 students access to computers and sources of information.

"Distance learning and technology is our way of doing it," Rogers said.

All teachers have computers in their rooms. The school has

three computer labs. Two satellite hookups carry Spanish, Japanese, French, science and English instruction from Texas.

Rogers administers a calculus and math program, taught by the University of Illinois via computer and modem, that also links five Chicago schools and 19 downstate districts, allowing students to get college credit.

Also important for rural life is a healthy and stable water supply.

Mundt, now president of EJ Water Corp., sought help from the state and the Farmers Home Administration in starting the company to serve a half-dozen townships around Dieterich. The water supply was running low in some places and there were concerns about water quality. That also threatened economic development.

The water cooperative got the necessary loans and grants, drilled wells, built a treatment plant, and now serves six counties.

"I see this as a parallel to the rural electrification 50 years ago," Mundt said.

Much like the high-tech schooling, medical care via video hookups is a way to provide access for underserved areas.

The Carle Center For Rural Health and Farm Safety in Urbana uses that setup with a hospital in Paris.

The Carle official participating at the conference, Cathy Emanuel, said telemedicine could become more viable if the government made it reimbursable under Medicare.

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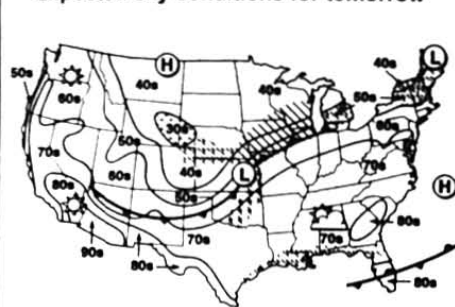

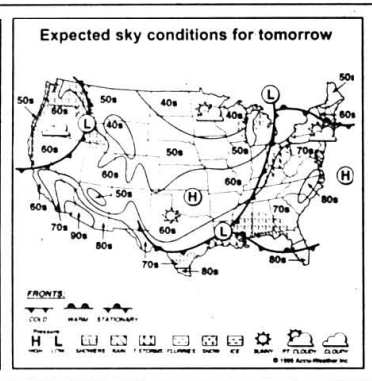

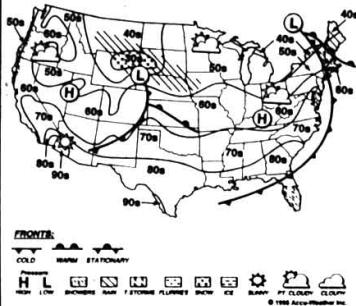
