talks with the school board stalled.

"We just want to know why, with the money available, they aren't paying teachers comparatively to other districts?" Trommer said. "They haven't had an answer for that. They've never once said the money was not there."

The teachers association researched the district's tax base and projected growth, both of which indicate money is currently available to offer teachers salaries comparable to other districts without increasing taxes.

"We're not asking for the moon and the sun. We just want to be compensated for services rendered," Phillips said.

The pay disparity for experienced educators stings even more after the board recently raised superintendent Rich Bumba's salary to \$82,000, a \$14,000 increase, Trommer said. The district has one school and 225 students.

"We don't object to the salary he's getting, but we feel the teachers should get something that shows we're important to this district, too," said Trommer, who has been teaching 23 years.

Board president Harold Ramlow said he would not comment about negotiations or the issues surrounding the talks until a contract has been signed.

"Negotiations are a closed session," Ramlow said. "I'm sure we'll both announce the de-

tations I don't intend to talk about any of the issues."

Trommer said the Federation of Teachers Association normally does not talk about negotiations, but no headway was being made after four meetings with the school board. Negotiators will meet again Monday for a fifth meeting.

"We have gotten nowhere, so we teachers decided to go public," Trommer said. "We've been in this position for years because we haven't gotten comparative raises and I don't think the public is aware of the situation."

The teachers association has not raised the question of striking next fall if a contract is not reached.

"We're going to continue to work to get some movement. Right now, we're working with the board," Read said.

The Illinois Education Association lists the kindergarten through eighth grade school district as the lowest paid teachers in Logan County, but also lists the district as the wealthiest in the area.

Greater input in health insurance premiums is another rallying call for the teachers association.

While other area districts pay at least single coverage health insurance for employees or an equal stipend if the employee opts out of the program, the West Lincoln-Broadwell board pays \$100 a month toward employees' premiums. The remainder of the health coverage costs

Board of Trade

CHICAGO (AP) — Grain futures prices climbed to new contract highs and soybean futures were sharply higher in early trading on the Chicago Board of Trade
 The markets traded higher on private forecasts calling for additional rain next week in

sodden Midwest growing regions. The new forecasts reinforce the National Weather Service's prediction for cooler, wetter temperatures that was made earlier this week.

Traders speculated corn sowing and spring wheat planting could be derailed past the optimal June 15 date for getting good yields. Analysts predict many farmers will have to replant crops already in the ground because of two months of nearly continuous rainfall.

Wheat futures also were supported by the prospect for disease among the winter wheat crop, which is ready to be harvested but has not been because farmers can't get into the fields.

Wall Street at noon

NEW YORK (AP) — Stocks were mixed at midday, with the Dow slightly lower but the broader market firmer, following a wild morning ride that was launched by a surprisingly weak jobs report.

Hillary speaks at high school commencement

ARLINGTON HEIGHTS — Thanks to some lobbying by one of their classmates, graduating seniors at John Hersey High School had a special speaker at their commencement — first lady Hillary Rodham Clinton.

Mrs. Clinton attended the ceremony Sunday at the invitation of Colin Ebeling, whose mother, Betsey, has known her since they were both sixth graders in nearby Park Ridge.

In her speech to 411 graduates and about 2,600 friends and family members, the first lady told them to treasure the tradition of public education and the many choices they have as Americans.

Mrs. Clinton said she couldn't miss the opportunity to talk about public education and to offer a little advice to the graduates. She also said Colin Ebeling did a good job of lobbying her for her only high school commencement appearance this year.

Mrs. Clinton said the students should stand up against negative stereotypes of young people and should remember that their choices from now on will guide their lives and the life of the country.

"I hope that each of you, as you now go forth, facing a myriad of choices, will listen to your own heart, will not be pressured by what anyone else tells you you should do, or what anyone discourages you from doing if you believe it is the right choice for you," she said.

She also commended the school in this upper middle class, conservative, community for making education a priority.

"It has been the historic door-opener to the American dream. It has always been viewed as the route to individual success and a stronger nation," Mrs. Clinton said of public education.

Mrs. Clinton's remarks were greeted with repeated rounds of applause. She received a standing ovation as she walked into the high school gymnasium, wearing a black robe with purple

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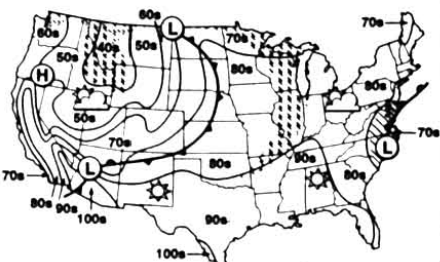

Board of Trade

CHICAGO (AP) — Corn and soybeans futures prices were mostly lower in early trading today on the Chicago Board of Trade, while wheat futures were marginally higher.

Drier-than-expected weather over the week-end allowed many farmers to get into their fields to plant crops after weeks of weather-caused delays. Farmers reported significant planting progress, particularly soybeans farmers in Illinois, where sowing was far behind the five-year average.

Investors expected the Agriculture Department's late afternoon release of its weekly planting progress report to show significant improvement over last week's dismal figures.

Traders said mostly clear weather predicted for this week also was pressuring prices. Wheat futures were pressured by the rapid harvesting of the winter wheat crop, but faced some support from Hurricane Allison, which was slowing harvesting in the Southeast.

Wheat for July delivery was 1/4 cent higher at \$3.86 1/4 a bushel. July corn was 2 cents lower at \$2.70 1/4 a bushel. July oats were 1 cent lower at \$1.57 1/4 a bushel; July soybeans were 1/4 cent lower at \$5.85 a bushel.

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Ready for Pickin' U-Pick

Illinois firm finds its business mushrooming

MOUNT CARMEL — Imagine a dark, humid warehouse that smells like it's full of sweaty gym socks that have been sitting around for days.

Jeff Parker spends hours in such a rank place, but he's not stewing hosiery. Rather, the president of Three Rivers Farms Inc. is growing tons of exotic mushrooms, and he's holding his nose all the way to the bank. "Smells like greenbacks to me," Parker said.

The 3-year-old company near the banks of the Wabash River in southeastern Illinois is hoping to sink its roots into a big chunk of the blossoming market for specialty mushrooms, most notably the Shiitakes. Parker and partner Dan Teague expect \$2.5 million in sales this year — a threefold increase over 1994.

The potential appears to be there.

U.S. growers produced 5.56 million pounds of Shiitakes during the 1993-94 season, more than twice the previous year's total, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

The total value of the crop rose by 93 percent to \$20.6 million.

"The specialty mushrooms got going about a dozen years ago as part of a cultural shift, with people more interested in foods high in fiber, low in fat and calories, and high in vitamins," said Paul Wuest, a plant pathology professor at Penn State's mushroom research center.

"Mushrooms sort of fit the bill for that kind of healthful approach to eating."

Three Rivers Farms grew from Parker's need to do something with his lumberyard after hard economic times slowed housing construction. Teague, an electrical engineer, proposed using the 3,000-square-foot of indoor space to grow mushrooms.

Both men each invested \$50,000 and struggled to teach themselves an ancient art with a capitalistic twist. They were up against tough competition from Pennsylvania and California, which dominate the mushroom market.

"We like to call it hillbilly ingenuity," Teague said. "You just don't go out and buy a mushroom maker. We designed

— eight tons of the stuff every three weeks.

Mushroom spawn is put in plastic bags with a closely guarded formula of sterilized sawdust — preferably oak — and other ingredients. After eight weeks sitting on shelves in dark, temperature-controlled rooms, the sawdust gets hard as a log and the mushrooms are ready to pick.

Three Rivers Farms grows an average of 3,500 pounds of Shiitakes a week, and they represent 90 percent of the company's sales. A \$2.5 million expansion is expected to boost production to 10,000 pounds a week by next summer.

The profit margin is high. Because he makes his own logs, Teague estimates a 50 percent return on Shiitakes, which sell for about \$3 to \$4 a pound.

Better yet, Teague said his 22-employee company recently was certified as organic, a distinction he expects will let him double the price of the Shiitakes. That's what gives him confidence to predict such a banner sales year, and net income of \$2 million.

Three Rivers Farms also is selling its logs at a healthy mark up, and they're expected to make up 15 to 20 percent of this year's sales. The company has a partnership with a San Luis Obispo, Calif., grower who buys its logs and three more growers are interested, Teague said.

Teague and Parker sell nearly all their produce to wholesalers, mostly in Chicago. But some crop also goes to St. Louis, Los Angeles, Houston and other markets.

The two men are confident the boom times have only just begun.

"Now when we got everything done, now that we know what the market does,

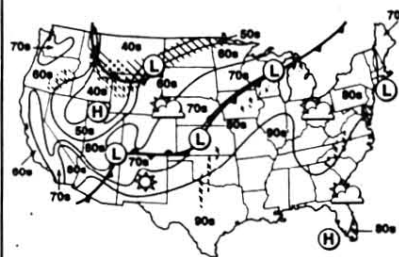

State builds tight case in bomb murder

BLOOMINGTON — The bomb that killed Kem Wenger matched a bomb a co-worker described to the man charged with murdering her, a government witness testified.

Harvey "Sunny" Studevant Jr. testified earlier in Dale Fosdick's trial that he told Fosdick, a co-worker at Caterpillar Inc.'s Pontiac plant, how to make a bomb.

Studevant testified that Fosdick had asked how much he would charge to kill Miss Wenger, his former girlfriend and the mother of his son. Studevant testified that he thought Fosdick was joking.

Monday, David Shatzer of the federal Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms testified, "When I read the statement (from Studevant), it describes a similar device, an identical device, as I described in my report" on the bomb that killed Miss Wenger.

Defense lawyer Michael Costello, who has stressed that Studevant did not tell Fosdick how to make a detonator, immediately asked for a sidebar with Judge William Caisley and could be heard asking for a mistrial. It was not granted.

Shatzer then testified that the bomb was "not a basic device" and "not thrown together by a first-timer." Costello objected, and Caisley told the jury to disregard that characterization.

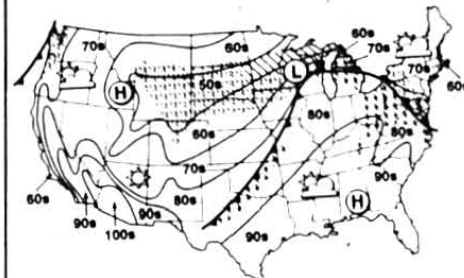

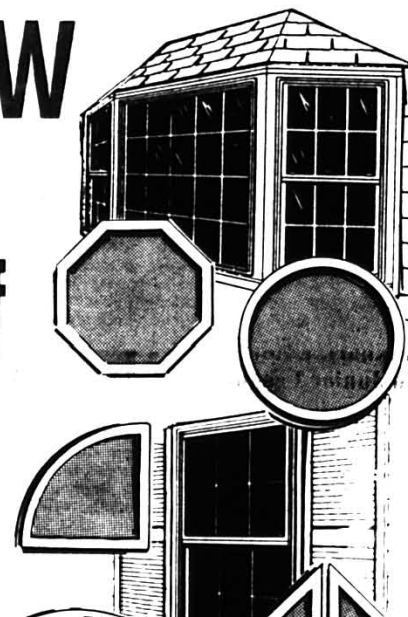

Convicted child molester gets more time to file motion

A Lincoln man who was convicted in 1993 of molesting three children has been given an extension to file a motion to reconsider his sentence because he did not have access to the prison's law library.

Kenneth B.T. Durham, 27, formerly of 1103 1/2 Third St. was given until July 5 to prepare the legal document.

Durham is serving the 15-year sentence at Graham Correctional Center in Hillsboro.

The Fourth District Appellate Court in Springfield granted Durham a second sentencing hearing after Durham claimed that then-defense attorney Nick Burgrabe failed to file a motion to reconsider the sentence before the deadline. Public Defender

Tom Funk is representing Durham in the second sentencing hearing.

Durham accepted an open plea agreement in December 1993 in exchange for the state reducing two counts from aggravated criminal sexual assault to abuse. According to the agreement, he pleaded guilty to molesting two of his nieces and a nephew, whose ages then ranged from 5 to 9.

State's Attorney Tim Huyett said the state argued for Durham to receive the maximum sentence of seven years imprisonment for each count, but the court opted for five years each.

In the appeal, Durham said Logan County Circuit Judge Gerald Dehner abused his authority by making the sentence so strict.

Board of Trade

CHICAGO (AP) — Grain and soybeans futures are steady, instances 50 higher; trading today on the Chicago Board of Trade as investors mull the impact of unexpected rain overnight in the Midwest.

Traders were trying to assess how much the rain — heavy in some areas — relieved young crops that had been parched in the past 10 days by dry, hot weather. Much of the Illinois growing area was under a thunderstorm watch today.

Grain and soybeans futures prices have run up to new highs in the interim amid growing fears of a drought. Any damage to the crops could be critical, the Agriculture Department predicts strong world demand this fall and extremely tight supplies.

Wheat for July delivery fell 1/4 cent to \$3.89 1/4 cents a bushel; July corn fell 1/4 cent to \$2.79 a bushel; July soybeans fell 1/4 cent to \$1.46 a bushel; July oats fell 1/4 cent to \$2.19 a bushel.

Meat and livestock futures were mixed on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

June live cattle rose .05 cent to 63.60 cents a pound; August feeder cattle rose .13 cent to 65.20 cents a pound; June live hogs rose .65 cent to 49.15 cents a pound; July frozen pork bellies rose .03 cent to 40.95 cents a pound.

Wall Street all noun

NEW YORK (AP) — Stocks were struggling to get ahead at midday, as investors debated whether Federal Reserve Chairman Alan Greenspan's comments late Tuesday were constructive for the market or not.

At noon on Wall Street, the Dow Jones industrial average was up 1.73 at 4,552.29.

Advancing issues led declines by 1,048 to 966 on the New York Stock Exchange, where volume came to 181.3 million shares, up from 164.56 million on Tuesday.

Broad-market indexes were mixed, as technology stocks turned tail at mid-morning and came under some pressure from profit-taking.

The NYSE composite index was down 0.01 at 291.75. The Standard & Poor's 500 list was down 0.30 at 544.68. The Nasdaq composite was down 3.02 at 926.81. The American Stock Exchange's market value index was down 0.50 at 434.58.

Most of the market talk surrounded a speech given Tuesday evening by Federal Reserve Chairman Greenspan, who said economic growth is slowing and that the economy may be slipping into recession. Greenspan stopped short of saying he would cut interest rates, which is what many stock and bond investors hope he will do.

The bond market took Greenspan's comments as a clue that the economy is slowing enough that interest rates will come down naturally, whether the Fed eases or not. Greenspan also said he believed underlying inflationary pressures were easing, which helped buoy the price of U.S. Treasury bonds. The 30-year Treasury bond was up 21.32 near midday.

Don Hays, Director of Investment Strategy at Wheat First Butcher Singer, Inc. in Richmond, Va., said the stock market had been in "euphoria for the past two to three weeks, thinking Fed going to cut interest rates. Now there's a little bit of concern that they may not cut or may not cut as much as people want."

Many investors are looking for a drop of at least 1/2 percentage point, Hays said, while he believes a cut of more than 1 percent is warranted.

Meanwhile, the Fed released its "Beige Book" of economic assessment at noon, confirming that the economy is softening.

Earlier today, the Commerce Department reported that America's trade deficit surged an unexpectedly sharp 16.2 percent April-ning an all-time high of \$11.37 billion, reflecting in part a surge in Japanese car imports. That heightened the tensions surrounding the United States' current trade talks with Japan, analysts said.

Technology stocks backed off after early morning gains. Micron Technology was the most active issue on the New York Stock Exchange and was down 1 1/4 at 56. IBM was flat and down 1/4 at 97 1/2.

Judge reviewing state's motor-voter plan

SPRINGFIELD — A federal judge was to meet with Illinois officials today to review the state's plan to impose a two-tiered voter registration system to comply with the federal motor voter law.

Once the plan is implemented, new voters who register at driver services facilities and other state offices would have to register twice if they wanted to vote in both state and federal elections. One registration would allow them to vote for offices such as president and Congress. Another registration form would have to be completed to vote in state and local elections.

"We think everything should be up and running by the first of September," said Ron Michaelson, executive director of the Illinois Board of Elections.

The two-tiered system is the result of the General Assembly refusing to pass legislation making state election law the same as federal election law under the National Voting Rights Act.

Dubbed "motor voter," the federal law is intended to make it easier for people to register to vote.

However, Gov. Jim Edgar and Republican lawmakers feel the federal law will open the door to election fraud with people ineligible to vote being allowed to register. Edgar feels state election law has safeguards to prevent fraud, such as requiring a voter to register in person and making it easier for election officials to purge voter rolls of ineligible voters.

The federal law makes purging election rolls more difficult,

they argue, and allows a person to register over the phone or by mail.

However, the state's challenge to the federal law was twice rejected in federal court, and the solution now is to move to a more complex two-tiered system.

Under motor voter, people visiting state offices will be asked if they want to register to vote. If they do, they will be registered to vote in federal elections. However, to vote in local elections, they will have to register under the usual state rules.

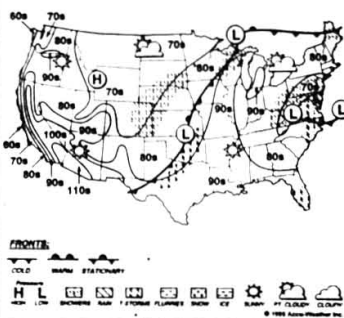

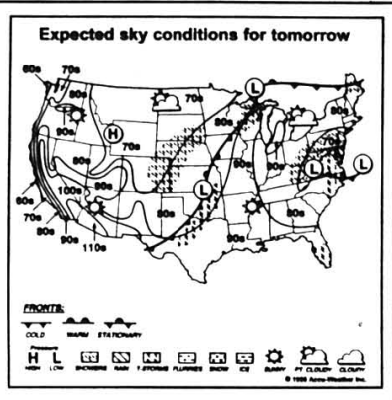

Amtrak expanding Chicago-Milwaukee service

MADISON, Wis. — Amtrak commuter service between Milwaukee and Chicago could expand to six trains daily July 16 as part of a subsidy deal to keep trains running through next summer, Gov. Tommy G. Thompson said Friday.

Wisconsin would pay \$2.3 million toward the train service through Sept. 30, 1996, and Illinois would contribute \$750,000, Thompson's office said.

Amtrak last winter said it intended to cancel commuter runs between the two cities to save money, unless states wished to subsidize the service.

The cutbacks drew protests from commuters and mass-transit advocates at railroad stations in Milwaukee and Chicago.

The revived service is expected to cost \$10.75 million over the next 15 months, officials said. Ticket sales could generate \$7.7 million.

The U.S. Department of Transportation granted Wisconsin's request Tuesday to subsidize Amtrak service, using federal highway funds aimed at reducing highway congestion.

"This is an appropriate use of the federal funding since Amtrak service provides a good alternative to drive-alone travel in a very congested area," Thompson said.

When Amtrak announced the

cutbacks, Wisconsin officials argued it was unfair to the Chicago-Milwaukee runs, which are among Amtrak's most cost-efficient.

The new schedule includes a train that officials said will operate later in the evening than the previous schedule.

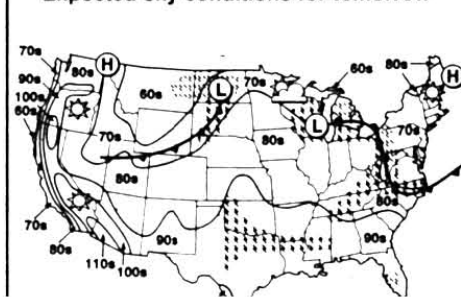

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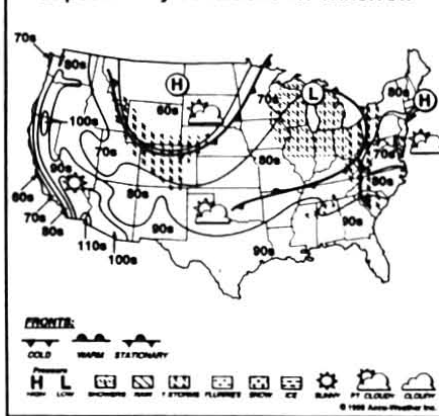

CHICAGO (AP) — Wheat futures prices rose sharply in early trading today on the Chicago Board of Trade as rain slowed harvesting of Kansas winter wheat.
Corn and soybean futures fell modestly, but futures were mixed.
Wheat's early surge may signal a resumption of last week's rally, which lifted July delivery prices by more than 42 cents a bushel.
The early gains were driven mainly by rain overnight in the Great Plains and a National Weather Service forecast for cool temperatures in the region next week. Warm, dry weather is best for harvesting.
Corn and soybean futures retreated in cautious trading ahead of Friday's USDA report on planted acreage and grain stocks. The report was scheduled for release early Friday morning, before the markets open.
In early trading, wheat for July delivery was up 8 1/4 cents at \$4.47 a bushel. July corn was 1/4 cent lower at \$2.69 1/4 a bushel. July oats were unchanged at \$1.46 1/2 a bushel. July soybeans were 1/2 cents lower at \$5.86 a bushel.
Livestock and meat futures were mostly lower in early trading on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange, reflecting heavy cattle and hog slaughter rates and abundant meat supplies. Trading volume is lightening as Independence Day approaches.
In early trading, live cattle for August delivery were down 0.02 cent at 62.25 cents a pound.

He was preceded in death by one son, four brothers and one sister.

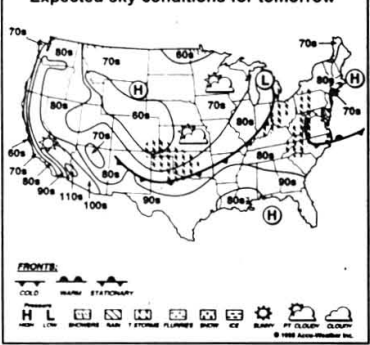

Trial on girl's slaying, burning to be moved

DAVENPORT, Iowa — A man accused of murdering a 9-year-old Illinois girl was granted a new trial in another county by a judge who halted jury selection after deciding potential jurors had heard too much about the case.

Stanley Liggins, 33, is accused of murdering 9-year-old Jennifer Lewis of Rock Island. Her burning body was discovered in a Davenport school yard on Sept. 17, 1990.

Scott County District Court Judge James Kelley on Wednesday granted a renewed motion by defense attorney J.F. "Mike" Tobey to move the trial after listening to protests by Liggins about having a racially prejudiced jury. Kelley ordered that Liggins, a black man formerly

from Rock Island, be tried July 10 in Dubuque County.

"The reasons, as stated in the record, are the inability to obtain a properly impartial jury due to pervasive publicity in the community," the judge said in a telephone interview.

Jury selection was in its third day and the pool had been pared to 32 people, including only one black person and one Mexican woman, Tobey said. The rest were white, he said.

Tobey also said that more than 36 percent of the approximately 50 potential jurors who had been questioned since Monday "had a great deal of exposure to some important aspects of the case."

"We were trying to get jurors to ignore things that are almost impossible to ignore," he said. "You reach a point where

you're asking them to do just a little more than any normal human being can do."

The county attorney's office, which is prosecuting the case, had no immediate comment.

Liggins also spoke to the judge.

"He was forceful, but he wasn't screaming. He didn't have to be restrained," Tobey said.

Tobey said his client "got down to discussing race as an issue in the most basic terms."

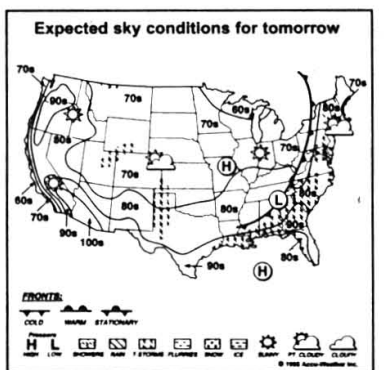

Reynolds wins delay in sex case

CHICAGO — A judge has agreed with defense requests to postpone U.S. Rep. Mel Reynolds' trial on sex abuse charges for two weeks.

Circuit Judge Fred Suria on Thursday re-scheduled the start of the trial to July 19, although the prosecution said it was ready to proceed, said Andy Knott, a spokesman for the Cook County state's attorney's office.

At a news conference Thursday to discuss Supreme Court decisions involving the Ku Klux Klan and congressional redistricting, Reynolds became angry when asked about the case.

"Nothing that's going on in my life is as important as what happened today in America," he said. "If all you're going to report on is what's going on in my personal life, you're doing this city and the people in this city a great disservice."

Reynolds faces trial on charges of sexual assault and abuse, soliciting child pornography and obstruction of justice.

Defense attorneys Ed Genson and Sam Adam sought the delay, saying Genson had recently finished a Will County case and needed further time to prepare for Reynolds.

Suria acknowledged that another trial he is presiding over has taken longer than expected and that he also might be pressed for time if Reynolds' trial started July 5.

Reynolds is still set to appear briefly in court on July 5 to post a \$10,000 cash bond on two new indictments announced in May.
