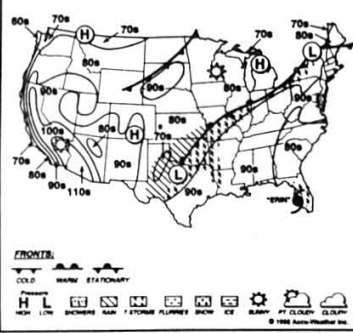

Dad supports daughter's jailing

CHICAGO — The father of a 12-year-old girl who was jailed after she and her sister refused a court order to visit him wants an appeals court to uphold the judge's decision to lock her up.

Heidi Nussbaum spent one night in juvenile detention at the Will County Jail, and her 8-year-old sister, Rachel, was ordered to stay home after Will County Judge Ludwig Kuhar found them in contempt of court.

Heidi was released July 25 pending an appeal.

The girls' father, Sheldon Nussbaum, asked the 3rd District Appellate Court in Ottawa on Monday to uphold Kuhar's ruling, claiming that his ex-wife manipulated his daughters.

"The court's sanctions against (the girls), though harsh, was a

final effort to exorcise them from (their mother's) total domination of them; to show them, with stark reality, that their father loves them and wants to visit with them and that they can't repeat their mother's manipulations without drastic consequences occurring," said court papers filed by Nussbaum's lawyer.

Nussbaum said that does not mean he likes seeing his daughters jailed.

"The sooner we can stop getting exploited (by the media)

and get into counseling, the better," he said Monday. "I just hope that we will all... be able to survive this and one day be able to say it's all worked out."

The girls' mother, Kathy Marshall, said she had been advised not to comment on the pending case. Her attorney, Andrew June, did not return phone calls.

Nussbaum and Marshall divorced in 1993 and agreed to joint custody of their daughters, Marshall, who had moved to the Chicago area after the divorce, unsuccessfully sued in North Carolina to prevent Sheldon Nussbaum from taking the girls to Charlotte this summer.

Marshall contended that Nussbaum had told the girls on previous visits that she was "wicked" and "deserved to die," June has said.

FAA buying new computers

WASHINGTON — The Federal Aviation Administration plans to buy new computers for the Aurora, Ill., air traffic control center and four others that have had increasing problems in recent months.

New IBM 9121 computers will be installed at Chicago, Dallas-Fort Worth, Washington, Cleveland and New York at a cost of about \$65 million, FAA Administrator David R. Hinson said.

Development of software and purchasing requirements could delay installation of the new equipment until 1997, but Hinson said the agency is looking

for ways to speed up the process.

The five troubled centers have had 20 computer failures in the last four months and each time it takes longer to restore service.

Hinson said that each center has several backup systems so safety can be maintained when there is a computer failure, but traffic often has to be slowed down.

A complete overhaul of computers at the nation's 20 air traffic control centers is scheduled to begin in 1998 or 1999.

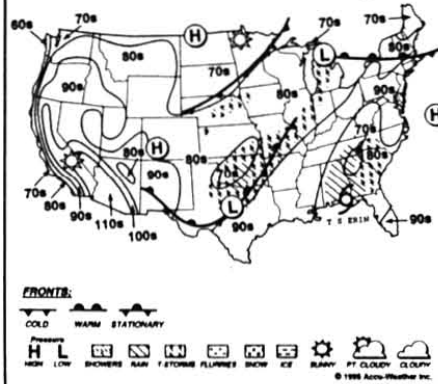

Divided panel considers Packwood penalties

WASHINGTON — With the Senate approving its decision not to hold public hearings on Sen. Bob Packwood, the Senate Ethics Committee now must consider penalties in a case torn apart by partisanship.

Feelings are so high on both sides of the public hearings issue that Ethics Committee Chairman Mitch McConnell, R-Ky., says it will be difficult for the panel's three Republicans and three Democrats to work together.

Nevertheless, the committee, which split 3-3 along party lines on public hearings, was scheduled to meet in closed session today to consider what to do regarding allegations that Packwood, R-Ore., engaged in sexual and official misconduct.

At the extremes, the case could be dismissed or Packwood could be expelled by the Senate. In between those possibilities, the Senate could vote to censure Packwood or strip him of his chairmanship of the Senate Fi-

nance Committee.

Republicans on Wednesday won a 52-48 vote against public hearings. The outcome upheld the committee position and turned aside a Democratic plan for unprecedented Senate intervention in a pending ethics probe.

Three Republicans crossed party lines and voted for hearings and one Democrat opposed them. Six of the Senate's eight women voted for hearings. Packwood did not want them; nine of his female accusers did.

Democrats fumed during an impassioned debate that female victims of senatorial misconduct may never again trust the institution. Republicans warned against undermining the committee's work now and ruining its effectiveness later.

"The spilling over of this case on the floor of the Senate has divided our committee," McConnell said during debate. "There's no question we've been feeling the strain."

He said "friendships have

been strained and we've got to get ourselves back together so we can finish this case."

McConnell had caused some of the bad feelings when he de-

clared that if Sen. Barbara Boxer, D-Calif., went ahead with her resolution to force hearings, he would propose ethics probes against prominent Democrats.

the market, extending steep losses posted a day earlier.

Corn and oat futures also weakened. Soybean futures turned higher after a lower opening amid talk China bought South American soybean oil.

Near-term wheat futures sank the permitted daily limit of 20 cents a bushel Wednesday as bigger crop prospects and slack export demand triggered heavy selling by speculators.

The sell-off continued this morning as investment funds abandoned their positions.

In early trading, wheat for September delivery was 7 1/4 cents lower at \$4.34 1/2 a bushel; September oats were off 1 cent at \$2.78 a bushel. September oats were 3 1/4 cents lower at \$1.68 1/4 a bushel; August soybeans were 2 1/4 cents higher at \$5.99 a bushel.

Cattle futures were down slightly in early trading on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange, reflecting worries that a threatened strike at IBP Inc.'s Dakota City, Neb., meatpacking plant early next week could cut demand for animals.

Hog and pork belly futures posted steeper early losses in response to increased slaughter rates.

Live cattle for August delivery were down 0.10 cent at 64.50 cents a pound; August feeder cattle were 0.05 cent lower at 67.80 cents a pound; August live hogs were 0.43 cent lower at 47.82 cents a pound; August frozen pork bellies were 1.33 cents lower at 41.02 cents a pound.

Cattle and hog futures rose moderately Wednesday; pork bellies weakened.

NEW YORK (AP) — Stocks were continuing to trim earlier losses around midday, as bargain hunters moved in to lift prices out of a steep decline.

At noon on Wall Street, the Dow Jones industrial average was down 10.92 at 4,679.23. The blue chip index fell more than 40 points in the first hour of trading before bottoming out.

Stocks were getting little help from bonds, where the 30-year Treasury was off more than a point all morning and yielding 6.93 percent, up from 6.85 percent on Wednesday.

But stock investors had "sold it down to such a point that program buying kicked in," said Edward Collins, head block trader at Daiwa Securities America.

Declining issues led advancers by nearly 2 to 1 on the New York Stock Exchange, where volume came to 169.91 million shares.

Stocks and bonds dropped sharply at the open, after the Labor Department said that unemployment claims dropped by 51,000 in the week ending July 29, the largest weekly decline in more than a year.

That sign of growth in the economy was bad news for investors hoping that the Federal Reserve would cut interest rates again this month.

The jobs-loss-claims data came one day after the market stumbled on concerns that a rising dollar might jeopardize U.S. exports, particularly in the very important technology sector.

Technology stocks were recouping earlier losses, with IBM up 1/4 at 108 1/4, and Intel up 1/4 at 61 1/4. Both issues had been down as much as a point earlier in the session.

Broad-market indexes, which are heavily weighted in technology stocks, were still lower. The NYSE composite was down 1.16 at 299.00. The Standard & Poor's 500 list was off 2.26 at 556.54. The American Stock Exchange's market value index was down 1.43 at 521.72, while the Nasdaq composite was down 5.90 at 977.85.

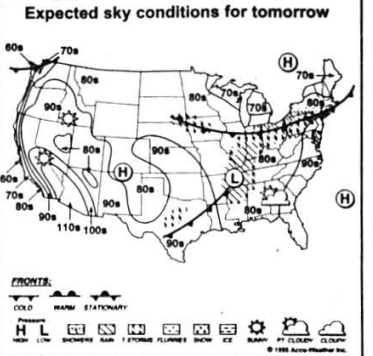

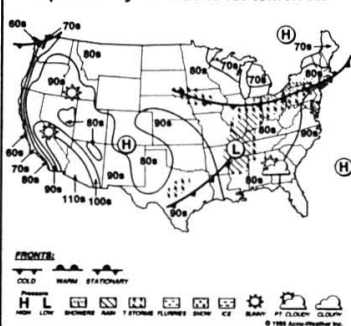

Hopes rise for air safety solutions

AURORA — U.S. Transportation Secretary Federico Pena's visit to the Chicago Air Traffic Control Center raised hopes Tuesday that potential safety problems can be solved more quickly.

"I'm optimistic," said Mark Scholl, president of a National Air Traffic Controllers Association local which represents workers at the Aurora facility. "He understands what we're faced with."

Pena, however, did not offer any ironclad guarantees. He said he came to the center to see for himself the outdated computers that controllers use to monitor air traffic in a four-state area surrounding O'Hare, the world's busiest airport.

The center's primary computer system, installed in 1963, crashed July 23, marking the fourth major shutdown in 10 months. Though controllers went immediately to a backup system, the computer failure caused flight delays of up to an hour at O'Hare and Midway airports.

"The problems that the center has encountered over the past several months are very serious matters," said Pena, while Aurora Mayor David Pierce and Chicago Mayor Richard M. Daley stood to the side. "I have

been able to get a better feel for the complexity of this system and the fact the equipment is old."

Meeting with about 40 people from management and controller ranks, Pena said he was pressing for federal budget changes that would allow the hiring of up to 75 additional workers needed at the facility to handle growing air traffic.

The Federal Aviation Administration announced Monday it wants to add 75 controllers in Aurora, which currently employs 402 controllers. Federal bids seeking to attract the new workers will go out in about two weeks, officials said.

The problem is that few experienced controllers are willing to move to Aurora without a pay incentive. Pena said the FAA is

unable to offer such an incentive unless Congress restores pending cuts in transportation funding.

Controllers start at about \$65,000 a year but pay varies little from one part of the country to another.

In 1989, the FAA drew about 50 controllers to Aurora through a pay demonstration project, which offered bonuses and paid moving expenses, Scholl said. He believes a similar approach would work again.

Pena also is attempting to reform the FAA's procurement system, a bureaucratic morass which he said adds months to the time it takes to acquire new equipment, such as computers. He is pressing for reforms that would make the FAA's financing more secure.

Man gets life for killing, burning Illinois girl, 9

DAVENPORT, Iowa — Jennifer Lewis' mother says she fears another successful appeal by Stanley Carter Liggins, the man convicted of killing the 9-year-old girl.

But Sheri Glenn said she has no doubt about the outcome of a third trial.

"There will always be worries that we'll have to do this again. But we'll get him again. The third time's a charm," Glenn said Thursday after the Rock Island, Ill., man was sentenced to life in prison without parole for

her daughter's slaying.

Jennifer Lewis was killed Sept. 17, 1990, after she disappeared from a store in her Rock Island neighborhood. Her raped and strangled body, wrapped in a plastic bag, was doused with gasoline and found burning near a Davenport elementary school she had once attended.

Liggins chose not to attend his sentencing. Defense attorney J.E. Tobey told Scott County Judge James Kelley the case would be appealed.

Kelley overruled Tobey's motion for a new trial and ordered

Liggins to pay \$13,453 in court costs and attorneys fees while allowing the family to receive up to \$11,000 from Iowa's Crime Victim Compensation Program.

During the 15-minute sentencing hearing, assistant Scott County attorney Julie Walton read portions of a six-page letter Glenn wrote to Kelley.

"We feel we've been cheated by Stanley because he took our daughter's life," the letter said. "We always have a pain in our chests and always will have anger."

Liggins was convicted July 25 of first-degree murder. The conviction was Liggins' second. In 1993, a Scott County jury found him guilty in the girl's death. That verdict was overturned late last year by the Iowa Supreme Court.

Glenn cried softly when she told reporters afterward that Liggins should have appeared at his sentencing.

"I feel Stanley should face up to what he's done," she said. "He will pay for eternity."

Ameritech, workers settle; Bell Atlantic may face strike

WASHINGTON — Ameritech and the Communications Workers of America reached agreement on a new contract, but fruitless talks with Bell Atlantic have the union representing most of its employees threatening to strike.

Ameritech reached an agreement late Thursday with the

CWA providing a 10.9 percent pay increase over three years and pension increases of 10 percent to 15 percent for future retirees, union and company officials said.

Jeff Miller, a CWA spokesman, said the agreement also contains improvements in employment security, including a new training and retraining

program and expanded transfer rights for workers and limits on subcontracting. He said it would preserve existing health benefits for active and retired workers, which had been a major issue in the talks.

Chicago-based Ameritech has 28,800 CWA workers in Illinois, Ohio, Michigan, Wisconsin and Indiana.

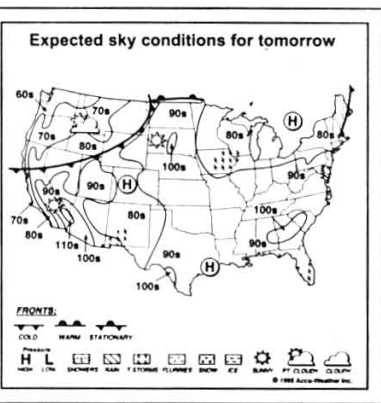

Wheat extended a slide that began late Monday after rumors of a Chinese wheat purchase proved false. The Agriculture Department reported modest improvement in corn, soybean, spring wheat and winter wheat crop quality in a weekly report released after the close of trading. In early trading, wheat for September delivery was down 8 1/2 cents at \$4.29 a bushel; September corn was 1 1/2 cents lower at \$2.79 1/4 a bushel, September oats were 1 1/4 cents lower at \$1.57 a bushel, August soybeans were down 7 cents at \$5.84 1/2 a bushel. Cattle futures posted moderate losses in early trading on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange as cash cattle prices in the Southern Plains continued to deteriorate. Stronger cash hog prices and wholesale pork demand gave hog futures a boost. Live cattle for August delivery were 0.45 cent lower at 61.92 cents a pound, August feeder cattle were down 0.30 cent at 66.55 cents a pound, August live hogs were up 0.17 cent at 48.47 cents a pound; August frozen pork bellies were 0.90 cent lower at 41 cents a pound. 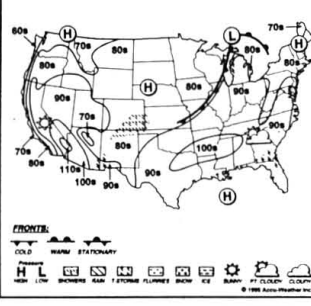

Traders expected the report, which was due out after the close of trading, to show about 4 percent more cattle on feedlots in the seven largest cattle-feeding states Aug. 1 than on the same date last year.

Hog futures extended their gains, reflecting higher cash hog prices and expectations for continued tight availability as hot weather in the Midwest dissuades farmers from transporting hogs to market.

August live cattle were 0.32 cent lower at 61.60 cents a pound. August feeder cattle were 0.17 cent lower at 66.45 cents a pound. August live hogs were 0.35 cent higher at 49.92 cents a pound. August frozen pork bellies were up 0.10 cent at 41.90 cents a pound.

CHICAGO (AP) — Grain and soybean futures prices rose in early trading today on the Chicago Board of Trade after the National Weather Service predicted a chilly autumn in the Midwest.

The 30- and 90-day forecasts for cooler-than-normal temperatures in the key corn and soybean regions raised the possibility of frost damage to the crops. Corn and soybeans were planted later than usual this year, particularly in Iowa and southern Minnesota, because of heavy spring rains.

Both crops are lagging the normal pace of development, but this month's hot, dry weather is helping crop progress.

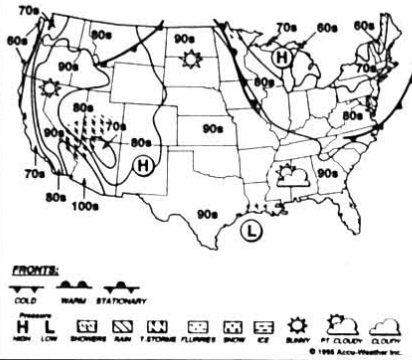

Kevorkian attends death of woman from Illinois

SOUTHFIELD, Mich. — Dr. Jack Kevorkian today attended the death of an Illinois woman, his attorney said. The woman was left in the parking lot of a suburban Detroit hospital.

The death of Esther Cohan, a 46-year-old with multiple sclerosis, was at least the 25th attended by Kevorkian since 1990. Kevorkian, a retired pathologist, advocates doctor-assisted suicide for the terminally ill.

Attorney Geoffrey Fieger said at a news conference that Cohan had been ill for 10 years and had been counseled by Kevorkian for months. She lived in Skokie, Ill.

Fieger said Cohan was taken to William Beaumont Hospital in Royal Oak, not far from where Kevorkian lives.

Colette Stimmell, a spokeswoman for Beaumont, said a security guard noticed a car with fogged windows about 5 or 5:30 a.m. The car was parked in an area reserved for physicians' cars near the hospital emergency entrance.

The guard could see a body through a window and notified authorities. A doctor and nurse administered an electrocardiogram to determine whether there was any heart function and declared the woman dead at 7:20 a.m., Stimmell said.

The body was still in the car at 9:30 a.m.

"This is a crime scene. The body was never removed from the car. You have to leave the scene intact," Stimmell said.

The car, an older model passenger car, had a temporary paper license taped in the back window, but police covered that over with cardboard. Officers were awaiting the arrival of the medical examiner before removing the body.

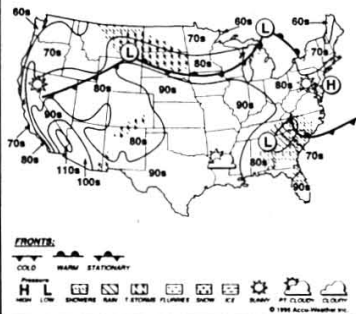

Disease, weather concerns boost corn futures prices

CHICAGO — Corn futures prices rose modestly Friday on the Chicago Board of Trade amid talk of crop disease and lower production prospects.

Oat futures also rose while wheat and soybeans ended mixed.

Reports of spreading gray leaf spot fungus in southern Iowa underpinned corn prices, although analysts said the damage probably will be limited.

Another type of fungus, aflatoxin, has been reported in southern corn states, which include Georgia, Kentucky and North Carolina.

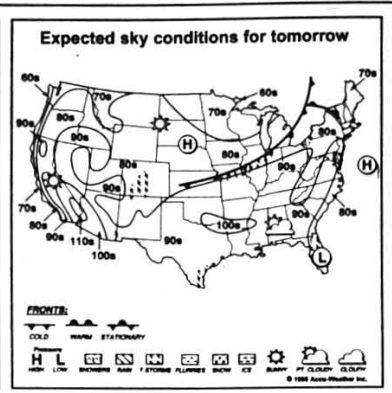

School bus driver screening weeds out 26 felons

SPRINGFIELD — A state law that requires all new school bus drivers to be screened for criminal backgrounds kept 26 felons from getting jobs during July.

That amounted to about 4 percent of those applying to be school bus drivers statewide, Secretary of State George Ryan said in a press conference at the Capitol Tuesday.

Ryan said he is looking at expanding an already lengthy list of crimes that would prohibit convicts from driving school buses, but offered no details.

Beginning in July, all driver applicants have been put through a background check that included scanning their fingerprints into a computer, allowing them to be screened against a database that can help detect people with criminal histories.

The checks are coordinated by the secretary of state.

Ryan demonstrated the state-of-the-art fingerprint scanning equipment. A technician rolled a reporter's finger across the inkless device and a fingerprint automatically appeared on a TV screen. That print was saved into computer memory for comparison when trying to identify

those barred from driving children to school.

The state check is followed up by an FBI investigation to identify out-of-state convictions, Ryan said.

"Our expectation was that many people with criminal histories wouldn't even bother to apply," Ryan said. "We found that that wasn't the case."

Board of Trade

CHICAGO — Grain and soybean futures prices rose strongly this morning on the Chicago Board of Trade after the National Weather Service forecast hot, dry weather in the Midwest next week.

The higher opening across the board extended Wednesday's gains in corn and soybeans. Wheat and oat futures ended mixed on Wednesday.

Traders believe sultry August weather in the Midwest already has reduced soybean yields, and further losses are likely if the pattern continues.

In a report released after the close of trading Wednesday, the weather service said temperatures in the region will be much above normal and rainfall will be below normal during the latter half of next week.

Further support stemmed from corn and

soybean production forecasts by Securities Corp. of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, that were below the latest Agriculture Department estimates.

The brokerage firm pegged the 1995 U.S. corn crop at 7.83 billion bushels compared with the USDA's Aug. 11 estimate of 8.12 billion. Securities Corp. estimated the soybean crop at 2.13 billion bushels compared with the USDA estimate of 2.25 billion.

Other private firms will release crop estimates ahead of the next USDA crop report on Sept. 12.

In early trading, wheat for September delivery was up 4 1/2 cents at \$4.37 a bushel. September corn was 2 1/4 cents higher at \$2.94 a bushel. September oats were up 1 1/4 cents at \$1.67 a bushel. September soybeans were 7 1/2 cents higher at \$6.14 a bushel.

Cattle futures were steady to higher in early trading on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange in anticipation of increased meatpacker demand for animals after the Labor Day holiday.

Hog and pork belly futures weakened in line with lower cash hog prices.

Live cattle for October delivery were 23 cent higher at 62.40 cents a pound. September feeder cattle were unchanged at 63.92 cents a pound. October live hogs were 0.10 cent lower at 44 cents a pound. February frozen pork bellies were 0.45 cent lower at 57.15 cents a pound.

Cattle futures ended mixed Wednesday, hog futures fell.

Wall Street, noon

NEW YORK (AP) — Stocks were edging higher at midday in quiet, pre-holiday trading. Traders and investors had muted reaction to a raft of economic data released this morning. Many are absent ahead of Monday's Labor Day holiday, and many are waiting to see August employment data, due out on Friday, before positioning themselves for the long weekend.

At noon on Wall Street, the Dow Jones industrial average was up 5.28 at 4,609.85.

Advancing issues led decliners by about 5 to 4 on the New York Stock Exchange, but a large number of issues — 900 — were unchanged from Wednesday's closing prices.
