Board of Trade
CHICAGO (AP) — Grain and soybeans futures prices advanced in early trading today on the Chicago Board of Trade on lower harvest estimates and followthrough buying from Thursday's strong close.
Corn futures gained on news that a respected firm late Thursday lowered its corn estimate to 7.85 billion bushels from 8.12 billion. The market has been trading below Agriculture Department crop estimates, but the Farmers Commodities Corp. number reinforces ideas of a poorer harvest than expected.
Soybeans futures also were boosted strongly by the new Farmers Commodities estimate of 2.21 billion bushels.
Wheat futures saw support from corn and soybeans and continued gains from news Thursday that the European Union has extended its suspension of subsidized exports through mid-October. That could force buyers

to turn to American crops for subsidized purchases.
Wheat for September delivery rose 1/4 cent to \$4.50 a bushel; September corn rose 1/2 cent to \$2.99 a bushel; September oats rose 1 1/4 cents to \$1.69 1/4 a bushel; September soybeans rose 2 1/4 cents to \$8.15 1/4 a bushel.
Beef futures advanced and pork futures were mixed on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.
October live cattle rose .28 cent to 63.60 cents a pound; September feeder cattle rose 23 cent to 64.50 cents a pound; October live hogs fell 20 cent to 44.45 cents a pound; February frozen pork bellies were unchanged at 57.25 cents a pound.

Wall Street at noon
NEW YORK (AP) — Stocks were following bonds higher at midday after the National Association of Purchasing Management reported a sharp drop in economic activity, prompting renewed hopes for an interest-rate cut.
At noon on Wall Street, the Dow Jones industrial average was up 33.81 at 4,844.37, after dipping three points in the early going.
The market eased at the opening, after the Labor Department reported a surprising 0.1 drop in the nation's unemployment rate in August, to 5.6 percent.
The jobs number showed surprising strength in the economy and disappointed bond and stock investors, who worried that it could reduce the chances that the Federal Reserve would lower interest rates this month to bolster the economy.

Spoiled San'wiches recalled

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich. — Savory Foods Inc. has voluntarily recalled six types of sandwiches sold at convenience stores in Illinois and four other Midwestern states.

The sandwiches, packaged under the Savory San'wiches name, are sold at stores in Illinois, Michigan, Indiana, Ohio and Wisconsin.

The sandwiches being recalled are: tuna, egg salad, chunky chicken salad, ham salad, ham and cheese and turkey and cheese. They have expiration dates through Sept. 12.

Routine testing by the Michigan Department of Agriculture found some of the sandwiches contained the listeria monocytogenes bacteria. The bacteria can cause mild flu-like symptoms in adults and can lead to fatal infections in children, the elderly or others with weakened immune systems, the company said in a statement.

No illnesses have been reported.

Consumers who have the sandwiches should discard them or return them to the point of purchase for a refund, the company said.

Pediatricians call to monitor children's sports

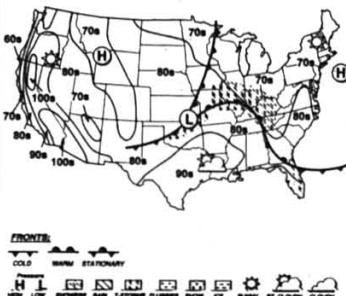

Innocent man dies in police chase

MORRIS — A police chase that reached speeds higher than 143 mph ended with the death of an innocent man. A marathon search followed for the man who prompted the chase.

Killed was Eugene E. Sanchez, 66, who state police said had residences in both Seneca and Rockdale.

State police said that Stanley Olivo, 27, of Lockport was being pursued late Saturday morning by Shorewood police for a traffic offense and that an officer recognized the vehicle Olivo was driving as one stolen from a Joliet dealership.

State police took up the chase near Channahon and onto U.S. 6 before Olivo lost control of the car about three miles east of Morris, went sideways and col-

lided with an eastbound car, killing Sanchez.

Sanchez was treated at the scene but died in a helicopter en route to a hospital.

Olivo was not hurt, but his vehicle was split in half. He fled to a nearby cornfield, prompting a search by police dogs, volunteers on horseback, a state police helicopter and officers from numerous law enforcement agencies.

Olivo finally was apprehended about 6:30 p.m. Saturday.

Slight cheers were heard from spectators, some in lawn chairs and some with binoculars as they listened to police scanners.

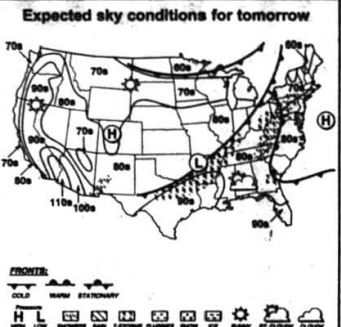

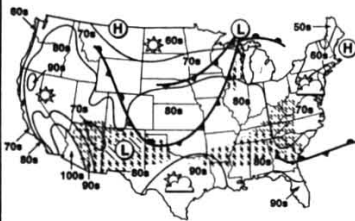

The company said Thursday that its first-quarter net income fell to 12 cents per share from 14 cents a year ago. The company blamed slower growth in its core database software business.
 Shares of cyclical companies, those that tend to respond sharply to changes in the economy, were lower. The Dow industrial components were led lower by cyclical names International Paper, off 1 1/4 at 85 1/4, and Alcoa, which was down 1 1/4 at 57 1/4.
 This was a partially a reaction to the softer economic data this morning, said Eugene Peroni, a technical analyst at Janney, Montgomery Scott in Philadelphia.

Veteran Chicago journalist Hanson dies at age 67

CHICAGO — Henry Hanson, a witty and whimsical journalist who covered politics for the Chicago Daily News and the arts for Chicago magazine, has died at the age of 67.

Hanson died Wednesday at his home of pulmonary fibrosis.

Hanson was among three journalists cited in 1963 when the now-defunct Daily News won a Pulitzer for a series documenting the availability of birth-control information among public aid recipients.

His journalism career began at Chicago's City News Bureau and spanned 40 years, including a stint in Springfield, covering the terms of three governors. "Two of them went to prison," he once mused in a Chicago magazine interview.

"He had a matchless, whimsical sense of humor and an extraordinarily graceful writing style," said Chicago Sun-Times reporter and former colleague Charles Nicodemus. "But he was also a quick, insightful reporter."

Hanson became a columnist for Chicago magazine in 1978.

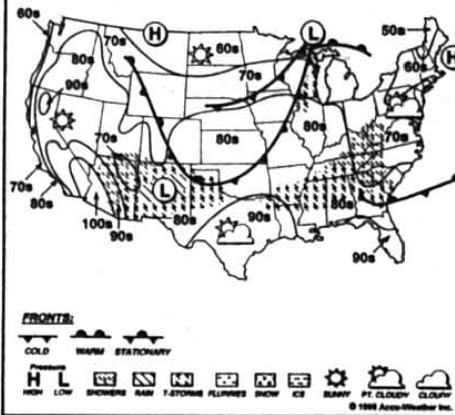

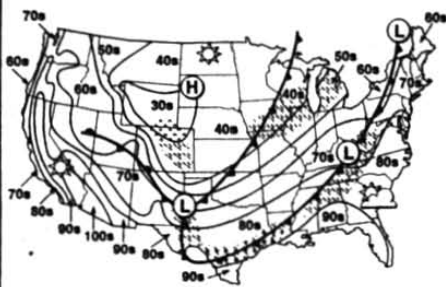

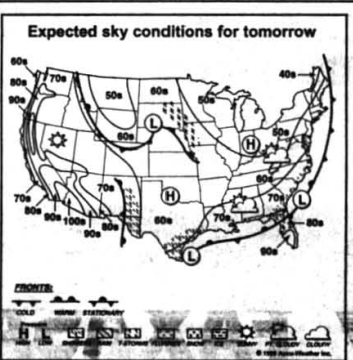

Fallout at ADM brings down more executives

DECATUR — Archer Daniels Midland Co. has fired three mid-level executives it calls cronies of Mark Whitacre, the FBI informant who prompted a federal investigation of price fixing in the food-ingredient industry.

One of the executives fired out was Reinhard M. Richter, president of ADM's Mexican operations, ADM President James R. Randall said in a telephone interview late Thursday.

Randall would not identify the other two but said they were "very minor" executives.

"They are all part of the Whitacre conspiracy," Randall said. The Chicago Tribune, citing

an unidentified company source and former ADM board member Howard Buffett, reported today that Richter and Marty W. Allison, vice president of ADM's BioProducts division in Europe, resigned Thursday, apparently under pressure. The report said neither man could be reached for comment.

The new firings are the latest rumblings of unrest within ADM, the world's largest grain processor and self-proclaimed "supermarket to the world."

Whitacre, former president of the BioProducts Division, was fired and accused of theft in early August, about six weeks after federal authorities subpoenaed

documents from ADM and other grain processors regarding possible anti-competitive practices in sales of high-fructose corn syrup, citric acid and lysine, a livestock feed supplement.

ADM denies any wrongdoing and has accused Whitacre of diverting \$9 million to a Swiss bank account.

Whitacre, who survived a subsequent suicide attempt, has said ADM routinely rewarded executives by depositing money into overseas bank accounts in their names but used the accounts against executives who revolted.

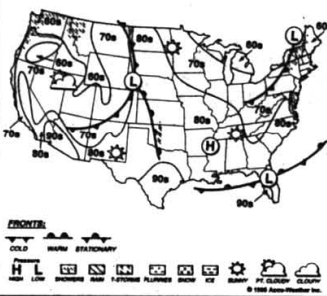

Board of Trade
CHICAGO (AP) — Wheat and corn futures were mixed in early trading today on the Chicago Board of Trade after the Agriculture Department reported harvesting of those crops was running near the normal pace. Soybean futures were slightly higher on ideas last week's frost in the Midwest did more crop damage than first thought.
Corn harvesting was 10 percent complete as of Sunday, the USDA said in a weekly report released after the close of trading Monday. That compares with the five-year average of 12 percent for that date.
The spring wheat harvest was 93 percent complete, compared with the norm of 92 percent, the USDA said. Winter wheat planting was 25 percent complete, below the normal pace of 37 percent.
Soybeans were 5 percent harvested, which was behind the five-year average of 8 percent.
In early trading, wheat for December delivery was up 1/4 cent at \$4.80 a bushel; December corn was down 1/4 cent at \$3.06 1/4 a bushel; December oats were up 1 1/2 cents at \$1.78 a bushel; November soybeans were up 3 1/4 cents at \$6.43 1/4 a bushel.

Nine-year-old admits tampering with switch, causing derailment

SEWARD — A 9-year-old has admitted tampering with a track-switching device, causing the derailment of seven locomotives and three freight cars in the middle of town, investigators say.

Federal and state authorities do not plan to charge the child, whose name has been withheld because he is a minor, said railroad investigator Lach Jamieson.

Residents said they didn't understand how a young child could have tampered with a track switch.

"It's hard to believe a 9-year-

old would attempt something like this alone," said Sylvia Gray, who has lived in Seward for 22 years. "I think older kids may have been involved."

No one was injured in the Sept. 13 accident.

Jamieson declined to say whether Chicago Central and Pacific, based in Waterloo, Iowa, would seek compensation from the family. The company estimates damages from the derailment at \$300,000. Jamieson said it is unknown whether a lock designed to keep the switching handle in place was secure prior to the derailment.

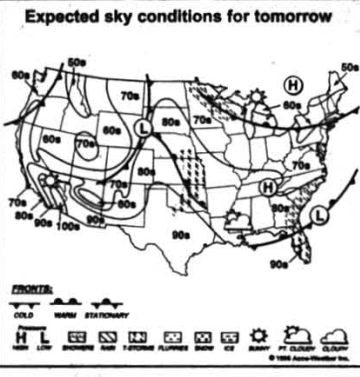

ADM mole reportedly strikes plea bargain

NEW YORK — The government's informant in a price-fixing investigation involving Archer Daniels Midland Co. has agreed to plead guilty to unrelated charges of evading income taxes and defrauding company shareholders, according to a published report.

As part of a plea deal, Mark E. Whitacre, former president of ADM's BioProducts Division, is required to cooperate with the growing number of investigations involving the Decatur, Ill.-based agricultural company, The New York Times reported. The article in today's editions cited anonymous, informed sources.

The investigations include fraud involving corporate money some executives allegedly received in overseas bank accounts as well as several inquiries into possible price-fixing involving several agricultural products.

The two felony charges to which Whitacre agreed in August to plead guilty involve millions of dollars he obtained from ADM through a Swiss bank account, The Times reported.

Industry executives said Whitacre has been interviewing at other companies for jobs. During those interviews, those executives said, he has disclosed his agreement to plead guilty,

The Times said.

No charges have yet been filed against Whitacre, and it could not be immediately determined when they might be. In a brief telephone call Tuesday, Whitacre declined to comment to The Times. And he did not immediately return phone messages left Tuesday night.

Justice Department spokesman John Russell declined comment on The Times report late Tuesday night.

A woman who answered the phone Tuesday night at the home of Whitacre's attorney, James Epstein, told the AP he did not take business calls at home.

Cat, UAW take another break in talks

PEORIA — Caterpillar Inc. and the United Auto Workers have taken another hiatus in their negotiations to end a 15-month strike.

The two sides met for more than two hours at a Peoria hotel Thursday. They have met only a handful of times since the union went on strike more than 15 months ago.

Most negotiation has been conducted through mediators or in brief face-to-face meetings to trade proposals, so two hours was an especially long session.

But they did not agree to meet today, as officials had said was a possibility. Recent negotiations have been a stop-and-go affair — brief meetings punctuated by long down periods.

Local bargaining sessions, about different issues at individual plants, may be scheduled next week, company spokesmen said. They, and union officials, refused to discuss the content of Thursday's meeting.

The last central bargaining session was conducted two weeks ago, and it too ended with the two sides agreeing to discuss local issues. Sources later said,

without providing any details, that the company made a contract offer that union officials disliked.

The meeting Thursday likely was to give the union's response, said Illinois State University management professor Victor Devinatz. "I don't know what else could have been going on."

"One thing we know is not going on is that they're not really engaging yet in bargaining," Devinatz added. "Nitty-gritty bargaining would involve eight- or 12-hour sessions."

The United Auto Workers has

not had a contract with Caterpillar since 1991 and has been on strike since June 1994.

More than 13,000 members are eligible to strike, but the company says only 9,500 have stayed on the picket line.

The rest have returned to work and helped the Peoria-based company continuing making earth-moving equipment — and set new records for profit.

The strike involves eight plants in Illinois, Pennsylvania and Colorado.

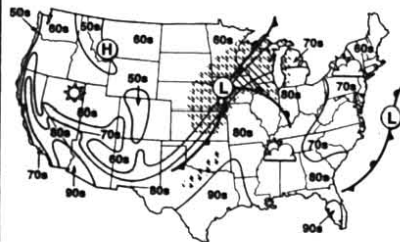

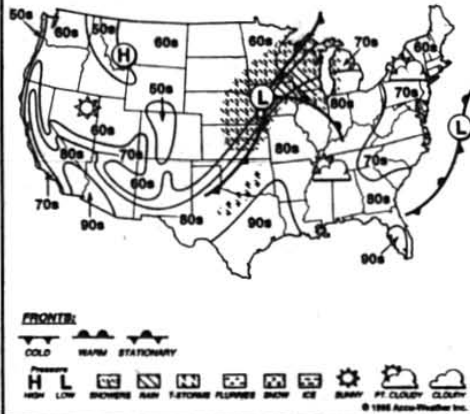

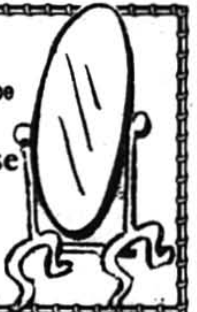
