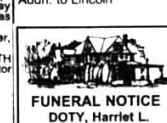

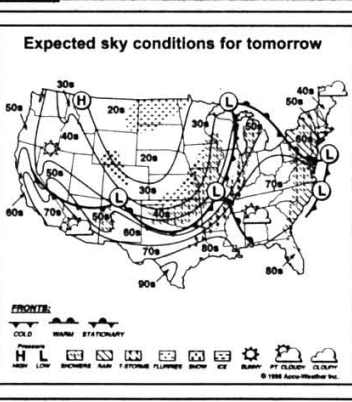

State holding hearing on nuke dump location

A public hearing to solicit comments on the proposed criteria for selecting a site for a low-level radioactive waste disposal facility in Illinois will be held Nov. 7 at the Prairie Capital Convention Center in Springfield.

This will be the only opportunity for central Illinois residents to give input on the site criteria. Public opinion will not be sought when a task group conducting the search applies the criteria to specific areas.

Rumors have placed Logan County — a top contender in the original aborted search in the early '80s — as a front runner for getting the low-level waste site. In the first go-round, Logan County Board members removed the county from the running after receiving a 4,400-signature petition against locating the facility here.

However, task force chairman Richard Semonin said the group

is starting with a clean slate and will not be narrowing the running field for several years, much less choosing a site until the turn of the century.

Semonin said the only effort to determine a 640-acre site for the waste facility is preparing a listing of property characteristics. This criteria list will be ratified following the public hearings and then given to the state Water and Geological Survey, which will find at least 10 locations that fit the bill.

The criteria specify the geographic, geologic, seismologic, hydrologic and other scientific conditions best suited for a low-level radioactive waste facility, as well as factors related to land use, natural resources and other concerns.

Anyone interested in testifying should notify Semonin by calling 1-217-523-0817. Notification for the hearing should be submitted by Friday. The hearing is scheduled from 2 to 5 p.m. and from 6 to 9 p.m.

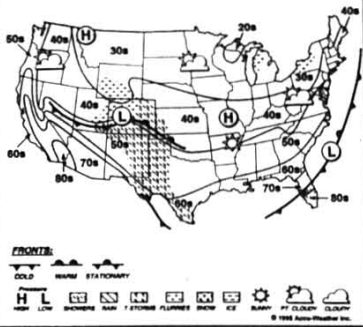

Blindness warning sounded

CHICAGO — Blindness — much of it preventable — among older Americans will double during the next 35 years if the nation doesn't find better ways to arrest eye disease among aging Baby Boomers, a researcher says.

"If we don't try to do something different, we're going to be in big trouble," said James M. Tielsch, an associate professor in international health and ophthalmology at Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore.

Tielsch presented his projections on aging and blindness Saturday at the annual meeting of Prevent Blindness America, the nonprofit group previously known as the National Society to Prevent Blindness.

An estimated 860,000 Americans over age 40 were legally blind in both eyes in 1990, and that number will increase to 1.7 million by the year 2030 at current rates of aging and diagnosis of aging-related eye diseases, Tielsch said.

"This is all driven by the wave of Baby Boomers moving through the older years ... into the high-risk years for vision loss," Tielsch said.

Four diseases cause most of the blindness and severe vision loss among aging Americans, who include 76 million Baby Boomers.

The leading cause is age-related macular degeneration, a painless deterioration of vision caused by a breakdown of tissues at the back of the eye. Another major cause is cataracts, a clouding of the eye's lens. Also important is glaucoma, damage caused by a buildup of fluid pressure inside the eyeball. And another major problem is diabetic eye disease, particularly retinopathy, caused by leakage of blood and fluid in the light-sensitive part of the eye called the retina.

Many cases of all four could be caught and cured or controlled through regular eye examinations, which Americans tend to neglect, Tielsch said.

The nation also needs to continue aggressive research into eye diseases and treatments, he said.

"If we could delay the onset (of aging-related eye diseases) by just 15 years, we could get rid of a lot of these problems because frankly more people would be dying before they had significant vision loss as a result of these problems," he said.

Dr. Eve J. Higginbotham, a researcher who is not associated with the estimate but who also attended the conference, said Tielsch's projections are "right on target."

"It's amazing that in this nation of plenty we have rate of blindness that rivals blindness in developing countries," said Higginbotham, chair of ophthalmology at the University of Maryland at Baltimore.

That is especially true since Medicare covers most of the cost of eye care for elderly Americans, she and Tielsch said.

Woman dies of exposure in swamp

Authorities said they do not suspect foul play in the death of Annetta Moore, who was reported missing Wednesday.

Hunters discovered Moore's car stuck in mud and well off the roadway east of Dowell on

Saturday, state police said.

Her body was found Sunday about a half-mile away during a search with aircraft and all-terrain vehicles, police said.

Jackson County Coroner Dr. Jerry Thurman said Moore had been dead 24 to 36 hours when she was found.

Police said they believe Moore became disoriented after her car became stuck. She had suffered a stroke in February that had left her confused at times, Thurman said.

Low supplies keep corn prices on upward spiral

WASHINGTON — With this year's corn harvest projected to be below last year's, feed prices are expected to continue rising, further squeezing livestock and poultry operations, Agriculture Department economists say.

Their November forecast puts corn production 16 percent higher than 1993 but 27 percent below last year's record harvest.

Demand also continues to be strong, which is expected to push ending stocks for next fall down to a level 25 percent below the 1993-94 marketing year and nearly 60 percent lower than last year.

The higher prices are expected to reduce feed use in 1995-96. The average price for corn is up 20 cents this month from last, now in the range of \$2.95 to \$3.35. That compares with \$2.26 last year and \$2.50 in 1993-94.

Sorghum and oat production are down 29 percent from last year, while barley is 4 percent lower. Seasonal average prices of these grains also are projected to be above the averages of the past two years.

Some of the higher feed costs may have been avoided last month by heavier use of pasture and range grazing.

Conditions ranged from fair to excellent for most of the country in mid-October, USDA's Economic Research Service said.

Hay production is forecast to set a record this year, at 157 million tons, with harvested acreage up 3 percent from a year ago. Alfalfa hay production is projected to be 6 percent higher and the largest crop since 1986, though not a record. Production of other hay is expected to rise 3 percent from last year.

The farm price of hay rose to \$83 a ton in October, but that was still \$3 a ton less than a year earlier. Alfalfa prices also were down \$3 a ton from last year, and the price of other hay was \$5 less.

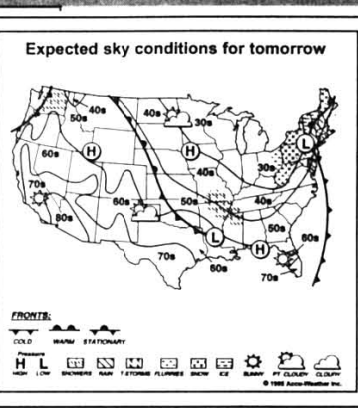

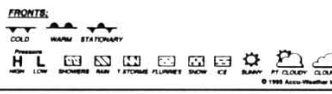
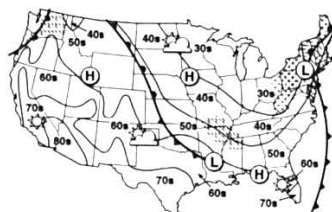

Justices pay tribute to late colleague

SPRINGFIELD — The late Illinois Supreme Court Justice Thomas J. Moran was remembered for his compassion and his ability to write scholarly opinions during a memorial ceremony Tuesday.

Moran, who died in September, was honored during ceremonies in the Illinois Supreme Court chambers. The ceremonies were attended by his wife, Jane, other family members and friends. The ceremonies for Moran, 75, lasted just over one hour.

Justice Ben K. Miller, of Springfield, remembered Moran as an individual who took an interest in the administration of the court, especially when he served his three year term as Chief Justice.

He played a part in the computer tracking of court cases, Miller said, as well as helping to establish a new code of conduct for lawyers.

Moran helped in opening proceedings to the public at the attorney's hearing board, as well as bringing lay persons into the proceedings, he said.

Moran served 16 years on the Illinois Supreme Court, Miller said, "and his opinions were known for scholarship and clarity."

"He was a unifying force on the court and he sincerely cared about other people," Miller added. "Those who knew him will miss him."

Terrence K. Hegarty, president of the Illinois State Bar Association, said Moran spent 36 years of his life in the judiciary and was dedicated to bettering other's lives.

"He had an ability to keep everything in perspective," Hegarty said. "His profound influence on the law of this state will be with us always."

Rudolph F. Magna Jr., president of the Lake County Bar Association, told the gathering a book could be written on the life of Moran.

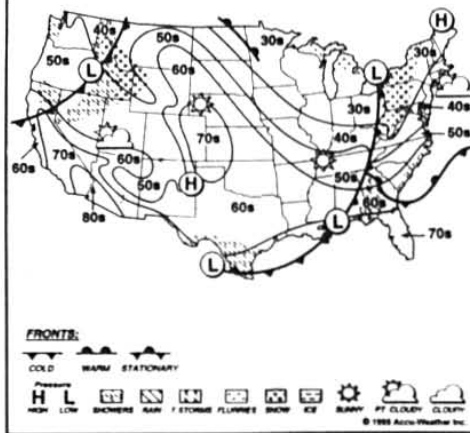

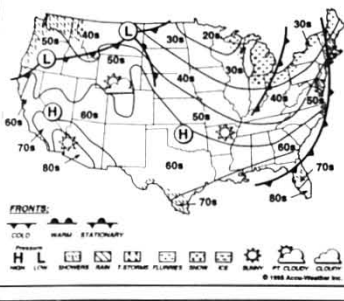

CHICAGO (AP) — Wheat futures prices rose moderately in early trading today on the Chicago Board of Trade on news of an Egyptian purchase and expectations for more export sales. Oat futures also rose. Corn and soybeans were steady to lower.

Private exporters reported sales of 150,000 metric tons of U.S. wheat to Egypt overnight, the U.S. Agriculture Department said this morning.

Analysts said China, Russia and Morocco also need wheat and could surface as buyers of U.S. grain this week.

In early trading, wheat for December delivery was up 2 cents at \$4.94 1/2 a bushel, December corn was unchanged at \$3.28 a bushel, December oats were up 2 1/4 cents at \$2.11 a bushel, January soybeans were down 1/4 cent at \$6.86 1/4 a bushel.

Cattle futures rose in early trading on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange after the USDA reported a smaller number of cattle on feed than traders expected.

In a monthly report released after the close of trading Friday, the USDA said 1 percent more cattle were being fattened for slaughter Nov. 4 in the seven-largest cattle-feeding states than on the same date last year. Traders had expected a 2.4 percent increase in the feed-lot herd.

Hog futures were narrowly mixed on ideas meatpacker demand will slow this week.

Live cattle for December delivery were up 0.20 cent at 68.87 cents a pound; January feeder cattle were 0.20 cent higher at 64.65 cents a pound; December live hogs were 0.08 cent higher at 44.15 cents a pound; February frozen pork bellies were 0.28 cent higher at 56.90 cents a pound.

Wall Street at noon

NEW YORK (AP) — The Dow industrial average was up slightly at midday, buoyed by a breakthrough agreement in the U.S. budget impasse.

At noon on Wall Street, the Dow Jones industrial average rose 3.97 to 4,993.92. It surpassed the 5,000 mark for the first time in history early this morning before retreating.

Declining issues led advances by 1,117 to 955, with 853 unchanged, on the New York

Stock Exchange. Volume hit 142.69 million shares.

Broad market indexes were mixed. The NYSE composite fell 0.50 at 319.62, the American Stock Exchange's market value index rose 0.51 at 532.47, and the Nasdaq composite slipped 0.60 at 1,044.43.

The Standard & Poor's 500 list fell 0.93 at 599.14, coming off its record high set Friday.

The budget accord reached late Sunday helped fuel the market's drive this morning, taking the blue-chip index past the 5,000 mark.

President Clinton and Congress reached a partial accord to reopen the government and start negotiations for a balanced budget by 2002. The sides, however, agreed to continue talks over taxes, Medicare, education and the environment.

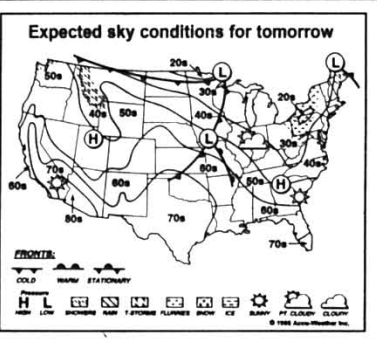

GURNEE — Two people were killed and seven others were injured in two accidents that happened within 30 minutes and three-quarters of a mile of each other Friday.

The first accident, at about 1 p.m. on U.S. Route 41, was a head-on collision between a car and a minivan. Both people in the car were killed instantly. Three others were admitted to St. Therese Medical Center in Waukegan and a fourth flown to

the Milwaukee Regional Medical Center.

Traffic was blocked because of the accident, forcing holiday shoppers heading to a popular outlet mall, Gurnee Mills, to take detours.

Authorities say backed up traffic may have contributed to a second accident, involving two cars, at about 1:30 p.m. on Stearns School Road just west of Route 41.

Three people were hospitalized — one in critical condition — in that accident.

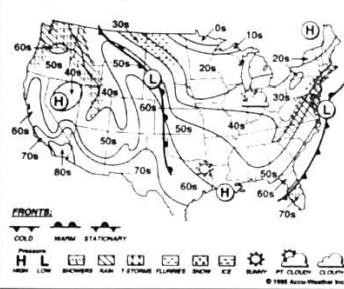

CHICAGO — A judge ordered two boys who threw a 5-year-old to his death from a 14th floor apartment to be held in state custody indefinitely.

Juvenile Court Judge Carol Kelly ordered the two boys, 12 and 11, to be held by the state Department of Child and Family Services until a suitable treatment center can be found for them.

Eric Morse was killed Oct. 13, 1994, when he was dangled, then dropped from a 14th floor window at the Chicago Housing Authority's Ida B. Wells apartment building.

Eric had accompanied the boys to a vacant 14th floor

apartment in the building. His 9-year-old brother, Derrick, testified that the older boy lured the brothers there by asking if they wanted to see a clubhouse.

Prosecutors say the accused boys were angry because Eric wouldn't steal candy for them, and used the clubhouse as a ruse to get Eric inside the apartment. Once there, the older boy hung

Eric out the window, Derrick testified.

Derrick testified that he ran down the stairs, vainly hoping to catch his brother.



Lawmakers tour U of I ag school

Event prompted by criticism of college's farm programs

URBANA — The University of Illinois can expect more competition for shrinking state dollars in the coming year, a state legislator predicted Tuesday.

In the wake of dismantling of regional university systems earlier this year, Rep. Bill Black, R-Danville, said other state universities have hired top-notch lobbyists to take their cases directly to the legislature.

"It may go very smoothly or it may be more fun than we've had in a number of years, I don't know," he said.

Black joined about 15 members of the Illinois House and Senate agriculture and conservation committees for a tour of the newly renamed College of Agricultural, Consumer and Environmental Sciences at the U of I Tuesday.

After eating lunch served by food-science students, the lawmakers said they approved of the new name for the long-time College of Agriculture, saying it more accurately describes the diverse curriculum.

The tour was prompted in part by recent criticism of the university for losing touch with its agricultural roots, and by controversies over cuts such as the pending loss of the sheep program.

Rep. Duane Noland, R-

Decatur, said the unusual group visit was partly to familiarize legislators with changes at the college, and to make sure agriculture remains a priority.

"We don't want agriculture to come out on the short end of the stick," said Noland, who is chairman of the House ag and conservation committee.

University officials said sheep will still be purchased for use when needed in animal science classes, but that keeping a full-time herd and shepherd had become too expensive, given the comparatively small size of the sheep industry in Illinois.

Sheep producers have criticized loss of the program, and Sen. Harry "Babe" Woodyard, R-Chrisman, chairman of the Senate ag committee, said it is one of the university issues that has caused his phone to ring lately.

It's among the tough choices the university has had to make, and will probably have to continue to make, Interim Dean David Chicoine said.

For the first time, the university expects to receive fewer federal dollars in the coming

year, Chicoine said. Staffing will be cut back, though not eliminated, in the university's horse, swine and dairy programs as well, he said.

Chancellor Michael Aiken said the university currently has 170 fewer faculty members, but more students, than in 1988. Illinois has not kept pace with other Midwestern states in faculty salaries, he added.

Woodyard said he learned that \$1.5 million had to be cut from other programs to come up with matching funding to keep local extension offices open around the state.

Legislators said they hope the soon-to-be-appointed Extension 2000 commission will address the funding issue, and other possible changes. Black said he receives more negative feedback about extension than any other university program.

After venturing past doors marked "DANGER, LASER" and trying their hand at manipulating genes, many of the lawmakers said they were impressed with the amount and level of research going on at the college.

Board of Trade

CHICAGO (AP) — Most grain and soybean futures prices extended their gains in early trading today on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Signs of export demand and tight near-term availability of corn, wheat and soybean oil.

The early gains extended Wednesday's strong rally, which was fueled in worries about dry weather in the winter wheat belt and expectations for export sales in U.S. grain.

Traders said there were indications of overnight export sales of corn, but no sales were confirmed by the Agriculture Department.

Little or no delivery notices were posted this morning against the December wheat, corn, soybean oil and soybean meal contracts, an indication of tight near-term supplies. Today marks the start of the delivery period for the December contracts, which expire Dec. 19.

In early trading, wheat for December delivery was up 1/2 cent at \$5.01 1/2 a bushel. December corn was 1 cent higher at \$3.29 1/4 a bushel. December oats were up 2 1/2 cents at \$2.14 1/4 a bushel. January soybeans were 1 1/2 cents higher at \$6.85 1/2 a bushel.

Cattle futures were mixed as meatpacker demand for animals slowed. Hog and pork belly futures were higher in

anticipation of stronger meatpacker demand. Live cattle for December delivery were up 0.10 cent at 67.45 cents a pound. January feeder cattle were 0.07 cent lower at 64.30 cents a pound. December live hogs were 0.40 cent higher at 44.55 cents a pound. February frozen pork bellies were 0.65 cent higher at 54.70 cents a pound.

Wall Street, noon

NEW YORK (AP) — Stocks were narrowly mixed at midday, as investors shed blue-chip names following sluggish economic reports but bought some small-company issues.

At noon on Wall Street, the Dow Jones industrial average was down 13.01 at 5,092.55.

Despite the loss in the Dow average, advancing issues led decliners on the New York Stock Exchange by 1,090 to 1,005, with 855 unchanged. Volume came to 178.23 million shares, down from 182.12 million Wednesday.

Broad-market indexes were mixed. The NYSE composite index was off 0.16 at 323.83, and the Standard & Poor's 500 composite was off 0.77 at 606.87. But the Nasdaq composite was up 1.22 at 1,058.84, and the

American Stock Exchange's market value index was up 2.20 at 535.23.

Bonds rose after the Commerce Department said orders to U.S. factories for expensive, long-lasting goods fell 1 percent in October — the first drop in three months — led by plunging aircraft orders.

At 10 a.m., the Chicago Purchasing Management Association said its regional adjusted November index dropped to 49.9 percent from 53.4 percent in October.

Both reports indicated that the economy may be slowing. That was good news for bonds, because a slower economy increases the chances that the Federal Reserve will lower interest rates. The 30-year Treasury bond was up 29-32 point, yielding 6.13 percent.

But it was potentially bad news for economically sensitive stocks, which respond quickly to changes in economic outlook. The Dow was led lower by economically sensitive names and those that have international exposure, including Disney, down 1/4 at 66 1/4 despite reports that its recently released film Toy Story has been a box-office hit.

Disney was followed lower by Eastman Kodak, down 1/4 at 68 1/2, and AT&T, off 1/4 at 65 1/4.
