



"You could tell from the message on the machine there was some sadness in the voice, it was kind of touching," said his father, Don.

The younger Chipman, who served in Saudi Arabia during the Gulf War, said his group "will be setting up the headquarters for the bigger force to come down."

Don Chipman said he last spoke by telephone with his son two weeks ago. "I told him to keep his head down and be

careful: 'You've got to be alert, son, and look out,''' said Chipman, 64, who served in the Korean War.

His parents said they support the NATO mission, with some reservations.

"We're probably more concerned now than (in Desert Storm) ... due to the unstable situation" in the former Yugoslavia, the elder Chipman said.

"Then, the mission was pretty well-defined. Here, we don't know. We just don't know what's going on," he said.

Mrs. Chipman, who spent three weeks in Europe with her son and his family this summer, said Matthew is "excited to get to go in and maybe be of some help."

Mrs. Chipman, 60, said her 9-year-old grandson likely understands the dangers his dad will face.

"The little ones, 1 and 3, are too little to realize what's going on," she said. "They're just excited to be able to come and see just excited to be ab Grandma and Grandpa.

Unposted rural roads now have SPORTS automatic 65 mph speed limits CARD SHOW

THE ASSOCIATED PRESS

SPRINGFIELD — With the federal speed limit now history, drivers can go 65 mph on county and township roads that have no posted limit, state officials said.

When the federal speed limit ended earlier this month, state speed limits kicked in.

"The state law on the books in Illinois provides for 65 miles an hour on these two-lane rural roads," said Martha Schiebel, a spokeswoman for the Illinois Department of Transportation.

Schiebel had no estimate on how many roads have no posted limit.

She said the law gives local jurisdictions the power to alter that speed limit after conducting a traffic study.

IDOT performed a traffic engineering study, which allowed Gov. Jim Edgar to impose a 65 mph speed limit on rural interstates and four-lane divided highways, and a 55 mph speed limit on urban interstates and two-lane state rural roads.

But the local roads are outside the state's jurisdiction.

Some local officials worry


that the 65 mph limit is unsafe for those roads, but at the same time they are concerned about the cost of a study.

"It would be a major cost to keep the speed limits at 55 mph under the current law," said Steve Brandau, president of the Illinois County Engineers Association. He said the best solution to the problem for local governments would be for the state to change the limit to 55.

The tollway authority has acquired 27 of the 48 homes in the path of the extension and continues to negotiate with the owners of the others.









The study is the first to explore the effect of naturally occurring hormones on the likelihood of developing ovarian cancer, Helzlsouer said in a telephone interview. She called for other studies to replicate the re-

"With ovarian cancer, there's a lot we don't know," she said. "It's not that common, and when it occurs, usually it's lethal, because it's found in very late stages."

The American Cancer Society estimated 14,500 women would die from ovarian cancer in 1995. The disease, which has a fiveyear survival rate of 42 percent, has claimed the lives of comedian Gilda Radner and actress Sandy Dennis.

The researchers were surprised to find a link between lower levels of gonadotropins and higher rates of ovarian cancer, Helzl-



The study may complicate efforts to develop new hormone treatments.

For example, a pilot trial is under way in California with hormones designed to act as a birth control pill and breastcancer preventative.

Since the cancer-preventative could cause bone thinning, developers are considering adding androgens to offset that effect, Helzlsouer's team said.

An outside expert said Helzlsouer's study is far from conclusive.


