Rural homeowners in Logan County who need to fix up their homes may be eligible for financing from the Rural Economic and Community Development division of the U.S. Agriculture Department.

Michael A. Booher, field office manager, said that in addition to financing new homes, the agency also has funds available to families to purchase an existing home.

RECD also makes loans to remove health or safety hazards from homes owned by very low income and elderly families, Booher said.

Income is the key to the type of assistance available through RECD, Booher said. If income is very low, a repair loan may be used to remove health hazards such as repairing roofs, providing sanitary water and waste disposal systems, installing storm doors and screens, insulating homes and upgrading electrical

Eligibility rules require applicants to own and live in a home or on a farm in the open country, or in a town having less than 10,000 population. All areas in Logan County are eligible for these types of loans. Also,

The judge gave him 100 years. Now the 36-year-old career criminal won't be eligible for parole until he is 92.

"Mr. Pullen, you have lost your right to live among us, sir," replied Circuit Judge Terence Madsen. "Go to jail.

# Shutdown delays crop report

CHAMPAIGN - The federal government shutdown that ended this week has delayed release of the final report on the 1995 grain harvest, the Illinois Agricultural Statistics Service said.

The Agriculture Department report due out today contains the final harvest tallies for corn, soybeans and other grain crops. The USDA now plans to release the report Tuesday.

A soggy spring and scorching summer helped make the 1995 harvest one of the smallest in recent years. The small harvest and a December USDA report showing an increase in swine herds drove corn and soybean prices sharply higher.

While corn prices fell earlier this week with the news of favorable weather for South American growers, grain prices should stay high through this summer, said market expert Darrel Good of the University of Illinois.

"The current supplies and worry about the coming crop year won't go away overnight," Good said.

There is "some potential for surprise one way or the other" with the final crop numbers, however, Good said.

The high grain prices may force some hog producers to reduce their herds, which could further drive down hog prices, Good said. But consumers probably won't see much difference in price at the supermarket, he

"The cost of the raw product is a relatively small percentage of prices at the retail level, Good said.







## Prisoner's fate may be decided by appeals panel

VIENNA — Lee Otis Grif-fin's 15-year fight to get out of prison for a triple slaying he in-sists he did not commit may be decided in a few minutes by the 7th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals on Wednesday.

Last June, a federal magistrate ruled Griffin must either be freed or retried because his original trial was unfair. State pros-

inal trial was unfair. State pros-ecutors immediately appealed. "It's down to the wire, and all the issues are on the table," Griffin, 37, said from Shawnee Correctional Center on Monday.

Griffin was charged with three East St. Louis murders in 1981. He was convicted sentenced to 40 years for the killings and 30 rs for armed violence. After years of court motions, a

breakthrough came in November 1994. The 7th Circuit in Chi-cago ordered U.S. Magistrate Gerald Cohn to give the case a "more searching examination."

Cohn then ruled Griffin re-

ceived ineffective counsel be-cause his attorney also repre-sented a co-defendant. Cohn ordered Griffin released in 90 days or retried.

The 7th Circuit ruled in July

that Griffin must remain in prison until the state's appeal was heard.

On Wednesday, the appeals court will consider the prosecu-tion's appeal of Cohn's ruling as well as a request by Griffin that he be released while awaiting the outcome of the appeal.

CHICAGO (AP) — Grain and soybeans fu-tures prices retreated early today on the Chi-cago Board of Trade amid lackluster weekly export sales figures.



# Deaths teach students hard lessons in life

COPLEY NEWS SERVICE

GURNEE - At the time of life when death is more myth than reality, teen-agers at Warren Township High School are learning hard lessons about their own fragile exist-

A suicide. An alcohol overdose. Two car crashes. Six students lost this school year

"They are scared," said Bill Werley, one of two psychologists on staff at Warren.
"We have kids that are so afraid, they are asking what is going to happen next. I had one girl talking to me about not taking driver's education because she is afraid."

Warren students Timothy Ouimby. 16, and

Warren students Timothy Quimby, 16, and Russell Wagoner, 14, both of Park City, were killed Sunday when the 1994 Mazda Quimby was driving struck a private ambu-lance on Washington Street east of Route 45 in Gurnee

in Gurnee.

Also killed were Melissa Chamness, 15, a
Zion-Benton High School student, and Arturo Colin of Park City, a 13-year-old eighthgrader at Woodland Middle School.

A fifth passenger in the car, Warren freshman David Kitzman of Park City, remains in
serious condition at St. Therese Medical
Center in Waukegan.

Julie Cooley, director of pupil personnel services, organized Monday's counseling services

The school's six guidance counselors, two psychologists and social worker all talked to Students, along with volunteers from Warren Township Youth Services, the Special Education District of Lake County and two private practitioners.

Counselors attended the victims' classes to talk with classmates. Administrators closed the school library and converted it into a counseling center.

Cooley said several other high schools, including Cary-Grove High, called to offer help. Seven students from Cary-Grove died after their bus was struck by a train last year in Fox River Grove.

Counselors and staff have themselves coping with Sunday's accident as

"This time, I happened to know two of the kids very well," Werley said. "I had worked with both Tim and David."

Werley said counselors are simply listening to students' fears

That we have to lean on one another and help one another. We tell them that it is important to talk about how you feel, to express how you feel."

Counselors were also on hand in Woodland Elementary District and Zion-Benton High School.

A spokesman for Woodland said a team of 13 social workers visited Colin's classes and offered individual sessions for both students and staff. All of the victims, except Chamness, had attended Woodland and were well-known by staff.

Sunday's accident was also difficult for Gurnee Fire Department firefighters and paramedics who responded. The department had also handled the accident in which Korda and Rockwell were killed.

"Probably the worst thing is to have someone who is highly trained and ready to help, and can't," said Fire Chief Tim McGrath. "You don't just walk away and forget about it. You grieve for the family, you grieve because maybe you have kids of

McGrath said counseling is available for firefighters through a Critical Incident Debriefing Team or through other means. He said no one has sought help after Sunday's accident. "Very often these things don't show up for a while," he said.

The chief said there used to be a stigma about firefighters seeking counseling to deal with grief over the victims they cannot help, but that has faded in recent years.

"When I first started there was a phrase, 'If you can't take the heat get out of the kitchen,'" McGrath said. "You used to sit around the kitchen table (in the firehouse) and hear statements like that all the time.

"Thankfully, that's changed. You don't hear statements like that anymore."

ing giant also tried to influence union elections by tearing down the signs of candidates they opposed, Rose ruled.

Rose dismissed several lessserious allegations against the Peoria-based company.

The union ended a 17-month strike late last year but returned to work without a contract.


