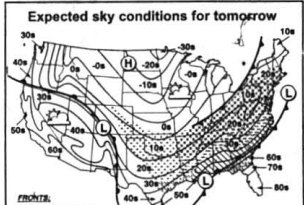

Board of Trade

CHICAGO (AP) — Soybean futures rose slightly in early trading today on the Chicago Board of Trade with a solid export report released by the government. Grain futures also rose.

Before the market opened, the Agriculture Department's weekly export report for soybeans showed sales of 529,600 metric tons. "That's good solid business for soybeans, but it's absolutely the kind of number we've been seeing and are comfortable with," said David Armstrong, an analyst with Chicago Corp.

Armstrong said the USDA's weekly export sales of 1 million metric tons of corn were average but somewhat lower than previous weeks.

In early trading, March wheat was up 2 cents at \$5.21 1/2 a bushel. March corn was up 1/2 cent at \$3.69 1/2 a bushel. March oats were up 1/4 cent at \$2.26 1/2 a bushel, and March soybeans were up 2 cents at \$7.40 1/4 a bushel.

In early trading on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange, feeder cattle, live hogs and frozen pork belly futures were mixed.

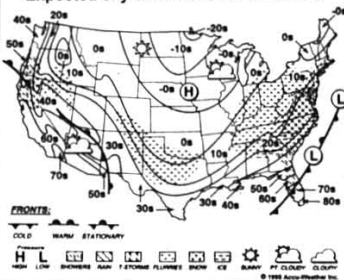

Board of Trade

CHICAGO (AP) — Wheat futures prices jumped in early trading today on the Chicago Board of Trade on news that Russia intends to buy 2.5 million metric tons of grain this month. Corn futures also rose higher on the news, while oats and soybeans were mixed. Jerry Gidel, an analyst with Dean Witter in Chicago, said wheat was also supported by concerns that the extreme cold hitting many of the Plains states will reduce yields from this year's winter wheat harvest. Corn futures opened lower with talk that the placement of new live cattle into feed yards could be as much as 10 percent below last year at this time, Gidel said. But corn prices rose in sympathy with wheat on the news from Russia, he said. In early trading, March wheat was up 4 cents at \$5.21 1/2 a bushel; March corn was up 1/2 cent at \$3.67 a bushel; March oats were down 1/2 cent at \$2.23 1/4 a bushel.

CHICAGO — Talk show host Oprah Winfrey and her studio audience are heading to Disney World as part of her show's 10th anniversary celebration. Winfrey made the announcement during a taping of the Oprah Winfrey Show on Wednesday.

Disney World, marking its 25th anniversary, contacted Winfrey and said, "It's our anniversary Oprah. It's your anniversary. ... We would like to send your entire audience to Walt Disney World," Winfrey said in a news release.

The 217-member studio audience "just went wild" when Winfrey announced they were going, said spokeswoman Jill Almuquist. The show airs Monday.

Edgar to announce stadium plans

CHICAGO — Gov. Jim Edgar shifted his push for a domed stadium into high gear today with a proposal for a \$400 million building to house the Chicago Bears and attract convention business.

Edgar's office refused to release details before a scheduled afternoon news conference. But Senate President James "Pate" Philip, R-Wood Dale, said the proposal would call for financing the stadium with a mixture of private and public money.

About \$180 million to \$200 million would come from the Chicago Bears and season ticket-holders and the rest would mostly be backed by existing taxes on motels, restaurants, rental cars and limousines in

to a domed stadium unless the cost is spread beyond Chicago. His opposition would surely keep some Democratic legislators from voting for the plan.

"Let's not kid ourselves. The stadium would be built to house the Bears for 10 games a year,"

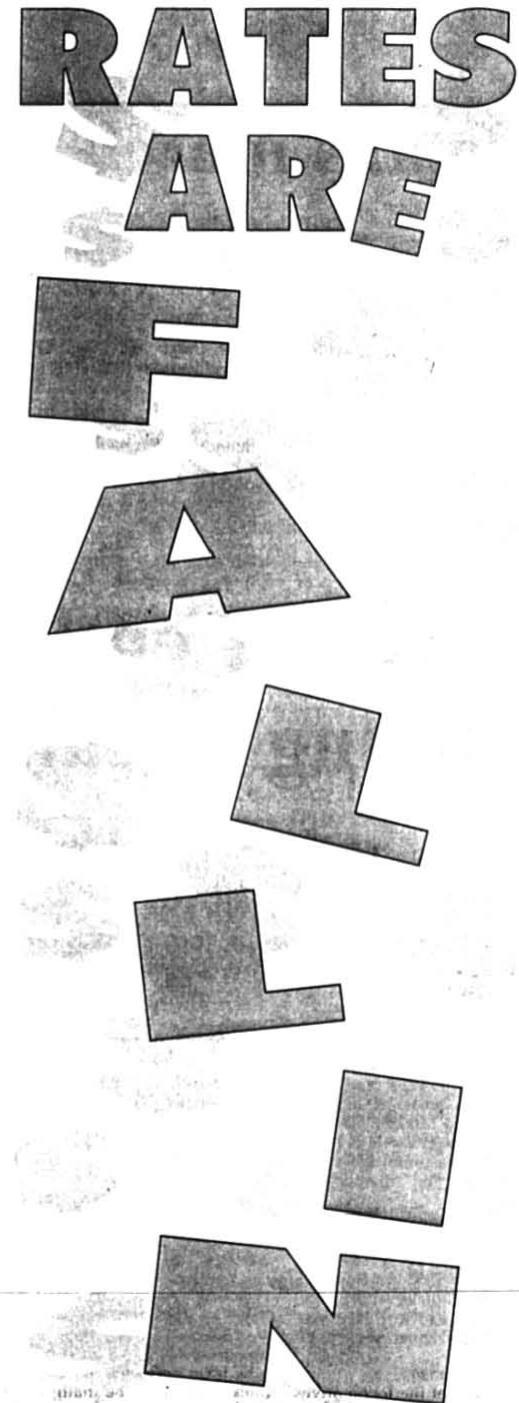

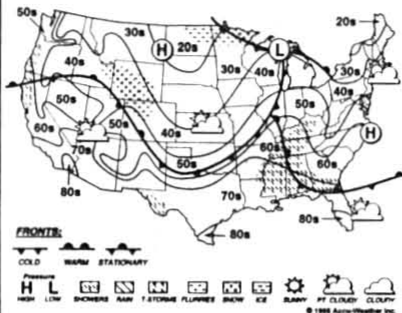

Board of Trade

CHICAGO (AP) — Corn and wheat futures prices rose strongly in early trading today on the Chicago Board of Trade after the release of the Agriculture Department's supply and demand reports. Oat and soybean futures were also higher.

The USDA reduced its forecast of May 31 U.S. wheat reserves to 346 million bushels, down from a January prediction of 386 million.

For corn, the USDA reduced its forecasts of ending stocks to 457 million bushels from 507 million last month.

"I don't think anybody is too terribly shocked by the numbers. But still, there it is in print and it boosted the market," said Jack Scoville, grain analyst for The Linn Group in Chicago.

The USDA also increased the export forecasts for both commodities in the reports. Scoville said those increases reflect the excellent demand Asia has had recently for corn and wheat.

In early trading, March wheat was up 5 1/4 cents to \$5.15 1/4 a bushel; March corn was up 2 1/4 cents to \$3.62 a bushel; March oats were up 2 1/2 cents to \$2.09 1/4 a bushel; and March soybeans were up 2 cents at \$7.23 1/2 a bushel.

In early trading on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange, live cattle were higher, following through from a strong close Thursday. Analysts said there is also a belief in the market that beef prices are on the rise.

February live cattle were up .40 cent at 64.70 cents a pound; March feeder cattle were up .28 cent at 58.50 cents a pound; February live hogs were up .18 cents at 48.80 cents a pound; and February frozen pork bellies were up .43 cent at 57.90 cents a pound.

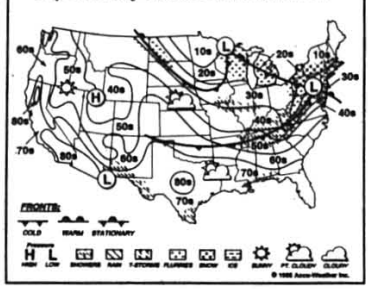

Clinton plans to tap Greenspan again

WASHINGTON — With his re-election chances riding on economic growth, President Clinton is getting ready to reap-point the Federal Reserve chairman noted primarily for the view that too much growth spawns inflation.
Clinton had hoped to add a pro-growth Democrat as the No. 2 official at the Fed to serve as a check on Chairman Alan Greenspan, but those hopes now appear doomed.
The White House said today that liberal New York investment banker Felix Rohatyn was on the verge of withdrawing his name from consideration because of what a spokesman

called the "cheap politics" of Republican foes.
"He's seen the prospects of his nomination descend into the kind of partisan infighting that the American people have grown to hate when they think of Washington D.C.," press secretary Mike McCurry said.
McCurry said Rohatyn had drafted a letter withdrawing his name on Monday but had been persuaded by Clinton's chief of staff, Leon Panetta, to hold off submitting it until the White House made one last-ditch effort to smooth the way for Rohatyn.
But officials held out little hope this effort would succeed in turning the opposition, led by conservative Sen. Connie Mack,

R-Fla., chairman of the Joint Economic Committee.
"I stopped believing in miracles a long time ago," Rohatyn said in today's editions of The Washington Post. He said he had been told by friends in both parties that his nomination hearings would have been "extraordinarily divisive, extraordinarily contentious and I didn't want to impose that on the president, on the country or on the Fed."
Rohatyn's potential nomination had faced massive opposition from Republicans on the Senate Banking Committee, the panel that must confirm Fed nominations.

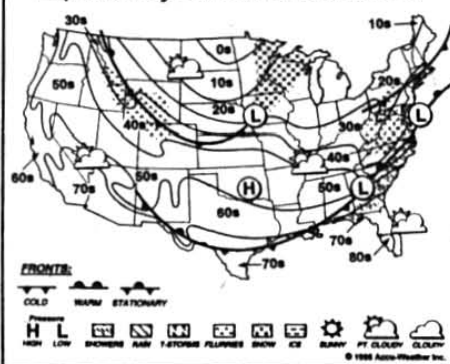

Board of Trade

CHICAGO (AP) — Corn futures prices rose early today on the Chicago Board of Trade amid new export announcements, while wheat prices slipped in quiet consolidation.

Soybeans futures prices turned higher.

The Agriculture Department said this morning that 100,000 tons of corn had been sold to Jordan and another 105,000 tons sold to an unknown destination. The announcements provided early support to the corn market, although investors said they had been expected.

Corn prices have rocketed to 15-year highs this week on strong foreign and domestic demand that threatens supplies expected to end at the lowest in decades. Prices continue to drift upward on bullish momentum, analysts said.

Traders also were moving to square their positions in advance of the three-day holiday weekend.

Soybeans futures prices moved higher on the strength in soybeans.

Wheat for March delivery fell 1 1/4 cents to \$5.24 1/4 a bushel; March corn rose 1 1/4 cents to \$3.79 1/4 a bushel; March oats were unchanged at \$2.18 a bushel; March soybeans rose 1 cent to \$7.33 1/4 a bushel.

Live cattle and hog futures advanced on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange, while feeder cattle futures prices were mixed.

Wall Street at noon

NEW YORK (AP) — Stocks were trimming their losses at midday but still below opening levels, as investors continued to extract profits from the high-flying equities market.

At noon on Wall Street, the Dow Jones industrial average was down 32.87 at 5,518.50. The Dow fell as much as 52 points earlier in the session, prompting the New York Stock Exchange to impose restrictions on sell programs at 10:23 a.m. The trading collar was lifted at 11:02.

Declining issues led advancers by better than 3 to 2 on the New York Stock Exchange. Trading volume on the floor of the Big Board was heavy at 231.78 million shares, well ahead of Thursday's pace of 182.6 million.

State Bank compiles rosy numbers

Rosy reports were the order of the day on Valentine's Day during the 91st annual meeting of State Bank of Lincoln stockholders.

President Terry J. Brown, reviewing the bank's performance in 1995, said primary capital rose to \$16,838,000, or 11.8 percent of total assets, which stood at \$142,299,000.

"Recently, the bank received the highest rating, five star, from Bauer Financial Reports, Inc., a bank research and rating firm," Brown said. "A component of the rating is that the strongest banks must have a capital ratio of more than twice the regulatory requirements."

Deposits and loans rose to new highs of \$123,198,000 and \$83,544,000, respectively, which reflects the ongoing and continuing growth and strength of Lincoln and the surrounding area.

Deposits and loans increased by \$4,050,000 and \$1,035,000. Total assets increased by \$867,000 to \$142,299,000, Brown said.

In 1995, the bank, established here in 1904, was designated a preferred lender by the federal Small Business Administration. The bank is one of four downstate banks to receive the designation.

Brown also announced the promotion of Jeanne Lessen to the position of real estate loan officer. She is actively involved with the bank's Fannie Mae and FmHA guaranteed loan programs and has presented programs for FmHA personnel through the state.

Candy manufacturer gives Centralia bitter pill

LAKE FOREST — Candy maker Leaf Inc. plans to sell its St. Louis plant and close its Centralia, Ill., factory as it realigns product lines in three other cities.

Leaf, a subsidiary of Finland-based Huhtamaki Oy, employs about 255 employees in St. Louis, where it makes Chuckles, Switzer and Sour Dudes candy

and Ford Gum.

The company hopes to sell those brands, and some of the workers could be kept on by a new employer, company spokeswoman Joanne Tremulis said.

The fate of 240 employees at Leaf's Centralia plant is more uncertain. The candy company is relocating equipment and products, including the PayDay

candy bar, to its Robinson, Ill., facility.

"At this point, we just don't know whether we'll need their skills or jobs at other plants," Tremulis said.

Centralia officials were disappointed by the announcement. Marion County has an unemployment rate of about 8 percent.

County launches solo flight on waste management

The Logan County Board dissolved its waste management committee Tuesday and made \$4,000 in seed money available to aid its successor in establishing a county-wide recycling effort.

Members of the new waste management board will meet for the first time tonight to sift through the results of three years of research generated from the Central Illinois Municipal Joint Action Agency on how to best initiate recycling efforts in the county.

While this is a monumental task in itself, the new board also will need to establish an infrastructure and appoint leaders.

The new board is comprised of a member from each participating community and one county board representative and will have the CIMJAA plan — adopted by the Logan County Board last year — as an outline for tackling the county's

recycling effort.

But the very nature of the plan gives the new board members the authority to decide how recycling will be accomplished and at whose expense.

County board President Eldon Behle proposed the county provide start up money for the new group out of the \$21,000 budget to initiate recycling efforts in the county.

Behle said the new board just needed enough to allow them to get to work on the particulars of putting the recycling plan into action and finding alternative funding sources.

"We hope the new board will progress rapidly enough they'll soon set up other means of supporting their efforts," he said.

While the Logan County Board agreed to put the money in a fund for the new board, there was one catch — they have to ask for it first.

Behle appointed county board member Dick Logan to the waste management

board. Logan had served on the county's waste management committee since his election to the board.

Other action taken by the board Tuesday:

■ Approved three low bids for road improvements throughout Logan County.

Calhoun County Construction was the low bidder on two jobs to repair bridges in Mount Pulaski Township, for \$17,088 and \$23,841.

R.A. Cullinan and Sons were awarded the job to repair Burtonview Road for \$79,949.

■ Extended a contract with Heritage in Flight to continue operating the Logan County Airport. The contract will run for an additional five years.

The board also renewed a policy of not offering hanger insurance.

■ Approved the hiring of auditor Jack Wood to review the county's office's utility bills.

The agreement allows Wood to receive 75 percent of any savings the county re-

ceives from charging errors from utility companies.

■ Decided not to offer early retirement to county employees because only three individuals were eligible for the program, according to finance committee chairman Rod White.

White said it would be better to wait until more employees are eligible because the county can offer early retirement only once in six years.

"We're not saying we don't want it, we're just passing on it this time," White said.

■ Approved the appointment of Kevin Coers to the Mount Pulaski Fire Protection District. Coers is completing a term for a former appointee who died recently. The seat expires in May.

Norma Bathe and Dan Fulscher also were appointed to a new term on the Logan County Enhanced 911 Board.

Illinois Power wants to burn ag chemical containers

SPRINGFIELD — Thousands of plastic containers discarded by Illinois farmers each year could be a cheap source of alternative fuel, contends a lawsuit filed in Sangamon County circuit court.

Illinois Power Co., based in Decatur, filed the suit, which seeks to reverse state classification of such plastics as solid waste requiring special approval for burning as a fuel additive.

"These containers are a landfill problem for the state," said IP spokeswoman Tanda Fiocchi. "It is one of the products that appears to us to be a good candidate for supplemental fuels."

The utility already burns 30,000 tons of used tires a year as part of its alternative-fuels program, with plans to boost that to 60,000 tons a year.

The lawsuit contends farm plastics, including discarded pesticide containers, can be safely burned as an additive to coal.

Legislation also is pending in the General Assembly that would ease environmental rules to allow utilities to burn wood, paper, agricultural products, plastics and other materials when combined with coal.

Bill supporters contend allowing up to 20 percent of such a mixture to come from alternative fuels would divert 900,000 tons per year of plastics and other materials from landfills.

A joint proposal for the farm plastics program was first submitted to IEPA in June 1994 by Illinois Power and Resourceful Environmental Ideas, a waste-to-fuel development company based in Belleville.

The companies propose to use "triple rinsed" shredded polyethylene from farm chemical containers to produce a granulated fuel mixture.

Poll: Buchanan, Alexander nipping at Dole's heels in Illinois

CHICAGO — GOP presidential hopefuls Lamar Alexander and Pat Buchanan have surged among likely Republican voters in Illinois, putting them in a statistical dead heat with Bob Dole, a Copley News Service poll shows.

The poll, conducted over the weekend, suggests Dole has a fight on his hands in Illinois, where the Senate majority leader has been the favorite.

Dole was substantially leading his GOP rivals in previous polls. But in the latest statewide survey, Dole won only 27 percent of backing from likely Republican voters, compared to 24 percent for Alexander and 21 percent for Buchanan.

With a 6.5 percentage point margin of error for the GOP sample, the three are statistically tied.

The results heighten the possibility that the March 19 Il-

linois primary could help determine the GOP nominee.

Republicans historically have voted for more moderate candidates in Illinois. Most of the state GOP establishment has endorsed Dole, including Gov. Jim Edgar.

Last September's Copley poll showed Dole with 38 percent and second place going to Texas Sen. Phil Gramm, who only had 19 percent and has since dropped out of the contest.

Buchanan raked up just 12 percent in that poll, and Alexander only had 1 percent.

Even in a Chicago newspaper poll conducted one month ago, Buchanan was down at 6 percent and Alexander had 1 percent.

That makes the rise of Alexander, former Tennessee governor and education secretary under George Bush, the most stunning revelation of the Feb. 17-19 survey.

Growing support for Buchanan, a political commenta-

tor who was a speech writer for President Nixon, is the second most striking finding.

Alexander and Buchanan have seen their stock rise dramatically in the first two major contests of the primary season.

Dole won the Feb. 6 Iowa caucuses as expected, but Buchanan and Alexander were nipping at his heels.

Dole failed to score an anticipated victory in Tuesday's New Hampshire primary, finishing a close second to Buchanan. Alexander was only a few points behind Dole in the Granite State.

Despite Buchanan's strong performances, many observers contend he is unlikely to become the Republican nominee because his anti-immigration, anti-trade views turn off many GOP voters.

The Illinois data suggest Buchanan will have a tough time attracting voters beyond his support base. Alone among the major candidates, his negatives out-

weigh his positives. While about one-third of GOP respondents hold a favorable view of him, 41 percent have an unfavorable opinion.

Alexander appears to have the most room to gain or lose support, since roughly half of those polled hold a neutral opinion of him. One-third of voters are neutral on Dole, and about one-fourth are neutral on Buchanan.

If the November election were held today, the poll further indicates none of the Republicans would beat President Clinton in Illinois.

Clinton overcame George Bush in Illinois four years ago.

Among all voters statewide, the Copley poll shows the president topping Dole 49-36 percent, Alexander 47-34 percent and Buchanan 53-29 percent.

Even so, the survey finds Clinton mired in mediocre job performance and popularity ratings in Illinois, where fewer than half of respondents give

The statewide poll, conducted by Mason-Dixon Political Media Research Inc., interviewed 818 likely registered voters Feb. 17-19.

Respondents were chosen to reflect the state's population distribution according to area, sex and race.

The overall margin of error is plus or minus 3.5 percentage points, meaning the results are considered reflective of the entire state population within that range. For the smaller Republican voter sample, the margin is 6.5 points.

him favorable marks.

The president's re-election numbers did rise slightly since September, with 38 percent saying they would re-elect him and 62 percent choosing to replace Clinton or consider another candidate.

Steve Forbes' weakness is another surprise. After threatening to overtake his rivals as the alternative to front-runner Dole, the multimillionaire publisher has failed to meet expectations

anywhere.

Forbes ranked a distant fourth in the Illinois poll with only 8 percent, identical to his showing in the September survey. He lagged in fourth place in the Iowa and New Hampshire contests.

Other Republican contenders, including Indiana Sen. Richard Lugar, Alan Keyes and Morry Taylor scored in the single digits. California U.S. Rep. Bob Dornan got less than 1 percent.

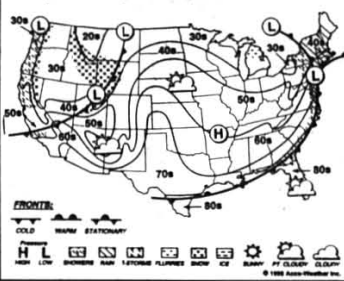

CHICAGO — A federal judge has thrown out the conviction of a postal carrier who was convicted of possessing hundreds of pieces of stolen mail.

U.S. District Judge Robert Gettleman overturned Rufus Cunningham's conviction because the jury took only 10 minutes to reach its decision despite relatively complicated evidence.

A spokesman for U.S. Attorney Jim Burns said the office is considering an appeal of Gettleman's decision.

About 770 pieces of mail were discovered in April 1994 under the back porch of a two-flat occupied by Cunningham.

House may condemn Farrakhan

WASHINGTON — Lawmakers have introduced a resolution condemning Nation of Islam leader Louis Farrakhan's recent trip to Libya, Iran and Iraq.

"Louis Farrakhan is the most notorious racist and bigot in the United States today," said Rep. Pete King, Farrakhan's most vocal foe in Congress.

The New York Republican complained that Farrakhan is "given a world stage to perform on" with the news media and federal government looking on him "as a novelty or an aberration."

"This visit to Iran, Iraq and Libya should awaken all Americans to exactly what type of danger we confront," King said.

The resolution co-sponsored by King and Rep. Tom Lantos, D-Calif., condemns Farrakhan's visit and urges the Clinton administration to investigate the trip.

"This resolution does not deny Mr. Farrakhan's right to free speech," said Lantos. "But we also have free speech as he has the right to denounce the United States as the great Satan."

King is leading efforts in Congress to investigate Farrakhan's travels and his association with such leaders as Libya's Moammar Gadhafi and Iraqi Saddam Hussein.
