
"To my knowledge, he is not anti-Semitic and not antiblack," said Duncan Bauman, the Globe editor who hired Buchanan. "If you listen to what he says, he's a compassionate man.

But Jake McCarthy, former editor of a Teamsters newspaper in St. Louis and now a columnist for the weekly Riverfront Times, remembers a different Buchanan.

In his column last week, Mc-Carthy wrote that Buchanan's rise is "a rather unnerving development to some of us who knew him in St. Louis in the '60s as, although affable enough, a man of unbending uptightness and social views from the days of robber barons and white supremacy."

In 1965, Nixon stopped by the Globe during a visit to St. Louis. Don Hesse, then the Globe's editorial page cartoonist, hosted a party for Nixon at his home in Belleville, Ill.





Peterson hopes to show footage of Stevenson's charity appearance in Normal last fall and include a few clips from episodes of the television series "MASH."









The PCB concluded opponents were effectively ex-cluded from the hearing process used by each community to jus-tify approval of a siting permit.

As in the Havana case, the appeals court was critical of a 1993, company-paid trip by sev-eral Beardstown city officials to visit a waste-to-energy in-cinerator in Massachusetts.

"Only those favoring the in-cinerator participated, although an effort was made to include opposing council members," the justices said.

Southwest Energy paid the cost of airline tickets, rental cars, meals and lodging for the two-day visit. Some participants met with local residents and took a sightseeing trip to Ply-mouth Rock, according to court records.

The company sponsored a similar trip for Havana city officials.

Southwest Energy argued such trips are standard business practice, and that there was no evidence the trips had influenced the local permit decisions. The appellate court justices

agreed such trips can be useful in helping local government of-ficials decide whether to issue permits. But the court said there must be a "bona fide" effort to include opponents of such facili-

The court also said the city should have paid the expense up front and then sought reimburse-ment from Southwest Energy. Energy Answers Inc. of Al-bany, N.Y., provided the finan-cial backing for the proposed incinerators in Havana and

Beardstown Following Edgar's action last Thursday, company officials said they would have to recon-

sider their plans. They also said they are con-

sidering legal action against the state.

The legislation signed by Edgar repealed the state's retail rate law that required utility companies to buy power gener-ated by waste-burning in-cinerators. The state then would reimburse the utility companies for the added cost.

Edgar's staff estimated the subsidy would have cost the state \$2 billion during the next 20 years.

Incinerator supporters claim the facilities are a safe way of producing energy, reducing reli-ance on landfills and giving the state's economy a boost.

Opponents argue the in-cinerators remain unproven and would be a threat to the environment.

Southwest Energy has 30 days in which to appeal the appellate court's decision.

Bill would permit big factories to negotiate secret utility rates

SPRINGFIELD - A bill allowing private electric utilities to negotiate secret rates with large industrial users passed the Illinois House Monday, but not before the worries of municipal power suppliers had been alleviated.

The provision, pushed by the nuclear powerhouse Commonwealth Edison, specifically exempts private utilities from laws against "rate discrimination," allowing private corporations to enter into proprietary rate schedules with large electric users.

The bill now heads to the Senate.

The Illinois Municipal Electric Agency, which represents 31 of the state's 41 municipally owned utilities including Springfield's City Water, Light and Power, opposed the measure out of fear that it didn't specifically prohibit private companies from luring away municipal customers with secret deals.

Although the Citizens Utility Board is neutral on the bill, other consumer groups say secret deals with industry would drive up residential rates.

Rep. Janice Schakowsky, D-Evanston, charged that the bill

was playing into Commonwealth Edison's hands "by letting in a little bit of competition for just the very biggest users while maintaining its monopoly status for those of us who don't have a chance" for such deals.

While big business gets a break, residential and other Commonwealth users in the Chicago area will continue to have the highest rates in the Midwest, Schakowsky said.

A recent court ruling denied Commonwealth the ability to set secret rates under an Illinois Commerce Commission pilot program because it violated a state law mandating published rates for all customers.

The bill's sponsor, Rep. Vincent Persico, R-Glen Ellyn, said the utility would be prohibited from passing along the costs of the industrial cuts. Those costs would be absorbed by the company's stockholders. CUB would review the rates and could file objections with the ICC, he said. But CUB would be prohibited from disclosing the rate in question.

Meanwhile, a separate bill supported by municipal utilities passed Monday, negating any potential competitive problems between them and private utilities.

Daniel Markey, an analyst for AgriAnalysis in Evanston, III., said the rain might be too

"The government statistics about the quality of the wheat crop is an indication to me that even if we do get a little bit of rain, it's not going to make a whole lot of difference.

The winter wheat crop has been plagued by extreme cold and dry weather all season. Weekly crop condition reports released af-

ter the market's close Monday showed 43 percent of Kansas crops were poor or very poor while crops in Oklahoma and Texas were in even worse condition. The report sent wheat futures soaring Tuesday.

"I don't think wheat really has a lot of room on the downside," Markey said.

In early trading, May wheat was down 31/2 cents at \$4.991/2 a bushel; May corn was up 1/2 cent at \$3.971/4 a bushel; May oats were down 1/2 cent at \$2.331/2 a bushel; and May soybeans were down 114 cents at \$7.3614 a

In early trading on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange, live cattle and feeder cattle futures were higher while live hogs and frozen pork bellies were mixed.



SPRINGFIELD — During a sometimes raucous debate, House lawmakers used words like "racist," "time warp" and "election-year stunt" in describing a pro-posal to force prison inmates to work in chain gangs.

The criticism from both Republican and The criticism from both Republican and Democratic lawmakers led Rep. Ron Wait, R-Belvidere, on Thursday to withdraw the proposal to permit the Illinois Department of Corrections to force immates to perform hard labor while chained together at the ankles.

The reaction in the House gives little chance for survival to a much stronger chain-gang bill approved on a vote of 40-12 hours earlier Thursday in the Senate. That bill also would permit off-duty correctional officers to carry concealed weapons and deny illiterate inmates good-time credits unless they learn to read

"Let's be clear about this. It's a stunt in

an election year. And it's a mean-spirited, cheap, political stunt, to boot,'' said Rep. Doug Scott, D- Rockford. ''It's shackling for the state of shackling.''

The legislation met with harsh resistance from Democratic lawmakers who said chain gangs promote images of slavery and the inhumane conditions of southern prisons in the early out to perf




